# Take a bow, teachers







# Recycled Percussion




Above: The trio opened the show by rocking out on construction ladders with DJ Dirty Soul mixing the house beats.



Chainsaws, plastic buckets and jackhammers were only a few of the items used to rock the crowd at Shippensburg University in late September. Filling Memorial Auditorium, students experienced the newest act sweeping colleges in America — Recycled Percussion's "Trash the Nation" tour.

Recycled Percussion consists of drummers Justin Spencer, Ethan Holmes and Greg Kassapis, as well as their DJ Jerami Bellofaetto better known as, "DJ Dirty Soul." This Junk Rock group was discovered at their high school talent show nine years ago and have been perfecting their act ever since. According to Spencer, Recycled Percussion, now on their third major U.S. tour, is performing, "Anywhere a crowd wants to rock."

The show started strong with DJ Dirty Soul mixing out his own rendition of Michael Jackson's "Beat It." Scratching and spinning, Dirty Soul warmed up the crowd and forced them to feel the beat and energy of the show. 





The Vagina Monologues returned to Shippensburg University this year for its second annual performance. On February 8-10, 22 of Shippensburg's own staff, students and alumni showcased the traumatic stories of many women involved in domestic violence through the use of music, humor and, above all, bravery.

This story, originally written by Eve Ensler, spread awareness on an issue that many people today have failed to take notice of — domestic violence. With a cast of 22 by her side, director Heather Edelen and all of the women involved put on an extremely good show.

"The idea behind the show as a whole is to essentially take back everything that has happened," stated Edelen.

These women's stories are so common, yet continually unheard, and this show portrayed a side of the abuse that will remain in many minds for a long while.

"I loved the Vagina Monologues. I think the production is empowering for women, but at the same time, it's something men can enjoy and laugh at (where appropriate)," said junior Maggie Rowan.

Before, during and after the show, the Shippensburg University Women's center, in collaboration with the National VDAY fund, raised a total of \$2,500 through the sale of tickets, pins and chocolates. From that total, 10 percent went directly to VDAY, who will in turn give the money to Iraqi women under siege. The last \$1,600 of the proceeds went to the YWCA in Carlisle, which has a shelter called the Sexual Assault/Rape Crisis Services of Cumberland County for domestic violence victims.

The last night of the show alone brought in nearly 200 people. With some of the skits being serious and others light-hearted, the Vagina Monologues brought a subject so easily forgotten to the forefront and did it in style.



Since 1871, Shippensburg University has changed drastically. With the construction of new classroom buildings, offices and residence halls, the university has adapted to the shifting environment of education. No doubt students, faculty, staff and visitors have noticed the construction over the years to improve the campus. With the original campus consisting of only five buildings, progress definitely has been made and spans almost 200 acres to enhance the learning and social environments of its students.

The buildings of the university have seen many faces and functions, starting with Old Main, erected in 1870, once the central hub of the university and now the administration building. Stewart Hall followed in Old Main's footsteps in 1893 as the campus's gymnasium, then the student activity center and finally home to the theater arts. Horton Hall (1895), at first the women's dorm, now houses the geography and history department heads. The Martin House has been the residency of SU's presidents since 1907 and is currently home to President Anthony F. Ceddia. Since SU was first a state teachers' school, Gilbert Hall has reflected its history as formally functioning as the adult education building and model school, but presently holds classrooms for the geography and earth science departments. Henderson Gymnasium, where the dance troupe practices and where many intramural teams practice, was once the alumni gym before Heiges Field House was built in 1971. The end of the 1960s and start of the 1970s were momentous years in SU's history, with the construction, dedication and openings of many of the residence halls, Seth Grove Stadium, the Cumberland Union Building (CUB), Ezra Lehman Memorial Library and Franklin Science Center.

As years progressed and the number of students grew, new buildings were needed to fulfill needs of students and faculty. In 1993 John L. Grove Hall, home of the business college, was dedicated and opened. Currently the Performing Arts Center is under construction and will be the newest edition to campus, seating over 1,500 people and housing the music department, classrooms and labs.

Jim Stuart, a student of SU in the '70s and back to finish his education, comments, "There is a lot more recreation for students on campus as far as fields and such. The intramural fields behind Mowrey Hall were a golf course back in the '70s."

Certainly many aspects of SU have changed to accommodate the times, but one thing remains the same: SU is a great place to learn, grow, live and remember.

When students move away from home, there are many things that take getting used to. From crazy schedules, independent decision making and meeting hundreds of new people daily, the first weeks of college can be extremely overwhelming. On top of all of the major changes, there is always the experience of eating in a dining hall for the first time.

Here at Shippensburg, students are given three options on campus as far as places they can use their meal plans. Those choices include Reisner Dining Hall, Kriner (affectionately named Kriner Diner) and the CUB. Each offering a wide variety of choices, it does not take students long to determine which place they prefer. Whether it be convenience, friends' preferences or food preferences, the three dining halls are strategically placed on campus to provide the utmost accessibility to all students.

"Well, I eat at all of them out of necessity. Kriner is closed on the weekends, you see, but it is definitely my first preference. The staff is very personable, and although none of the dining options have a great amount of selection, Kriner has, by far, more choices on any given day," stated freshman Matt Stern.

Reisner is the biggest of the three, offering six food lines including Hometown, Mexican, Pasta, Pizza, Sandwich line and Grill. The dining hall also offers a full spread of desserts, as well as two salad and soup bars. Kriner, the newer of the three, offers much the same, however it is confined to a smaller space and many students prefer the more intimate feel. The CUB provides pizza line, sandwich line, grill and specialty line.

"I eat at Reisner because it's the closest diner to me, and the CUB when I want to bring food back to the dorms," explained freshman Laura Vitacco.

The CUB and Reisner are located near Mowrey Hall, Seavers Complex and the library. Kriner is behind Old Main, and in front of Keifer and the dorms located on the farther end of campus.

"I eat at Kriner...it's cleaner and the food seems better," said sophomore Tim Dutko.

Overall, students here at Shippensburg are given ample options when determining where to eat. Although their reasons may vary, Shippensburg students will never walk away hungry when leaving the dining halls.








Right: The camera and blue screen allow SUTV to impose images in the background.




Left: The Slate is the campus newspaper that keeps students up-to-date on the happenings around campus.





# Football

Led by head coach Rocky Rees, Shippensburg University's football team finished the 2004 season with a winning record of 10-1, but lost in the first game of the NCAA Division II playoffs against West Chester.

Having lost only one game to Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP), the Red Raiders improved on last year's 8-3 season. With 17 of last year's starters returning, including all 11 offensive players, the Raiders secured the 2004 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Western Division title.

This year's star offensive players included 2003 PSAC Western Division Offensive Player of the Year, John Kuhn at fullback; tight end Joel Gamble; wide receiver Patrick Ferguson; and offensive tackle Greg Hutchinson. This year's defensive team was led by Brent Grimes at cornerback; Ryan Hoffman at defensive end; and linebacker Dan Walsh.

In their Aug. 28 season opener, the Raiders defeated the Kutztown Golden Bears 35-0 at Seth Grove Stadium.

After winning at home against Shepherd College and then Bloomsburg, the Raiders traveled to Millersville University to defeat the Marauders 49-27 on Sept. 18. This win marked the first time since 1993 in Raider record books that the team had started a season winning four straight games. This game also marked Kuhn's career-high rushing record of 234 yards. The victory at Millersville set the stage for the Raiders to win their first PSAC Western Division game against the Edinboro University Fighting Scots Sept. 25 at home.

In a game against the IUP Indians on Oct. 2, the Shippensburg team suffered its first shutout in eight seasons when IUP scored 17 points. This loss was even more disappointing to Ship fans since the Raiders entered the game ranked first in the Northeast Region, while IUP ranked 10th.

Making a comeback after the defeat to IUP the week earlier, the Red Raiders were victorious against Lock Haven University on Oct. 9. Helping his team win the game with a score of 45-7, Tony Gomez threw for a career high 228 yards, locking in Ship's seventh-straight victory against the Bald Eagles at home.

In their final regular season game, the Raiders beat the No. 2-ranked West Chester Golden Rams in a 24-21 game at Farrell Stadium on Nov. 6.

Although they were defeated in the playoffs, they made their marks in Ship's record books for the first time in over a decade.






Left: A swarm of Raider defense tackles Slippery Rock's offense.



# Wonens Soccer



# Men's Soccer

After finishing the 2003 season with a record of 11-7, the men's soccer team was poised to continue their success in 2004. The team's overall improvement came with both the help and leadership skills of captains Aaron Bush and Jake Deininger.

Bush was named an All-PSAC second team selection in 2002. Bush anchored the defense along with his teammate, junior Roman Navarro. Fellow captain Deininger, led the team in assists the past three years, setting team records in single season and career assists, as well as being named to the All-PSAC first team.

One of the team's main goals was to make it to the conference playoffs. "We wanted to make playoffs this year and to have a shot at tournament, anything beyond that would be extra," team member Bill Davis said. Davis stepped into the starting goalkeeper position this season. Davis, a senior, played in 13 games in three years, making a total of 52 saves for his team.

Midfielder Adam Borwick scored with less than one minute remaining in the first overtime period to give the Raiders another 2-1 victory.

The team also benefited from the help of Andy Jennings, who was named PSAC Men's Soccer Player of the Week for his performance during the week of Sept. 27 to Oct. 3. Jennings, a senior, posted five goals and one assist against rivals Goldey-Beacom and Bridgeport. Shippensburg beat Goldey-Beacom, 6-1, and No. 17-ranked Bridgeport, 4-1.

After numerous close competitions, the Raider's overall aggressive play and solid ability made their team a tough opponent this season.







# Mens Cross Country

After a strong 2003 season, expectations for the men's cross country team were high again this year. "Our expectations are primarily to accomplish something this school has never experienced in years past; that is a PSAC championship in cross country," sophomore Allen Pryde, one of the top runners for the team, said.

The Raiders began the 2004 season ranked at No. 22 in the preseason poll. They fell to a No. 25 ranking in the regular season poll, but not before winning key races along the way.

When asked who these were, Pryde said, "We are our own biggest challenge with respect to staying healthy and doing the proper things that will allow us to compete at PSACs, with teams such as Lock Haven and Edinboro who, on paper, are our toughest opponents."

The Raiders' drive and focus, as well as their ability to work together efficiently, allowed them to achieve their full potential this season.

Pryde said, "Our team is very strong in both aspects of mentality and physical strength. I have witnessed people suffering throughout races and workouts but they are so driven to do anything for our team that they have a huge heart and strong willpower." "We're practicing more and taking more initiative to practice on our own. We also try to be more supportive of everyone," team captain, junior, Lina Pavilianyte said.








# Cheerleading





Returning from a rebuilding year last year with nine freshmen and two seniors, the team boasts all of its players from the previous season except three and stands to be a serious contender in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Western Division.

When asked to discuss the differences between this season as compared to last season, Hudson said, "We are more of a team, everyone's friends on and off the court. It's more fun. We're more experienced and we know what we have to do."

One of the most aggressive players on the team, Hudson has led the PSAC ranked nationally in steals and assists. 







# Wonens Swinning

After coming back to the pool after a strong 2003-2004 season, the Shippensburg's women's swim team strived to improve on last season's record. Finishing with a 2-3 dual meet record, the Lady Raiders were led into the season by head coach Tim Verge and assistant coach Kerrie Fineran.

Sophomore Sarah Allen said, "Ship swimming is well-known for its hard work and success." After disappointing defeats against Lafayette College and St. Bonaventure University in October, the Lady Raiders began anew in November as they secured their first season victory at Slippery Rock University on Nov. 5. Unfortunately, the ladies couldn't hold their own against the Clarion University Golden Eagles when they lost their Nov. 6 meet.

The Lady Raiders made quite a comeback Nov. 13 when they beat the Edinboro Fighting Scots. With the help of senior Kim Magnanelli and freshman Kelcie Baber, the women won eight of their 14 events during the dual meet.

Magnanelli, the reigning Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) champion in the 200-yard backstroke, placed first in her event and first in the 200-yard freestyle. Baber swam in the 200-yard butterfly and also placed first in the 100-yard freestyle. The 200-yard medley relay team consisting of Magnanelli, sophomore Jill Snyder, Baber and freshman Shannon Rose claimed first place.

These Lady Raiders had to prove themselves when competing against the likes of NCAA Division I teams such as Duke University, Yale University and the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. The swimmers landed ninth place overall at the Patriot Invitational held at George Mason University. The relay team of Magnanelli, Snyder, Baber and Rose had the best showing with a 4:02.06 finish in the 400-yard medley relay.

In their first meet of the new semester, the Lady Raiders lost against the Bloomsburg University Huskies. The successful relay team of Baber, Snyder, senior Lauren Keller and freshman Kristin Mack won the 200-yard medley relay. Baber won all four of her events in that meet.

Practicing twice a day during the week, the lady swimmers are among the hardest-worked athletes at Shippensburg.

"We're probably one of the few teams that do two-a-day practices. You can always spot a swimmer around campus by stiff walking and walking slowly up stairs," Allen said.

Fellow teammate Smith placed in 100 backstroke at the PSAC championships with a time of 55.89. Great talent in the back is shown by other swimmers, including Nellett, senior Mike Coleman and freshman Mike Fleming.

The relay team of four skilled swimmers has pushed the men to achieve recognition in this race. Again, the strength and depth of the swimmers has proved beneficial to the team as they swam and worked their way to the top and to the finish line. Owen and Nellett placed fourth at the PSAC championships in the 800-yard free relay with their time of 7:10.99.





Helping about 600 SU students, the sports medicine staff is accustomed to a wide variety of injuries and aches. The staff aides about 20 sports teams throughout the entire year, making the sports medicine students present on the fields and courts almost as often as the athletes are. The staff tends to be made of biology, business and education majors who learn essential skills that will come in use in their careers.


"What our work study students are doing right now is they come and they are first responders, first aid, things like that, general medical prevention," explained Wes Mallicone, director of sports medicine.

Students generally become interested in sports medicine because they were former student athletes at the high school level who have come to college for more training and expertise. Also, these students might have been injured in a high school sport and have taken their concerns to their local certified athletic trainer at the high school. These trainers might have fueled their students' growing interest in the field and encouraged them to pursue such work.

The students' training go far beyond the classroom. Most are certified in CPR, First Aid, AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) and receive their training through the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross.

Mallicone said of his job as sports medicine director, "Today I took an athlete to the doctor's office he said, 'Hey I appreciate you taking me to the doctor's office' because he wasn't able to. Those are the things that make your job worthwhile."



Team captains Christie Slaughter, Kelly Frick, Tunisia Lacy and Linsday Govern have pulled together a solid team that has already broken school records.


The women's most difficult opponent, Kutztown University, has seen great efforts and strengths from the competitors time after time.

This season the Raiders sailed past the competition. The team was led by captains Alton Richards, Mark Piccolo, Terry Lillicrap and John Pacovsky.






This high jumper clears the pole without any difficulty.



# Softball







# Baseball

Led by head coach Bruce Peddie, the 2005 Shippensburg University baseball team came off one of its best seasons in school history. Last season, the team won over 40 games and was the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Western Division champion.

Traveling all over Pennsylvania, Florida, North and South Carolina and West Virginia, the baseball team had a consistent season, ending with a 22-21 record on the season and a 6-6 record in the PSAC West division.

Pitcher Nathan Starner was named Western Division Pitcher of the Week in March when he set a new school record for strikeouts in his seven-inning game, with 16 strikeouts, crushing the previous record of 14 strikeouts. Starner set the record at the Raiders' 2-0 victory at home against East Stroudsburg University.

The Raiders got the season off to a good start with a 6-2 record in the first eight games against Mt. Olive College (N.C.) and Wingate University (N.C.).

The baseball team's next big win of the season came in mid-April when they beat Slippery Rock University three games in a row, with scores of 6-1, 6-0 and 9-0 respectively, but ended the series with an 8-6 loss against The Rock.

Kappa Sigma was founded at Shippensburg in the spring of 2004. Kappa Sigma was formed nationally in the fall of 1869, at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. Kappa Sigma is a fraternity steeped in the traditions of the past and dedicated to the Pursuit of Learning. Kappa Sigma is one of the five largest fraternities in the United States and Canada and records 215 chapters and colonies.

# Sigma Tau Gamma ETF

Sigma Tau Gamma, originally established at Shippensburg University on March 9, 1959, has become a national social fraternity dedicated to promoting lifelong friendships and committed service to both the university and the surrounding community. Sigma Tau Gamma became the seventh social fraternity on Shippensburg's campus when it established a colony of 21 men on April 3, 2004. Prior to this, the Beta Epsilon chapter of Sigma Tau Gamma was closed in 1999 due to low numbers and a large national debt. Since the April colonization, however, the organization has become successful again within both the community and with the university. Now spread to more than 100 college campuses across the United States, the fraternity was founded at the Central Missouri State Teacher's College in Warrensburg, Mo. in 1920.

Brothers of Sigma Tau Gamma stress certain qualities that each of their members must attain. These include excellence in academic, athletic and social endeavors, as well as leadership, integrity and friendship through brotherhood. Members of the fraternity frequently participate in numerous activities both on and off campus, sometimes with other fraternities and sororities. One event that members take part in is the Big Brothers Big Sisters Bowl for Kids' Sake. In addition to tackling events and community service projects, members of Sigma Tau Gamma also excelled in their academic studies in 2004. The fraternity was honored with earning the highest GPA in both the spring and fall semesters of 2004.

Members of Sigma Tau Gamma can read about their own and other members' activities in their publication, which is called The SAGA of Sigma Tau Gamma, and is released several times a year. Readers can find articles such as, "Sigma Tau Gamma Governance System" and "Gamma Chi Chapter Celebrates 30 Year Anniversary." When Sigma Tau Gamma members graduate from Shippensburg University, they can still be active within the fraternity. There are three ways for alumni members to remain actively involved. These include participation in a college chapter alumni association, participation in an alumni chapter and service as a regional or national officer of the fraternity. Alumni may be involved simultaneously in one, two or all three of these participation avenues

While members of Sigma Tau Gamma might look forward to graduation and getting a job within their desired field, they can know that they will always have a brotherhood of friends nearby wherever they travel.







#### Volunteers Club

During the Fall 2004 semester, the Volunteers Club spent a total of 316 hours volunteering in the community.


Aleia Myers, an active participant in the club, commented on her membership, "I enjoy the Volunteers Club because it allows me to give back to the community."



# Tim Russert

With the days leading up the 2004 Presidential Election, every day seemed to bring with it new information, views and controversies surrounding President George W. Bush and Democratic Party candidate Sen. John Kerry.

On Sept. 20, Tim Russert, best known as the moderator of NBC's "Meet the Press," spoke to an eager audience in Heiges Field House about the heated presidential race. According to Russert, the number of Americans on Social Security in 14 years will increase to almost 80 million — a staggering number compared to the already overwhelming 40 million currently on the program.

"A president can't handle tough decisions unless followed by tough questions," Russert said. Some of these decisions include the deficit, the war in Iraq, homeland security and the future of the nation's children.

Russert urged his audience, from elder community members to SU's freshmen, to vote, especially as members of one of the three most important swing states, Pennsylvania.

Russert also spoke about the state of the country's children and said that in order to have a strong future, there must be citizens to maintain and make America prosper.

"They are loved unconditionally, but they are not entitled," Russert warned the students.

Russert remained honest and non-partisan and he offered a wealth of information on the impacts of the political scene past, present and future.

"You have to determine what course you want the country to take," Russert said as he wrapped up his speech.

As Election Day wrapped up, President George W. Bush was declared the winner. Many networks included Russert speaking as one of the foremost experts on the Presidential race, with charts and projections that showed careful study and consideration.

While the country gets a glimpse of Russert on television, students, professors and the community surrounding Shippensburg University obtained a first-hand account of the election and the current political situation from one of politics' leading commentators.



## Winter Graduation

For most students, graduation symbolizes a lifelong dream of earning a degree, as well as the opportunity to move out into the workforce and put their newly developed skills to use. On Saturday, Dec. 18, Shippensburg students proudly walked into Heiges Field House to accept their diplomas for winter graduation.

A total of 740 students received degrees at the ceremony, 447 undergraduate, and 227 graduate students. Out of the undergraduate degrees, 227 were from the College of Arts and Sciences, 130 were from the College of Education and Human Services and 120 were from the John L. Grove College of Business.






"It was an awesome experience. The CUB turned into an awesome place with fun activities," said freshman Rachel Bruno.





# Della Reese

In honor of the Gifted Minority Scholarship benefit dinner, Shippensburg University welcomed actress, singer and ordained minister Della Reese on Thursday, Feb. 17. This year marked the 20th anniversary of the scholarship dinner; the fund for the scholarship began 22 years ago. The event, which was held in Heiges Field House, drew a large crowd of students, faculty and members of the Shippensburg community.

Born in 1931, Reese was raised in the "slums" of Detroit. "I'm before Motown," Reese said. However, Reese was able to rise above her meager situation, becoming the first in her family to attend high school. She relied on her family's support to get to where she is today.

Reese said of her mother's strong influence, "Without the spiritual platform that my mother gave me to stand on, I never would have been able to do any of the things that I've been able to do."

Reese is probably best known for her role as Tess, the gruff but goodhearted angel who steers her human "assignments" back on the right path, on the hit television show "Touched By An Angel." Reese, who earned Emmy Award and Golden Globe nominations for the role, knew that the show would be a hit before it became popular.

Reese told the Shippensburg audience, "This is going to work because this is God's thing,"

After "Touched By An Angel" ended, Reese focused on her career as an ordained minister; she has an active congregation in Los Angeles.

"I wanted to have this relationship with God. I wanted to be able to tell him what I needed and have him respond," Reese said. At the ceremony, Reese encouraged students and other audience members to do whatever they want in life, even if others doubt them. Her positive outlook was in part shaped by previous health problems; Reese has had three aneurisms and two brain surgeries. She has looked to religion to help her overcome her troubles.

Reese said of her experiences, "If you go to God for your highest good, he will let you do and be for you your highest good." Reese ended the evening with a final message that was aimed at the students. She told the students to do what they can with what they already have.


Concluding the ceremony on a positive note, Reese said, "You should specialize in something. But in specializing in something, you shouldn't cut off all of the other things that you are good at."


## May Graduation 2005




Graduate student Pamela Peters said, "I think it's really powerful for people of different backgrounds on campus to come together like this...for this cause."


Programs are available for one semester or a year and do not necessarily cost more than a semester or year at Shippensburg University. Interested students should start planning about a


Sometimes shocked by the differences in other countries, many students find themselves adapting and appreciating the traditions and ways of life of a variety of people.



"I have no plans. I'm going to Las Vegas to try and gamble away some of my student loans," senior Alison Sanouvong said.


There are many options for students after they graduate. Some are looking to go right out into the career world, others are getting





# Bookstore Going Internet

As the times change, so does Shippensburg University, including the University Store, a popular place in the bustling and busy CUB. One of the store's main focuses is providing students a way to buy their books. Of course for many years, students have stood in long lines with baskets of heavy books, manuals and CD software.

In April 2004, the university store opened its Internet "doors" to allow students the ease and opportunity to purchase their books online. Pam Booker, book department manager, has commented that the change has proved very successful in accomplishing students' book-buying needs.

The first students to take advantage of the online bookstore were 2004 summer school students.

"I used it last summer. I had to pick up the books at the store, but it was faster and more convenient," senior Grace Burchett commented.

For the fall 2004 semester, 400 students used the technology in anticipation for the schoolwork ahead of them. With approximately 1,000 students using it so far, the online bookstore is convenient for both on and off-campus students. The new program has saved off-campus students from the hectic and time-consuming tradition of looking on index cards for the correct textbooks, and then waiting in lines winding through the store.

To use the online store, a student must first create an account. All information concerning this prodecure is provided on the Web site. The other information the student needs is the department, course number and the class section. A choice for "new" or "used" books lets the students choose the condition of their books, just like in years past. The store accepts credit cards (Discover, MasterCard and Visa). Although students must pay freight charges and taxes, these charges are a small negative to the convenience and time saved by using the Internet for buying the coming semester's materials.



### President Ceddia Retires

The walls on the third floor of Old Main are lined with pictures of straight-faced men in bow ties and stiff suits. Below their scraggly beards are nameplates with familiar names such as Heiges, McCreary, Eckels, Gilbert and Lehman. The latest picture on the wall of past presidents of Shippensburg University depicts the clean-shaven face and toothy smile of Anthony F. Ceddia. While the inviting portrait emits warmth and friendliness, it does little to fully express the depth of the man who has led Shippensburg University for the past 24 years.

Ceddia, who will retire this June, is a man of small stature but possesses a deep, even voice with just a hint of a Boston accent.

"It's been a wonderful experience here and a pleasure to work with everyone here, especially the students," he said. But their lives were changing with three small grandchildren already here and a fourth coming.

"I was hungry to spend time with them. There was a strong family pull," he said. "I had to miss a lot of things in my son and daughter's lives and I wanted to make up for it and be a part of my grandchildren's lives."

Also, Ceddia's battle with prostate cancer in 2003 sobered him a little to the reality of life.

"It sent the message that I'm vulnerable. If you don't have your health, you can't do much," he said. That pushed the idea of retirement closer to the forefront. Ceddia has regular check-ups every six months, and continues to boast a "clean bill of health."

However, retirement won't mean Shippensburg University students have seen the last of Ceddia. He and his wife bought a villa in Fayetteville, in order to be close by and maintain what Ceddia says are "long-standing friendships." He said they will come back for events and will help in any way the university needs them in the future.

"Nothing means more to me than walking across campus, or in the CUB and dining halls, and having a student make eye contact and ask me how I'm doing," he said.

Not only the students, but also the faculty and staff at Shippensburg University have taught Ceddia much about himself and life.

"I've learned to respect the potential and promise people have," he said.

Ceddia said he has learned to never underestimate human potential.

"What you see is never what you ultimately get," he said. "The most exciting thing is seeing human potential actualize itself." Following in Ceddia's footsteps as interim president will be current dean of student affairs Jody Harpster.







# Colophon

"Scraps of the Past, Pieces of the Future" is the 88th Volume of the CUMBERLAND. The CUMBERLAND is the official yearbook of Shippensburg University, a member of the Pennsylvania Commonwealth's State System of Higher Education. The page size for this volume is 9x12 inches incorporating 256 pages, printed with first quality printer's black in on 80-pound, triple-coated matte paper.

The cover was designed by the yearbook staff with assistance from Jaime Belcher, a member of Herff Jones' cover artist design staff. The cover is 4-Color Litho with Matte Lamination. These elements were all combined and applied to a 160-point Binders Board. The endsheets, designed by Kris Fedysky, were printed front and back using Specialty Grain Series stock paper with navy ink applied to all.

Adobe PageMaker 6.5 and Adobe Illustrator 5.5 were used for the typography and layout of the book. The fonts were chosen from a library of Adobe fonts provided by Herff Jones. All pages were produced by staff members using Power Macintosh G3 computers. Photography was provided by various staff members, as well as DaVor Photography, located in Bethlehem, Pa. Jim Rainey served as our representative from DaVor. Herff Jones, located in Gettysburg, Pa., was the book publisher. Marilyn Matiland served as our representative from Herff Jones.

Expenses were paid for by the Shippensburg University Student Association, along with several fund-raisers by the CUMBERLAND Yearbook staff members.
