Four Year Group



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






LOWER CLASSES


The Club owes much to Miss Edna Arnold, its advisor, whose advice and cooperation have done much to make the Club a success.


GIRLS' STUDENT COUNCIL

The month of December marked several big events in the history of the








GEOGRAPHY CLUB






MEN'S TRIBUNAL

VARSITY CLUB



Y OACH Bentz returned to S. S. T. C. after a year's leave of absence, during which time he attended Pennsylvania State College and completed his work for the Master of Arts degree. "Coach" was graduated from that College in 1923, and during his undergraduate days made an enviable record in football, attaining Walter Camp's mythical "All-American" team in the fall of 1922. At his graduation he accepted the position of Director of Athletics at Mansfield State Normal School, where he remained for one year. In the fall of 1924, Coach Bentz came to Shippensburg, and since that time has produced a championship team in both baseball and football. At no time have his teams been in the so-called "rut." In the fall of 1926, "Coach" was granted a leave of absence in order that he might take post-graduate work at Pennsylvania State College. While there, he assisted Hugo Bezdek in his football-coaching duties. However, Coach Bentz returned to us this year, and we are glad that he is here.



FOOTBALL

POOTBALL, our greatest sport, did not afford us the usual glory as it has done in the past several years, but we can say that the team was a credit to the institution. Out of the nine games which were played, the Red and Blue gridmen broke as nearly even as could be possible. In four of these encounters the heavy end of the score eluded them, and in one game a 0-0 tie was realized. In points scored, S. S. T. C. had a fourteen point lead on their opponents, scoring 96 points to the 82 which were scored against the team.

At the start of the season Coach Bentz had thirty candidates, sixteen of these having already seen action in Red and Blue togs in former years. The team proved to be light, but fast. We are not offering any alibis whatever, but truthfully speaking, the team met many reverses in the form of injuries and illness to the men.

Blue Ridge College was taken on first on the home field and was spanked, 25-0. Although this game was no real test, it brought out some of the strong and weak points and aided the Coach to bolster his team which gave us a real display of football on the same field the following week with Georgetown "Frosh." This was the first encounter with this strong team from the South; they came with a reputation and lived up to it. They were big, fast, and well coached, but the Red and Blue showed that they were very nearly their equal and were beaten by a lone touchdown, 6-0.

The first battle on foreign soil took place at California State Teachers College. Here the Easterners were forced by the Westerners to be content

with a scoreless tie. This was not so bad, but the real reverse was had the very next week when, after migrating to East Stroudsburg, the S. S. T. C. team was set back by the terrific score of 31-0. This was a complete surprise as the East Stroudsburg team had emerged from mediocracy in former years

to a mighty championship machine.

Then came the annual "Home-Coming Day" game with the "Yellow Jackets" of West Chester State Teachers College opposing. Since these teams are probably the keenest rivals among Pennsylvania Teachers Colleges, Shippensburg entered the game with a grim determination, being not too optimistic, but having plenty of spirit. When the final whistle had blown, the home team had lost, 21-0, and all that could be said was: "Too bad, Shippensburg, but you surely did fight"; and "A very good game, West Chester."

The battle was then carried to Millersville soil and the Lancaster Countains were downed, 19-0. This was a relief after the strain of the last


three results.

On Eckels' Field, the "Little Green Terrors" of the Western Maryland College "Frosh" tore through our squad for three touchdowns in the first quarter. After this period, Captain Larimer's boys went through some sort of a reformation and outplayed the Southerners for the remainded of the game, losing finally, 18-7.

The Red and Blue Warriors gave a fine display of football in the final game of the season when they trounced the Potomac State Normal eleven by a 19-6 score. In this game the locals presented a very consistent, smooth-running ma-

chine.

We realize that, although our team did not rank with the most outstanding they were by no means a discredit. Here's for better luck next

at the College, and his athletic career has been an enviable one.





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BASKETBALL

HERE were many things for the students and supporters to be proud of in the term of '27 and '28 on the campus of the old institution, which had just recently taken on the new name of Shippensburg State Teachers' College. It is noted that one of the most outstanding of these is the basketball squad which brought them glory galore and gave them that grand and glorious thrill that comes when something you can call your own is seen to do a remarkable piece of work. What did the basketball team do that was remarkable and glorious? Plenty! To boil their work down and present it in a few words, we might say: the team played sixteen games with some of the strongest teams of its class; nine of these were played at home while seven contests were carried to foreign courts; this schedule resulted in eleven victories and five defeats; 585 points were scored against 465.

The colorful season was opened at home and a precedent of victory was set up when the team defeated Blue Ridge College, 42-37. The precedent was not lived up to in the following week—S. S. T. C. was defeated in a close-guarding game by Dickinson "Frosh," 22-19.

The Red and Blue tossers then ventured to Maryland on their first trip and were victorious, 32-15, over Frostburg Normal. In the next three games at home, as many victories were realized. California was defeated, 32-20; Millersville Normal was swamped, 47-29; and Frostburg struggled under the terrific score of 71-14.

Next was a two-game eastern trip which did not prove favorable for the Red and Blue so far as the scores are considered. Both games turned out to be defeats for S. S. T. C. East Stroudsburg handed the team the hardest setback of the season by a margin of nine points, 42-33. Kutztown duplicated the trick being on the heavy end of the score, 35-27.

The Blue and Red came back strong and avenged both of these defeats at home. Kutztown was easily overcome, 40-30; but the biggest thrill came when the boys tangled with East Stroudsburg for forty minutes of the hardest fighting and fastest playing of the season. The visitors were sent back trailing as close as possible, 36-35.


The Woodsmen from Mont Alto were entertained at Shippensburg and beaten, 27-22. The fourth defeat came again on a foreign court. Millersville humbled the team 31-28 in a close contest.

Bringing the action again to Shippensburg, Bloomsburg S. T. C. proved to be another scrappy opponent. After a game in which the leadership see-sawed considerably, the visitors were merely submerged, 45-44.

Mont Alto was the last stumbling block of the season. At Waynesboro the tide was turned and the Teachers were bested by the Foresters in an extra period game, 42-39.

In closing the season, the squad did it quite royally. Activity was carried to Western courts in a two-game trip to California Normal and Indiana S. T. C. These games in a different section of the State were played in a different manner, i. e. fouls were not called so consistently, with the result that the Red and Blue was allowed to scrap their hardiest. California lost to them, 33-31; and Indiana was swamped in a typical Shippensburg last-half rally, 34-16. Again we say: it was a team of which to be proud.

At the close of the 1927 season, Varnum Fenstermacher was elected to pilot the '27-28 squad. Whether or not his influence was felt can be judged from the showing his followers made.

"Fannymacher" is one who is to be envied for his athletic ability. He participates in all lines of sports on the campus. His early training along this line was received at Wilmington, Delaware, and at Harrisburg. At Harrisburg Tech he was an all-around athlete. Upon coming to Shippensburg he likewise took to all athletics just like a fish takes to water. He is perfectly at home when engaged in sport.

With the close of basketball season, "Fensty" has earned eight letters in three years at school, with baseball this year his probable ninth. His services have been greatly appreciated and it is hoped that he will continue to be successful in the line of work he loves best.



BASEBALL

ITH the reputation of the 1926 championship team to be upheld, the 1927 nine entered upon the past season with a grim determination to bring another baseball championship to Shippensburg. Although the "baseball gods" decided otherwise, the team did enjoy a rather successful season, winning four of the six games played.

Kutztown and Bloomsburg were defeated in order and then followed the thrilling game with East Stroudsburg. Here our opponents staged a ninth inning rally and nosed out the Red and Blue by a 7-6 score. Next the highly touted Bucknell Freshmen were decisively beaten as was the Gettysburg Freshman nine. In the final game of the season, East Stroudsburg put up an almost flawless exhibition of the national pastime to defeat the local sluggers 8-3, thus crushing our championship hopes.

Jupiter Pluvius proved to be a jinx during the season and three games were cancelled because of rain.

JUNIOR BASKETBALL SQUAD


