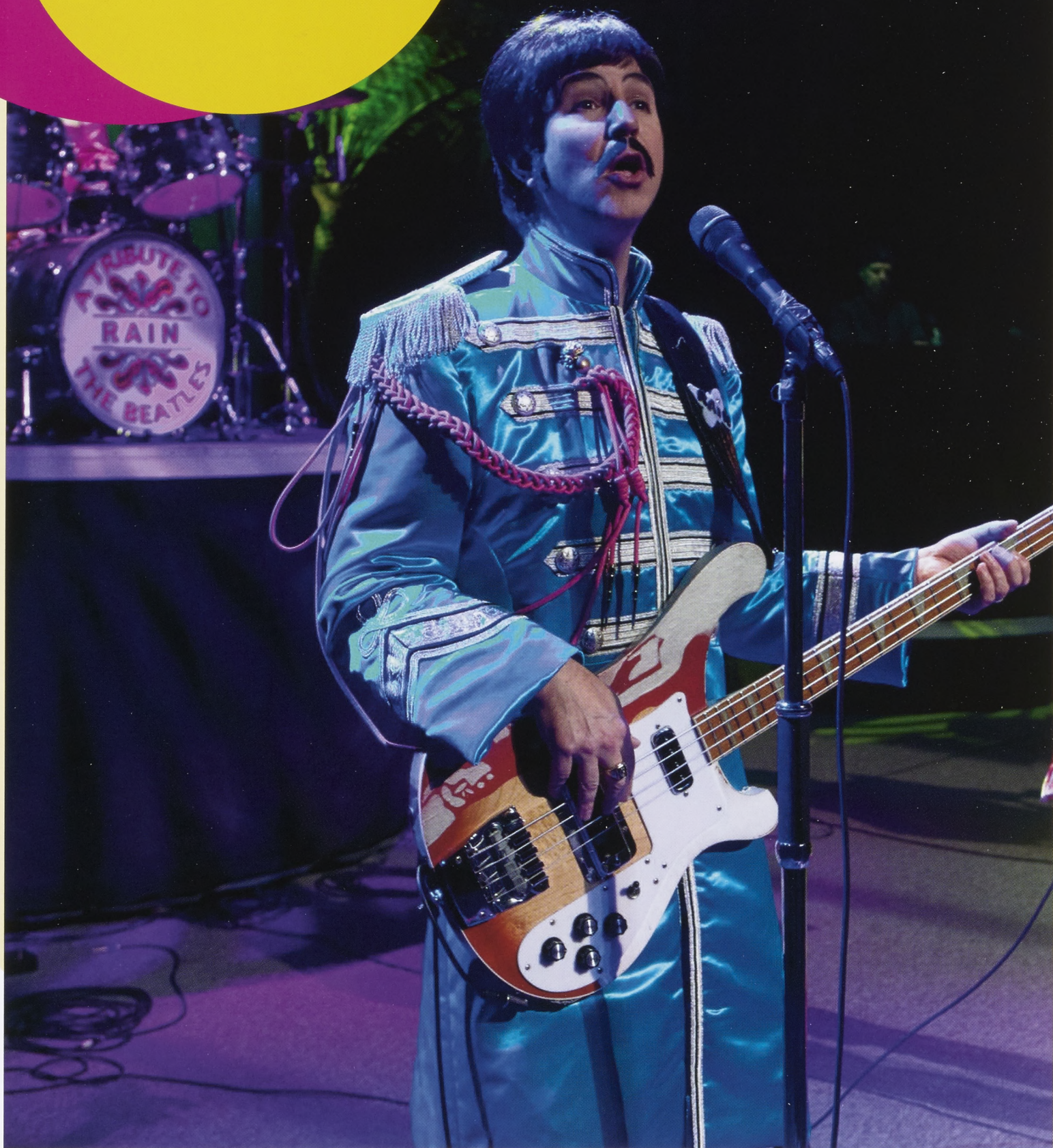

ANNUAL TULIP PLANTING OFFERS SENSE OF COMMUNITY FOR DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS

As temperatures and attitudes towards workloads began to cool before Fall Break, the sun shone brightly on Oct. 4 and warmed those in attendance at the annual Tulip Planting Ceremony.

Held every year by the Shippensburg University Women's Center, the event was organized to honor the lives of survivors and victims of domestic violence.

Graduate practicum student, Tiffany Conde gave opening remarks at the ceremony.

Along with Conde, Amy Smith of Women In Need and Gladys Brown of Domestic Violence Services, also spoke. They both had encouraging words for anyone seeking help, while Brown shared her personal experience with domestic violence. Smith and Brown both wanted everyone to know that all attendees were not alone and that there was "always someone available to help if they needed it."


The Women's Center is a SU group that seeks to assist women by addressing issues such as sex-role stereotyping, networking, self-defense, women's health, domestic violence and sexual assault. Men and women are both encouraged to participate in the offered discussion groups, volunteer opportunities, films, lectures and workshops that are sponsored by the Women's Center.

According to the Women's Center facts, domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women between the ages of 15 and 44 in the United States, which is more than car accidents, muggings and rapes combined.

On top of that, one out of every four women in the U.S. will be physically assaulted or raped by a partner at some point in their lives. This is one of the many reasons why women are encouraged to learn the facts to protect themselves, to educate others and to fight the violence epidemic.

The unique fundraiser benefited the Fisher House, located in Rockville, Md., a foundation that provides free housing to wounded veterans during rehabilitation.

For a \$1 donation, patrons were able to hit a used car, donated by Hickman Automotive of Shippensburg, with a sledgehammer; for \$5, patrons were able to smash the car with six excruciating hits.

A DIFFERENT WAY TO UNWIND AND RELAX AFTER A LONG DAY OF CLASSES

Sun light poured through the glass windows in the chapel, creating a soothing atmosphere. Intense silence ricocheted off the four walls. Four participants sat on mats, legs crossed, hands pressed together and eyes closed. Their bodies shouted the definitions of calm and focused.

"Yoga should connect the mind to the body," said Devon Van Horn, the yoga instructor for Shippensburg University's Mindfulness Movement Yoga for Health.

Van Horn has taught yoga for two semesters during her graduate studies at SU.

"The purpose of this class is to give people the opportunity to slow down and notice the way their body feels and what they are thinking," she said.

Junior Lauren Cappuccio has been attending Van Horn's class since February, but has been practicing yoga for at least a year.

"I attend because yoga helps me to relax and center myself," she said. "I go because it clears my mind and makes it easier to concentrate on everyday things."

According to references in WebMD.com, yoga increases flexibility and muscle strength, improves posture and breathing and promotes less stress. By allowing the body to relax and move in a rhythm, the mind can become calm and focused, relieving stress.

Every Wednesday from 1:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. Van Horn leads her students through a yoga routine of stretching and balance poses in the Spiritual Center Chapel. Her largest class has been 9 students.

"I try to teach students that yoga is fun, and that you don't have to be a contortionist to receive the benefits of yoga," she said.

The University Counseling Center sponsors this program for SU students, faculty and staff at no cost.

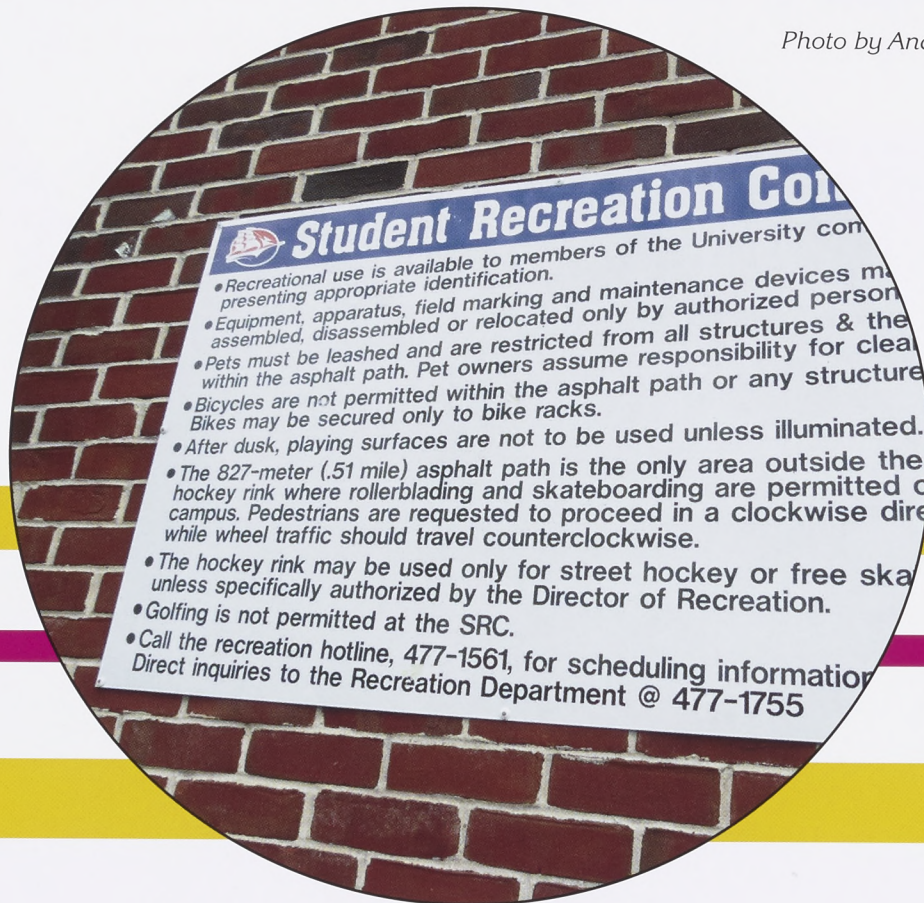

SU PROFESSORS COLLABORATE ON BOOK ABOUT POLITICAL SEX SCANDALS

COMMUTERS STRUGGLE TO KEEP MONEY IN POCKETS AND CARS IN SPACES

Shippensburg University teaches more than 7,100 students. Of these students, more than 3,600 students requested commuter stickers between June 2010 and June 2011. (The number of decals includes repeats given to the same commuter due to loss, theft or a change in vehicle.)

But commuters may face differing struggles than those who live on campus. Parking tickets and the cost of decals are common fees for students.

For students who have decided to commute, based on budgets, a homebody personality or being a mother of young children, they may pay as much as students who pay room and board each semester.

PARKING DECALS

At the beginning of each school year, commuters and students with cars on campus must pay \$65 to obtain a parking decal. The decal must be affixed to the right side of the vehicle's bumper or attached onto the license plate. The decal, which changes color each year, is labeled with the identity of the student: resident or commuter.

If additional decals are purchased, for either a second vehicle on campus or theft or loss of the first decal, they must be purchased for \$10.

Faculty and staff are also required to have a parking decal, but receive it for \$1 each school year.

The \$65 fee goes to the Student Association budget, which is used for multiple clubs on campus.

TICKET HORRORS

After paying \$65 for a parking decal, an added parking ticket expense may empty a pocket.

A general parking violation can cost up to \$50, according to the Department of Public Safety's website.

From June 2010 to June 2011, 7,326 parking tickets were issued, said Police Chief Cynthia Grissom. The number of tickets and the reason behind them varies each year, she said.

After fees, commuters may end up paying more to attend SU than resident students that live on campus.

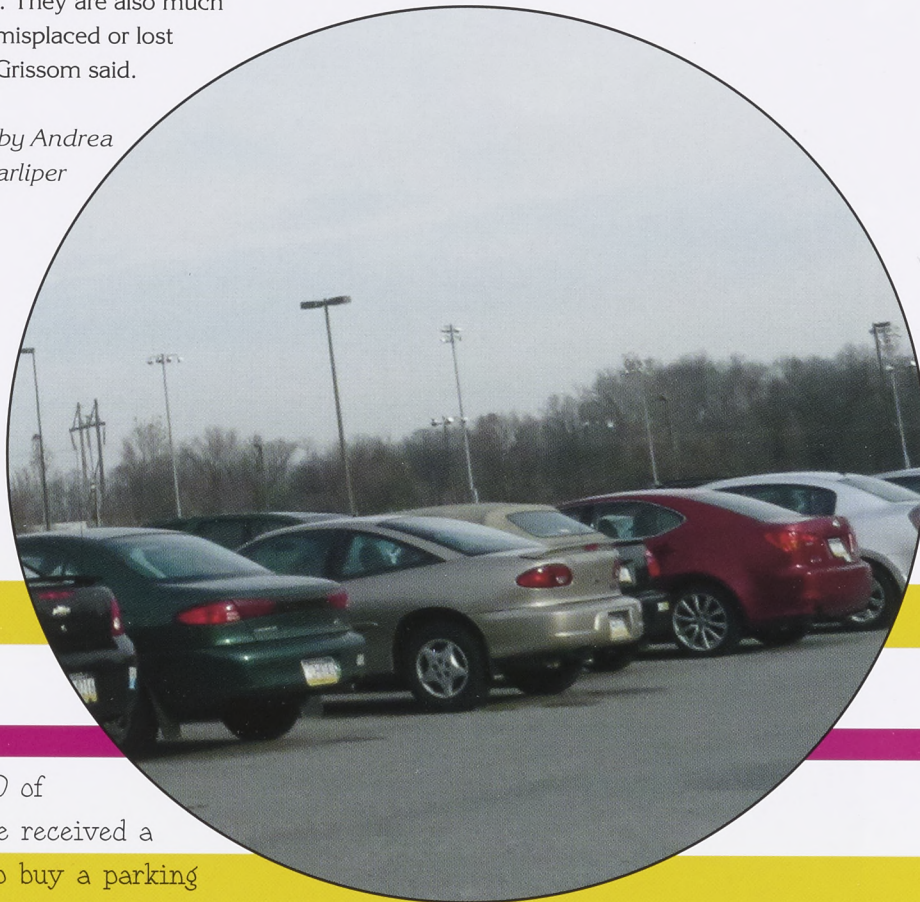

find a \$50 ticket on her car.

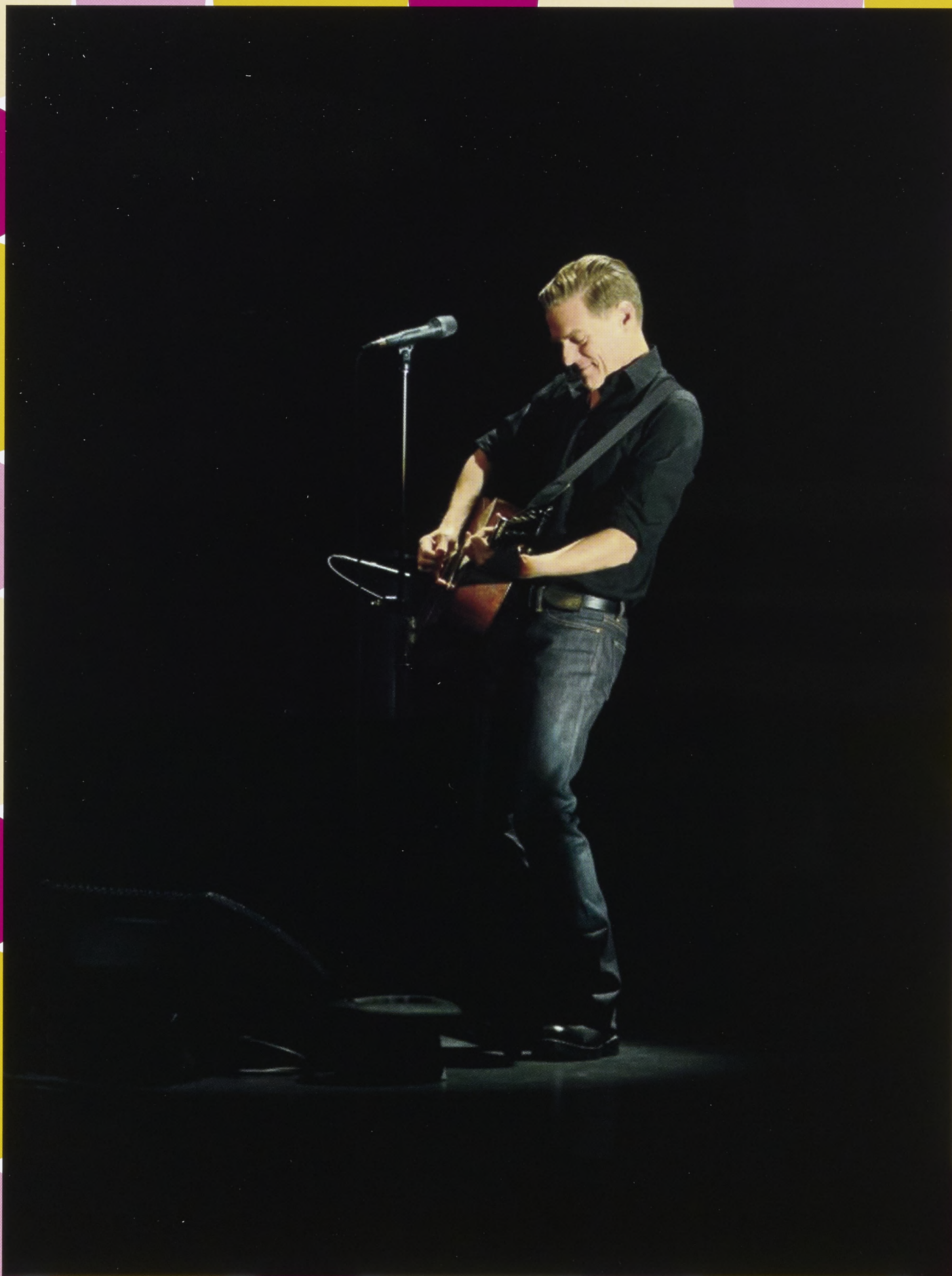
"The same week, my roommate, who had some knee issues (no surgery, mind you), limped into

KEEP YOUR CASH

Grissom advises students to park in areas designated for them, be it commuter or
student lots.

"Most of the lots are monitored by cameras and patrolled and regulated by
university police officers," she said.

"Also, be aware of the rules. The reason for the no pull-through rule in all
lots on campus is to allow easy visibility for university police. The
parking lots are labeled and rules are explained in pamphlets
given out when purchasing a parking decal."

WIZARDS, MAGIC, AND THE GAME OF QUIDDITCH COMES TO SU

A Shippensburg University student has started a new club for Harry Potter lovers: The Quidditch Club. Christopher Kostick created two quidditch teams at SU, creating the Quidditch Club.

Quidditch is inspired by J.K. Rowling's Harry Potter novel series. The club offers an opportunity to experience the game rather than read about it.

Kostick has written for the International Quidditch Association (IQA) and wants to continue his involvement. He plans on applying for a volunteer assistant director of development position and to be a volunteer member of the World Cup VI organizing team, both under the IQA, in the near future.

"As soon as I learned that people were playing this around the country, I wanted to play," Kostick said.

The club, open to any undergraduate or graduate student at SU, is a co-ed intercollegiate sport that plays under the IQA. It aims at uniting a diverse group of people in an active, creative and unique environment.

The game, which involves four balls during one single game, can be complicated for some, but becomes simple for the players. Two teams of seven players each try to score the highest amount of points, worth 10 points each, before the "snitch" is caught to end the game.

On each team, two players use "bludgers," or dodge balls, to temporarily knock out opposing players from the game.

The seeker, the only player allowed to touch the snitch, is responsible for catching it.

At SU, a weighted sock attached to a specified runner's shorts represents the snitch, who can use any tactic to avoid capture.

From My Friends

After 21 years of Coach Rocky Rees leading Red Raider football, a new era began in 2011 when Coach Mark Maciejewski stepped in. With this change came numerous editions to the program including new jerseys, a new offense and new entries in the SU record book.

The Red Raiders finished their 2011 season 7-4, and won their last four straight games. The Raiders tallied 411 points, compiled 55 touchdowns, ran 898 total plays and picked up 281 first downs. They also racked up 5,124 yards of total offense, all of which set single-season school records.

Also leading the up-and-coming Red Raider surge was sophomore Zach Zulli. Zulli finished out his season with 226 completions and 34 passing touchdowns. His 2,741 passing yards were good for second-most in a single season ever. Zulli also notched a school-record with six touchdown passes in a 59-20 win over Cheney University.

The SU defense tackled opponents behind the line of scrimmage exactly 93 times in addition to sacking the opposing quarterback 38 times, good for second and third in school history. Cody Flemming was the leader of this defensive unit with 83 tackles on the year. With one year remaining in his college career, Flemming stands just 15 tackles for loss behind the school record holder, Coach Maciejewski.

The highlight of the 2011 season, however, came on Homecoming afternoon as SU faced the Kutztown Golden Bears. SU held the Kutztown offense to just 219 yards and forced 5 turnovers. The Red Raiders came out victorious 49-7 over Kutztown-who later went on to become the PSAC champions.

An excited coach Maciejewski had this to say after the win:

"We're still young and we're still gonna have ups and downs. But this is a good win for us. It just validates everything we do as a program."

The Lady Raiders had a heartbreaking 2011 season with numerous amounts of close loses but held their own throughout the season due to the phenomenal defense. SU went 5-10-3 the season after making an appearance in the 2010 PSAC playoffs.

Senior captains Emily Andrew and Samantha Stuart were necessary components to the Raiders defense throughout the season. They led a team of 20 returning players and 10 new players. The Lady Raiders finished the season with four devastating losses in their last five games. Their last game was against California (Pa) and SU pulled out with a 4-1 defeat.

Although the team did not make it far in the play-offs they made Raider history with their skill and determination. The Raiders finished the 2011 women's soccer season with just 21 goals against them and tied for the second fewest in the programs history. The Raider defense this season was the best in SU history, when in previous seasons they had excelled at offense.

With an overall record of nine wins, six losses and two ties, Spering mentioned the strengths of two players in particular who lead the team to victory this season - Oliver Templeton and Austin Hill.

"Templeton is one of the captains and holds the middle of the field and combines the defense with the attacking players," he said. "Hill has started every game since he was a freshman and makes it possible for us to take certain luxuries defensively."

Along with Templeton, Hill was nominated as an All-Region player for the season.

"Our expectations for next season are simple," Spering said. "We want to be able to continue on our current path of success both academically and athletically."

From the team's co-captain perspective, Templeton is even more determined about the success of next season.

"We are going to win the PSAC next season and make it to the last four of the national tournament," he said.

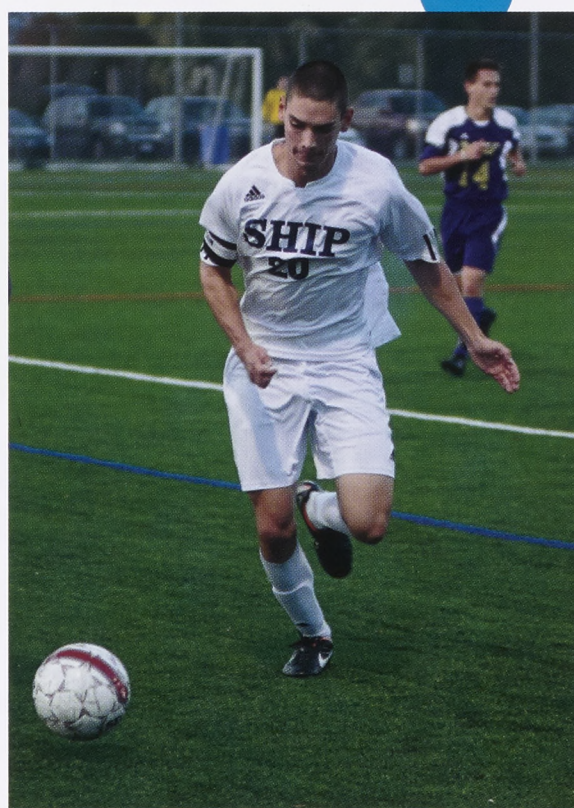

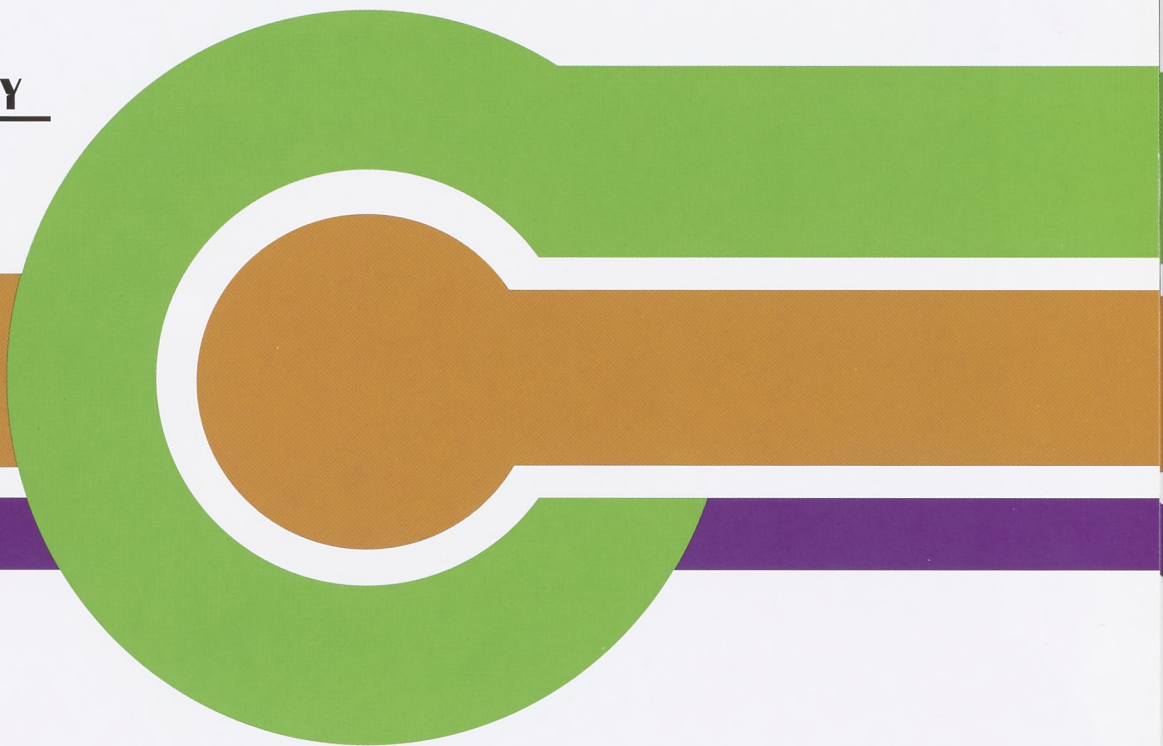

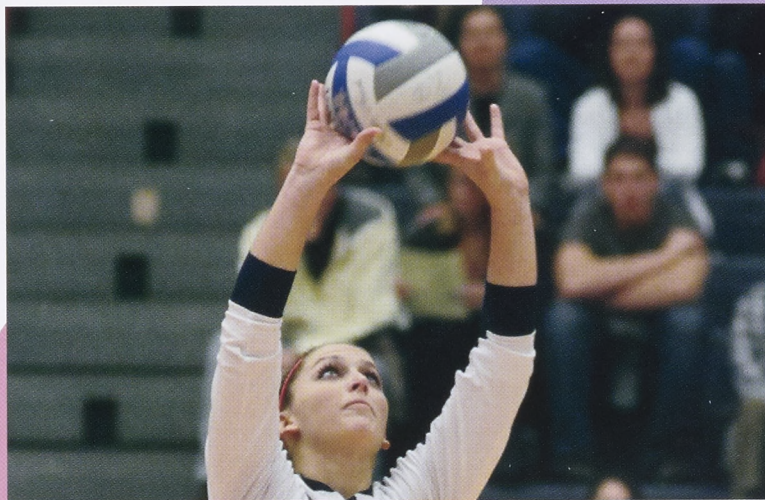

The highlight of the season for many players is the final game of their career.

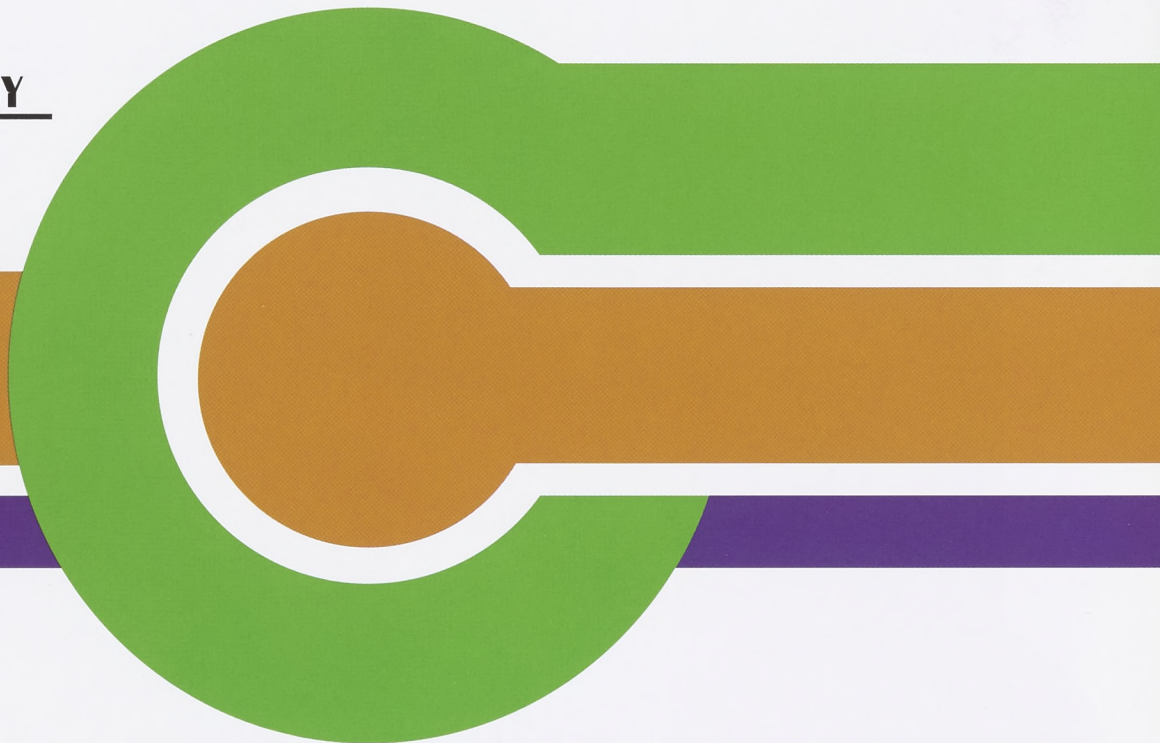

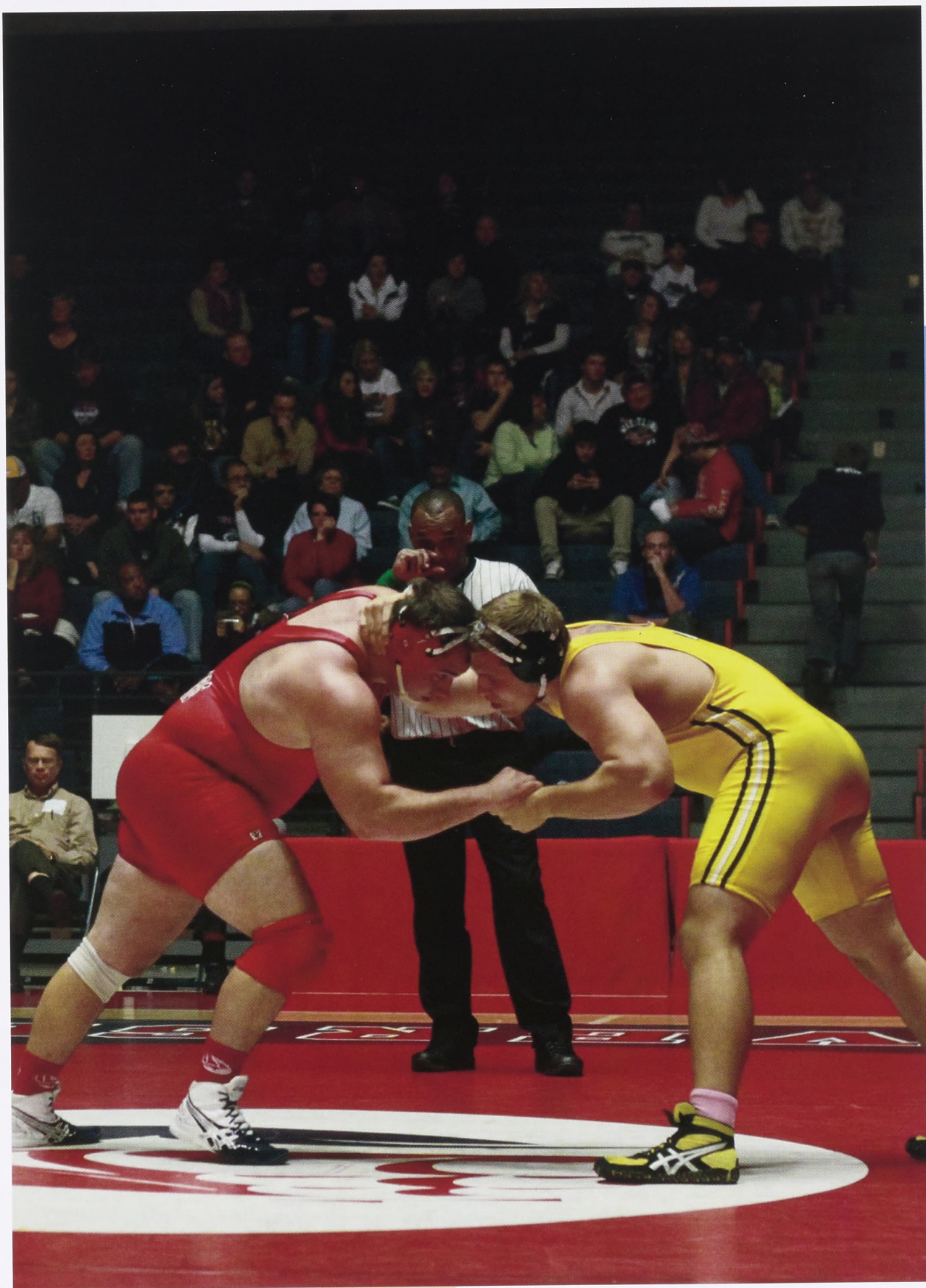

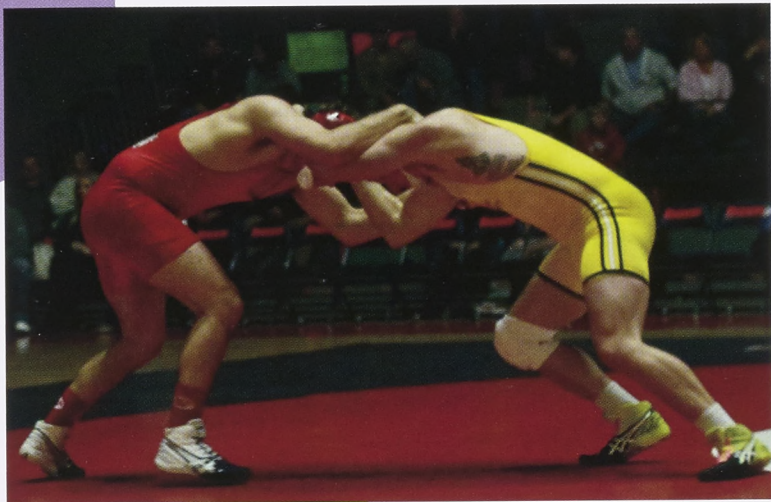

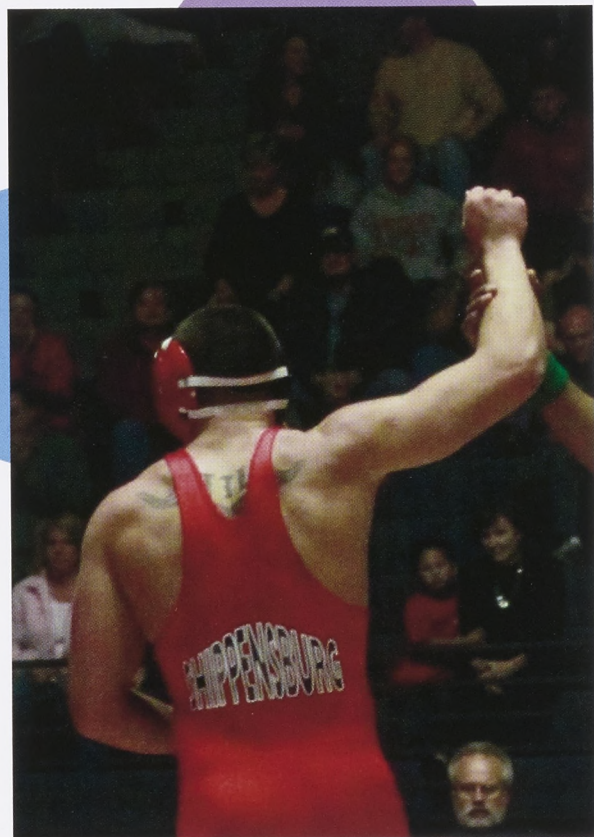

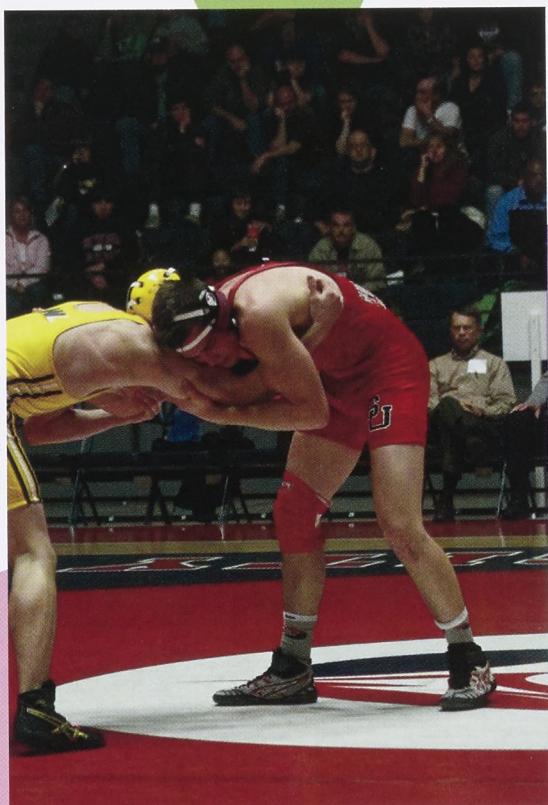

The 2011 Men's Cross Country Team finished its season with a strong effort at the NCAA Division II National Championship placing 17th overall.

The Division II title was battled for in blustery November conditions at the Plantes Ferry Athletic Complex in Spokane, Wa. on November 29, 2011. Senior Stephen Schelander lead the way finishing 41st overall. He had a time of 32:05 while Shippensburg finished 17th overall and had a complete time of 2:46:44 and 413 points.

The Red Raiders impressive seventh place finish in 2010 NCAA Championship granted the PSAC a third team to send to the 2011 championship.

Shippensburg ran a competitive season finishing third in PSAC, solidifying a third consecutive trip to the Division II Championships. The team finished with 108 points, 3rd overall, and Schelander, Matt Gillette, and Eric Evans each earned PSAC Regional Top Ten Awards finishing in 3rd, 6th, and 13th places respectively. The Red Raiders were ranked 24 in the nation at the end of the season, but had previously seen rankings as high as 18.

The Red Raiders were bolstered by strong running from freshman Bernard England, Scott Armstrong, and Peter Gelston. Their efforts coupled with the veteran runners Gillette, Schelander and Evans produced a competitive and dedicated team.

The 17th overall finish was impressive for the Red Raiders; only two runners had competed in a NCAA 10k championship race previously, and the lack of experience did not hinder their results, 7 places above their ranking of 24 in Division II.

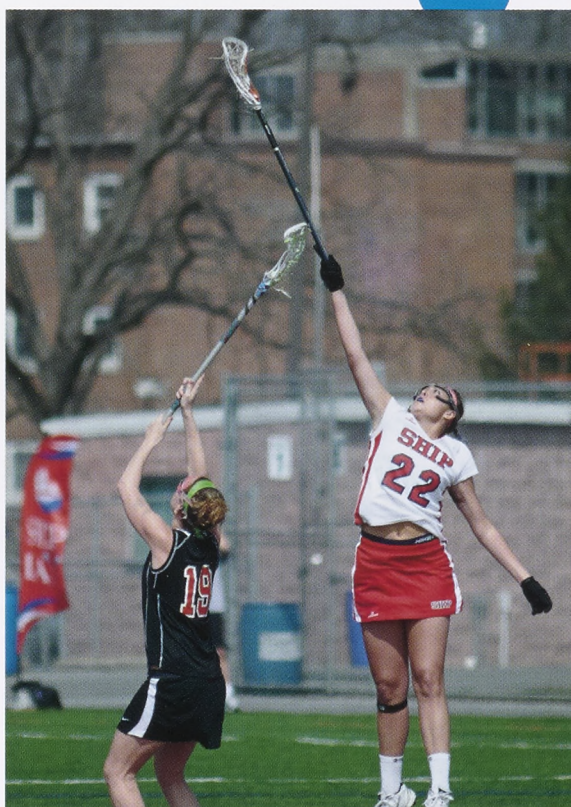

The Red Raiders started the 2012 season with nineteen returning players and high hopes of improving on a mediocre 2011 campaign. SU finished their season with a record of 32-21. Receiving the No. 5 slot in the Atlantic Region, the Raiders won the most games in five seasons and finished among the final four teams in the PSAC tournament.

Also, the Raiders Baseball team added two new assistant coaches, Kris Kullman, a Shippensburg graduate, and Corey Haines, a Maryland graduate.

During the 2012 season, SU played against some of the best teams in Division II baseball. The Red Raiders found themselves in games decided by one or two runs in 30 of their 53 games. The record among these games amounted to an even 15 wins and 15 losses.

At the season's end, Head Coach Matt Jones improved eight wins from the 2011 season. SU's batting average was .283 and the team's ERA improved by two-and-a-half runs from the previous year.

After four years senior players Eric Herman, Kody Kibler, Ben Miller, Jimmy Miller, Cam Richardson, Nick Umberger, Tyler Uphouse and Ted Williams ended their collegiate career with 91 victories.

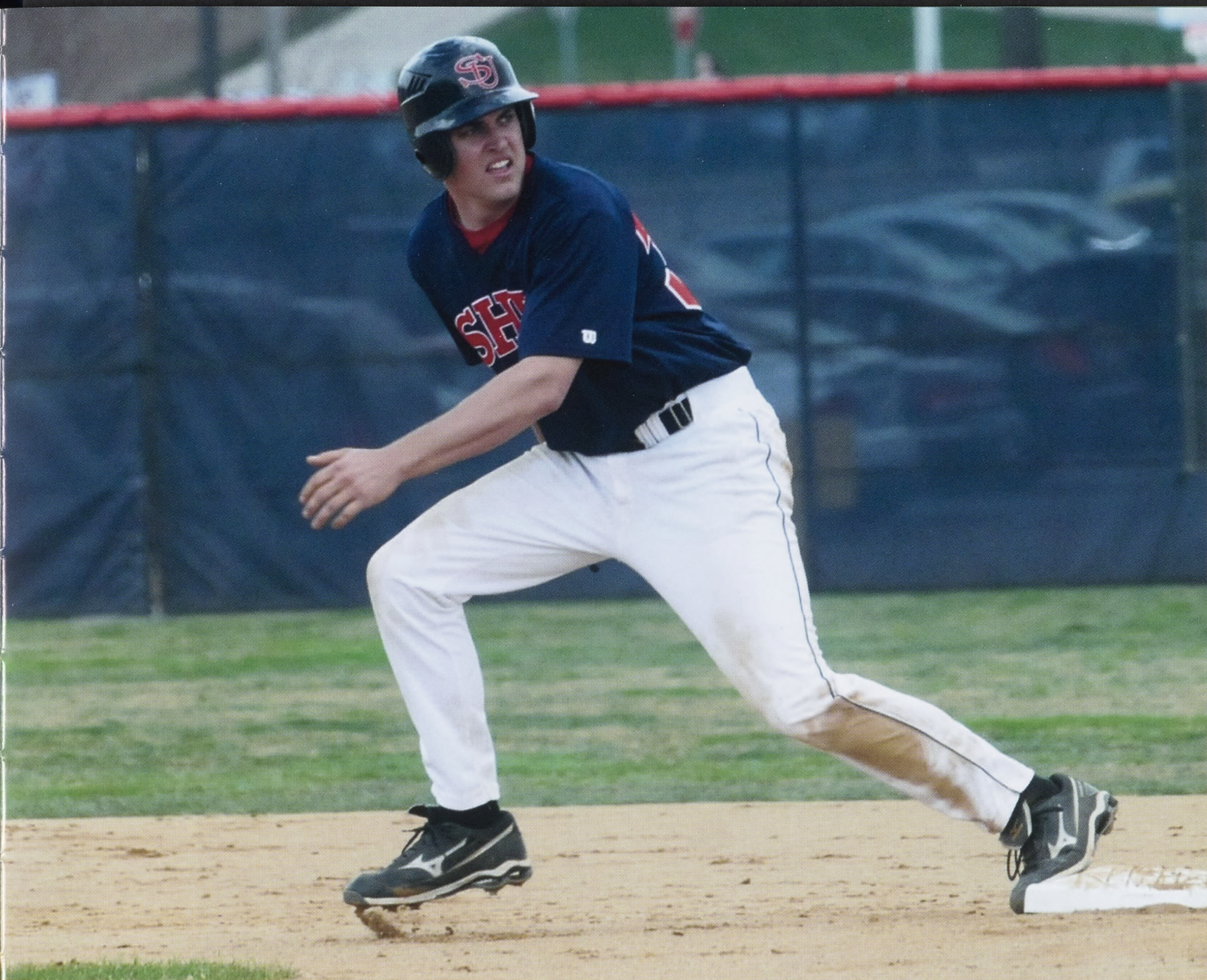

TAKING A BITE OUT OF MATH

MATH PROFESSOR SHARES STORY OF SURVIVING A SHARK ATTACK

Shark Week will never be the same for mathematics professor Kimberly Presser after she experienced the power of these creatures in August 2010.

While visiting her brother, a Navy commander stationed in Jacksonville, Fla., Presser was attacked by a 6-foot shark in the shallow waters. She was wading waist-deep in the ocean when she noticed an unidentifiable figure swimming five feet away from her.

Unexpectedly, it hit her with a force, "like a rocket." The shark bit her left arm below her elbow. Presser quickly scrambled to shore, yelling "Shark!" The shark did not attack her again as she ran toward the beach to safety.

Presser was taken to the hospital and went directly into surgery. Presser became as popular as a celebrity in the hospital among the staff and patients.

Her husband, Clif, took a picture of her bite and posted it to Facebook, joking about the coincidence of Shark Week.

Other than making the top of her highest fears list, Presser was left with a small souvenir - a tooth from the attacking shark.

Clif and Kim Presser have two children, Collin and Alex, and live in Arendtsville, Pa. She attended college for a bachelor's degree in mathematics and then continued to graduate school. She has taught at SU for 11 years in the mathematics department.

Words of Wisdom from Professor Presser:

The faculty are not out to get you. We are here FOR YOU. We are accessible in our offices, by e-mail and by phone. We cannot help you if you do not let us know that you need it. SU students have a luxury of having caring professors who want to see their student succeed, not fail. There are bigger schools where you are just a number and students and professors don't get this kind of interaction. Take advantage of this luxury.
