





Working out the cost of fitness

Students have mixed feelings about the fee to use the Student Recreation Center

very Shippensburg University student paid \$167 a semester to have access to the Student Recreation Center. For those who take full advantage of what the facility has to offer, this price could be considered a bargain. However, considering that student fees paid for the construction of the building, those who did not use the gym frequently may have some objections.

The facility was not accessible during winter break, and could only be used by students during the summer if they paid an additional summer fee.

To the average student who went home when classes were not in session, the gym was only open for eight months a year. If the gym was only open for eight months, than every student paid over \$40 a month for access to it.

Most of the dues went toward the upkeep of the facility, but not all studentsawere aware of everything the center has to offer.

The gym included four basketball courts that could be used for volleyball or indoor tennis. There was also an indoor track, two racquetball courts and a full fitness center that included cardio equipment and weights.

It was easy to overlook the fitness room that was used daily for scheduled fitness and aerobic classes. Most of these classes were taught by students, and even included Zumba, a cardio class that incorporates salsa music and dance. Also, there were yoga classes as well as other specific workouts.

After listing everything the gym has to offer, senior Tony Russo still thought that \$40 a month is too much.

"I got a membership at LA Fitness at home and I pay less than \$40 a month. LA Fitness not only offers more, but the facilities and machines are much better," Russo said. "My main problem with the gym is that the fitness area is too small. The only time I can go to the gym and lift is when it

first opens or two hours before it closes because it is always so cramped."

Russo admitted to going to the center a few times a week, but believed that \$40 a month is too much.

"I think a lot of students overlook how much they pay for the gym because it is lumped in with the large sum that is due for every semester."

Most students paid more than \$3,000 a semester in fees, and the rec fee is just a small part of it.

Senior Jason Edwards didn't mind the fee. "I go to the gym a couple of times a week," Edwards said, "and I don't think that \$40 a month is too much. I

get a lot out of the gym, plus it is open from, like, 6 to 11 on weekdays, which are longer hours than most gyms."

Penn State University has several recreational facilities on its campus, but only charges the students if they choose to pay for a membership. Edwards prefers SU's fee.

"It costs a lot more than \$334 a year to go to the gym at PSU. I prefer that every student chip in a little bit, so that we can all use the recreation center," Edwards said.





Next on our list: Huber art Center

Renovations begin to upgrade the 79-year-old building

rt students and faculty had to vacate their home in Huber Art Center in order for contractors to begin work on the improvements and upgrades.

The building was originally built in 1931, and served as the campus library until the opening of the Ezra Lehman Memorial Library. Since then, the art

department had found a home within its walls. It also had an upgrade in 1970.

This project had been one of several for the campus, with recent openings of the new Student Rec Center, and the renovations of the Dauphin Humanities Center, the Ezra Lehman Memorial Library, and Reisner Dining hall.

Reunifications were also slated to begin in the summer of 2010 on the Anthony F. Ceddia Union Building.

After decades of use and an increased interest in the art department, the building was ready for renovations. In its last year of use, many art students used the walls of the building as a canvas for their creations.

Some of the problems with the building were limited laboratory space to work on projects.

Often times, art students were forced outside to work on projects, particularly sculpting. Other problems included a general lack of space, and a poor HVAC system.

One of the biggest renovations will be the new three-story addition tied directly into each floor of the original building. There will also be an increased size of laboratories, and more galleries and locker space.

The floor-plan layout will be improved, and all mechanical, HVAC, pliable, electrical, and technology systems will be replaced.

Once the project is complete, slated for spring 2011, there will be 6,000 more square feet. The total cost for the project was \$5,728,000.

In addition to the renovations, the building will have some green features. For example, recycled materials, like aluminum and metals will be used to compose the majority of the new building, all sealants, adhesives, and paints are to have low volatile organic compounds, and all spaces will have adjustable temperature controls to prevent over heating or cooling.

Temporarily, the art department had moved to the Faculty Office Building, which still had its limitations, but the wait for the new building should be well-worth it.

At the ground-breaking ceremony, President William Ruud said, "Today is the start of another milestone in the university's history and a step toward a wonderful future of success, and, no doubt, some great art."



Eat, study, sleep (if you're lucky)

a fter months of anticipation from students and faculty, Reisner Dining Hall and the Ezra Lehman Memorial Library held ribbon-cutting ceremonies on Sept. 12.

Students explored the new upgrades since the beginning of the semster, but the ceremonial openings marked their official openings.

Reisner, a place many students got to for their meals, now seats 900 people. For those older students who remember going into little rooms to get their food and sitting at small, cramped tables, the new building is a welcomed treat.

The dining area is also home to the cooking area, where students can see chefs prepare the food. The open layout features a salad bar, a sandwich bar, a dessert bar, a grill, and a variety of foods served, including American, Italian, Mexican, and Chinese.

The Tuscarora Room for banquets is now 8,000 square feet, with a versatile layout. Originally built in 1965, the \$17 million project also featured an exterior upgrade.

The library's upgrades were all interior, but it was completely transformed. The open floor plan allowed for a better environment for group study and collaborative projects. In addition, there are new instruction labs, offices, group study rooms, an art gallery and offices.

Improvements included HVAC and duct work, as well as an upgraded telecommunication system. The Learning Center is now located on the mail floor, as well as the Ask Us Anything station, where students can go for extra help.

The \$1.5 million project renovated 24,000 square feet to the building, which was originally built in 1967.




One additional new feature were occupancy censors. These censors sense when someone is in the room and turn on the lights, and when the room is empty, the lights go off in order to save energy.

There are computers in the main floor area, which form several islands of technology. Scanners and printers are also available for use.

During finals week, it became clear how valuable the upgrades were. Students had new places to go for group study, a common situation for students with difficult classes.

The availability of computers, as well as a constant supply of caffiene from Starbucks, and the closed rooms encouraged studying for students who were eager to complete the semester and head home for a well-needed break.

he National Association of Black Accountants hosted their first annual NABA week, kicking it off with a poetry slam. The Words from the Heart Poetry Slam took place at McFeely's Café on Wednesday, Feb. 3.

"Good evening! I said good evening!" said guest speaker Gerald Proctor, or "Conscious" on stage. Centered in York, Pa., the poet of 29 years was keeping the audience alive by spitting out a few slam rhymes of his own before beginning the competition.

Consisting of eight contestants and two rounds, Words from the Heart, was more about the enjoyment of poetry than the art of competition.

First round contestants were Juan Zabala, Benjamin Balutis, Carina Paulino, Januarie Taylor, Terrance Griffin, Trane Overton, Marcus Cooper and Dimonique Thompson. It was up to each contestant to lay down his or her own piece of work. Some sat, some stood, some used paper and some had it memorized. One of the contestants, Januarie Taylor threw her papers when she was done with them.

There were long lines of prose poetry and short lines of blank verse. Slamming about religion, crime, love, homosexual ideals and problems and sleep were only half of the things

Before finishing up the night, Conscious added a few light-heartening words:

With the amount of attendance, the NABA was able to give out prizes to the poets who won. Each received gift cards to Wal-Mart.

Paulino, the winner of the NABA poetry slam, is a sophomore. Paulino has been into poetry and writing since she was young. This is her first slam contest, though back at home in Philadelphia, she attends open mic nights to recite her works.

"I really don't worry too much about the competition," said Paulino, "I believe that there are no poets better than any, because if you're writing from your heart, you can't be bad."

"We wanted the Ship community to get an opportunity to interact with the members of NABA and get to know them on a personal level," said Walter Brown, the organizer of this event.

The path to peace and happiness

Bhante Sujatha explains his life as a monk and offers advice for students

f you want to find peace and happiness, start with yourself."

This was the main message from Bhante Sujatha, a Buddhist monk who came to Shippensburg on Feb. 25, 2010 to talk about peace, happiness and how to find them.

Sujatha believed that happiness was a choice and a person needed to make that choice.

As he was talking to the group it was obvious that Sujatha has chosen happiness.

He entered the monastery at age 11 and grew up in there. Sujatha cleared up the misconception that monks were cut off from the world, talking about his travels in the United States and his encounters with students.

One aspect he emphasized was how monks do not just wear long robes and march around all day praying. Rather, monks do lead an ordinary life outside of the monastery.

He relayed a story that explained what he meant. One day, Sujatha went to the gym dressed in basketball shorts and a shirt.

When he saw one of his students from the monastery, the student did not recognize him because he was dressed differently than when he was teaching in the monastery.

Sujatha explained that he did have a normal life besides

the one he led when he was in the monastery.

Even though Sujatha experienced life both as a regular man and a man of faith, he realizes that excitement in life is dangerous.

People have asked him if he was excited to make a trip to the West. He replies to this question by saying he was happy to go but was mindful of his experience there.

He was mindful because he had to accept the way life was in the West, and know he could not change it.
Still, he realized he might be able to open up some minds.

With this perspective, eight years ago, Sujatha established the Lotus Temple with three people.

The Temple expanded, and Sujatha explained there were several Temple locations throughout the United States.

Snowmageddon hits Shippensburg

Decade's first major blizzard caused accidents, snow days, and lots of shoveling

record-breaking snowstorm, named by some as "Snowmageddon," had blanketed the nation. The blizzard hit nearly every inch of North America and even had a death toll as a result.

Pennsylvania was victim to the snowfall, even though it was not hit the hardest. The areas of Harrisburg, Chambersburg

> and Carlisle received more than inches of snow.

Shippensburg University was affected severely by the snowfall. There was debate as to whether or not school should be in session because of unsafe walking and driving conditions.

Whether school was in session or responsibility of getting to their jobs and internships, both in and out of town.

Alan Brauer, a student at SU and former employee at Little Caesar's, was a victim of the icy roads.

"I was heading to work one day when I got in the accident. I was coming down the hill at Queen Street by Sheetz and I knew I was losing control at the time, but by the time I knew it, it was too late to turn around."

Brauer described his thought process while sliding on the roads,"I figured I'd just keep going and if I got to the Sheetz parking lot I could be safe there and I would tell my work there was no way I could come in. I was coasting down the hill and I felt like I was sliding. I put the brakes on and went sideways and hit into two different cars."

Students at SU trekked through the knee-high mounds of snow just to get to their classes or the campus dining halls. Students with vehicles found themselves shoveling out their cars several times throughout the storm.

Professor Tim Hawkins of the Shippensburg geology department said that the specific type of storm that hit most of the Atlantic region was called a nor-easter storm. It was a specific type of storm that moves up the coast in a counter-clockwise pattern.

The storm originated in the Atlantic Ocean and then swirled not, several SU students still had the into the Northeastern region. The storm then moved to the Pennsylvania area, which was where the precipitation was dumped.

> Hawkins also said that global warming does indeed have an effect on precipitation amounts. "As the temperature rises, air can hold more moisture; hot humid air holds more water vapor," said Hawkins. "If the storm can hold more water, then there will be a noticeable increase in snowfall."

> Though we experienced a rare and massive amount of snowfall this winter, we cannot dismiss the possibility of it happening again. Changes in the environment, such as rises of global warming, will continue to influence an increase in snowfall in the future.

> While no one can be sure of how much or how little snow will fall, one thing is for sure; the weather remains predictably unpredictable.

Lending our hearts to Haiti

The SU campus comes together to raise money for the troubled nation

he devastating earthquake in Haiti left thousands of citizens in need of aid. Shippensburg
University did its part to help rebuild the lives of those who were affected by starting a "Help for Haiti" campaign.

Students, faculty, clubs and organizations raised awareness and sought donations in an effort to lend a hand.

Groups such as the Multicultural Student Affairs held fundraisers through its member organizations and The African American Organization hosted a "Welcome Back" party in January that generated over \$700 that went towards Haiti relief efforts.

Kapri Chase, the African American Organization's treasurer, said there was a \$3 cover charge, but many students donated more money throughout the night.

The main goal of the fundraising efforts was "to do something that would really make a difference," said Diane Jefferson, the director of Multicultural Student Affairs.

Other organizations involved with Multicultural Student Affairs held additional "Help for Haiti" fundraisers in March and April.

"The Department of Athletics was one of the many areas included in the initial discussions regarding the initiative," said Carrie Michaels, the assistant director of athletics at Shippensburg University.

"Because it is such a great cause, we wanted to do our part to contribute," Michaels said.

The Student Athlete Advisory Committee, the SAAC, collected spare change at men's and women's basketball games. It also hosted a dodge ball tournament, with proceeds going to the "Have a Heart for Haiti" campaign.

Lacrosse teams and men's and women's soccer programs coordinated a two-mile run to raise money. The University Store collected donations as well.

According to Mark Werstein, manager of the University Store, every donation makes a difference.

"People may donate by "rounding up" their transaction. Some students have left their change, and others have simply donated a dollar or more," said Werstein.

He did some research and, with the help of the store's Point of Sale provider, was able to find a non-merchandise key that can be used to accept donations through the cash register.

The money raised by Shippensburg students, faculty, and organizations proved the campus cared about the larger world around them.

Faculty and students raise money for Haiti

t Shippensburg University, we were lucky to have some of the greatest faculty in the world, who have experience in their respective fields and can share insight and wisdom.

Apparently, though, we had some talented performers and philanthropists who have the courage to get in front of their peers and students to raise money for a nation in need.

On Tuesday, Feb. 23, some faculty and students performed on stage at "Ship Shines for Haiti." Under the direction and production of Prof. Paris Peet, with help from Prof. Debra Cornelius, a night of entertainment and fundraising was organized to help the devastated nation of Haiti.

Prof. Cornelius taught a sociology senior seminar class, in which the students must do a service learning project. Once the earthquake hit Haiti, she thought it would be a good

idea to raise money for Doctors Without Borders, who was helping the troubled nation. Her class teamed with Prof. Fisher's practice with organizations and communities class to put together the event.

In addition to the show, a silent auction was held to raise even more money. Faculty donated items such as a weekend at a beach house in Ocean City, Md., catered dinner for four, jewelry, art and other items.

On the day of the show, students and faculty worried no one would show for the event.

Prof. Cornelius wrote, "On the afternoon of the event, we had no pre-sold tickets. The students and faculty worried no one was going to come. On the night of the performance, we sold out of 500 tickets, and people were still lined up around the block!"

With the admission to the show and the silent auction, the faculty were able to raise \$7,000 to donate to Doctors Without Borders.

The local chapter of the Association of PA State College and University Faculties (APSCUF) sponsored the event.

On Jan. 12, a massive earthquake, 7.0 magnitude, hit the island nation of Haiti. The nation was poor as is, and the damage from the earthquake devastated the nation more.

Shippensburg also did its part through fundraisers like "Ship Shines for Haiti," "Have a Heart for Haiti," fundraising walk/runs and men's and women's basketball games. The women's lacrosse team also held fundraisers.

Cornelius also wrote, "Events such as this allow students to work for the greater good of people in need."







The school's mascot, Big Red, also made an appearance to help get the school fired up for the game the following day.


The cheerleaders also performed at the rally, doing their best to show support for the football team and the university.

On the next play, the Rams completed a seven-yard pass on fourth down, which brought a turnover and a clock without time.

After the game, the Shippensburg VFW awarded Offensive Player of the Game to Chase DiFebbo and Defensive Player of the Game to Travis Proctor.

As tradition, the halftime show featured the homecoming court and the winners were announced. The 2009 homecoming queen was Jenny Folan and the homecoming king was David Ness.

The final score and win of 24-19 proved to be the ultimate ending to a week filled with spirit and competition.

n Wed., March 24 Charlaine Harris came to speak at Shippensburg University about her career as a writer and the TV series based on her novels.

Harris considers herself very lucky because she "has had an amazing career," and has "never had to deal with rejection."

This was not hard to believe considering it seemed as if it would be downright impossible to reject anything that this bubbly, Southern woman was able to write.

Many people had taken to her works, which was obvious when anyone walked into a bookstore and saw shelves of her books.

Combating excessive energy use

Residence halls compete to save energy and help the earth

hile the colors of Shippensburg University are red and blue, the campus tried going green for the month of March with an eco-friendly contest. The goal was to see which residence hall could reduce each building's energy cost.

Called "SUstainability @ Ship," this experience was a student-lead effort to reduce energy waste on campus and was publicized through e-mails in March. The residence hall

that reduced its energy usage the most would be the winner. This announcement took place on Earth Day, April 22.

The campus of SU has nine residence halls, including Stone Ridge Commons, housing approximately 400 students each.

Every room is equipped with Internet, electrical sockets, heating and an on-site laundry room, each using a lot of energy in order to work.

The vast majority of students bring microwaves, televisions, laptops and other appliances as well.

With all the electricity used and the amount of students on campus, forgetting to turn off the lights when leaving the room can waste a lot of electricity.

The leaders of this campaign are Ashley Egresitz and Andrea Carpenter. Egresitz is the Resident Director of Naugle, a housing complex on the eastern campus wing, and Carpenter is the RD of McCune, the honors dormitory.

There were several easy ways to contribute to the program. A Facebook page was used as a tool to get students involved. The whole Shippensburg network was invited to join.

"We ran awareness campaigns through our Facebook page in order to save paper for ads, and placed 'HOT SPOT' indicators made from recycled newspaper in places in each residence hall that students could interact with to save energy," wrote Carpenter and Egresitz in an e-mail.

These tactics encouraged students to interact with each other to save energy. The auxiliary leaders tracked the power consumption for the whole month of March.

"They sent out e-mails," say freshman Lauren Cappuccio,
"But they really left it to the students to do something."

The webpage stressed the importance of doing little things that can leave a big impact. It hosted links on how and where to recycle computers and cell phones. The theme was "It IS easy being green!"

The winner was announced April 22. Out of all the dormitories on the SU campus, McLean Hall managed by far to lower its energy use.

During March 2010, McLean used 35,800 kilowatt hours of electricity; a decrease of 9900 hours from March 2009, saving \$626, according to the official write-up by Egresitz.

This contest was just one of the many activities residence halls provided for its students. Many residents assistants held programs for their respective residents, plus anyone else who wanted to attend.

Ollergies interfere with life

Academics and social lives can suffer

ere you ever kept from doing schoolwork due to a sickness? How about from seasonal or pet allergies? If your answer was yes, than you were like a majority of students at Shippensburg University.

As you sat in class on a warm day, the professor opened the window to let in a cool breeze to sweep away the salty sweat from your forehead. The wind rushed in, bringing in the scent of freshly-cut grass and the heavy weight of the humidity.

Yet along with those scents, a wave of pollen made its way into the room; your nose began to run, an itch began to develop in your throat and your eyes began to water. These were the symptoms people faced when dealing with allergies.

For Cierra Knepp, a 20-year-old accounting major at SU, her allergy symptoms tended to severely interfere with her work.

"Some days, I will feel sick and can't do any of my schoolwork," said Knepp, "I just have to lay down and wait until they goes away."

Knepp, who had to be on medication for her allergies, did not know she had it until she began coming to Shippensburg.

Allergies, according to the Education Training Research Associations, were usually inherited and incurable. There are treatments, such as the medicines Knepp used, which helped relieve the stresses that the allergies caused. If medicines were not easily accessible to a student, there were other methods that could help to reduce regular symptoms.

By using an air conditioner instead of opening doors and windows, it was easier to keep pollen out of the house. Also, by controlling dust and making animals sleep in their own area, allergy triggers were able to be kept to a minimum.

Sometimes, though, a student could not control these factors.



Zachary Shank, an 18-year-old freshman, was stuck in the dorms at SU and had difficulties escaping certain allergies.


"Since we don't have air conditioning, the only way to keep cool during the warmer weather is to open the windows," said Shank, "My nose always gets stuffy and I can never stop coughing."

During winter seasons, Shank said that "it's not much better" because of how stuffy the rooms got. Knepp, who lived in Seavers, ran into the same issues.

"Because we can't open the windows in Seavers, we have the same air circulating in here all season," said Knepp, "I always wake up with a sore throat and a stuffy nose."

Whether mild or severe, allergies were not something that anyone wanted to have. They not only interfered with schoolwork, but with social situations as well. Here at SU, students not only faced the difficulties of these allergies, but also the stresses of classes.

Nurturing creativity at the PAC

H. Ric Luhrs Performing Arts Center provides a creative venue for performers

ow many students had set foot inside of the H. Ric Luhrs Peforming Arts Center for something other than a class assignment?

When I surveyed students on the Shippensburg University campus I was not very surprised to find that many students only went to the PAC if they had a music class and had a requirement to watch a performance. Some students were not even aware where the center was located.

The PAC opened in December 2005, with the hope of attracting nationally-known performers and speakers. The center is named after the Navigating into the Future Campaign Chairman H. Ric Luhrs. The idea for the center was that of former SU president Tony Ceddia for over a decade. The vision for the center was to expand and nurture the creativity that was already taught on the SU campus.

The PAC had 1,500 seats, 73 being handicap and wheel chair accessible. There were several seating sections to choose from in the Grove Theatre such as: front orchestra, orchestra, upper orchestra, front balcony, side balconies and balcony sections. The theatre was built so that no matter where guests sat, they were able to view everything. The PAC included three VIP dressing rooms including lounge areas.

It also included two cast dressing rooms and one swing dressing room for large groups who perform at the PAC. Each room was equipped with make up tables and a bathroom, complete with a shower. The PAC had an instrument rehearsal room, two piano studios, keyboard laboratory, box office, food service, music library and classrooms.

The Director of Marketing and Administration

Services Jeffrey Sommer discussed how the performances were selected. The seasons for performances started in September and end in July. Sommer said that booking entertainment depends based on what the performers' schedules look like.

"Some of the performers were booked at the end of last season; others are still being booked right now. Once performers and dates are approved I gather the information needed to start advertising and marketing," Sommer said.

When asked if the PAC was geared toward SU students or the general public, Sommer responded that it was not solely focused on SU students.

"There are programs within the seasons that are more for students. Sometimes students have to come to a performance because of a requirement from a class," he explained.

"However, the ironic thing is once they come they are surprised at how much they enjoyed the performance. If we had to rely on students alone for support we would not do as well."



The high price of attending college

Students forced to work to deal with the rising cost of tuition and living

any college students were broke, but in this economic crisis the situation of university students had worsened. Besides the tidal rise in tuition, students had to take into account the staggering cost of books, food, meal plans and housing.

To combat this increase in college expenses, many students had jobs on the side in addition to their college career. For

some, it was necessary. It may be part of a scholarship work program. This program may have had restrictions on the employment options, such as working in their major's department office.

Other work opportunities may have worked in the university's dining program. Jobs ranged from being a dishwasher, a cashier or server. Chain food retailers such as Quizno's, Chick-Fil-A, and Starbucks had locations on campus where students can apply.

For students with cars, off-campus jobs were an option. There awe employment opportunities in

Chambersburg, such as shopping outlets. Target, Kohl's and retail stores in the Chambersburg Mall offer a chance for a job. Junior Dee Grasso had a job working at Michael's in Chambersburg.

"There was nothing in Ship; just bars and Wal-Mart," Grasso said about her employment choice. "I applied online," she said. "I needed money for gas and groceries."

Grasso works about 15 hours a week, and insisted that

work did not interfere with her homework or school performance at all. Time management was very important so that the hours spent working did not interfere with class schedules and homework.

Desiree Kennedy was a senior, who finished her last credits with student teaching in Mechanicsburg. Since that position is unpaid, she knew would have to get a job.

"I didn't have a choice," Kennedy said.
"I knew I would need money for gas and bills."

So she landed a job as a receptionist at a hotel about 20 minutes away. She usually worked about 15-16 hours.

While Kennedy said this job didn't hinder her ability to do homework, she admitted to its drawbacks.

"It does take away from having a social life," Kennedy said.


While some students devoted their weekends to work, others spread out their hours throughout the week.

An example of employment designed for students was the SU phone-phoney January, the SU Foundation hosted this fundraising event. Students call alumni and family of students to solicit donations to the foundation.

These calls are made from the foundation building and take place only in the evenings. Since this is student-specific employment, schedules can be made flexible around night classes.





Stressing coping mechanisms

Students face tons of stress daily, but not all is bad

ou were sitting in a classroom wearing your snuggest jeans, tightest fitting pullover that you couldn't take off because it was hiding the ketchup stain on your white shirt, and you were asked to stand up in front of the class and read a passage. Nervous?

Many people, especially college students, experienced stress every day; the trick was to try to manage the stress before it damaged your daily routine.

According to the Associated Press,

controlled stress that results in top

performance at high stress activities such as giving oral arguments, giving a speech, or sports. This stress provides the focus and energy needed in order to perform at the highest level of the individual's ability."

Another example was racing to meet a deadline. Racing to meet a deadline was stressful and difficult, however, it was a positive stress because once the project or assignment is finished the stress was gone and feelings of relief and happiness took over.

Aside from the positive effects of stress, we were most familiar with the negative effects, such as headaches and high blood pressure.

There were numerous ways to cope with stress. There were a lot of simple things that helped to eliminate and cope with stress among college students. Some of these included getting up earlier to prepare for class, avoiding tight fitting clothing, set up appointments before hand, ask for help when needed, don't rely on memory and write it down, use time wisely and avoid negative situations and people.

Dr. Carson offers advice for life

Dr. Benjamin Carson overcame struggles and hardships to be a neurosurgeon

r. Benjamin Carson, a world-renowned neurosurgeon, visited the H. Ric Luhrs Performing Arts Center on Feb. 25 as a guest lecturer. He spoke about his experiences in neurosurgery and treated the audience to some of his personal insights on life's hardships. As Carson was growing up, he struggled with learning and poverty, but he overcame them and became a successful doctor.

Carson grew up in Detroit and sparked an interest in medicine at a young age. He had struggled with learning from the beginning, for which classmates often teased him. Carson credits his mother for helping him overcome these struggles by forcing him to turn off the television and encouraging him to read books instead. He then made it to the top of his class in middle school and was voted "most likely to succeed" in high school.

One of Carson's most important messages was ignoring naysayers.

"We should never listen to people who talk about what we can't do," said Carson. "There is no such thing as useless knowledge. You never know what doors it's going to open for you."

He added that, as a society, it was beneficial to emphasize and reward intellectual and technical talent. Carson also addressed the issue of diversity.

"Our diversity is our strength," he said about our nation.

"Every single one of us is culturally relevant to every single one of us."

Carson also said that it was our responsibility as citizens to hold those in power accountable to accurately represent our country.

One of Carson's surgical experiences he shared involved a trip





to South Africa in 1997 to separate twins who shared the same drainage systems.

The procedure involved making risky cuts between thin blood vessels, but Carson and his team were able to separate them after a 28-hour operation. The accolades from South Africans were another amazing outcome of the surgery.

At the end of his lecture, Carson offered listeners a chance to ask him questions. Topics ranged from his wife of 35 years to people who changed his life. One audience member asked for memory tricks to learn information.

"I tended to learn from repetition. I made flashcards for everything," said Carson. When asked to describe the role personal faith plays, he said it played the "largest role in my life."








Dr. Benjamin Carson relays advice about life and overcoming hardship to the audience. (Top)









extremely well in different organizations and industries. Through an internship students benefited not only themselves, but also their employers.


Students who participated in internships had a step above those who didn't. After graduation, when applying for a job, employers looked and asked to see if a student had at least one internship.






Matthew Miller works on his homework while he works at the front desk. (Top)

The Raiders win first PSAC title in 28 years

he 2009 football season proved to be a stellar one for the Raiders despite only being ranked 5th in the PSAC Eastern Division preseason coaches poll. The football team ended up finishing the season with an overall record of 9-3 andmade school history with numerous records.

At the start of the fall season, the Red Raiders fell to Shepherd 34-26 in the 12th Annual Great Valley Classic. Although Shippensburg had a third quarter lead, Shepherd capitalized on a few big plays and came off with the win at Ram Stadium.

After this first lost of the season, the team turned things around with four straight wins including a huge 49-7 home-opener win against Lock Haven on Parents and Family Day as well as their division opening game against East Stroudsburg.

Following the second loss of their season against C.W. Post, the football team traveled back home to face division rivalries Kutztown and West Chester. The Red Raiders proved victorious in both games. After standing their ground and coming off with these two wins, the Raiders then faced No.3 Bloomsburg for a chance to play for the PSAC Eastern Division title. After coming from behind in the fourth quarter, SU scored in the final minute of the game to defeat the Huskies

28-27. Following this exciting win, the Raiders had the momentum to carry them through two more wins including the PSAC championship game in which they defeated California (Pa.) 42-35.

After a hard fought game, the Raider football team ended their season to the visiting California (Pa.) Vulcans in the second round of the NCAA Division II Super Region One football playoffs. However, the team was unable to claim a game-winning score and was defeated 26-21.

At the conclusion of the season, numerous Raiders received awards. Five players were named to the 2009 Don Hansen's Football Gazette All-Super Region One Teams. Seniors Mike Harris, Kyler Ford and freshman Kevin Herod were chosen as first-team selections, while senior Tyton Brunner and freshman Bobby Mullen received votes for the third-team.

Harris, a split end and Ford a punter, also got the opportunity to star in the 2010 Valero Cactus Bowl held at Texas A & M Kingsville's Javelina Stadium. Both players represented the Division II East all-stars. Despite losing the game 16-0 to the West, both players had solid performances that helped them stand out to the numerous scouts representing the National Football League that came to observe the game.



Field Hockey reaches NCAA semifinals

The 2009 season marked one filled with records and honors

he Shippensburg Lady Raiders field hockey team gave its seven seniors a season to remember in 2009. The Lady Raiders finished the year a stellar 20-3 and reached the NCAA Division II semifinals for the second straight year. All three of the Lady Raiders' losses came to Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference rival Bloomsburg, including a 4-2 semifinal loss to the Huskies at Stonehill College in Massachusetts.

The Lady Raiders' 20 wins matched a franchise record, as the Lady Raiders won 20 games back in 2005. The Lady Raiders finished 7-0 in PSAC West competition while also ending the year 13-1 at home and 6-1 away from Robb Sports Complex.

Sophomore forward Kristina Taylor emerged not only as an SU star but also as one of the top players in all of Division II.

Taylor finished the year second in Division II with 24 goals, and also had nine assists and 112 points, all while starting in every one of the 22 games she appeared in for the Lady Raiders.

As a result of her impressive efforts, Taylor earned 2009 Longstreth/ National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Division II First-Team All-America honors, along with a spot on the 2009 Division II All-Tournament Team. Taylor was named PSAC Western Division Player of the Year.

Senior forward Jamie Doughty and senior goalkeeper Amanda Houser joined Taylor on the Longstreth/NFHCA All America First Team. Doughty ended the season third on the team in goals with nine. Doughty also tallied four assists and 32 points during her final collegiate season. Houser completed the

campaign with 111 saves while only giving up 19 goals all year. Houser also compiled an .854 save percentage and eight shutouts in 23 games.

Senior midfielder Mariah Wooters, who earned a place on the Longstreth/NFHCA Second Team, totaled four goals, six assists and 14 points in 20 games for SU. Senior defender Lois Kaschenbach, who was also a member of the Division II All-Tournament Team, had one assist, one point and four defensive saves during her senior season. Kaschenbach came up huge for SU in the postseason with two defensive saves in the semifinal loss to the Huskies.

Fellow seniors Laura Wylde, Lauren Hollingsworth and Kim Tully also made huge contributions to the Lady Raiders. Wylde, a forward, finished second on the team with 14 goals while also dishing four assists and totaling 32 points. Tully, a midfielder, scored three goals, gave five assists and ended with 11 points. Hollingsworth, a defender, finished the year with one goal, four assists and six points.

The Lady Raiders hosted both the PSAC Championship and the NCAA Division II Regional Championship. SU knocked off No. 4 East Stroudsburg, 3-0, in the regional matchup on Nov. 7.

In addition to all the accolades the team earned, the Lady Raiders also had 10 members named to the 2009 NFHCA Division II National Academic Squad. The 10 named to the squad included seniors Doughty, Houser, Kaschenbach and Wylde, junior Kristen Brooks, and freshmen Jordyn Beam, Ashley Hallowell, Taylor Jones, Kerry Senderling and Ashley

plays and tough competition, the team ultimately lost to California (Pa.) University, 3-0.


While the team did not have the ending to the season it wanted, they still had many memorable moments and important victories that will take them far into the next season.



She brought in 13 points in the win, including the final shot that secured the win for the Raiders.

Senior forward Lauren Beckley, who has been one of the key players for Shippensburg University since her freshman year has already set numerous school and conference records during her career. She continued to exceed even more records when the Lady Raider's played West Virginia State on Dec. 29.

Going into the game, Beckley needed just 10 points to become the ninth player in PSAC history to reach 2,000 career points. She surpassed the milestone by scoring 25 points in the match up and also had 10 rebounds. Despite receiving double figures from numerous players, SU loss the close game 87-81.

Less than two weeks later, Beckley was at it again. In a 68-54 victory against visiting IUP, the senior forward notched 30 points and 18 rebounds in the game. This led her to become the all-time leading scorer at Shippensburg University. She also reached the 1,000 career rebounds two games later in a win against Mansfield University.

With just four senior players this season, the fairly young team worked hard and grew together as a team. The team ended their regular season 14-16 overall and 7-7 in the PSAC East Division. This concluded the careers of Lauren Beckley, Ally Briggs, and twin sisters Sheila Wasser and Shelly Wasser.

his year, the men's wrestling team finished 6-8 overall and had one member of the team make it to the NCAA Division-II Semifinal Championships.

Their opening match against Waynesburg University resulted in a 20-15 loss. Individually, Shane Claar did win 7-3 over John Sanko, and David Sunderland won 9-8 over Alex Evanoff.

At the Washington & Jefferson Open, redshirt-senior Nate Nauroth won the 141-pound title. Redshirt-junior Chris Barrick won the 174-pound title, and redshirt-junior Brian Hindle won second in the 197-pound match.

At the PSAC Wrestling Championships, the team finished 10th overall with 40 points, which included competition from six division-I schools. Barrick placed second at 174 pounds, Sunderland placed fifth at 165-pounds, Nauroth placed sixth at 141 pounds, and Keith Dahlheimer placed sixth at 184 pounds.

The home opener against East Stroudsburg University on Jan. 12 resulted in a 24-12 loss. One highlight from that match was when Simon Rice nailed his first collegiate pin.

At its first dual-meet of the season, the team posted its first two wins over Seton Hill and Anderson University (S.C.), 32-6 and 30-12, respectively. The team had three victories by fall from Nauroth, Barrick and Nate Reese. For Nauroth, this was his sixth pin of the year.


At a competition in Newberry, S.C., the team faced four tough schools, winning three of the competitions. Their only loss was against #2 Newberry, 3-35. They posted wins against Belmont Abbey, St. Andrew's Presbyterian and Limestone, 39-7, 48-0 and 20-18, respectively.

Later, the team beat York, 39-7, but suffered two more losses to Mercyhurt and Delaware Valley. Despite winning three bouts against Gannon, the team lost overall, 29-12.

Despite the losses, the team managed to place eighth overall with 57 points at the NCAA Division-II East Region Duals, in which Barrick, Nauroth, Jon Hade, Dahlheimer, Rice and Devan Jones advanced to the next round. 
At the National Championships, Barrick made it to the semifinals, and landed in fifth place. He also made All-American status.

The women's swimming team lands 27th in the NCAA

wimming coach Erin Goodhart was new to the position this year, but not new to SU. Goodhart graduated from SU in 2004, and was named interim coach for the men's and women's swimming teams.

The women's opened with losses at a tri-meet with West Chester University and Kutztown University, 69-130 and 93-111, respectively. The 200-yard freestyle relay team of junior Amy Fisher, junior Sarah Bratman, senior Anna Kinard, and sophomore Nicole Capozzi did make a first-place finish at the meet.

The team came back from the loss with a victory over Drexel, 106-93. In this meet, Whitney Garner won two individual events: the 200-yard IM and 100-yard freestyle. The team also posted a victory over Canisius, 114-86.

At a loss against Clarion, Fisher posted first in the 1,000-yard freestyle. Kristen McCandless and Rachel Ballard both posted first in the 500 -yard freestyle and the 400-yard medley, respectively.

At the Patriot Invitational in November, the team finished sixth overall, with strong performances from Julia Brownrigg, Ballard, and Garner.

The Zippy Invite in December landed the team in eighth place overall with 395.5 points. The 800-yard freestyle relay team of Garner, McCandless, Brownrigg, and Fisher placed fourth, landing them an NCAA qualifier. Another exciting moment was when Fisher beat her coach's old record in the 1,650-yard freestyle. Fisher set the record at 17:26.39, surpassing Goodhart's of 17:29.36. This record also was an NCAA qualifier.

The team then posted two victories over Bloomsburg University and Indiana (Pa.) University, 137.5-121.5 and 133-123, respectively.

The team then moved onto the PSAC Championships. After the first day, the team placed second with 38 points, but ultimately landed in third with 397 points after the fourth day. One impressive finished was Fisher, who placed fourth in the 1,000-yard freestyle.

At the NCAA Division II Championships, the team landed in 27th place with 19 points. Fisher won All-American status in the 1,000-yard freestyle, and Garner also received the honor in the 200-yard freestyle.

The overall record for women's swimming ended 4-3, an impressive season for the women.

The Zippy Invitational landed in sixth place, despite seven Top 12 finishes, including Naylor and Drew Hagerich.


At the PSAC championships, the team ended the season in third place.

ith a remarkable season, the women's track and field team proved their excellent athletic abilities with multiple new records and incredible wins.

The season began with strong wins from Erica Hess winning the 400-meter dash, Emily Dubs winning the 800-meter dash and Rebekah Newhart winning the high jump.

At the 2010 Bucknell Heptagonal, Sophomore Amanda Raudabaugh was only 0.15 seconds short of winning the 800-meter run. Her time was recorded as the fastest time in the PSAC.

Sophomore Nelly Spence, who had an incredible season the previous year, won the mile in 5:04.70, while Mary Dell, another excellent competitor from the previous year, earned the victory with a time of 2:58.72 in the 1,000-meter run.

Sophomore Sarah Strayer won the 5,000-meter run. Senior Shannon Hare was only .04 seconds short of winning the 500-meter dash while Hess finished third in the 400-meter dash.

One of the greatest successes of the day was the 4x800-meter relay team which consisted of Dubs, Ashley Fornshell, Jamie McCollum and Raudabaugh finishing second with only .02 seconds short of a victory.

Despite all the previous successes of the women's track and field team, one of the greatest achievements came from Newhart who broke a 12-year-old school record in the pentathlon from the Bucknell Open.

One of the most impressive accomplishments came from the distance medley relay squad at the 2010 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships which consisted of Dell, Hare, Abby Huber and Spence. The Lady Raider quartet won the event; defeating Division I schools in this meet such ass Ohio State, Connecticut, Buffalo and Tennessee.

About midway through the season in the Armory Track and Field Center, Spence broke a 25-year-old conference record in the 5K while Dell posted the third-fastest 5K time in the nation. Megan Breski, a freshmen, tied the school record and Katie Frey, a junior, ran the 3K the second-fastest time in the PSAC during their season.

At the 2010 PSAC Indoor Track and Field Championships, the team finished first for the indoor title against three-time defeating champion Slippery Rock allowing SU to end with 173.25 points.

At the 2010 NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships, the women's distance medley relay squad of Dell, Hare, Huber and Spence earned All-American honors for the third consecutive year with a second place win.

At the Bucknell Heptagonal, the indoor track and field team had a solid performance finishing fourth overall. Graybill won the pole vault. Dustin Adams finished second in the 5,000-meter run, and in throws, Tappah Dinnall took fifth in the weight throw. In the 4x800-meter relay, Ryan Boyer, Joel Flott, Pio Mandato, and Matt Gelety finished second.

Sophmore John Clark at the Bison Open & Multi had the teams best long jump at 22 feet, 0.25 inches allowing him to place third. Gelety broke the school's record in the 1,000 meter in

the New Balance Games. Freshmen Matthew Terry improved his long jump to 22 feet, 9.25 inches ranking fifth in the PSAC. The following day, the 4x800-relay team consisting of Buck, Mandato, Neyhart and Gelety conquered SU's previous record in the event.


Graybill won the pole vault competing against schools such as Pitt, Duke and Texas. Graybill was the first notable SU competitor to clear 16 feet since 1995. In the triple jump, Matthew Terry jumped 47 feet, 4 inches giving him a new personal record and ranking him 16th in Division II.

In the LaFayette/Rider Invitational, Bryan Beegle won the 5K event with his time ranking sixth in the PSAC to date, giving SU more PSAC qualifiers. Elijah Trusty finished second in the triple jump in field while Allan Lehman achieved a PSAC qualifier in the triple jump.

Yet another school record was achieved by Buck and Marcus Line at the Kent State Tune-Up. In the 800-meter run, Buck surpassed the old mark set in 2005 while Line made a new record in the 300-meter hurdles within only 38.97 seconds. The new records led to the track and field team being ranked third in the Atlantic Region.


The team landed a tie for first place just after the first day within the PSAC Indoor Championships. Despite the team's efforts, the team ended third at the PSAC Indoor Meet.




Two members were named to the All-PSAC Eastern Division Second Team. Cody Kulp and Jimmy Miller earned the honor through their outstanding season and hard work.



There was a good chance that the members of Greek life were aware of the rumors and myths that surround the organizations, but when asking the SU brother of Phi Delta Theta if there was anything he heard about his fraternity, the only thing he really heard was that Phi Delta Theta's basement was "a very chill place to have a party."

Love 247, Colleges Against Cancer, G.E.S.O. and Rotaract launch on campus

nother school year meant another chance to try new activities, including clubs. SU offered four new organizations: Love 247, Colleges Against Cancer, the Geography/Earth Science Organization, and Rotaract.

Love247 president, Rylan Good, described the club as "unlike any other club you'll find." One objective of the club was to raise awareness for those struggling with self-mutilation, suicide and depression, and help them through these struggles. Good emphasized that the key to Love247 was the love and support that the club aimed to provide. Love247 helped people network with a professional or find a person who would listen.

The success of the 2009 Relay for Life led to the creation of a Colleges Against Cancer chapter. President, Nicole Wootten, said the club teamed up with the American Cancer Society.

"There is not a single person out there that has not been affected by cancer in one way, shape, or form," said Wootten.

One of the objectives of this club was to "celebrate the lives of

those who have won the fight, remember those that have lost, and to fight back against this terrible disease until we find a cure."

According to G.E.S.O. president Aaron Shields, the club was "basically a means for people to get together and enjoy whatever adventures we can find, while staying focused on conservation and trying to help clean up areas that need attention." Shields said the club's adviser, Prof. Sean Cornell, always had helpful advice and ideas to offer.

Rotaract, a volunteer service organization, is the collegiate-level of the Rotary. One of the goals of the organization was to understand the needs at the community and international level, as well as build leadership skills. Alyssa Harnish, Rotaract's president, added that there were some funding challenges while trying to reinstate the club this year.

Rotaract's main project, Photos With Santa, sought donations from the people who got their picture taken with Santa and decorated their picture frames.

act: a suicide occurred approximately every 17 minutes, and almost one million suicides were attempted in the U.S. yearly.

In order to bring attention to such a serious issue, senior Rylan Good, president of Love 247, decided to raise awareness about suicide, depression and self-injury by creating Love247. Originally, Good wanted to bring an official chapter of "To Write Love On Her Arms" to SU, which is a non-profit movement that is dedicated to helping people who are struggling with depression, addiction, self injury and suicide. Due to lack of funds, Good was unable to attend the conference in Florida to start the chapter. However, Good still wanted to do something in order to bring awareness to SU

"I wanted to keep the same vision and ideals but make a SU version," Good said.

Good wanted a name that summed up the meaning of helping someone who was contemplating suicide, or dealing with self-injury and/or depression.

"In order for people who are dealing with depression, cutting and suicide people are going to need to show them love 24 hours 7 days a week," Good said.

Love247 may be less than a year old, but it has already begun to spread the word on suicide, self-injury and depression. Good said it took about two to five months to get approval from the Student Senate due to the sensitive nature of the organization and what they are trying to promote; but by October 2009, Love247 was up and running.

Good felt it was very important to have Love247 because depression, self-injury and suicide were real issues.

"Because these are real issues, it makes people not want to talk about them. Two-thirds of people who suffer from depression don't seek treatment," Good said.

One of the main goals for Love247 was to let people know that it was okay to talk about depression and self-injury. It was important for students to feel safe and cared about.



"Retirement is a strange concept to even think about, but I have been contemplating what bigger and better things I have to do," Serr said.



Harrow enters the academic ring

Dr. Sharon Harrow's unique approach to literature appeals to students

nglish Professor Sharon Harrow walked into the room on the first day of class, and her new students may had been taken aback by her quirky personality. Her curly dark hair surrounded her ivory-skinned face, and her brightly colored clothes showed off her shapely figure.

As she introduced herself and the course, Harrow liked to use big hand motions, sound effects and even impersonations of characters or authors. Her unconventional teaching methods, mixed with some more traditional ones, made Harrow a favorite professor among students.

Some of her teaching methods included engaging the students through exciting and fun ways. Based on her theater experience from college, Harrow liked to introduce theatricality into her lessons.

For her Restoration 18th Century British Literature class this semester, Harrow allowed two different options for a final project. The first project was a more traditional literary analysis paper. The second project was one where students must research information about an author or character and prepare a dialogue to be presented in front of the class on finals day.

Last spring, her class made Facebook profiles for influential people, authors, or characters. Senior communication/journalism major Lindsay Sica said it allowed her to bring the 18th century into the 21st century through the social network.

The students had to do research to create the profile for their person or character. Sica chose to do hers on author John Gay. The students also had to write a paper from the person or character's perspective.

"It was an unconventional way to learn about the material, but I was impressed with [Harrow's] innovation to allow us to do this project," Sica said.

Known for her theatricality, unique assignments, friendliness, and her quirks, it was not hard to see how much Harrow likes her job. She advised students to do what they love, and never lose the love of reading. She said it's important to balance life, and take things one at a time. By getting into the habit of getting work done, she said it would make one's life so much easier.

"Do things consistently," she said.



r. Pete Gigliotti, SU's Executive Director for University Communications and Marketing, held three academic degrees and had been at SU since May 1988. With his experiences here, and as an active member of university committees and governing boards, he had positive things to say about the campus.







Geophysics to come to SU

A three-year grant allows the department to purchase instrumental equipment

The geography/earth science program was awarded a three-year grant of \$196,902 by the National Science Foundation, and the money will be used to provide equipment for students to use to find sink holes, fault lines, caves, and other items buried underground, as well as to hold workshops for area consultants and teachers.

Instrumental in securing the grant was Professor Joseph Zume. He said the grant was very difficult to get because it was so popular and competitive.

"Few have the courage to go there. It's a lot of work, and only a small chance to get it," he said.

The equipment allowed users to see what was below the surface of the ground. For example, Zume said a man once buried his car underground in order to collect insurance money. The insurance company suspected he buried it, and scientists used geophysics equipment to locate the car underground without digging.

Geophysics used the principles of geology, physics and mathematics to study deep below the surface of the ground, in

the earth's interior, without digging.

Zume said the equipment was environmentally friendly because scientists did not disturb the natural environment with evasive measures to study below the surface. Magnetic waves were used to study the earth's interior.

By getting this equipment and learning about geophysics, Zume said the students get an opportunity they previously would not have been able to get.

Katona Miller, a senior earth/space science education major, said the addition of the geophysics curriculum enhances the department because it gives students a more rounded education.

"If it was available when I was here, I would have taken it," she said.

Additionally, Zume said the addition of geophysics could open more employment opportunities for students, since they will learn about the subject and have experience with using the equipment.











very December, SU holds a winter commencement to celebrate the seniors who finished their academic careers during the fall semester. This past year, the winter commencement took an unexpected turn.

Graduates, parents, families, and administration listened to Rhodes tell his speech, offering advice and insights along the way.

Afterward, graduates threw their caps up in celebration of their academic success. Many went on to get jobs, some off to the Peace Corps or other volunteer organizations, some off to grad school, and some, well, just didn't know.

ECONOMY MAKES JOB-HUNTING DIFFICULT

Some seniors found jobs right way, others were still struggling to find one

or four long years, seniors had worked hard at SU to gain an education that would hopefully lead them to a job they enjoy in the future. However, with the economy in a less-than-ideal condition, it was harder for graduating seniors to find jobs after they graduate.

Ben Bernanke, chairman of the Federal Reserve, talked about employment in a speech to the Joint Economic Committee in Congress on April 14.

"Younger workers may be particularly adversely affected if a weak labor market prevents them from finding a first job or from gaining important work experience," Bernanke said, according to the testimony on the Federal Reserve Web site.

Andrew Lentz, a senior who double majored in management and marketing, was among the lucky seniors who already had a job lined up after graduation. Hired as a field sales representative at TTI Group, an organization that markets products to the home improvement and construction industries, Lentz moved to Waterville, Maine for his new job.

"It was quite difficult to get this job. I had two initial rounds of

interviewing, then I was flown out to Milwaukee for three more rounds of interviewing. After two or three weeks, I was offered a job, and I accepted it," he said.

Not all seniors were quite so lucky. Some had sent out numerous resumes and made follow-up calls to no avail. Steph Beyer, a senior English major, said finding a job is difficult.

"I'm trying to find a job, but sadly I chose to follow my heart and be an English major, sans secondary certification," she said.

Others are simply by-passing the job market all together by going to graduate school. Jillian Zeigler, a senior biology major, accepted a spot at Purdue University in Illinois to pursue a career in veterinary medicine.

Dan Hylton, director of the Career Development Center, said many students are turning to graduate school instead of finding a job. Because of the competitive job market, students are hoping after graduate school the job market will improve. The downside to earning a higher degree right away is that students rack up more debt, Hylton said.





Held every spring, this year's commencement was presented with a sunny day and a lot of wind. Friends and family held onto heir hats, flowers and balloons as they came out to support their loved ones.

Approximately 1,000 undergraduates participated in the commencement this year, making the SU campus the main source of attention during the windy spring day.

This year, alumna Judy Happ, vice president for administration with the International Institute for Restorative Practices presented the address for the master's degree ceremony. Around 140 students participated in the master's program this year.

Happ, a 1987 Shippensburg graduate with a master's degree in administration of justice, was also a former probation officer for Dauphin County. The International Institute for Restorative Practices, where Happ currently works, is a graduate school in Bethlehem, offering restorative practices for educators persuing children and youth education services.

Senator Jeanne Shaheen, a United States senator from New Hampshire, enthusiastically presented the undergraduate degrees for the second time at SU.

Shaheen is the first woman in U.S. history to be elected as not only a U.S. senator, but as a governor as well. Shaheen also graduated from SU in 1969 with a bachelor's degree and a master's degree from the University of Mississippi.

As the commencement ended that day, families and friends were invited onto the field to meet with their newly graduated SU alumni.
