SU Marching Band visits the Emerald Isle

Members of the Shippensburg University Marching Band rang in 2015 with performances in Ireland—the group's first international tour, according to Director Trever Famulare.

The highlight of the tour was the group's participation in Dublin's third annual Procession of Lights on New Year's Eve. Shippensburg led the procession through the streets of Ireland's capital city. Other shorter outdoor performances, which the Irish call "stand and blow" concerts, were in Limerick and at Kilkenny Castle.

The band had to submit an audition tape to be considered for the tour. "They asked for our repertoire list. We gave them music from our show this fall, along with a few other songs we traditionally would play," Famulare said.

A total of eighty-six students took the trip. They rehearsed twice a week, memorizing four different song sets for the Procession of Lights and two different sets for the additional concerts.

The group also carved out time for excursions to Bunratty Castle, the Cliffs of Moher, Blarney Castle, and several sites in Dublin. "To me, it's not just about the performances; it's also the experience the students get," Famulare said. "We have a number of students at this university who have never left Pennsylvania before now, let alone the United States. This is a once-in-a-lifetime trip for them."
















SU Field Studies in China

A group of 14 students took part in the Field Studies in China course taught by Dr. Jennifer Pomeroy and Dr. George Pomeroy of the geography/earth science department.

They arrived at East China Normal University (ECNU) in Shanghai on June 12. During their 20-day stay, they will take part in Chinese language and culture classes and participate in sightseeing excursions in various Chinese cities, including Shanghai, Hangzhou, Xian, and Beijing.

Twelve Chambersburg Area School District teachers went on the trip and the group visited Shijiazhuang No. 25 High School, a CASD sister-school.

Other highlights of the trip included a visit to Xian where the group visited the site of the Terracotta Army, a collection of life-size terracotta sculptures including 8,000 soldiers, 130 chariots with 520 horses and 150 cavalry horses. The sculptures were discovered by chance by a farmer digging a well in 1974. They were buried in 210-209 BCE with Qin Shi Huang, the first Emperor of China, to protect the emperor in his afterlife.

The group also exchanged Shippensburg University keepsakess with their hosts and enjoyed shopping in local markets.

In 2005, if you had asked Travis Clark, Hunter and Drew Thomsen and Danny Duncan where they would be in ten years, they probably would not have been able to predict the successful musical career they have had. With four records, three extended plays and numerous tours under their belt, pop punk band We the Kings has acquired a quiet yet dedicated fan base and several smash hits.

The band released their debut self-titled album in 2007, hitting number 3 on Billboard's Top Heatseekers chart and 151 on the Billboard 200. The album's 2nd single, Check Yes Juliet, is their biggest hit to date and also their biggest hit on Billboard charts. They have even recorded with Demi Lovato in 2010 and had their song "Blood Brothers" featured in an episode of CW hit The Vampire Diaries.

Despite all this success, while their home in their native Florida, they are just five normal guys. Lead singer Travis Clark is getting married in December and Coley O'Toole, keyboardist for the band since 2011, is expecting a baby with his wife. Clark said, "besides working out, going to the movies, going to get drinks with friends, date nights and other 'normal' things is what we're into!"

The band is extremely down to earth, meeting outside after every show to meet, talk and take pictures with fans. When asked if being humble was important, Clark said, "...we decided early on that we never wanted to forget who we are and that we always wanted to maintain being humble no matter what success came our way." After saying some of his idols were "completely arrogant" in person. The band was nothing close to arrogant from the beginning of the show to the tiny meet-and-greet afterwards.

The crowd was amped and energetic on Friday night. There was a line outside with students waiting for doors to open as early as 6 even though the Activities Program Board (who were in charge of the show) did not open doors until 7 pm. The band did not come on stage until 8 and everyone was eager as the time ticked away.

The five band members were all smiles and waves as they took the stage, playing to a small crowd in the CUB multipurpose room. They shared song inspirations and funny stories with the crowd, even singing happy birthday to a young fan in the front row who traveled from a neighboring town to see them.

While the concert only lasted an hour, Clark told fans he wanted to "meet all of you and lick your faces" which caused an eruption of cheers from the crowd. It was awhile before they emerged from the cub, equipment and baggage in hand, but were excited to talk to and take pictures with the small crowd grouped outside.

The band played all of their hits, as well some of their lesser known songs. The crowd went completely wild when they closed with hit 'Check Yes Juliet' after covering songs by Jason Mraz and Jimmy Eat World.


It was at a Jimmy Eat World concert, with guests Green Day and Blink-182, that Travis Clark decided with best friend Hunter Thomsen that he wanted to start a band. The band is likely to take a break from touring and recording, with Clark and O'Toole's impending family changes along with just recently returning from Japan in late September.

If it's girls, money, cars, or fame, then go for that and don't stop until you have it. 















Q&A With: Travis Clark, lead singer for We The Kings

What made you want to become a band in the first place? How did this whole thing get started?

We really just wanted girlfriends to be honest. We never expected to make it this far, but obviously we're happy that we did.

What were your influences? Have they changed at all? When did you all pick up your first instrument?

We all listened to a variety of styles and artists, but I think if I had to not avoid the question, I would say The Beatles, Coldplay, Foo Fighters, Blink 182, and Jimmy Eat World. The influences that we all admire have evolved, but I still think that we cherish those early influences and credit them to a lot of our success that we've had so far! I started playing piano when I was 5 years old and wrote my first song when I was 8 years old on the piano. it was called "Runaway." I think I still remember the whole thing.

You've made four records now so what is the writing process like for you guys? Is there anything or a certain place that helps you out?

The writing process has always been constant with We The Kings, typically I get into the studio and record some ideas that turn into rough demos, I then show the rest of the guys to see what they think, and if all comes back positive, then we all record the song together and slap it on the album in hopes that the fans enjoy our work.

Is there a reason you guys like playing so many colleges? Is it a different atmosphere than other venues?

Well for starters, we didn't really get the chance to live the "college" lifestyle, so it's nice to see what we would be missing out on. The band got signed right out of high school, and don't get me wrong, I'm not upset by any means about that, but college was always something that we all wanted to be a part of, so playing at colleges is the happy medium between being musicians and graduates.

You guys have stayed really humble throughout the years. Is that important to you?

We've had the amazing opportunity to meet some of our favorite bands that we adored growing up. Some of those members have been humble, some have been completely arrogant, so I think we decided early on that we never wanted to forget who we are and that we always wanted to maintain being humble no matter what success came our way. It's also important to us due to the fact that if we ever came home cocky, our mom's would literally slap us so hard it would knock us right back down to earth.

Was there ever a moment where you thought the band wouldn't work out? Has there ever been a moment of doubt in your career?

Always. Being in a band is the least stable career we could have thought to pick, but it's the most fun when it all works out, that's what keeps us going. We always cross those life and career "speed bumps" but we get through it just like any normal person gets through their own life's hazards. We always hope for greatness and try representing ourselves as best as possible, that way even if we do fall short of what people think we should reach, we'll still be successful in our own minds.

How is the support from your family, friends, and the people back home? Is it strange coming home from tour?

We have an incredible support system from our fans to our friends and most importantly our families. Our families have been there through the thick and thin and have seen us grow from immature kids playing music too loud in our parent's garage into immature kids playing music too loud in venues across the world. It is strange coming back home sometimes because new restaurants will be built and some streets will be newly paved and some buildings will be painted different color etc., but no matter how much the town tries to change, the people who we grew up with and our hometown will always know us better than anyone else and that is always something we can appreciate coming home to.

What do you guys like to do when you aren't touring, recording, or writing?

We all have pretty normal lives outside of touring and recording. I'm getting married in December, so wedding planning has been the highest priority as of late, but besides that working out, going to the movies, going to get drinks with friends, date nights and other "normal" things is what we're all into.

Maize described her experience as queen as "wonderful." She was enthusiastic at the idea of recognizing another student who was just as involved as she had been.

















































Ship's "BIG" Show Big Sean performs Homecoming

On April 7th, 2015 a powerful event took place on Shippensburg's Campus. An event where individuals speak out against domestic violence and sexual assault occurred, called "Take Back the Night." This year's theme was "Ship Says No More."

Take Back the Night began in the CUB MPR with speaker Stephanie Erdice from the Women's Center. She wants to bring more awareness to the issues of rape and abuse and inform students that both are not tolerated on our campus. Erdice explained that there is a Ship website for sexual misconduct with up-to-date information. Over the last twelve months, she said, this initiative to end these issues has really spread. "We have seen thoughts and ideas torn into action and advocacy," said Stephanie. She stated that this is the inspiration needed to end violence on Shippensburg's campus.

Shippensburg President, Jodi Harpster, spoke at the event as well, discussing the issues of domestic abuse and sexual assault, saying, "We still have a long way to go." Fortunately, Ship joined the national "NO MORE" Campaign last year, which works with victims and those who support the cause to spread the word and end the issue. Harpster's goal is to create a campus environment in which everyone can feel safe. One out of every six women has been a victim of sexual assault. "We HAVE TO speak up. As members of the Ship family, we need to talk about things that are most important to us," stated President Harpster.



A few SU Dance Troupe members joined the MPR stage to dance while the song "The Freshman" by the Verve Pipe played. After this, Erdice introduced the Slate News Editor, Mary Grace Keller who created a video for the event.


A video called "Walk a Mile in Her Shoes" was shown from the yearly event that locally takes place in Chambersburg and is held across the country. Men put on women's high heel shoes and walk for a mile in order to help raise awareness about rape, sexual assault and gender violence. The video pointed out that "No one has to do everything, but everyone has to do something." After the video, two speakers came to the stage to discuss that we also need to educate men about violence and assault. They discussed that men should see women as people and not objects. One young man stated, "Truly love women? Time we act like it. Time we take back the night." They explained that men are victims of sexual assault as well and that men need to speak out. There should be no shame.

Members from the groups of REACT (Rape Educators and Contacts) and The Women's Center spoke at the event. These young women informed the audience of the different, convenient places students can obtain information.

One speaker said that talking on stage was out of her comfort zone, but that the audience can compare it to speaking out about issues of sexual abuse and domestic violence. In order to make a change, sometimes people have to step out their comfort zones. She said, "We must march. We must protect. We must protest. We must shake the Earth."

A poem called "Speak Out" was read to the audience It was written by a survivor. Words were given for the audience to chant during the outdoor rally. The audience members got together and were lead outside of the CUB. The group marched around campus chanting the phrase: "Students unite. Take back the night. No more silence. No more violence. Hey, hey. Ho, ho. Sexual violence has got to go." At the end, the audience formed a group, and each person received a candle. Each person was given the opportunity to speak about his or her own experience. Many brave, young women and men walked up to the front of the crowd to speak once he or she had grown the courage. The courage of others helped lead more and more people to take that chance to tell his or her story. For many, this was the first they have ever told their story. Emotions went wild, and the support and love felt upon the audience was immaculate. The audience formed a family of support. After the speakers finished, every single audience member lit a candle to signify what was taken from these young women and men during their episodes of sexual abuse or violence.



























Ship Says No More


Relay For Life

the American Cancer Society.




There was something different about this year's Relay for Life event though. Usually there is one team that raises the most money for Relay. This year both the Kappa Sigma and Alpha Phi team and Team Dagnes made a truce and decided to tie for the most donations. The Associate Dean of Students Veterans Affairs, Bob Smith, labeled it "The Intentional Tie." Each team raised \$9,567. This means that those two teams raised 38 percent of the total donations made to Relay for Life this year.

A single pale hand slipped between the red curtains — the audience's first glimpse as to what lies beyond the velvet shroud.

Da da da dum, snap, snap.

"The Addams Family" arrived on the Shippensburg University Memorial Auditorium stage, last night, as Act V's latest performance.

The evening consisted of ghosts, potions, thunderstorms and the ever-charming quirks of the Addamses. Act V had to pull together an especially talented cast for the show to live up to the Broadway hype. The cast members had to be skilled in theater, song and dance for the SU production.

In the musical, Wednesday Addams, played by Mackenzie Brouse, falls in love with a "normal" boy, named Lucas Beineke. Wednesday's usual dark and gloomy disposition is replaced by thoughts of sunshine and rainbows, once she admits she wants to marry Lucas, played by Tyler Law.

Even when the two freshmen co-stars are not the center of attention, they maintain their characters' personas with every tiny interaction — like when Wednesday rolls her eyes or Lucas smiles lovingly at her.

The plot evolves when the father of the family, Gomez Addams, finds himself trapped between the two women he loves the most, his daughter and his wife, Morticia, played by Gillian Bradshaw.

"Whaaaaat?" Gomez screams, with a Spanish accent, when Wednesday tells him that her and Lucas are engaged. Wednesday makes him promise not to tell Morticia until after the Beineke family comes over for dinner.

As the song goes, Gomez is "Trapped" between keeping a promise for Wednesday and keeping a secret from his wife, whom he tells everything.

Tyler Marshall plays the role of loving father and devoted husband, rarely letting Gomez's Spanish accent slip while he is in character.

"He's so charismatic and fun to play," Marshall said of Gomez.

At one point in the musical, when everything seems to be going wrong, Gomez and Wednesday have a father-daughter dance outside the family graveyard.

"It's the point when Gomez breaks out of his quirkiness he's had throughout the show and has a moment with Wednesday," Marshall said of the scene, one of his favorites.

The majority of the time, Gomez is rattling off family history, caressing his wife or brandishing a sword.

Morticia drew the eyes of the crowd wherever she moved, her sultry black dress highlighting the paleness of her skin. Bradshaw captured all that is the essence of Morticia, from her pointed walk to how she runs her family — although her parenting tactics are quite different from that of Alice Beineke, Lucas' mother.

Upon meeting Alice, Morticia nearly vomits at the sight of her bright yellow dress and the sound of Alice's singsong, rhyming sentences.

Although more of a secondary role, Ariadne Retzer brings the character of Alice to the spotlight when she belts out "Waiting" and collapses on the Addams' dining room table, halfway through the show.

During intermission, student director and producer Samantha New had a giant smile across her face. The dress rehearsal, the night before, was a little rough, and New was ecstatic to see how the show was turning out.

"It's always different when you put on a show and there's an audience," New said, her red lipstick-coated smile stretching even further.

"The audience gives them new life," New said.

When the curtains parted again, the show shifted focus to a fight between Lucas and Wednesday.

"I can be impulsive. I just need to think about it first!" Lucas yelled as he ran after Wednesday, who was toting a crossbow.

In the second half of the musical, the differences between Lucas and Wednesday are perpetuated even further as the Addams and Beineke families deal with their own love problems.

However, the more serious scenes were always punctuated with little moments of humor.

"If you're going to act like a tool, why don't you sleep in the shed," Alice said to her husband Mal, played by Matthew Peck.

Auditions for "The Addams Family" were held in November, and rehearsals began during the spring semester. The long hours New spent between student teaching and musical practice were finally worth it when the curtain came to a final close, Thursday night.

"Together, we've made Act V history," New said before running off to hug and celebrate with choreographer, Kimberly Browna.

"We did it!" the two yelled as they embraced.





NASPAA is the national accrediting body for college and university public administration programs.

Olejarski will accept the Jacqueline F. Lewis Pi Alpha Alpha Chapter Award of Excellence at NASPAA's annual meeting in Albuquerque, N.M., in November. "We are thrilled to receive the award. It is a huge honor, especially since we have been chartered as a chapter only since December 2012," Olejarski said.

The chapter's largest activity is its annual induction ceremony, held the first week in May in celebration of National Public Service Recognition Week. The ceremony is held jointly with the Central Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Society for Public Administration (ASPA), the professional membership organization for those working in the public administration field. The ASPA chapter presents its annual awards and features a keynote speaker during the event. "Having the ceremony as part of ASPA's annual awards dinner is a way to honor our students' hard work and academic achievements in a really meaningful way," Olejarski said. "Not only are their families and faculty there, but they also get to network with professionals, which makes the event even more important for them."

Shippensburg is one of five Pi Alpha Alpha chapters in Pennsylvania. It is the only university in Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education with a chapter.

Coming into the first season without their Harlon Hill winning quarterback, the Shippensburg Red Raiders had a lot of question to answer. The coaching staff believes that one question that still remains unanswered is just how good is the Red Raider football team? The team managed to finish above .500 with a final record of 6-5 after dropping the season finale to Mercyhurst University 42 to 21.

Junior Sheldon Mayer, another stand out wide receiver for the Red Raiders, recorded his career best with 14 catches for 198 yards. The Red Raiders had had themselves a tie game going into half time with the score 14 all. Behind a 21 point 3rd quarter, and five big touchdowns for the game from Mercyhurst's redshirt junior quarter back Brendan Boylan, the Lakers proved to be too much for the Red Raiders.

"We had a year full of injuries, guys playing out of position and a lot of younger guys playing more than snaps than expected." said Coach Mac. The Red Raiders how ever did not lie down and accept defeat when adversity begin to run throughout the team.

"There were a lot of guys that stepped up as we needed them to and assumed that leadership role."

None more than the Red Raiders senior wide receiver Trevor Harman who recorded 947 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns on the season. Others players also stepped up big for the Red Raiders. Senior running back Blair Brooks reached 1,171 yards on 176 rushes becoming the first running back for Shippensburg to eclipse 1,000 yards since Shippensburg Alumni and Green Bay Packers fullback John Kuhn.

When asked about next season Coach Mac said," A lot of young players got experience this past season. Now we need young guys to step up and everyone to be an impact player for us."



Mens Soccer

The 2014 Raiders looked to continue a run of success that included two NCAA and two PSAC Tournament appearances over the last four seasons under the direction of head coach Jeremy Spering.

SU reached the PSAC Quarterfinals in 2013 and hoped to once again crack the league's Top 6 squads. Twenty-one players returned to the team, along with a new goaltender and replacements for several key seniors a wealth of experience helped ease the transition.

Two of SU's three All-PSAC players from 2013 were back, and each of the team's three leading point scorers also returned. Additionally, five key defenders were also back from a unit that posted five shutouts and limited the opposition to just six first-half goals during the 2013 season.

Shippensburg ended the season 6-9-2 and 4-7 PSAC .

All nine of SU's losses in 2014 were decided by one goal, including two in overtime and one in double-overtime

"Our goal next year is the reach the final four, but always to be crowned as National Champions." said Coach Landes.
























Womens Volleyball

Men's Basketball






"I am extremely proud of our men's program for achieving this mark," said TIm Verge '89, head coach.



SU headed into the 2014-15 season without a senior and just three juniors on its 13-person roster, and finished the season 19-10 overall.























Womens Tennis & Womens Lacrosse



Shippensburg University junior Megan Lundy was named to the 2015 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Spring Top 10 squad.


























The Shippensburg University men's outdoor track & field team finished the 2015 NCAA Division II Outdoor Track & Field Championships with 10 First Team All-Americans, the third-highest total in the country behind perennial powers Saint Augustine's (national champions; 12), Texas A&M-Commerce (eighth place; 11) and Johnson C. Smith (11th place; 11).

Shippensburg entered this year's national championships with 11 entries including the 4x400-meter relay. Of those 11, SU had All-America efforts in eight – seven First Team (10 total trophies when including the relay) and one Second Team. The full list is broken down at the bottom of the page.

SU broke a school record last year in having four unique men's All-Americans at an outdoor championships; its previous best before that had been three on multiple occasions. This year's total of 10 trophies more than doubles the previous-record haul.

Shippensburg, under the direction of USTFCCCA Atlantic Region Head Coach of the Year Dave Osanitsch, finished 13th in the team standings, just three places shy of its best NCAA outdoor finish in school history (10th in 1984). The Raiders tallied 23 points, the most by a PSAC school at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in 19 years (Edinboro scored 23.5 points and finished 10th in 1996.)

























Shippensburg University's women's softball team ended the season with a 17-18 record but celebrated superlative athletes.


The Shippensburg University softball team had three of its players selected to the 2015 All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Eastern Division squads .
