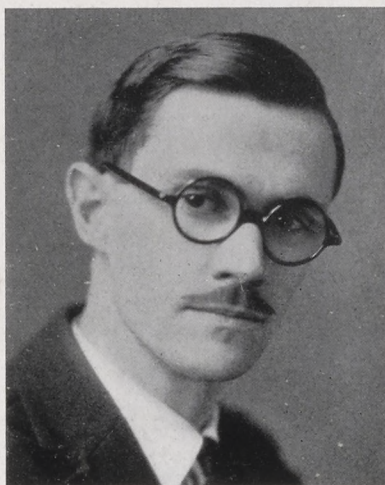
SHIPPENSBURG A STATE TEACHERS' COLLEGE

TUESDAY, October 12, marks an epoch in the history of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School. On that day a charter was granted enabling the school to confer the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education for the four-year course. This charter also gives the Normal School the ranking of a state teachers' college.

Shippensburg—a state teachers' college means increased enrollment, wider range of subjects, better teaching, and improved equipment. It is a distinct step in the advancement of teaching as a profession in Pennsylvania, requiring, as it does, a type of specialized training on an equal plane with that of other professions.

The presentation of the charter was made by Mr. James N. Rule, Secretary of the State Council of Education. In his address he stated that Shippensburg was the first Normal School to receive the decree of the State Council of Education.

The granting of the charter does not change the name of the school. This, however, will be done at some future meeting of the State Legislature.



CLASS DEAN

DR. EDGAR C. BYE holds the unique distinction of being Dean of the first four-year class to graduate from the Cumberland Valley State Normal School. Though but small, this Class acted as pioneers, blazing the trail for all the future four-year classes. As guide to this small group of pioneers, Dr. Bye proved to be an all-round "good scout" and as such deserves much commendation.

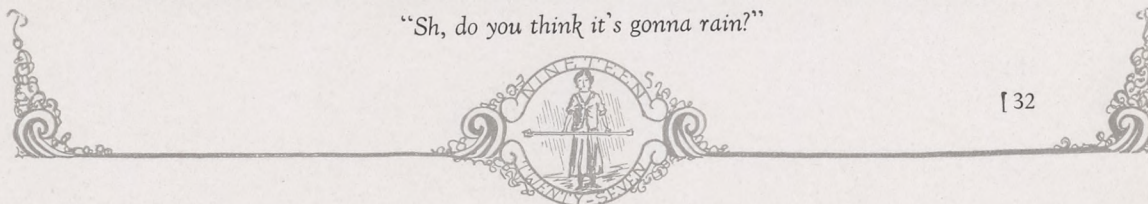

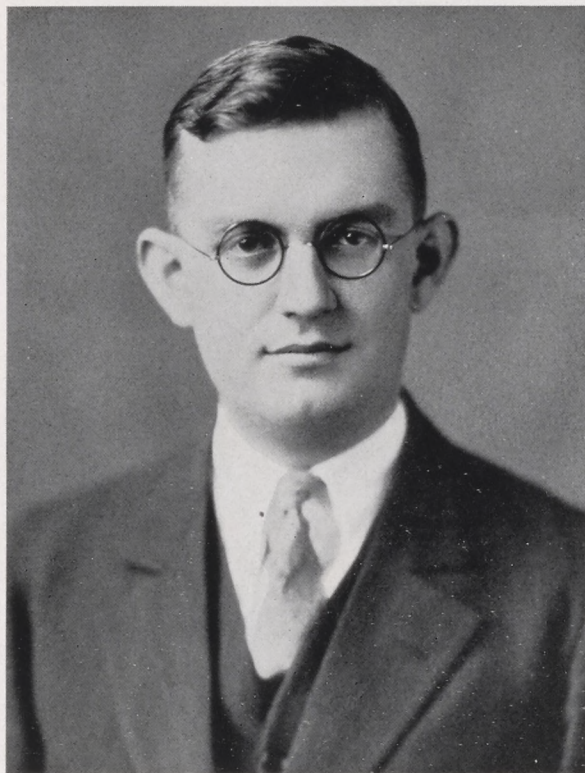
"For he is a jolly good fellow." Yes, we mean "Pious," for although his nickname belies the fact, this popular football star is always ready with a joke or a smile.

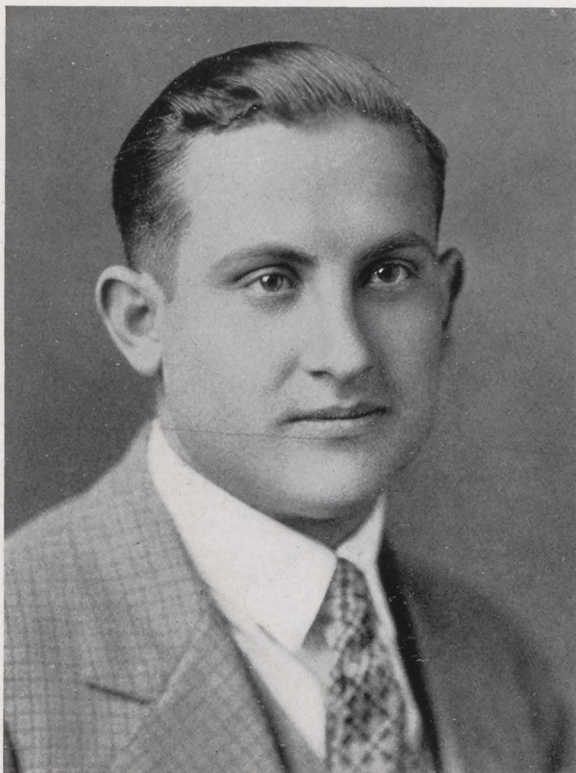

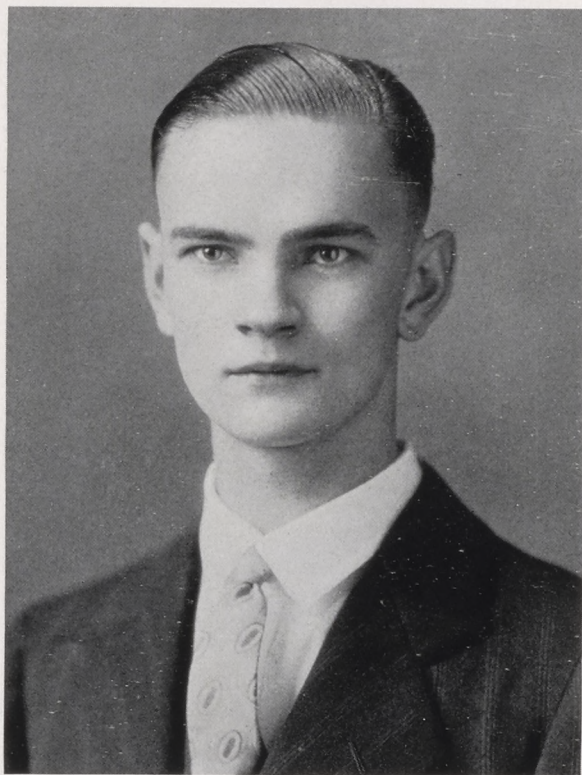

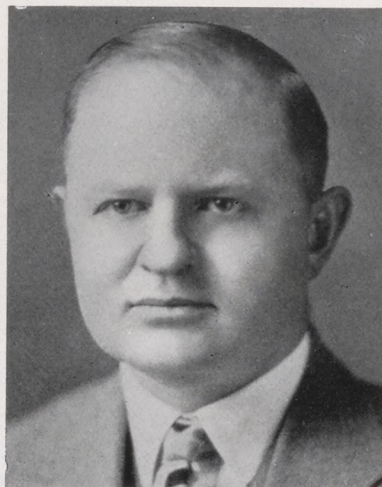

JUNIOR HIGH SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

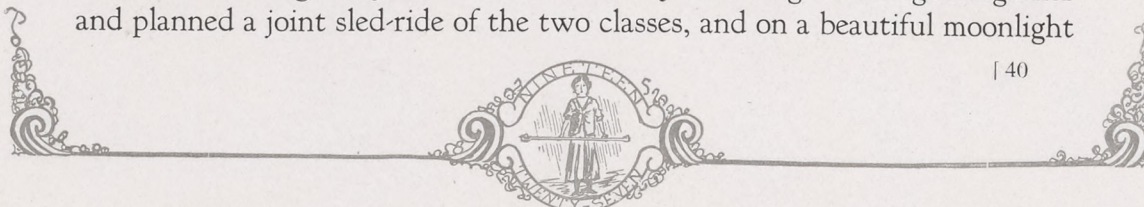
THE Junior High Class will now broadcast their History from station C. V. S. N. S.



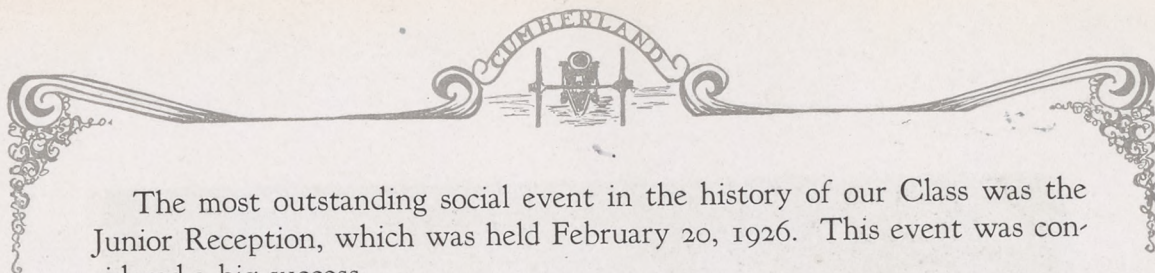
HISTORY OF CLASS OF 1927

PHILOMATHEAN LITERARY SOCIETY

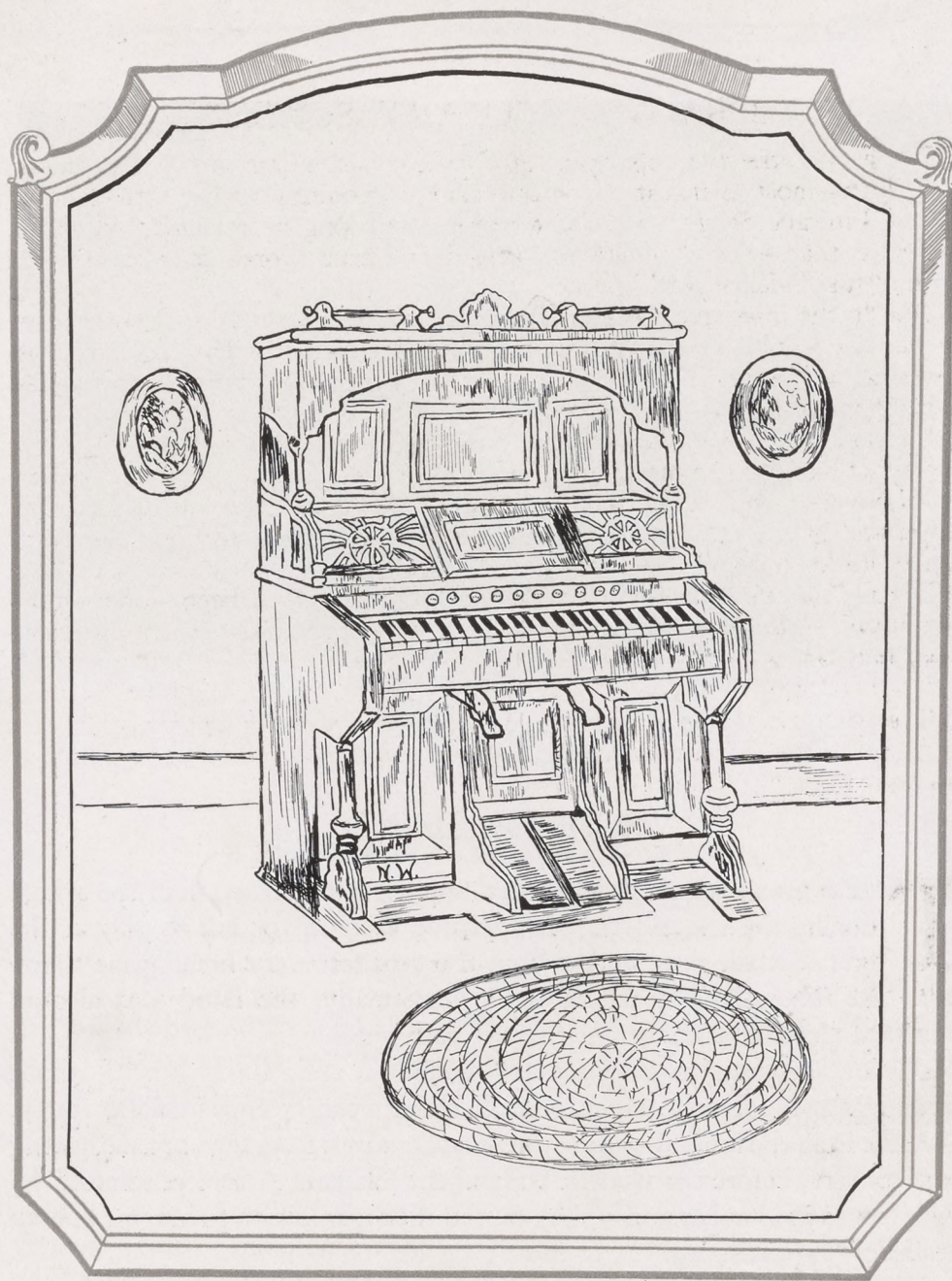

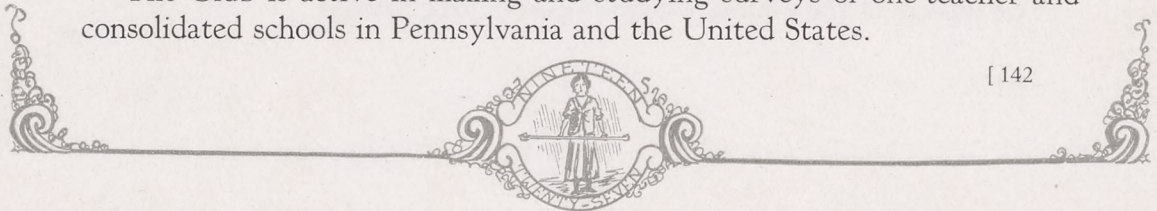

Tennis, with its opportunity for steady improvement in form and technique, enlists the interests of a large group of men and women who throng the courts in the fall, spring, and summer. Athletic sports make not only for a healthy, vigorous body, but they are powerful influences for clean living, self-control, cooperation, leadership, and scholarship. No man (or woman) can maintain high athletic standing unless he is clean in thought and act. The member of a team who loses his temper and fails to keep a clear head at all times soon proves a detriment rather than a help to his team-mates. No matter how brilliant or spectacular a man may be in any game, unless he can sink his own personality into the group personality and cooperate with his team-mates, he is likely to lose out in the long run. There is a growing demand in inter-school games that all the players shall be students who make satisfactory grades in their classes. The day for the "ringer" and the "tramp" athlete is almost at an end, and schools that countenance them are being dropped from the schedules of high-grade institutions. The various athletic organizations of our own school have done much, and can do still more, to promote good, clean sport in all interscholastic games.

Valuable as are the athletic organizations of any school, they are not sufficient in themselves. They must be supplemented by those that develop



the cultured aspects of life, such as Art and Music. The band, orchestra, choral societies, and glee clubs not only contribute much to the social and civic life of the school, but they give a fine opportunity for further musical education to all who are interested in music. The Arts and Crafts Club performs a fine service for all those who seek self-expression by means of pen and pencil or who have ability in manual work.

The Literary Societies are the oldest organizations of our school. Their roots reach deep into the past, for both have had an uninterrupted existence for more than fifty years. It is a fine tribute to our student body to have competent critics say that the programs rendered by these organizations are better this year than ever. In the halls of these societies have been trained not only a great group of superintendents and principals, but a body of outstanding lawyers, doctors, ministers, and business men.

Closely affiliated with the Literary Societies are the Dramatic Club and the Debating Club. No other organizations give finer opportunity for self-expression than these. The Country Life Club keeps its membership in touch with all that is best in rural matters.

The "Campus Reflector" calls into its service the men and women who seek to prepare for leadership. No better opportunity could be given than is here afforded to mould the opinion of others through the columns of this school publication.

Such, then, in brief, are the organizations that appeal to the various types of students who seek to fit themselves for the work of the modern world.

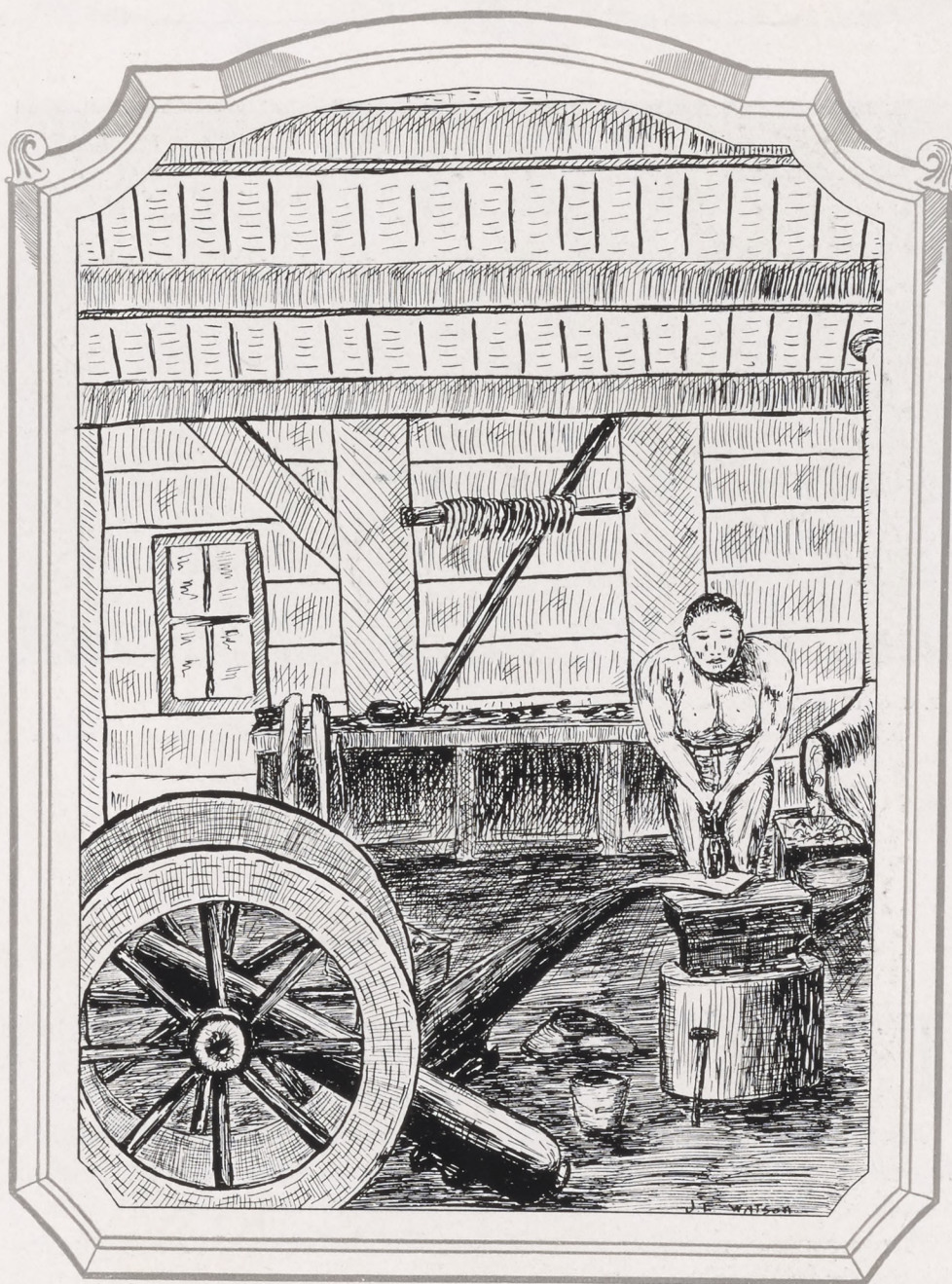

FOOTBALL SEASON OF 1926

THE football season of 1926 was eagerly looked forward to by all supporters of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School after the championship season of 1925. Several stars were graduated the preceding June, leaving many holes to be plugged in both the line and back-field. However, rumors began to float about as early as July that there would be a lot of fine material on hand when practice started September 8. True enough, a goodly number of men with ability reported the first week. However, it takes time to develop stars or to mould a winning team out of new material.

In the initial game of the season with Beckley Business College, it was clearly seen that there must be a great deal of polishing done before the machine could be expected to function with smoothness and precision. The defense was there, and the offense seemed to flash at intervals. These characteristics, however, were fortunately lacking in the games with Gettysburg Freshmen, East Stroudsburg Normal or California Normal.

The regular schedule opened with Beckley Business College on Eckels Field, September 25. This was the first time C. V. S. N. S. ever played Beckley. It was a hard-fought battle from beginning to end. At the end of the first half, the Red and Blue team was more than holding its own, and at the end of the game 13 points were piled up while Beckley failed to score.

On October 2, our team journeyed to Windsor, Md., where it played the Blue Ridge College team. Here it suffered the first defeat of the season, 6-0.

The next Saturday, October 8, was an open date on our schedule, but the





team was drilled hard in order to get in perfect working order for the hard schedule that was to follow. On the following Saturday, October 16, the Red and Blue warriors tackled the Dickinson Freshmen team with the determination to send them down to defeat. As they had previously defeated the Dickinson Junior Varsity, so they did this time, winning by a score of 23-0.

With the count standing at two won and one lost, the team journeyed to Indiana to match the skill of the western and central section of Pennsylvania on the gridiron. This was a hard-fought, well-played game. Both teams played a good offensive game throughout but our team's defense weakened, permitting Indiana to score 17 points while we were unable to score.

The bitterest defeat of the season was on October 30, at West Chester, when the Chester County boys defeated us in a hotly contested battle by the score of 19-15.

November 4 was "Home Coming Day" at Shippensburg, so with a determination to show the Alumni that athletics are as strong at Shippensburg as they ever were, our team trampled Millersville into the "terra firma" of Eckels Field to the tune of 63-0.

The strong Gettysburg Freshman team was defeated the next Saturday 13-6. (This seemed the turning point of the season.) Our team ended the

season with the most brilliant finis that could be possible by defeating East Stroudsburg 7-0 and California 9-7, two of the strongest Normal School teams in the state.

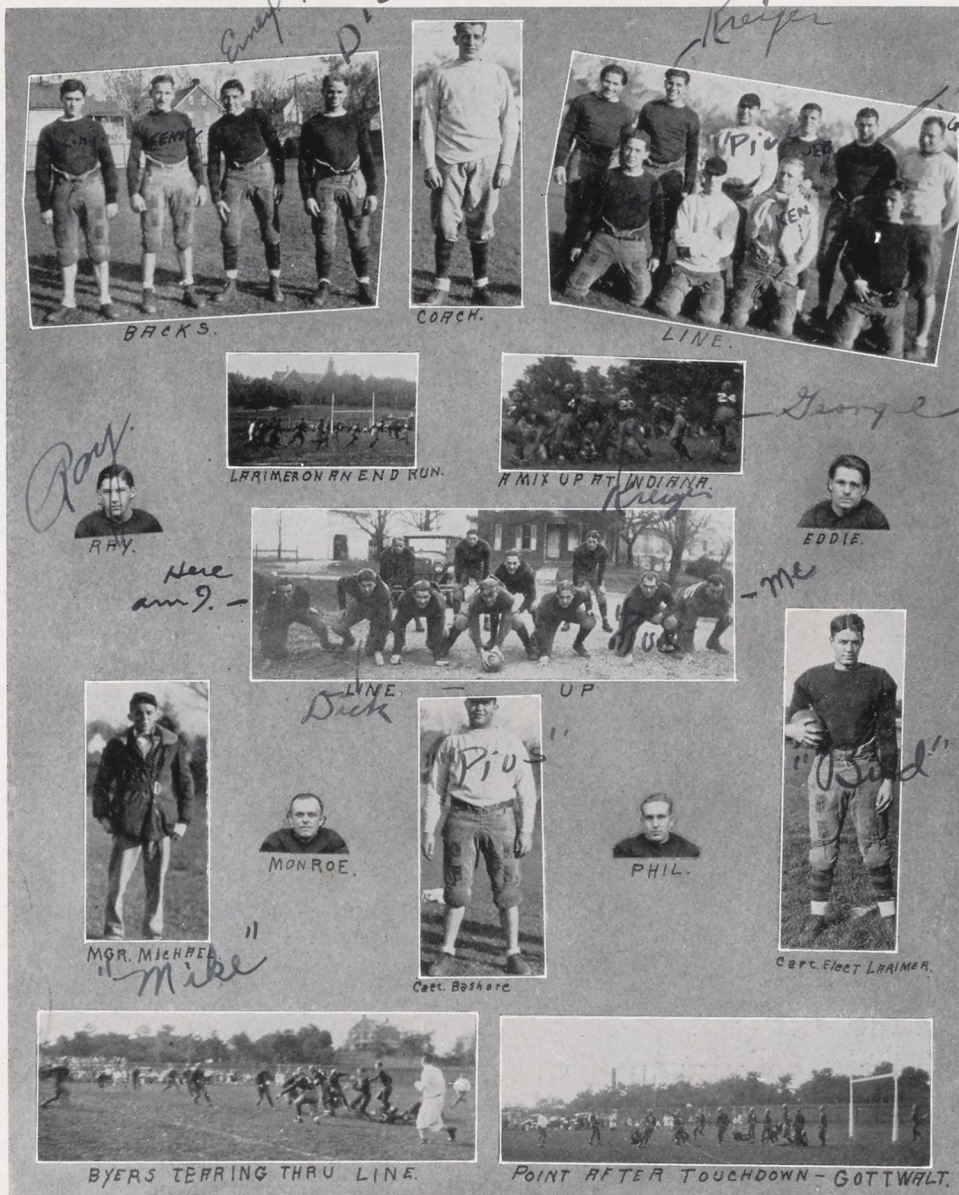
The squad was honored at a banquet given by Mr. John Morrison, of Shippensburg, a true booster. The school also banqueted the football squad for the third consecutive season.

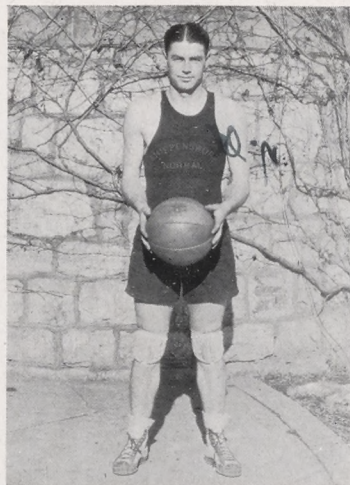

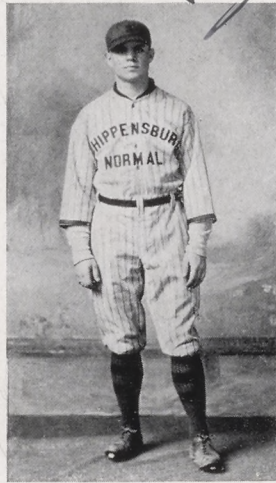
BASKETBALL

WITH the return of most of last year's varsity team, and an abundance of new material from various high schools, the basketball prospects for the coming season loomed very bright. At the call for candidates for the squad, about twenty-five men answered, and after a few weeks' drill Coach Potratz chose a squad to represent the school in the early games. In spite of the fact that the team had an excellent start, the "Tough Luck" Jinx got the best of them, and they took on a losing streak which was very hard to break. Of the fifteen games played, the team won five. Considering the team's victories and defeats, the season was not very successful. However, C. V. scored 440 points to the 443 of their opponents.

All of the teams on this year's schedule put up unusually hard games, and throughout the season extra periods were played, ending many times in a close lead for our opponents. The quintet which the Gettysburg Freshmen pitted against our team was one of the best which has ever represented that school. They were a fast-moving, smooth-passing, and accurate-shooting squad. As a result, our team went down in defeat to a 34-22 score. When we met the snappy West Chester tossers, their constant long shots and moments of brilliant passing eliminated our hope for a championship team. When the husky foresters of Mont Alto pulled so marvelously together and displayed a real example of team-work, we again suffered defeat, only to revenge it by a 41-18 victory in the second game played with them on the home floor.

The season's scrub team was composed of a fast group of high school stars just starting their college basketball career. They played well and afforded the varsity plenty of opposition in the practice games. A scrub schedule, consisting of four games, was played with nearby high schools. The team won two of these games. Six players and the manager received varsity sweaters for service on the varsity this season. All members of the varsity basketball squad eligible for an "S" will receive sweaters, with the exception of those awarded for football.

The outlook for next year in basketball is even brighter than at the beginning of this term. All the varsity men of this year will return, and the scrub team and new material from the high schools will vie for positions on the 1927-28 team. Next year's schedule includes seven normal schools. With the new athletic regulations for the Teachers' Colleges going into effect, we can expect some fast contests and real basketball exhibitions.

The prospects of the 1927 baseball season are very encouraging with the return of many of last year's men and a promising group of new players. The team, thus far, has not been officially selected, but things indicate that Captain Mentzer will be shifted to center field where he can be expected to play a prominent part in the games of this season.

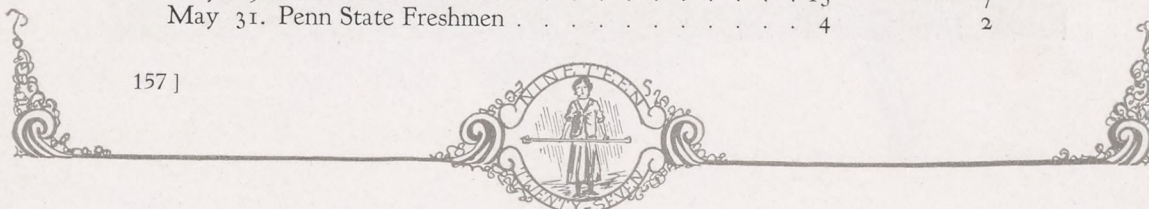
BASEBALL

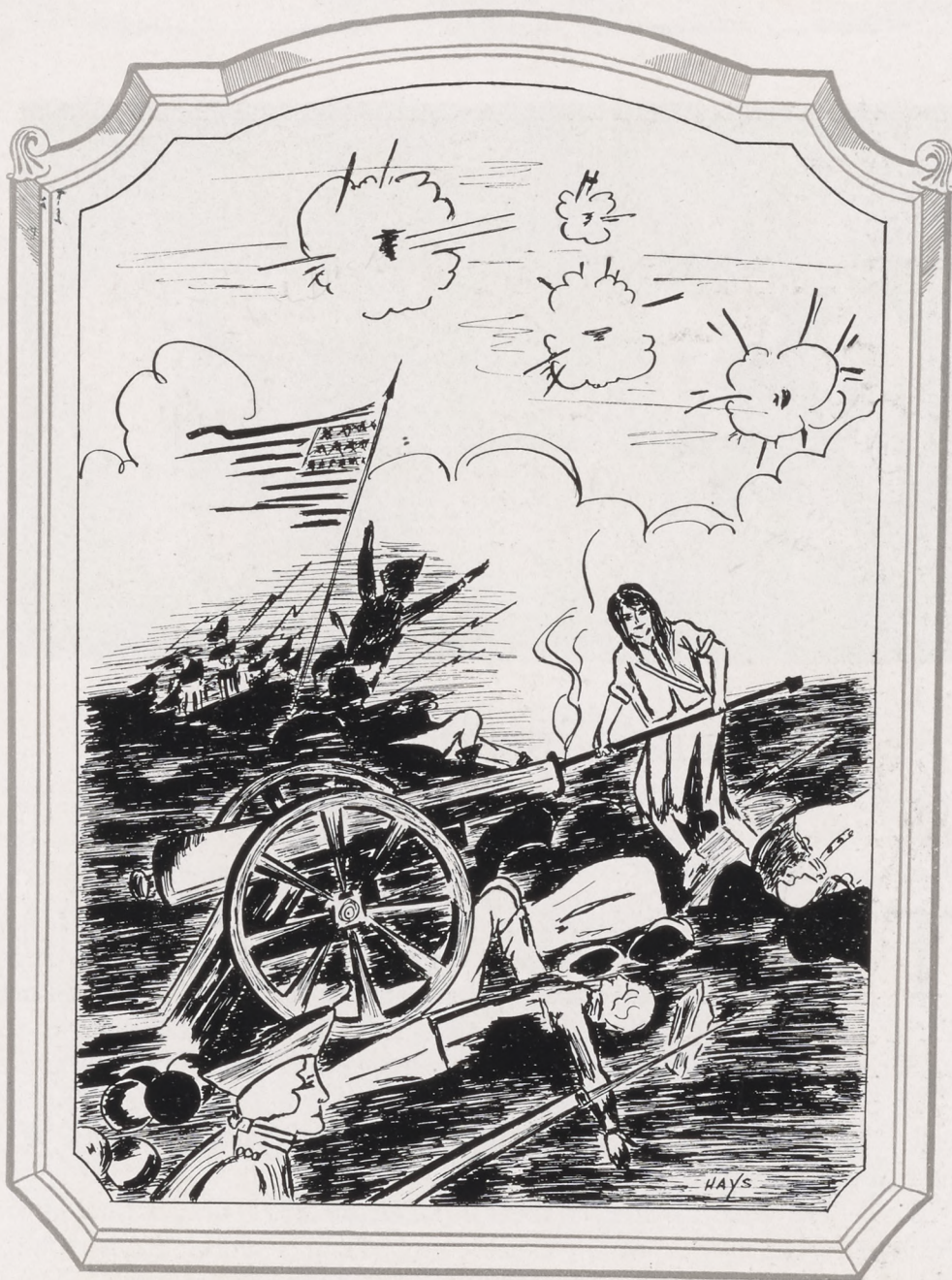

This year, instead of a small representation of girls from each class in all athletics, there have been several hundred girls out for each sport. Under the direction of this enthusiastic coach, many teams were formed, and they played each other throughout each season.

The gain was shown in spirit as well as in numbers. With a coach such as Miss Henderson urging each one on, the interest and competition was certain to reach its highest and best level.

GIRLS' HOCKEY

WITH the crisp fall weather came the call for hockey players. Never in the history of C. V. S. N. S. were there so many girls who responded to this call—about two hundred reported the first week of practice. Very few girls found it necessary to discontinue this activity.


Few rules were set forth as requirements. The girls were put on their honor not to indulge in eating candy, sundaes, cakes, and other sweets.

With the large number of girls out for hockey, it was possible to have practices only twice a week for each group. However, this situation did not hinder the production of skilled players. The first-year girls displayed fine sportsmanship as well as ability. The new girls were desirous of learning the game. They attended practices and took very few cuts, which resulted in speed and accuracy of movement. The Juniors and Seniors were likewise talented and spirited players. Their previous work and knowledge of the game made them enthusiastic and skilful.

Very early in the season Miss Henderson divided the group of prospective players into small groups. Each was instructed to elect a captain and decide upon a name for its particular team. The team names chosen were as follows: "Tee-Pees," "Wildcats," "Spartans," "Dashers," "Peppy Eleven," "Flashers," "Tigers," "Stars," "Flyers," "Hawks," "Jolly Juniors" and "Lightnings." Each team thus organized was out to win. Pep and enthusiasm were shown in songs and cheers. Each team decided upon some symbol, suggested by their team-name, which they displayed in various manners. Flags and banners were also constructed displaying the symbols.

Constant practice and coaching made it possible to have two tournaments. The first took place on Thanksgiving Day. The big event began with a parade. The girls assembled at various places designated on the campus. At a given signal the brass band sounded and the parade was moving toward the hockey field.

When the procession finally came to a halt, each class marched around the hockey field, singing and giving their cheers, holding their banners high and erect. When the time arrived for the playing, cheers and yells were heard issuing from the bleachers. As this was a holiday, many of the students not out for hockey found their way to Eckel's Field to cheer their favorite team to victory. Team after team battled together, some rising, some falling. Finally, when all teams had played, the honors of the day were given to the



"Wildcats," a Senior team. All went home tired but happy, looking forward to similar occasions.

The second event took place on the last day of the season which fell on Saturday. The time scheduled was 10.30 to 12. As on the previous occasion, all teams were out to win and many to seek revenge. This being the last game of the season, new teams were formed. The new teams were "Day Student," "Dormitory," "Main Building," "Senior Class Team," "Junior Class Team" and a "Freshman Class Team." Again the student body was well represented on the bleachers, giving their support by cheers and songs. Every girl played hard and fast.

Spirit and enthusiasm were shown all during the hockey season. The boarding students found this outdoor sport very beneficial to their health. Those who were suffering from lack of exercise could not attribute this condition to hockey, because every girl was kept busy. The crisp breezes which accompany fall make one feel alive and active.

With the opinion of physical educators that instruction should be given to the masses rather than the small or selected group, our hockey program was outlined. Instead of a few girls being given opportunity to participate, all girls who were physically fit and who desired to play were encouraged to enroll. Miss Henderson gave thorough and complete instruction of the smallest details of the game. "Hats off to the best Coach that C. V. S. N. S. has ever had for the girls!" We predict a similar season next year.

Sunday, 3d.—Five more days until we go home! Fare-thee-well.

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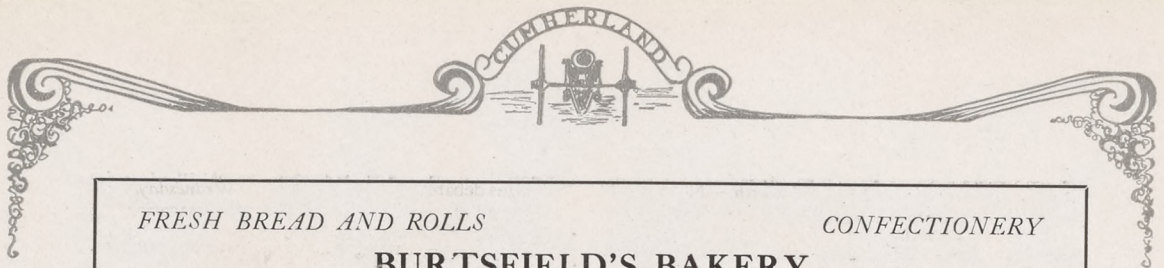
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
