
SHIP: The Main Attraction

Shippensburg University is located amidst a wide expanse of flowing farmland. The university's location is one factor that allowed Dr. Heather Sahli, a biology professor, to start up a campus farm for Shippensburg students. Sahli serves as the chair of the sub-committee that assisted in starting the garden. The garden, which is located in the field behind the Shippensburg University Foundation, is not the first one the university has provided for students.

Sahli explained that a smaller garden was previously available for students, faculty and staff to plant vegetables and flowers. Since the allotted amount of land was fairly small, Sahli requested to move the garden to behind the SU Foundation. The garden was moved to the new location at the beginning of the fall semester of 2012.

So far, participants have planted vegetation such as spinach, mustard greens, bush beans, kohlrabi, kale, several different lettuces, and carrots.

"The mission of our farm is to provide students with hands-on opportunities in sustainable agriculture, to increase our campus's sustainability by providing locally grown produce to the dining hall, and also donating some of the food grown to the Shippensburg Produce Outreach, which provides fresh produce to people in need in our community," said Sahli.

Julia Russell, a graduate student, became involved with the garden after she was hired as the graduate assistant of the campus farm coordinator. She has several duties including planting, weeding, watering, and assisting in organizing student involvement to ensure that all the necessary tasks are completed.

Russell has also faced several challenges since gaining her position. She is in the process of attempting to rebuild an old greenhouse to put in the garden. After it was donated to the garden committee, Russell began researching how to build a greenhouse. She hopes that when she rebuilds it, she can make it larger than it previously was.

"I believe that farming in a manner that promotes local produce and sustainability is really important to the community and the environment and that's what the campus farm is all about," said Russell.

Hurricane Sandy By Andrea Starliper

Just a few days after its initial landfall in Jamaica on Oct. 24, Hurricane Sandy inevitably made its way toward the United States. By Oct. 29, Hurricane Sandy had moved just off the coast of Atlantic City, N.J., and was classified as a post-tropical cyclone.

Yielding to precaution, the Shippensburg campus closed at noon on the 29th and shut down everything but the food services on Oct. 30.

The campus Emergency Response Team met the Friday before Sandy to discuss plans for the campus to ride out the storm. First on the agenda was checking food sufficiency to see just how many days the campus could feed the students without receiving more supplies. Next, equipment such as generators was checked to make sure all were up to date.

According to Executive Director for University Communications and Marketing Peter Gigliotti, one of the first concerns was for the university's off-campus commuters. As Sandy's path crept inland, all university activities were postponed. After all, SU commuters make up 63.5% of the student body.

On the night of Oct. 29, SU waited to see what Sandy was going to bring.

Tuesday followed with rain, but nothing more than the campus is used to seeing. According to Dr. Tim Hawkins' weather station outside Shearer Hall, total rainfall amounted to 3.98 inches during Sandy. The highest wind recorded on campus was 33 miles per hour, while winds along the shoreline of New York and New Jersey gusted to nearly 110 miles per hour.

By late Tuesday night, almost all was clear. Lights flickered throughout the evening in dorms, but power was never lost. On campus, only minor leaks were reported around windows of the Ceddia Union Building. There were no reports of water intrusion within campus basements or roofing.

Summed up by Gigliotti, "The storm was just not the punch we expected."

Off campus in Shippensburg, some areas had downed power lines and trees uprooted, but nothing like the devastation seen in other states.

A New Place To Call Home

Construction is not something new to students at Shippensburg University. After all, can you think back to your years here and remember a time when there wasn't some part of campus being renovated or something new being built?

Just when one project seems to end, a new one always seems to take its place. For the first time in more than 50 years, students are finding a new space to call home. The completion of phase one of a three-phase, five-year housing project began at the end of the fall 2012 semester.

Three newly constructed buildings, Presidents' Hall, Seavers Hall and McLean Hall II will house a total of 924 students and are much different than the older dormitories. The rooms are apartment-style living areas that offer single and double bedrooms as well as a kitchenette and dining/living area. The public spaces of the new buildings have laundry rooms, game rooms, common rooms, study lounges and social lounges. McLean Hall II will not only house students, but the new Wellness Center to replace Etter Health Center. In exchange for building three new dormitories, McCune Hall and Kieffer Hall were knocked down.

Phase two will include the demolition of the old Seavers Hall, Mowrey Hall and Etter Health Center. Phase three will include demolishing and replacing the remaining dorm buildings. The completion of the \$200 million housing project is expected to be during the summer of 2015.

While the dorms at Ship are held near and dear to the hearts of the students they housed, the project will undoubtedly reshape the on-campus living experience. After all, buildings and dorms can be replaced but the memories and friendships they harbored won't be forgotten.


This fall, PSA held a mock Electoral College election with Dr. Alison Dagnes' Political Science Honors class. All members of the honors program are either juniors, seniors or graduate students, but other political science students were invited to the event as well. President Ruud and his wife were gracious enough to open their home to the group and also participated in the event.

Each student who attended chose a state beforehand and researched their state and its political viewpoint. They then participated in a roll call and gave their electoral votes to whichever candidate was ahead in the polls. This could be a tricky process as some of the states switched back and forth between the candidates. The students had to vigilantly watch the polls and make an educated guess as to how the state would vote.

Since 1977, Penn State has hosted THON, a 46-hour dance marathon that raises money for The Four Diamonds Fund. This year, Shippensburg University students organized a Mini-THON for the first time. The Mini-THON acted as a smaller version of the already popular THON.

Nate Blass and Mackenzie Bender started the Mini-THON club in March of 2012. Since then, they have held 17 events to raise money for The Four Diamonds Fund. According to the THON website, The Four Diamonds offsets the cost of treatment that insurance does not cover, as well as expenses that may affect the welfare of the child. Act V The Metal Children By Theresa Helwig

The controversy of banning literature from schools is one in which our country has dealt with since the days of Mark Twain's "Tom Sawyer." The play "The Metal Children," written by Adam Rapp, addressed this issue and other controversies when it was performed by Shippensburg University students in Memorial Auditorium Nov. 9-11.

"The Metal Children" follows the journey of a young-adult author, Tobin Falmouth, whose novel "The Metal Children" has been banned from a high school located in the typical conservative small town. The novel addresses controversial issues such as women's rights, teen pregnancy and abortion. Superintendent Otto Hurley, played by senior Daniel Lindgren, feels these topics are not suitable for the students. Falmouth, played by freshman Tim Hippensteel, travels to the small town in order to attend a meeting addressing whether or not students should be permitted to read the book.

Vera Dundee, played by junior Kimberly MacAlister, is one student advocating for the novel. With the help of her teacher Stacy Kinsella, played by junior Cory Stevens, they explain to Falmouth how the novel has positively affected them. Dundee feels that the novel gives teen girls inspiration to take control of their own bodies. With all the twists and turns, including stabbings, suicides and teen pregnancies,"The Metal Children" kept the audience on the edge of their seats.

"The Metal Children" has won the 2012 Poets, Playwrights, Essayists, Editors, and Novelists (PEN) Award for American Playwright in Mid-Career. Rapp wrote the play following an incident where his novel "The Buffalo Tree" was banned from the curriculum of a Pennsylvania

high school. His experience with that situation influenced the subject matter of "The Metal Children."

Evan Hallman, a senior at Shippensburg University, directed the 2012 Shippensburg production of "The Metal Children." Hallman discovered his passion for directing after previously taking on the role for SU's production of "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead."

Hallman was able to sum up the play in his own words.

"The play really does speak to the future of what family dynamics can be in the future and broaches the awkward intimacy that pervades our lives," Hallman said.

"The Santaland Diaries," a one-man show written by David Sedaris and adapted by Joe Mantello, helped to usher in the holiday season at Shippensburg University in Memorial Auditorium. The play, which was performed Nov. 28, 29, 30, and Dec. 1 and 2, was directed by theater professor Paris Peet.

The production centers on a down-and-out man who comes across a job opening for an elf at a Macy's department store during the holiday season. It follows his journey from the initial interview and training, all the way up to the climatic Christmas Eve shift. The man eventually chooses to call himself Crumpet.

The sarcastic nature of Crumpet, played by Ethan Goldbach, kept the audience laughing until the last line. The ridiculous outfit, which not only included a pair of tights but also shoes with bells on the toe, served as a source of humor for the viewers. In the end, Crumpet leaves his costume behind with his fellow employees. The only thing he takes away from the experience is that he hates costumes, bossy Santas and obnoxious parents.

Ethan Goldbach, a senior at Shippensburg University, agreed to play Crumpet after Professor Peet approached him with the idea of putting on the production. Goldbach was excited to be given the opportunity to be the lead in the one-man show.

"This show really demonstrates an actor's range. 'The Santaland Diaries' has been a thrill and a challenge because it's constantly changing based on the audience members' reactions. The thrill of getting consistent laughs from audience members is indescribable. It has also just been a blast creating the various sub-characters in the show," said Goldbach.

The production did present difficulties for Goldbach since there was only one character. The biggest problem he faced was memorization. Since he did not have any other actors to bounce lines off of, he was forced to solely rely on his own memory, which at first was a daunting task. He was able to remedy the problem by adapting the play into a staged reading, which he said made "the script a natural part of the show."

Even with the memorization, Goldbach viewed the show as an overall positive experience and appreciated the difference from regular productions.

"It's different because it's just me. With most shows, you have other actors on stage with you...With this, though, the audience is the closest thing to another character, and they really make the show. If they're feeling it, their responses are key in this show," Goldbach stated.

Invisible Children By Gillian Radel

Invisible Children is a movement that raises awareness about the atrocities that are being committed by African warlord Joseph Kony, leader of the Lord's Resistance Army, and his child soldiers. This year the movement was held in Memorial Auditorium and was organized by Brandon Gebhart of the fraternity Kappa Delta Phi. The event was held at the university in the past, but this year's presentation was more poignant.

The night started out with a performance by the In-Motion Dance Troupe. This was followed by a viewing of the Kony 2012 video. The video showed the child soldiers in Africa and their terrible struggle against Kony. Most of the children shown had been forcibly removed from their homes and forced to kill others. The film stressed the importance of capturing Kony and stopping the war. Kony has been wanted for war crimes by the International Criminal Court in The Hague, Netherlands, since 2005 but has been abducting children since 1986.

The most heartbreaking part of the evening was when a former child soldier spoke to the group. The man shared his first-hand experiences and brought many people to tears. However, the speaker made it clear that he wanted people to focus on the capturing of Kony rather than dwell on the horrors of his past.




Invisible Children is something that should be talked about on campus. It should not be forgotten and will hopefully accomplish its mission to capture Kony.




All Time Low also held a question-and-answer session with SU students.
























New Alum Gives Job-Hunting Advice



Shippensburg has a variety of nightlife attractions for SU students to indulge in when headed out on the town.

Wibs, a popular destination for Shippensburg students, offers a variety of specials to choose from and plenty of music. With specials running Monday through Saturday, it is always a great place to go when short on cash.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Wibs has \$1.50 drafts and \$5 pitchers of Bud Light from 6 p.m. to midnight. Monday is wing night as well, where you can get 10 wings for \$4.50. But, if you are going to Wibs for a good time, your best bet would be to go on Thursday or Friday night, the busiest night of the week, according to the owner.

Wibs is a great place to make memories with friends after turning 21, but Manager Don Serbo Jr. warns, "Come to Wibs, enjoy yourself, but don't make it your last night."

Thursdays are college nights, where SU students can get in for free with no cover charge, as long as they can furbish SU identification. Happy hour on Thursday starts at 9 p.m. and ends at 11 p.m., with half-priced mixed drinks and shots, as well as \$5 pitchers of beer, drafts starting at \$1.50 and the presence of a DJ who keeps the party going until closing.

Fridays and Saturdays are just as appealing, with a \$2 Long Island Ice Tea special and a \$1.75 Captain and Coke special. Fridays provide a DJ with a \$1 cover charge, while Saturdays feature just a \$3 cover charge.

Although Wibs is right off campus, it is not the only bar in town. Shippensburg also has two other bars favored by SU students: University Grille and Hot Point Inn.

University Grille, located on King Street, gets the most attention from SU students on Tuesday and Thursday. Tuesdays offer Taco Tuesday where students can get two tacos for \$1 and purchase \$1 drafts with proper identification from 7-11 p.m. Thursdays have endless pasta for \$7 and \$1 mix drinks from 7-11 p.m. as well.

The University Grille also offers other specials throughout the week other than Tuesday and Thursday, including specials such as \$2.50 Captain and Cokes, \$3 pitchers of Miller Lite and Yuengling Lager, and \$3 martinis.

Also offering student-favorite deals is the Hot Point Inn bar, located across from the Creekside apartments. Hot Point offers wing night Monday through Wednesday, with wings at 50 cents apiece and Taco Tuesday, with tacos going for 63 cents apiece. Wednesdays are free pool and jukebox night, Thursday nights feature karaoke and a DJ takes over Friday and Saturday. Hot Point also offers \$3 pitchers of Bud Light all week long.

These, along with some of the other Shippensburg late night attractions, are all great places to go while attending Shippensburg University.

Stephannie Stair, a senior, said it herself, "All of my memories were made at these places."

"Study during the week, go out to **WIBS** on Thursdays and enjoy the freedom on the weekends. The four years go fast, don't waste them."



"Internships! Do them, and do not take no for an answer. If someone says no, just keep trying," said Quiñones.







Both Raider Squads come out Victorious during Play 4 Kay Event

The annual "Play 4 Kay" basketball games on Feb. 16 were a success. The games raise awareness for breast cancer, and the money earned is given to the Kay Yow Cancer Fund. Since 2007, this initiative, supported by coaches across the nation, has raised over \$2 million.

The Lady Raiders played against PSAC opponent East Stroudsburg. Shippensburg freshman Stephanie Knauer helped lead the team to victory by scoring 22 points and grabbing 14 rebounds. Junior Sarah Strybuc had nine assists and scored 14 points. Shippensburg easily won the game, 67-47.

Before the start of the men's game, senior football defensive back Corey Hunt spoke to the crowd about his battle with cancer. In 2010, he was diagnosed with a type of cancer called Synovial Cell Sarcoma. As he went through his chemotherapy sessions, which he believes were about 10 times harder than football practice, Hunt thought he might not survive. Hunt found out that he was cancer-free on May 24, 2011. At the conclusion to Hunt's uplifting speech, Shippensburg President William Ruud presented Hunt with the Jane Goss Perseverance Award.

As the afternoon continued, the Ship men started off their game against East Stroudsburg by falling behind. Before long, however, sophomore Reggie Charles made up for the slow start. Charles ended up carrying the team, scoring 31 points. He also had nine assists and five steals. In addition, junior Dylan Edgar was a big help, adding a double-double with 14 points and 11 rebounds. Ship went on to beat East Stroudsburg 87-77, breaking their 14-game winning streak. This was also a nice accomplishment for the Red Raiders since the team had lost to East Stroudsburg by 43 points in a previous game this season.

"So people can now watch and listen; we're really trying to make this as multimedia as possible," said Anstett.

Also, the station has a smart phone application for both Android and iPhone that WSYC had to "bump the capacity for," from 200 to 400 listeners in preparation for the event, Anstett stated. Apple's iTunes offers a streaming option that allows WSYC to broadcast as well. That means people from anywhere in the world could listen to 88.7 FM's "Up All Night."

"We actually had someone from England tell us that they were watching us, and someone from Denmark," said Anstett.





Students Go Barefoot for the Sake of Global Awareness | By Hannah Wolfe

A group of approximately 30 people strolled through campus with bare feet, carrying a banner covered in paint footprints and the letters 'ODWS.'

The students were participating in the barefoot walk, one of several annual events surrounding "One Day Without Shoes." On Tuesday, April 16, Shippensburg University hosted the annual day of awareness for the fourth time.

"One Day Without Shoes" is "Our day to bring global awareness to children's health and education by going without shoes," according to the event's website.

University Union and Student Activities' LeaderSHIP programs, Emerging Leaders Institute and Advanced Leaders Institute sponsored the event. LeaderSHIP members encouraged students to spend five minutes, 20 minutes, an hour or the entire day barefoot, according to Assistant Director for Leadership Development and Student Group Services Ashley White.

From 1-3 p.m. in the Great Hall of the Ceddia Union Building, members of the LeaderSHIP programs provided games such as ring toss, horseshoes and ladder golf for the opportunity to win prizes. At 3:30 p.m., participants met in front of the Ezra Lehman Memorial Library for a barefoot walk around campus. The walk, along with the other activities during the day, was intended to promote awareness and start conversations about children's health.

"Once people see this massive group of people walking around, they're going to be like 'hey, what's that for?'" said White.

Participants were hoping to convey the problems less fortunate countries face. Going without shoes results in children missing days of school because of diseases like hookworm, an infection that foot protection prevents. TOMS shoes, which is affiliated with the event, uses proceeds to improve education, hygiene, medication and protection from soil.

Leadership Development Intern Amanda Gelber believed that not wearing shoes for one day helped her understand what children who cannot afford shoes go through every day. She said that wearing shoes every day prevents people from understanding its affect.

"The awareness that it promotes and the way that your feet feel at the end of the day gives you a taste of it," said Gelber.





Communication/Journalism Department Earns Accreditation | By Brent Scheidegger

On May 5, 2013, the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications (ACEJMC) voted to give full accreditation to SU's Communication/Journalism Department. Department chair, Dr. Joe Borrell, called the accreditation, "an assurance of quality."

The ACEJMC already granted the Communication/Journalism program provisional accreditation in 2011. It was determined in 2011 that the program would need to undergo some changes that would prove to be very challenging for both the faculty and the students. Faculty members were asked to change their course curriculum. The graduation requirements for students were also adjusted and two new courses were added.

The 2011 visit brought the addition of two courses: Diversity in the Media and Practicum. The courses were designed after ACEJMC members suggested the department needed more diversity and that more students needed to participate in student media.

In addition to the new courses, faculty members also worked around the clock compiling data that would prove the department's effectiveness. They needed to show that both faculty members as well as students were progressing at an acceptable rate and were on par with other Communication/Journalism programs.

After an 18-month long makeover, ACEJMC members returned to evaluate the adjustments. During their 3-day stay, the members agreed that the program had met the standards required for accreditation and granted recommendation for full accreditation.

Dr. Michael Drager said in an interview earlier this year, "This is a great achievement by faculty and students, but especially by students."

Becoming an accredited program means a lot for potential and current students, as well as alumni. For students who have not yet completed the program, accreditation means new opportunities for contests and access to resources restricted to accredited programs. The accreditation will also be listed on future degrees and will potentially increase employment opportunities.

Accreditation is exciting news for alums as well.

"It's my understanding that alumni will be able to claim accreditation," said Borrell. Borrell also explained that the alumni's contributions to the program have been crucial in the accreditation process.

Faculty, staff, students and alumni have worked for over 10 years to make the Communication/Journalism department a respected program and their efforts finally paid off. With accreditation, SU will join Temple and Penn State University as the only Pennsylvania State based institution with an accredited Communication/Journalism program.

After the C/J Banquet, SU alums such as Fox 43 news anchor Evan Forrester spoke with students on resume-building and how to keep their social media pages clean.

SU Graduates 1,082 Undergraduate, 145 Graduate Students

Shippensburg University celebrated the graduation of its graduate and undergraduate students on Friday, May 10 and Saturday, May 11. The graduate ceremony was held in the H. Ric Luhrs Performing Arts Center Friday evening and included 145 students. The undergraduate ceremony took place in the Heiges Field House the following afternoon.

Also, as a part of the commencements, four university alumni received the annual Outstanding Young Alumnus Award. The recipients were James A. DeGaetano, Class of 1999; Gerald E. 



Perhaps the biggest game of the year, the Shippensburg Red Raiders hosted the Bloomsburg Huskies on Oct. 27, in a battle of the undefeated with the PSAC East Title and a trip to the PSAC Championship held in the balance. A 'Red Out' was in full swing with more than 7,000 fans and students showing support for their team by wearing the color red. The Shippensburg Red Sea was also showing their pride as hundreds of students painted red and white led the crowd in cheers.

The Red Raiders continued their season and guaranteed themselves a trip to the PSAC Championship with a 49-42 win over Bloomsburg in the final four seconds of the game. Junior Quarterback Zach Zulli led the Red Raider offense 83 yards in 14 plays and 2:30, capping the drive with a 2-yard touchdown pass to Bryan Barley.

SU finished the regular season undefeated, breaking 65 school records in the process. They were ranked as high as seventh in the American Football Coaches Association Poll, the highest in school history. Despite a loss to IUP in the PSAC Championship game, the Raiders bounced back the next Saturday to defeat Bloomsburg for a second time, giving SU its first NCAA Division II playoff victory since 1991. Shippensburg's season came to an end at the hands of Winston-Salem State in the second round of the NCAA playoffs with a final score of 34-17. Despite the tough season-ending loss, the 2012 season was one for the Raider record books.

QB Zach Zulli

This year, Zulli earned the NCAA Division II's Harlon Hill Trophy, the Division II equivalent of the Heisman Trophy. Zulli is the first SU player to ever achieve this honor. Zulli led all divisions of college football with 54 touchdown passes in 2012 while leading all of Division II with 4,747 passing yards.

The Lady Raider field hockey team returned another successful season for Shippensburg University. The women finished their season with an overall record of 17-3, and made it to the NCAA Division II National Semi-Final game. Unfortunately, SU lost a thrilling match to West Chester on a last minute goal, 3-2.

The SU offense was a powerhouse all season as they outshot their opponents 383-197. They also outscored their competition, 77-20. On the other half of the field, the defensive unit was just as impressive as their counterpart. The defenders tallied 16 defensive saves while the goalies accumulated 8 shutouts.

This year, the Lady Raiders were led by junior Bre White and senior Kayla Harshman. White was named the 2012 Longstreth/NFHCA Division II Field Hockey Player of the Year after notching 17 goals and 9 assists. Harshman was named to the NFHCA First Team All-American after recording a team-high of 6 defensive saves.

However, Harshman and White were not the only ones to earn post-season honors. Four other Lady Raiders earned Second Team All-American Honors including Seniors Ciarra Delost, Taylor Jones, Jamie Levy and Junior Katie Shoop. Shoop, a defender, totaled 2 goals and 4 assists. Shoop also earned All-American Honors in 2011 as a sophomore.

"I don't think any of us realize our achievements these last few years," Shoop stated, "If anything, we under appreciate our success. Yes, we've made it to the Final Four, but I don't think we will be satisfied until we win the championship. We are proud to represent Ship and are honored to have such a strong program."

Sophomore Ari Saytar and Junior Lauren Taylor were also named to the All-PSAC Western Division Second Team.

SU saw its regular season conference winning streak, which began in 2008, snapped at 37 games, however, the Lady Raiders still came out victorious with the PSAC regular season title. This year marked the Lady Raiders 9th appearance in the NCAA Division II Tournament, all of which were under Head Coach Bertie Landes.

The Shippensburg University women's cross country team had a fantastic season with many great performances, yet again. The team took first place at five out of seven meets.

The team won its fifth consecutive PSAC championship title which was held at Slippery Rock University. Senior Katie Spratford had an impressive kick over the last 800 meters which pushed her over the finish line to win her first individual PSAC title by 10 seconds. Senior Amanda Raudabaugh finished in eighth-place, while junior Emma Shank finished in ninth; both achieving All-PSAC recognitions.

Senior Katie Wiechelt won Lock Haven's 6K "Go Fast River Run" for the second consecutive year with a time of 22:55. Junior Heidi Shuck took second place in 23:06. The team finished overall by placing seven runners in the Top 10.

Going in to the Atlantic Region meet, the Lady Raiders were more than ready to defend their title. With a total of 70 points the team took home its fifth consecutive NCAA Division II Atlantic Regional Championship. Spratford earned her first individual regional championship by 27 seconds with the time of 20:20.

Spratford went on to finish third at the 2012 NCAA Division II Women's Cross Country Championships. She finished her career with three All-American finishes. Together the team took seventh, which is their fourth Top 10 national finish in five years. After her remarkable season, Spratford was named the 2012 PSAC Women's Cross Country Athlete of the Year.

"I think my training over the past three years here at Ship really came together for me this season. I was able to consistently progress my training each season and focus on slowly achieving my goals," Spratford said.

Having a young team of runners did not stall the men's cross country team from having a phenomenal season. The team, which consisted of two seniors, three sophomores and five freshmen, battled their way into a fifth place PSAC finish and fifth in the region.

Senior Matt Gillette led the Red Raiders and finished third at the PSAC Championships held on the Cooper's Lake Campground course outside of Slippery Rock. Gillette finished the 8K with a time of 25:30. Senior Brian Quintrell greatly improved his placing from last year by finishing 29th overall with a time of 26:35.

A fifth place finish at the NCAA Atlantic Regionals did not allow the team to advance as a whole to the 2012 Division II National Championships held in Joplin, Missouri. However, Gillette clenched an individual qualification by finishing fourth in the region with a 10K time of 31:07, a second personal best by 50 seconds.

Gillette closed out his outstanding career with a 17th-place finish at the NCAA Championships, earning his first All-American honors. He improved his 10K time by achieving a time of 30:00. Gillette is a four-time All-PSAC and All-Region runner and is SU's 10th men's cross country runner to achieve All-American honors.

The 2012-13 volleyball season was nothing short of historical and exciting. SU had a dominating group of seniors including Andrea Heimsoth, Lauren Murphy, Jenny Pry, Rachel Smicker and Erin Flick, along with returning players Samantha Edwards and stand-out Jill Edwards. Add in a strong freshman class and it made for one of the best seasons in SU volleyball history.

The season started out on a high note in Minnesota where the team went 2-2 against nationally ranked teams. After a long, hard-fought season and 3-1 win over West Chester, the team wrapped up its regular season play with a record of 26-10 overall and 14-5 against the other PSAC schools. This was the second most wins in a season in school history. The only PSAC East losses for the Lady Raiders came against Lock Haven.

Going into the PSAC playoffs, SU was ranked second in the East, enabling them to host the quarterfinal matchup against West Chester. An impressive 3-0 sweep against West Chester sent the Lady Raiders on to face the Western Division's No. 1 seed Gannon in the semifinal. In one of the hardest fought games of the season, Shippensburg came up just shy of a victory in a five-set match with set scores: 25-19, 23-25, 25-21 and 19-25.

However, the team was not done yet. The Lady Raiders earned the No. 6 seed from the Atlantic Region in the 2012 NCAA Division II Championships and were to face No. 3 California University of Pennsylvania. This was only the second appearance in school history that Shippensburg earned an NCAA tournament berth. After a tough match, Shippensburg's historic season came to a close with a 3-1 loss. The five seniors finished their careers with a total of 77 match wins over the last four years.

Four of Shippensburg's players earned All-PSAC designations. Junior outside hitter Jill Edwards earned her third All-PSAC First Team recognition. Senior setter Andrea Heimsoth and senior libero Lauren Murphy were each selected to the Second Team squad along with freshman middle hitter Taylor Gottshall. Gottshall also received the honor of PSAC Eastern Division Rookie of the Year.

wrestling

The 2012-13 wrestling campaign for Shippensburg University was a season of milestones for the wrestling program, capped off with a berth in the NCAA Division II Wrestling Championships.

With 14 SU wrestlers returning from last year's squad, three PSAC place-winners, seven Atlantic Region place-winners, four national qualifiers and one All-American, it was shaping up to be a good season.

The season started strong for the SU wrestlers, as they won their first dual meet by defeating Waynesburg 34-7, with three pins and winning eight out of the 10 matches.

Running into some tough opponents, however, SU lost the next two of their three meets. Both losses came from the hands of the Division I programs Rider and Lock Haven University.


Despite the tough losses, the Red Raiders kept moving and soon found themselves in the PSAC Championships. The Championships were held Dec. 8 at Kutztown University and the team placed eighth overall. Three SU wrestlers placed that day, one of which was freshman Bobby Scheivert who finished third in his weight class and achieved the highest PSAC placing for a SU wrestler since 2009.

Following the PSACs, the Red Raiders went on to finish with a 12-8 record for the regular season, and won three out of four in both Mid-Penn and Super Region 1 duals as well.

At the end of the regular season, the wrestling team headed into the NCAA Super Region 1 Championships. There they finished sixth in the championships as a team, which was SU's highest place in regionals since 2007.


In addition, Shippensburg's Cameron Throckmorton won his 133 pound class title and represented SU in March at the NCAA Division II Wrestling Championships that took place in Birmingham, Ala. Throckmorton was the first SU wrestler to do so since 2009.

Unfortunately, Throckmorton was eliminated from the competition after losing back-to-back duals. He finished his 2013 campaign with an impressive 21-5 record.




Senior Tyler Erdman squares off against his Kutztown University opponent.

women's swimming

The many hours of training paid off for the Shippensburg University women's swim team. The team finished another great season with outstanding performances. At the final regular season meet at Bucknell University, the Shippensburg swimmers gave it all they had. There were a total of 12 PSAC qualifiers and 14 personal-best times. The outstanding Lady Raider quartet consisting of freshman Rikki Sargent, junior Julie Brown, freshman Carolyn Meier and senior Julia Brownrigg won the 200-yard freestyle relay in 1:38.60.

At the PSAC meet, the women's swim team had some of the best performances in Shippensburg history. The 400-yard freestyle relay squad consisting of Sargent, Brown, Meier and Browrigg set a school record of 3:28.77. Brown and Brownrigg each went on to set individual school records, as well as contributed to a 400-yard medley relay record. Brown, with her solo performance in the 50-yard freestyle, became SU's first individual PSAC champion in seven years. The relay squad also set a school record in the 200-yard freestyle relay.

Sargent bested her school record in the 100-yard breaststroke with a time of 1:05.53 and placed fourth in the event. Sargent also placed seventh in the 200-yard breaststroke.

Shippensburg finished seventh overall at the PSAC Championships, an improvement of one spot from last season. The team was also recognized for maintaining national Scholar All-American team status, showing that they work hard both in the pool and in the classroom.

men's swiming

Despite a regular season mark of just one team victory, the SU men's swim team made quite a splash at the PSAC Championships. The team, comprised of five seniors, two juniors, nine sophomores and three freshmen, was lead by head coach Tim Verge in his 14th season.

Senior Sean Minford was nothing short of the jack-of-all trades for the team during the 2012-13 season. At the PSAC Championships Minford swam his final individual race, the 200-yard backstroke, in 1:52.78. The time earned him an impressive personal record by more than a second and allowed him to take over the fourth all-time spot in the SU record book. However, for some of his strongest swims, Minford also broke the school record in the 200 IM with a time of 1:52.52 and the 100-yard breaststroke with a time of 56:70.

Senior Stew Conrad also beat a personal best of his own during the championships in the 200-yard backstroke with a time of 1:55.28.

Eric Naylor, another SU senior, wrapped up his collegiate career by placing in all 12 of his individual swims at the conference championships. When asked about the season Naylor stated:

"We didn't end up where we wanted to at the end of the year and I think that will drive the underclassmen to work harder and do better next year. We have a strong freshman and sophomore class that will continue to drive this team for a few years to come."

Eddie LaNoue ended his time in the pool with a total of eight PSAC winning performances.

Senior Mike Keefe finished his four-year stint just outside the SU record book for the 50-yard freestyle, possessing a time of 22.18. His time is nearly 1 second away from 10th of all-time.

Young sophomore Brennan Wolter was another Red Raider who just missed a spot in SU's top 10 for the mile. During the PSAC Championships Wolter swam the event in 16:28.28. Teammate Naylor holds the final spot for that event with a time of 16:28.18, which he set in 2011.

The Shippensburg University women's basketball team finished their 2012-13 season with a record of 20 wins and only eight losses. The team advanced to the first round of the PSAC Championships, but fell to Millersville University on Mar. 5.

The team excelled in Heiges Field House, as well as on the road. With a home record of 9-6 and an away record of 9-2, the Lady Raiders proved that they could showcase their talent on any court.

The women stood out at the Oahu Classic, defeating BYU-Hawaii and Hawaii-Hilo. They also held their own in the PSAC division. Freshman Stephanie Knauer was named the 2013 PSAC Eastern Division Freshman of the Year.





The Lady Raider softball team dominated their competition in yet another season, compiling a 30-9 record. The women posted 13 wins in PSAC play, earning a No. 1 seed in the PSAC Championship tournament and a No. 2 seed in the Atlantic Region tournament.

Shippensburg recorded 16 shutouts in the regular season, a testament to their strong pitching staff. SU's pitching was led by junior Emily Estep, sophomore Liz Parkins and sophomore Makenzie Lynn. Estep led the team in earned run average on the year with 1.08. In her 123 innings pitched, Estep also struck out 140 opposing hitters, while walking only 37. Parkins posted an undefeated record on the year at 9-0, while Lynn was a great inning-eater, pitching over 90 innings.

The Lady Raider offense was equally potent as the defense, as five hitters batted over .300. Outfielder Kiersten Darhower led the way, hitting .370 with 12 RBIs and 24 runs scored. As a team, SU slammed 13 home runs against their opponents and outscored those opponents 185-64.

SU earned its keep in practically every game this season, proving themselves especially in the last regular season game when they battled East Stroudsburg. In that game, Shippensburg native and second baseman Rachel Shumway got behind a 0-2 count but fought her way back. Shumway proceeded to foul off seven straight pitches, before launching a homerun, which ultimately gave SU the winning run.

The Lady Raiders continued on after the regular season into the PSAC Championship tournament and was selected to compete in the 2013 NCAA Division II Softball Championships. In the PSAC tournament, SU defeated Bloomsburg University 6-0 and came out victorious over Mansfield 4-2, however, fell short to West Chester 2-0. In the Atlantic Region tournament, SU earned the No. 2 seed and was able to host the competition at Robb Field. Under Head Coach Bob Brookens, this was the tenth time in 13 seasons that the Lady Raider softball team has qualified for the NCAA tournament.

Junior left fielder Hilary Lyons was named to the 2012-13 Capital One Academic All-District Two Team and deemed the 2013 PSAC Champion Scholar.



Dr. Zaccagnini is an associate professor in the Educational Leadership and Special Education department here at Shippensburg University. She has been a part of the Raider family for 18 years and fell in love with the university because of the heavy focus on its students. Aside from being a professor, she also serves as an adviser and a mentor to students.

Disability studies did not always have her heart. Zaccagnini initially planned to be an attorney or an architect, however the pivotal moment in which she discovered her true passion came from working in the area of deinstitutionalization. There she wrote grants for a variety of institutions promoting disabilities and became an advocate and activist for those with disabilities. Her purpose

was to create awareness and let others know what it would be like to stand up and advocate for those who could not, including child abuse and neglect and those with disabilities. She also worked in Washington D.C. on the National Challenge Committee on Disability with influential disability rights professionals from across the country.

One of her biggest accomplishments while Zaccagnini has been at SU, is the approval of a disability studies minor for students as a result of the initial collaboration of Drs. Allison Carey, Marita Flagler and Suzanne Morin. There are currently 31 students signed up, a number that is both surprising and exciting to her.

Zaccagnini is heavily involved in the student group PIE (People Involved Equally). In the past 5 years, the group has received two campus-wide awards including for new service program and for their service to the community.

Dr. Z knows what it is like to be a student, and has felt the demand and pressure that comes along with getting an education. Her advice?

James is an anthropology professor and has been teaching at Shippensburg University since 1988. James received her undergraduate degree from Bucknell University in 1971 and graduated with a dual major in anthropology and sociology. While working at Bucknell with another professor. James accepted an offer to teach and further her research at Penn State.

While earning a

James did fieldwork in the
French West Indies on the

During her time there, she

demography, as well as

values. James later
received her doctorate

from Penn State in anthropology specializing in Mate Choice, which is the process of how people choose how they pick a partner. For her dissertation, James created a computer simulation program that can take data from the islanders about who they would pick to marry and project who the islanders will pick as a mate.

After teaching at Penn State for several years, James said she finally found her home at SU. James realized that smaller classes give her the opportunity to interact with the students and get to know them on a more personal level. She loves teaching and her students, and her students love her back.

James continues her fieldwork by traveling to Greece every summer. This is not a problem for James, as her husband's family is from Greece. While there, James also interacts with refugees from Turkey and listens to those who want to share their life story.

After three long years of trying to find the answer to a question that weighed heavily on her mind, Shippensburg University faculty member Dr. Alison Dagnes not only found the truth behind her question, but wrote a book about it, as well.

Dagnes, ninth-year associate professor in the Shippensburg University Political Science department, launched her humorous book this past September. The title of the book, *A Conservative Walks Into a Bar: The Politics of Political Humor*, has a witty title that is often used in the beginning of many political jokes.



There had been two events that got Dagnes' mind wanting to know more. The popular 1990's comedian Dennis Miller had an interesting downfall that caused Dagnes to question the humorist political satires. After the unfortunate events of Sep.11, 2001, Miller became a fond supporter of George W. Bush and evolved into an outspoken conservative. After his blunt jokes began, his fan base started plummeting. Also, the uprising of Jon Stewart, who hosted "The Daily Show" began to make Dagnes wonder one big question, "Why, in an age where political comedy satire is so big, influential and popular, are there so few conservative satires out there?"

After reaching out to a childhood friend, who is now a comedian, this person helped her get in touch with about a dozen different political comedians, writers and producers. With that list of names, she gained more than two dozen other political interviewees. She then traveled all around the country and began her research. Dagnes flew to cities in California and to Chicago, Ill., as well, to gather everything that she could from these funny, but brilliant political humorist for her book.

Dagnes' book highlights the history of the satire, the comedy professions and the subject of satire itself. It also goes in depth as to why there is such a lack of balance in political humor and how it is affecting us as a society.

Dagnes claimed that even though it was extremely time consuming and a bit daunting at times, she enjoyed the whole process. She hopes her readers will gain a few things from her book:

"I hope that readers see how fun political satire can be, how instrumental it can be and informative. I also hope they enjoy reading, but that they look around political humor and see how good it is and how good it is for us to laugh together. I think these days we are a fragmented society and have a really polarized political climate, and **I hope that this brings us together.**"

Since the release date, Dagnes has been busy with interviews from news mediums all over the world. She did interviews with the United Kingdom's BBC, MSNBC and National Public Radio (NPR).

Her book is available to purchase on the shelves of Barnes and Nobles and on Amazon.com.




