Major General Tony Cucolo, the 49th commandant of the War College, in Carlisle, served as the commencement speaker during the undergraduate ceremony at 11 a.m. May 10 in Heiges Field House.


Cucolo ended his term as commandant in June 2014. Prior to his arrival at Carlisle, he spent 10 months as director of force development for the Deputy Chief of Staff at the Department of the Army in the Pentagon.



Commissioned a second lieutenant of infantry in 1979, Cucolo served 18 years in infantry and armored divisions. He commanded two companies, was an operations officer at battalion and brigade level, commanded a mechanized infantry battalion, commanded an armored brigade combat team and was deputy commanding general for a light infantry division.

He also served the Joint Staff at the Pentagon from 2001 to 2003. He has a bachelor's degree from the U.S. Military Academy and a master's degree from the University of San Francisco. He also is a graduate of the U.S. Marine Corps Amphibious Warfare School, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, and the U.S. Army War College.

Approximately 1,000 students participated in commencement exercises, including triplets Tiffany, Lindsay and Katie Doughty. The Lancaster natives were the only set of triplets enrolled at Shippensburg.

All three sisters graduated from the College of Education and Human Services and consider Shippensburg their "second home."





"It was great seeing the overwhelming responses to the fundraising efforts of our committee members as well as the homecoming court," Graham said.

SU Alumni, the homecoming committee, faculty and administration work hard for months to see the event finally come together on campus.

"It was such a busy and crazy week but I thought it was awesome to see how much everybody enjoyed everything and how much fun I even had doing it," said Heather Schmuck, assistant to the chair of the homecoming committee.

"It feels awesome when you plan an event that the entire campus loves and praises you for. I also think that homecoming is an important part of college because it brings everyone at Ship, including students, staff and alumni, together," Stambaugh said.

Planning for next year's homecoming will begin January 2014. Current members of the homecoming committee will hold their respective positions until then.



Jody Harpster

Acting as the new resident director for the men's dormitory in the Belmar House, the young Juniata College alumnus was set to enter the classroom again to obtain his master's degree in college student personnel administration/counseling.

In his first year on Shippensburg State College's campus of almost 5,000 students, George Harpster became the vice president of the newly formed Graduate Student Association, and then became the association's president the following year. Also in his second year, the young resident director moved to Horton Hall where the students were housed in the first and third floors, with the second floor being designated for offices including the Dean of Women.

With the college being split men and women in terms of deans and athletic directors, so was student housing. Harley, Kieffer, McLean, Naugle and McCune Halls were assigned to the female students while the Belmar House, the third and fourth floor of Old Main, Lackhove, Wright, Mowrey, and Horton Halls were assigned to men.

Now almost 40 years later, Shippensburg State College has transitioned into Shippensburg University, and instead of sitting at his desk in the classroom, in student government meetings or in a residents' hall with his friends, Jody Harpster now sits behind his desk in the office of the Executive Vice President of External Affairs and University Relations, in trustee meetings and in his home with his family. But soon, Harpster's desk will change locations again, moving just across the hall to the corner office of the president's suite where he will serve as the interim president of SU.

However, Harpster explained that his beginning may not be all that unfamiliar to current SU students. "I grew up a lot like most of the people who go to school here," Harpster said.

Harpster was born in the small mill town of Tyrone, Pa., where he attended Tyrone High School. In high school, he played football and ran track where his team won district gold in the mile relay beating Altoona High School. Harpster also said that he was in school musicals and also sang in the choir.

"It was easy in a small town to get a broad level of experience and I took advantage of that opportunity," Harpster said.

Harpster explained that with his father being a railroad worker and his mother a stay-at-home mom, his parents always wanted better for their children and would do anything to provide an education. And, with a caring and supportive family, Harpster became a first generation college student attending Juniata College with the goal of becoming a dentist. But, when he decided that biology and chemistry were not for him, he decided upon psychology. While at Juniata, Harpster was involved in music and sports running track and field, was the vice president of the student body his junior and senior year, and was the co-editor of the year book.

After graduating from Juniata College, Harpster immediately came to Shippensburg State College in the summer of 1972 to obtain his master's degree.

Following his graduation from Shippensburg State College, Harpster landed his first job in Charlotte, N.C., as the resident's coordinator at a 500-student coed residence hall at the University of North Carolina Charlotte.

"I was there when little UNCC went to the Final 4 [of the NCAA Division I basketball tournament]. It was the most amazing thing," Harpster said.

Leaning back in his chair, with his arms folded and a smile on his face as he looked off reminiscing, Harpster explained that he was in UNCC for three years. During his second year, the men's basketball team lost in the finals of the N.I.T. tournament to Kentucky. The following year, UNCC made the Final 4 along with the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC), University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV) and Marquette. Harpster recalled that UNCC was the Cinderella favorite, but Marquette was the other favorite because it was Al McGuire's last season as the head coach of Marquette. UNCC lost to Marquette in the Final 4 by one point and Marquette went on to win the national championship over UNC.

But following his time at UNCC, Harpster went to Chapel Hill to get his Ph.D. at UNC.

"The only way to advance in student affairs or higher education generally was to have a Ph.D.," Harpster said.

Along with his course load, Harpster also worked full-time as an area coordinator of 1,100 students in co-ed residence for two years. Then, he earned the position of Associate Director of Housing/Director of Resident's Life, which he held for the next two years.

"That was a real special learning experience for me. The reason was all of those peers that I worked with for the previous two years, suddenly I became their boss," said Harpster. "That was a huge learning experience as to how to make that transition."

Next, Harpster became the interim housing director at UNC, which he did for a year and a half. After obtaining his Ph.D. from UNC, Harpster traveled back to Charlotte to be the assistant vice chancellor of student affairs.

Then in 1995, he returned to Shippensburg to become the Dean of Students and associate vice president of student affairs. Harpster explained that one of his favorite aspects of the job was that one of his direct duties was to advise the student government which he loved.

"I really enjoy working with student government," Harpster said.

Harpster spent the next 10 years at SU as the vice president of student affairs, but following Tony Ceddia's announcement that he would retire, Harpster was offered the position of the interim president.

"I was the interim president for two years and it was wonderful," Harpster said.

Now that Harpster will be heading back to the president's desk, he explained that he has two goals. The first goal is, "for the students to be successful academically and otherwise," said Harpster.

"The second is for care and tending of the campus. Being available to people every day," Harpster said.



Because this is Harpster's second crack at the presidency, he has the advantage of looking back on his prior experiences.

"The key to success my last time as interim president was that everyone worked together. Every member of the executive management team was in acting or interim positions. So we made a commitment to one another and to the institution that we would not let the momentum that had developed, stop. We would continue to provide outstanding educational opportunities to the students and keep the momentum up at the institution," Harpster said.

In terms of the length of his presidency, there is no set time frame. According to Harpster, he will continue to live at his home in Shippensburg while renovations are made to the Martin House. Harpster said he lived at home rather than the Martin House the first time he was the interim president because minor renovations were made. However, Harpster said the renovations this time are more significant.

According to Harpster, he enjoys the small-town life of Shippensburg. And, although his perspective may have changed, Harpster is still the man that holds SU near and dear to his heart, and he is one who is familiar with the university.

"I love this place. I feel at home in Shippensburg; in the community and on campus," said Harpster. "Why wouldn't anyone want to work here? This is a neat place. It's an exceptional and outstanding institution with wonderful faculty members and a superb student body."

Professor Gina Barrecca demonstrated the power of humor at SU.

University of Connecticut Professor Gina Barrecca demonstrated the power humor has to bring two kinds of people together: the male and the female kind at the Memorial Auditorium.

"Women are still not represented in our culture," Barrecca said, as she put on makeup before her talk Thursday night.

Barrecca is not what she calls the fedora wearing, cigar smoking feminist stereotype.

Humor crosses gender lines and allows people to discuss difficult or taboo subjects.

People view things in a similar light with one another through laughter's community effect, Barrecca said.

When Barrecca the "Women Whisperer" speaks about women's senses of humor, she notices men nodding too.

Indeed, both men and women were clapping, laughing, understanding and connecting during the presentation.

Barrecca told jokes about how men think.

"A man's worst fear is a woman asking them what they're thinking," Barrecca said, "Because it's probably the extent of, 'Should I finish this bag of Doritos?'"

She also made cracks at women's lack of ability to tell good jokes.

"Harry," Barrecca said, imitating a woman talking to her husband, "Tell the one about the shrimp dinner.

"I can't," Barrecca said, imitating the frustrated husband. "Shrimp is the punch line."

On Sundays, when Barrecca was a kid, her aunts would be in the basement making dinner while giggling and laughing in the secret language of women's humor.

When men enter this girls-only giggle fest and dare to ask what is so funny, they would often reply with "nothing," Barrecca said.

"It would take 200 years of cultural history to explain," Barrecca said, "but I suggest we take that risk."

Barrecca said to risk being misunderstood is to be a leader.

Those who use humor take steps toward breaking down gender barriers that have been created by society.

Barrecca gave two pieces of advice to SU students. First, keep records of events throughout life, in order to shed light on one's strengths and weaknesses. However, do not post them all over Facebook, she said.

Second, is to be courageous even if you have to fake it until you make it.

As students, the world gives leeway for mistakes that will not be so forgivable in the workforce.

"Part of being successful is getting used to being rejected," Barrecca said. "You fail, then you fail better. This is the time you learn to fail better."

The night ended with a book signing.

"It was amazing," said Abigail Brumback, as she hurriedly prepared to have autographed her freshly bought copy of "It's Not That I'm Bitter: How I Learned to Stop Worrying About Visible Panty Lines and Conquered the World".

Barrecca is also the author of "Babes in Boyland: A Personal History of Coeducation in the Ivy League," which uses material straight from Barrecca's own records during her college experience.

Students gathered on Wednesday to eat pink cotton candy and read flyers that urged them to “feel their boobies.” The Women’s Center and Colleges Against Cancer sponsored the Breastival on Oct. 2.

The CUB amphitheater was filled with tables where visitors could play games and win prizes while learning about breast cancer.

“It’s what I call an info carnival. So it’s information at each table, but there’s also games and prizes,” Women’s Center Director Stephanie Erdice said.

According to the American Cancer Society, one in 227 women under 30 will be diagnosed with breast cancer over the next 30 years.

“We can get breast cancer, too, and I don’t think everyone’s aware of that,” said Lainey Schock, Women’s Center intern and undergrad student.

“We want to bring awareness to it particularly for young women and to celebrate survivors and remember people who have lost their battle with breast cancer,” Erdice said.

In keeping with the goal of celebrating and remembering, some fair-goers opted to write inspirational messages or memorials on pink ribbons that attached to a poster board.

Among the tables was a station where students could make their own surface cleaner using vinegar, baking soda, natural dish soap, borax and hot water.

According to the Breast Cancer Fund, many household cleaners contain carcinogens that are linked to breast cancer. “It gives them more information and more awareness about what they might be putting on their body or in their house that could be hazardous to them,” Erdice said.

Laura Gordon, breast health patient navigator at Chambersburg Hospital, had a table at the festival where she answered questions and, using models of breasts, showed students how to give breast self-exams.





SU Boxing Club

Henderson Gymnasium used to be the home of Shippensburg University basketball and volleyball before Heiges Field House was constructed.

The gym is now used for indoor softball practice while the locker rooms on the lower floor are used by the softball, lacrosse and soccer teams.

One aspect of Henderson Gym that many people do not know exists is the boxing room, which was the training facility for two All-Americans along with three national tournament competitors in 2014.

The SU boxing club is overlooked a lot of the time because it is not among the top sports at SU. Despite the lack of publicity, it does not stop the team and fighters from making noise inside the ring.

SU sent three boxers, Emily Appleman, Tylik Guilford and Luke Belski, to nationals this year, but they overcame a hard fought journey to get there.

Before getting to the national stage the preparation starts once the boxers step onto the SU campus. According to head coach Travis Wylie approximately 100 potential boxers come out to the first week of practice which takes place on the recreation fields. The first few weeks are used for conditioning, a span where, from what Wylie says, is when the weak dwindle out.

From there the team moves into a small room on the bottom floor of Henderson Gym. This room has a few heavy bags, one speed bag and a few scales along with a boxing ring.

From that point on it is all work for the select few that decide to take on the challenge of being a boxer.

The ones that do stay do not have an easy road ahead of them, but they never stop improving. "I am the smallest guy here," Belski said. "I always have to spar with guys that are bigger than me, but when I finally get into the ring to fight someone my own size their punches do not phase me."

Appleman faces a big challenge every time she steps into the ring during practice, being that she is the only girl on the team. She does not see that as a downfall, only something that can make her better.

"I go into the ring and fight some of the girls I am used to getting hit by the guys," Appleman said. "I know they (the girls) will not knock me out, I just go in the ring and do what you have to do."

Training varies from day-to-day for the boxers, but something that always stays true is working on cardio, hitting the speed bag and increasing their punching power by hitting the heavy bag.

Wylie says his fighter's progress quickly from training session to training session and for good reason.

"Each week we film them, study their weaknesses and then the following week we work on drilling, they no longer become weaknesses," Wylie said. "The next thing you know they become a well-rounded boxer."

The season is a long one, mostly comprised of training with a few individual bouts, including a home event that the team held in the beginning of February.

The fighters use these fights to perfect their skills before stepping into the ring on the big stage.

“Just like any other fight we go to, it gives us experience,” Appleman said.

SU held a successful home event earlier this year that attracted a good crowd and allowed the boxers to showcase their skills.

The next stage is the national tournament, where the boxers compete against the best competition from around the United States.

The boxers say they try to stick to their normal routine, despite having such a big fight.

“A lot of it is just staying calm,” Guilford said. “You want sparring to feel just like that national event, you just want to have fun.”

The days leading up to the big fights can be long but once the big fight comes it is all business.

“I like staying calm,” Guilford said. “When you stay calm you remember your technique and can listen to coach.”

From a coaching standpoint, Wylie tries to keep his coaching style the same when the big time comes.

“I try not to change at all, I try to be the same person during nationals,” Wylie said. “It would not be right for me to change — you do not want them to change their styles.”

Nationals treated the team well this season, Appleman and Belski were named All-Americans while Guilford made it to the quarterfinals.

Guilford lost his bout by disqualification. From what Wylie said, Guilford got hit with a strong punch that caused his jaw to need some adjusting. The boxer was unable to keep his mouthpiece in, as it fell out when he threw punches and was eventually disqualified.

Wylie says the future looks bright for the team with the core group of boxers that he has returning.

“Top three team in the nation, I will be drilling that into their heads from the get-go,” Wylie said. “If everyone lives up to their expectations we can honestly make a run at the national team title.”

Wylie says coaching a team or an individual to a national title would be awesome. He noted that this year was a big step in that direction and he expects more of the same in the years to come.



The variety this freedom encouraged ensured that there would be topics to interest any student.

This workshop taught the audience how to be better leaders by understanding the people around them.




Students then had to choose two of nine available workshops to attend. The subjects covered included effective communication, feminism, résumé building, how to dress professionally and more.

"Our overall goal is for students to have fun while developing their capacity to become stronger leaders," she said.


After the final workshop, students completed evaluations to ensure that next year's conference is equally as successful.

Deciding what you want to do with your life can be tough. There may be many things you are good at or that you love to do and just can't decide which direction to take in college. Shippensburg University provides you with many routes on your journey through college to a dream career. What if you are an undeclared freshman or suddenly want to choose a different path in life and have the key in the ignition, but no roads are in sight? You have to start your own path. Perhaps that path is communication/journalism.

The communication/journalism department offers three main emphases for students to focus on – electronic media, print media and public relations. Each emphasis provides core classes for students, as well as electives related to what the student decides to focus on.

The electronic media program in the department provides students with hands-on, professionally-based coursework and training. Some of the classes offered in the emphasis include electronic media programming and management, electronic field production and television studio production. Each of these classes offers state-of-the-art hard and software for students to gain experience. Students can pursue many careers in the electronic media field, such as news anchor, disc jockey, TV reporter and video programmer.

Professor Ted Carlin, WSYC-FM adviser, teaches many electronic media classes in the department. He believes that the hard and software available to students in the classroom can create engaging audio and video content for radio, television and online platforms.

“Co-curricular experiences with WSYC, SUTV and other student media groups accentuate the program and allow students to produce professional content on a daily basis, while working towards junior and senior internships off-campus at regional and national media companies,” Carlin said.

WSYC (We Serve Your Community) is the university's student-funded and run radio station that plays music, as well as sports and news casts. Members of this organization can be a DJ, sports broadcaster, or a board operator among numerous other positions. SUTV consists of a news, entertainment and sports department. Members of the organization can gain experience in producing, editing, television photography and studio operation from an organization that won a regional Emmy in 2012 and was nominated for the College Radio Award.

In the print media program, students are encouraged to improve their writing skills and pursue their desire to write. Students are prepared for careers in newspapers, magazines, freelancing, multimedia journalism and editing. Classes offered in this emphasis include feature writing, public affairs reporting, magazine design and digital journalism. In this field, you may want to pursue a career as a newspaper or magazine editor, freelance writer, investigative journalist, or a page designer.

As the university's newspaper, The Slate offers opportunities related to all three emphases to students. Staff positions available include editor-in-chief, advertising director, multimedia director, public relations director, graphic designer and editors for each section of the newspaper. If you aren't looking for a staff position, you can also choose to write for any of the sections, weekly.

The Cumberland Yearbook is another student media group aimed at students in this elective, where students focus on cover design, theme development, layout design, as well as writing and photography. In 2007, the Cumberland Yearbook won the Yearbook Award of Excellence, which is given each year to five percent of yearbooks, nationwide.

The third and final emphasis in the journalism department is public relations. This is the emphasis where most people ask "What in the world is public relations? What do you do?" The definition of public relations is "the professional maintenance of a favorable public image by a company or other organization or a famous person." Overall, the main goal of a public relations specialist is to make a company or person look good and create more awareness of them. Other career options in this emphasis include graphic design, advertising, media relations and public affairs. Classes offered include promotional publication design, advertising copywriting, media advertising and sales, as well as public relations research and campaigns.

Professor Holly Ott, Interim Internship Adviser of the department, believes that the public relations program prepares students for careers in media relations, public affairs and digital communications.

"The program offers a blend of theory, research and practice," Ott said. "We also have a strong student-media group, PRSSA [Public Relations Student Society of America], where students can gain experience with real clients in the business world. Students also have great opportunities for internships in public relations."

The public relation program's main student media group is PRSSA, which focuses on serving the university, as well as businesses and non-profit organizations in the community. They aim to assist students in understanding procedures of the profession and create awareness of an appropriate professional attitude.

In order to bring students across the different emphases together, the department has several social gatherings throughout the year, such as the ice cream social earlier this month, which allowed students to meet their advisors and other professors in the department. Communication/Journalism Day is also another event during the year that brings the department together to feature the different student media groups.

If you are looking for any other reasons to join the communication/journalism department, the program is strongly student-focused and nationally accredited. It features an accomplished faculty, strong research agendas and professional experience, as well as unique internship opportunities that are afforded through strong relationships with employers. According to Ott, the department offers "big school" experiences at an affordable cost.

"Our program is the only nationally accredited journalism and public relations program in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education (PASSHE)," Ott said. "Students in our program have found the faculty to be very committed to student success. Also, since our program places great emphasis on practical application and experiential learning, many of our students enter the workforce feeling very prepared and well-versed in the understanding of the craft of journalism and public relations."

Overall, the communication/journalism department prepares students for their career and what the world has to offer after college. The courses offered and student media groups available provide sincere hands-on experience to students so they are ready for what's in store in the real world. With the amazing professors assisting students, as well, students are sure to have a fun, educational and unique experience they couldn't find anywhere. Activities Program Board, or APB, is responsible for many of the activities that are held across campus. But, many students do not realize the amount of work that actually goes into planning for these events.

APB originated as a committee in Student Senate in 1973. On April 11, 1983, it became a recognized student group on Shippensburg's campus. The group is the main programming board on campus and focuses on improving social, cultural, recreational and educational programs for students as well as the community.

Within the board, there are numerous leadership roles for which a student can run. for. A student can be a general member who participates as much or as little as desired. A student can have an executive role as president, vice president for campus outreach, vice president for membership, or treasurer. If a student desires a position in event planning, he or she can be anything from concert, entertainment or performing arts chairperson to campus activities, multicultural affairs, or travel and recreation chairperson.

Since APB was created, hundreds of students have suggested ideas for events that cater to Shippensburg students. With a board of 14 students, three direct advisers and more than 30 general members, APB plans with the students in mind. Suggestions, data and surveys are taken by students to let the board know in what programs they would be most interested.

APB plans concerts, comedians, tournaments, dances, day trips and movies.

The events are planned a semester in advance. The board attends the National Association for Campus Activities, or NACA, conference in the fall and in the spring. In the fall and in the spring. At NACA, APB talks to agencies and performers to bring back to campus for the full board and general members to vote on for the upcoming semester.

Every year, there are new trips and there are traditional trips, such as a day trip to New York City. This year, the board planned a trip to a Phillies vs. Nationals game, a trip to the Spy Museum in Washington, D.C., and a trip to the Newseum in Washington, D.C.

Brittany Arnold, a senior psychology major, is the concert chairperson on APB.

"The way that we pick our concerts is we survey the student body and see what genre they would like to see and then go from there to decide on who is in our budget," Arnold said. In the past, APB has brought big names to Shippensburg like B.O.B., Jason Derulo, Howie Day, and the Plain White T's.

Kristina Carey, entertainment chairperson, explained that the way APB chooses what movies to show is through a website called Swank.

"We see what movies are not in theaters anymore but not yet on DVD or on Redbox," Carey said. The board then votes on the movies. In the months of November and December, the movies that played in Orndorff Theater were "White House Down" and "We're the Millers." In November, there was a fall film festival. "The Place Beyond the Pines," "Admission" and "The Way, Way Back" were shown.

Information on exact dates and times of movies being shown can be found in a copy of APB's event listing.

The special events chairperson is responsible for not only planning APB events such as the Parents and Family Celebration and RaiderFest, but he or she also plans daytime events for homecoming week. The special events chairperson is the liaison between the Homecoming Committee and APB.

Tyler Graham, a junior art and graphic design major, has been on APB for two and a half years. This year, he serves as the performing arts chair of the board.

"The way we program is with students in mind. This way, students are involved in the decision-making process to help us know what they are looking for and thus, help us plan our events better," Graham said.

New Dorms

There is no doubt that the new suite-style residence halls on campus have a different atmosphere than the traditional halls.

To an outside observer, it could seem that the suites, with their private bathrooms and ample security features, are less community-oriented than the traditional halls, but is that really the case? In the suite-style buildings, outside doors lock automatically. Kayla Strohl, who moved from the now-demolished Lackhove Hall to Presidents Hall, said this affected her interactions with other residents.

“I didn’t really have any communication with anyone on my floor, unlike in the old dorms where people left their doors open and everyone knew who was living next to them,” Strohl said.

Victoria Knight, who now lives in McLean II, agreed with Strohl. She compared her experience in McLean II, a suite-style hall, to life in Naugle Hall, a traditional hall.

“In Naugle, no one had true privacy. Our entire wing kept their doors open and everyone wandered in and out of rooms at all times of the night. We trusted each other and it was more family oriented,” Knight said.

“It makes my job easier when residents have their doors open,” said Tara Owens, a resident assistant (RA) in Mowrey, a traditional hall.

Despite the apparent concern of closed doors, methods used to create home-like vibes do not seem to be specific based on the type of hall.

To make her residents feel more at home, Owen uses different approaches.

“Try to remember their names. Create an open environment so the students feel comfortable. Greet them and ask them questions about their day and things of that nature,” Owen said.

“It really starts with opening when we start in August and the RA’s knocking on doors and introducing themselves and introducing one suite to another suite. ‘Oh you’re interested in X, Y and Z? So and so down the hall is also interested in X, Y and Z.’ and the RA becoming the catalyst and the link between all those rooms and not being intimidated by these big suites behind closed doors,” said Jen Milburn, assistant director of Residence Life.

According to Milburn, the suite-style residence halls have more community space than the traditional halls, including larger kitchens, game rooms and study lounges. These spaces, Milburn said, will get more use over time, as RAs and students adjust to the suite-style buildings.

“As time goes on, the kitchens are used constantly, the game rooms are used constantly. It’s easier than, I think, the outside person would assume, for the RAs to go and knock on doors and be like ‘Hey, let’s go make cupcakes in the kitchen! Let’s go watch the game on the big screen! Let’s go play foosball!’ because it really does happen every day, it’s pretty awesome,” Milburn said.

Helping the Homeless

Living on a Pennsylvania farm in the late '90s, Sue Rudy and her husband Vern first took in a homeless person as an act of faith.

Believing that they had a mission to fulfill, the Rudys bought a second home and welcomed more homeless people. Realizing the community need, by 1999, Silence of Mary Homes was founded. Today there are five homes located in Harrisburg, Pa., and two in Fort Wayne, Ind., that serve more than 700 people.

Silence of Mary Homes is a non-profit organization that relies solely on donations and the work of volunteers. Ask Sue Rudy about her residents and she will firmly reply, "We are not a shelter, we are a family."

Having grown up in a poor family in Baltimore, Md., Sue Rudy knows what many of her new family members are going through. School was an especially difficult place for Rudy, who has Tourette's syndrome and autism. Her instinct in life has always been to think and care for others before herself.

Saturday, Sept. 28, Shippensburg University students gathered at the Cora L. Grove Spiritual Center, packed into vans loaded with supplies and left for Harrisburg to meet the extended Rudy family.

In the Allison Hill area of Harrisburg, crime is a common sight and the homeless population is on the rise. Silence of Mary Homes provides a family environment for those in need, whether that be the poor, mentally ill, immigrants, men and women on probation or anybody looking for a helping hand.

Students in Professor Laurie Cella's and Professor Karen Johnson's basic writers classes traveled to Harrisburg to complete their service learning project for just this purpose. Members of Catholic Campus Ministries and impromptu volunteers also joined the party.

Next to the intersection of North 20th Street and Market Street, a house belonging to Silence of Mary Homes was in dire need of repairs.

After scrubbing the floors, painting walls and stocking shelves with supplies, SU students in the basic writers classes sat down with some of the "family members" and interviewed them about their lives.

Drawing inspiration from stories of struggle and triumph, SU students will craft essays based on their time spent in service.

One student, Dania Harrell, was brought to tears when she interviewed a mother of three who has been working hard to provide a better life for her children.

Cella and Johnson agreed that after students complete service learning projects, they see a dramatic improvement in their writing and communication skills.

"It's not just a change in the way you write, it's a change in the way you think," freshman business major, Brandon Christmas said.

Catholic Campus Minister Roxanne Dennis, brings students to Harrisburg once a semester to rebuild, restock and restore the old homes.

Through this trip alone, a surplus of supplies was brought to Market Street to help furnish the three-floor house. Hygiene products, cleaning supplies, carpet, clothing, bedspreads, towels and a strong work ethic were just a few items among the donations.

About 15 years ago, SU was the first to reach out to Silence of Mary Homes and offer help.

Since then, more and more people have come forward to offer their assistance in maintaining the homes.

The program relies heavily on volunteerism like that displayed by SU students.

For people like Sue Rudy, who treat every moment as a gift, the generosity of others is invaluable.

"Without the college students, we couldn't be here," Sue Rudy said.

Study Abroad

On Jan. 24, The Slate featured a story about a Shippensburg University sophomore named Kelsea Collins, who had just left to learn abroad at Limerick University in Limerick, Ireland.

She had high hopes of a life-changing, perspective-altering experience that would help her better understand her future.

Collins, now a junior, returned May 15 after a four-month trip that exceeded all of her expectations, altered her perspectives and certainly changed her life.

"You just become a different kind of person because you're completely self-reliant," Collins said. "You become a stronger person because you put yourself out there."

She lived at home in Chambersburg, Pa., and commuted to and from SU until she went to Ireland to live on her own for four months; a dramatic change.

To Collins, it was for the best, and made for a time during which she made some of her best friends and memories.

She came back with many new perspectives on academics, culture and herself.

She said one big difference in the schooling style is that there are no general education requirements, and students instead take classes that pertain to their major.

Also, classes are very lecture-based and homework is rare. Most classes boiled down to a couple tests and/or projects.

Collins said it put the student in a more independent role, which is something she found she likes, but it may not be for everyone.

Some of her most interesting observations were cultural ones.

The Irish's outgoing nature made Collins realize how shy and awkward Americans can be.

It is more common for someone to approach a person and strike up a conversation in Ireland than it is in America.

According to Collins, the Irish people she experienced generally view Americans as gullible, but nice enough people.

Also, as expected, the Irish students found the American accents to be interesting and could differentiate between Collins' roommate's New Jersey accent and Collins' "southern accent." She was once told, "You sound like TV."

"I never realized it until I went over there that I say things kind of drawn out and they would call me out on it," she said, noting that Americans speak much more slowly than the Irish or English.

Collins spent most of her time in Ireland, but took excursions to France, The Netherlands, The Czech Republic, Germany and Italy.

Collins said the experience went beyond academics and culture and changed her perspective on life.

She said it helped her find her self-worth, and the experience made her more well rounded overall.

The memories of walking all over the town, walking along the river she lived beside and riding the bus to school are engraved in her mind forever.

The experience meant so much to her that she became a campus advocate with the group that sponsored her trip, Academic Programs International (API).

She said they made the whole experience easier with assisting with housing arrangements, providing a cell phone service and organizing meetings for students before they left for Ireland so they would know someone prior to arrival.

Collins is excited to work for API and has already created the idea of a gender-neutral speed-dating-style meet-and-greet that would spread awareness about studying abroad and let students get acquainted.

That event will take place on Wednesday, Sept. 26, and API plans to have one event every month this semester. Anyone interested can "Like" the "Shippensburg University International Students" Facebook page where events will be posted.

One big focus of the last time Collins talked to The Slate was if the trip would help her understand where she wants to go in her future. When asked about it now, she only had one answer: "Back to Ireland."



"It's a good traditional place to go to," said Junior Samantha Damiano.



The University football program took a step in the right direction in 2012, having made the Division II playoffs. This year, they were hoping to repeat the success of last season and get back to the Division II National Championships for a chance at the title.

SU had a slow start in the beginning of the season, dropping their first two meetings with Shepard and Slippery Rocky University. However, after a rough start to the season, the Raiders rattled off an impressive five straight winning streak, which included a Family Day victory over East Stroudsburg 41-31. The Raiders later had their best offensive output of the season against the newest member to the PSAC, Seton Hill 73-27. After a heartbreaking homecoming loss to West Chester, the Raiders were also able to bounce back and beat nationally ranked Bloomsburg 34-18. Shippensburg finished the season with an overall record of 7-4, which meant they were not able to meet their goal of qualifying for the Division II Championship playoffs. Senior defensive lineman Jake Metz was named PSAC-East Defensive Player of the Year.

Zulli was also nominated as a regional finalist and has a chance to win back to back Harlon Hill trophies; something that has not been accomplished since NFL player Danny Woodhead did so at Chadron State in his 2006-07 season.

The Lady Raiders then faced off against LIU Post, the North Region No. 1 seed, for the national title. The girls held LIU to a 1-0 lead through halftime, but were forced into extra minutes after LIU Post tied the game with less than 3 minutes to go. In sudden death, senior Bre White placed a penalty stroke in the back of the net and clinched the national title for the first in school history.

In a season full of blood, sweat and tears, SU's Mens Soccer team ended the season 9-7-2 but celebrated individual successes of players.

Senior midfielder Oli Templeton, junior forward Derrick Roy and junior defender Gregg Whitcomb of the Shippensburg University men's soccer team earned spots on the All-PSAC Second Team squad released by the conference office on Thursday afternoon.

The all-conference honors are the first of each of their careers as the three honorees are the most for Shippensburg since it netted five to the 2010 All-PSAC teams.

A two-year captain, Templeton was one of two Raiders to start every game this season, recording two goals and two assists while ranking second on the team in both shots (45) and shots on goal (19). Templeton's goals came against Mercyhurst and East Stroudsburg while his helpers came against Holy Family and Gannon.

Roy had a standout season in his return from a leg injury that cost him the 2012 campaign, leading the team in goals (11), points (26) and shots (64) as his totals in each category were more than twice as many as any other Raider.

His career-high 11 goals were tied for fourth-most in the PSAC while his team-leading four game-winners were also tied for fourth-most in the conference. His scoring prowess marked the first double-digit goals season for a Raider since 2010.

Women's Soccer

The Lady Raider soccer team had quite an explosive season this fall. With an overall record of 12-6-3 to end regular season play, the women made it all the way to the PSAC Women's Soccer Championships. On Nov. 5, the team played Edinboro in the PSAC Quarterfinals and won 4-3 in a penalty-kick shootout, allowing them to advance to the Semifinals for the first time in the team's 20 year history.

Goalkeeper Shelbie Rackley, a senior, happily gushed about her feelings toward her team. She mentioned a moment from their PSAC Quarterfinals game that is sure to stay fresh in her memory for a long time.

"I could not have asked for a better senior year, no matter the upcoming results of the NCAA games. I was extremely proud of my team for making the PSAC Tournament, being that it is so hard to do in our competitive conference," Rackley said.



The Shippensburg University Men's Cross Country team finished second in the season-opening Galen Piper Alumni Open/Cross Country Challenge. The team finished behind the Shippensburg Alumni, who took their third consecutive win, and seventh overall in the thirteen years of the home University's home meet.

The very next week, the men finished third at Kutztown's Division II Challenge, with juniors Brayden Burleigh and Bernard England finishing as Shippensburg's first and second runners for the second week in a row.

After two weeks off, the men's cross country team came back in full force to take first place at the Dickinson Short Invitational. Ship placed five runners in the top eleven spots, with Burleigh taking first place overall in a time of just 12:04.

The women were back at Lock Haven for the NCAA Atlantic Regionals. They placed fourth and earned themselves a spot at the NCAA Championships.


The Lady Raiders ended their 2013 season by placing 22nd at its sixth consecutive NCAA National Championship in Spokane, Washington.


Men's Swimming




Wrestling

A year after the Shippensburg baseball team made a surprise appearance at the 2013 Division II Baseball World Series, the Raiders were looking to try and make another appearance in Gary, North Carolina and possibly bring Shippensburg its second National Title this year for the sports program. The Raiders started off their season by splitting their first three double-headers of the season. Then after sweeping IUP, the Raiders lost two in a row.

After the two game losing streak Shippensburg was in full gear as they rattled off 10 straight victories. This brought their overall record to 19-5 at this point in the season. Unfortunately from that time on the baseball lords did not smile upon Shippensburg baseball as the pitching that was depended on the first half of the season struggled to have the potent offensive support seen previously.

Shippensburg would ultimately be knocked out of PSAC playoff competition after splitting a double-header with Lock Haven in late April. Overall the Raiders finished with a 29-17 record, which from the first half of the season is a let down to the potential that this team possessed.

Cody Ezolt and Pat Kregeloh shared the home run title with the team while Kregeloh also led the team in RBI, and managed to win 3 games on the hill, and lead the pitching staff in strikeouts for the Raiders. Senior Austin Bartley also set the record for most saves in a season by a Raider pitcher. While Mark Curtis won the most games for a Raider pitcher going 5-0.

Shippensburg finished the year with 36 victories – the most in a single season in eight years. The team celebrated 1,000th career victory for the Raiders in 37 years of Shippensburg University softball. SU also reached the finals of the PSAC Tournament and also won two NCAA regional games for the first time since 2006.

The season marks an end to the outstanding careers of the senior class: Emily Estep, Hilary Lyons, Kirstin McClune and Rachel Shumway. Additionally, junior Jordie Darchicourt plans to graduate after the fall semester.

In 79 career games, Estep finishes her career with a 62-21 career record, 652 strikeouts and a 1.65 ERA. She concludes a storied run ranked second in school history for career strikeouts, third in victories, fifth in winning percentage and fifth in appearances.

Lyons, meanwhile, set the single-season school record for stolen bases by finishing the year with 32 after recording two steals in Sunday's games. The three-time Capital One Academic All-District performer finished her career with 56 stolen bases, second-most in school history behind current teammate Thompson, while totaling 122 hits, batting .319, recording 35 RBIs and scoring 79 runs.

McClune batted .257 in 97 career games (79 starts) with 14 extra-base hits, 20 RBIs and a .997 fielding percentage, while Shumway amassed five homers, 41 RBIs and a .422 career on-base percentage in 102 games.

"Every day I sit up there in my office knowing that I have no problems out here," Brookens said. "They did an outstanding job as a family. They spent more time together than possibly any group I've ever had."

The Shippensburg University men's track & field/cross country team achieved its best overall finish in the six-year history of the Damon Martin Division II Men's Program of the Year Award standings sponsored by the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCA), ranking sixth overall in Division II for the 2013-14 season.

Shippensburg finished 23rd overall in cross country, ninth in indoor track & field, and 29th in outdoor track & field to accrue 65 points. Adams State, coached by the awards's namesake Damon Martin, won for the sixth consecutive year by claiming the cross country national championship and finishing second in both indoor and outdoor track & field.

The NCAA Division II Program of the Year awards are presented annually to the most outstanding men's and women's cross country/track & field program. The awards honor the institution that achieves the most success in each academic year (spanning the cross country, indoor track & field, and outdoor track & field seasons) based on its finish at the NCAA Division II Championships.

Shippensburg was the only East Coast school among those ranked in the Top 10.


