The advisory committee consists of Miss Nora Kieffer, Miss Claudia Robb, Miss Harriet Willoughby, and Miss Alice Huber.



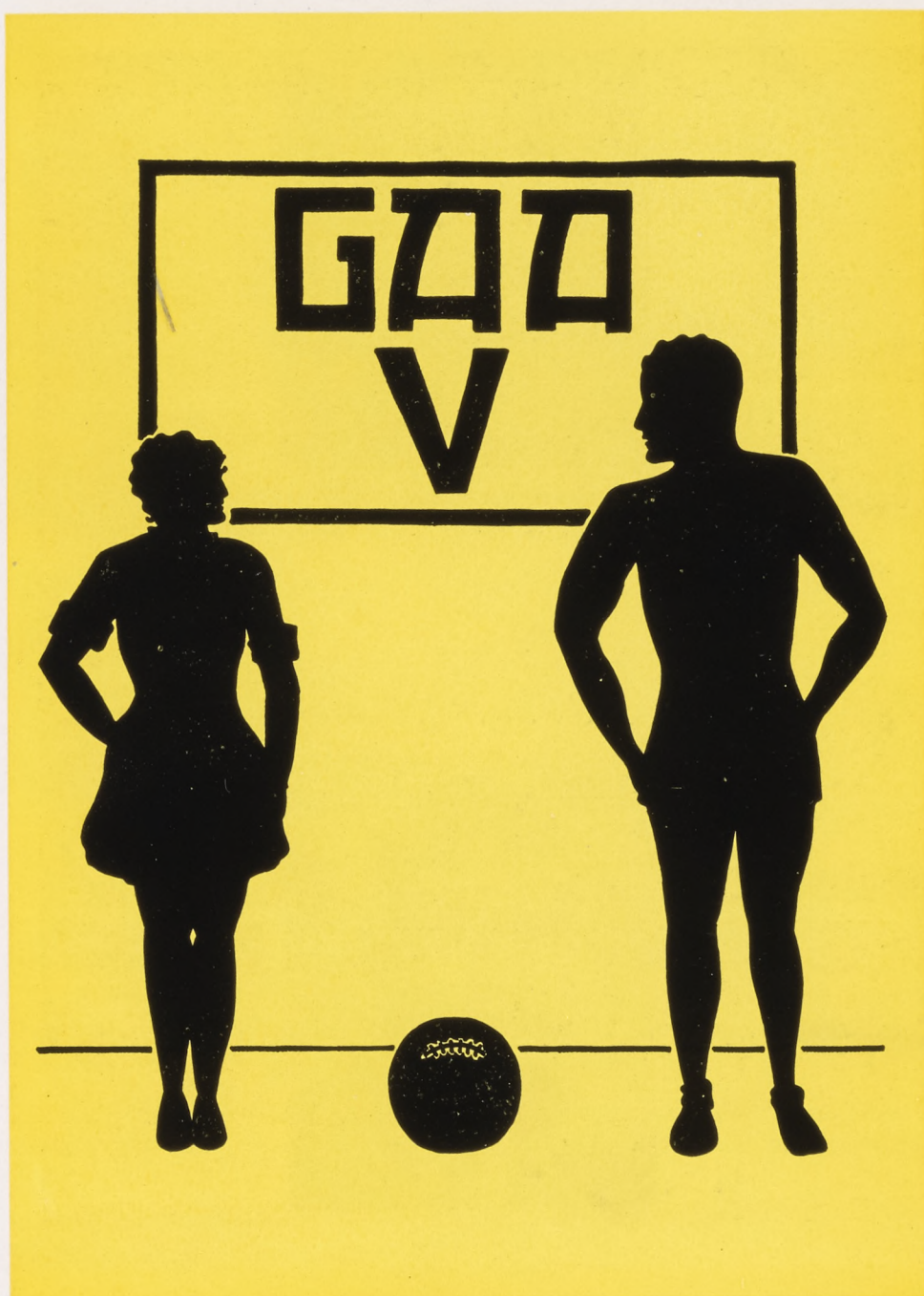

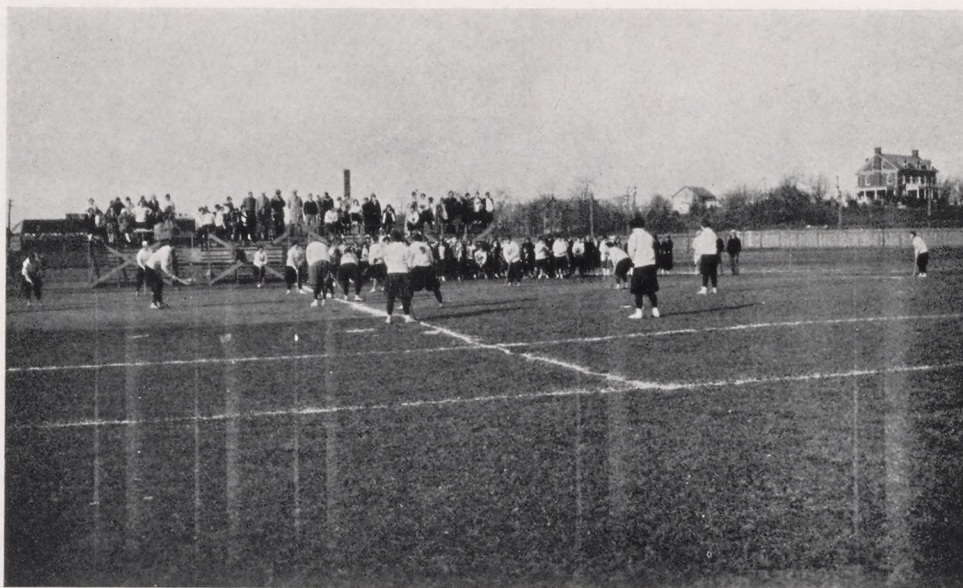
GIRL'S ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Many girls participate in the sport.

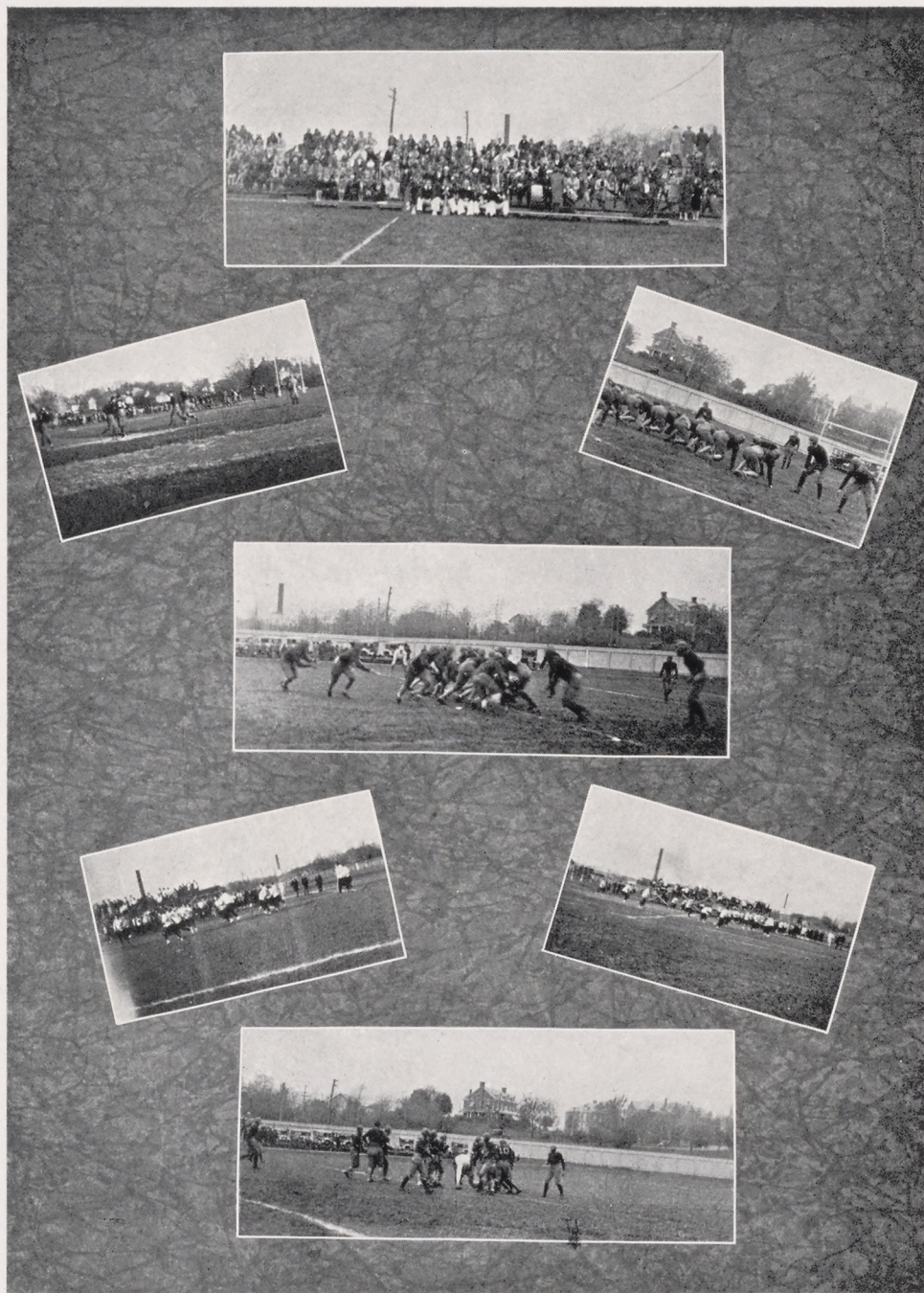

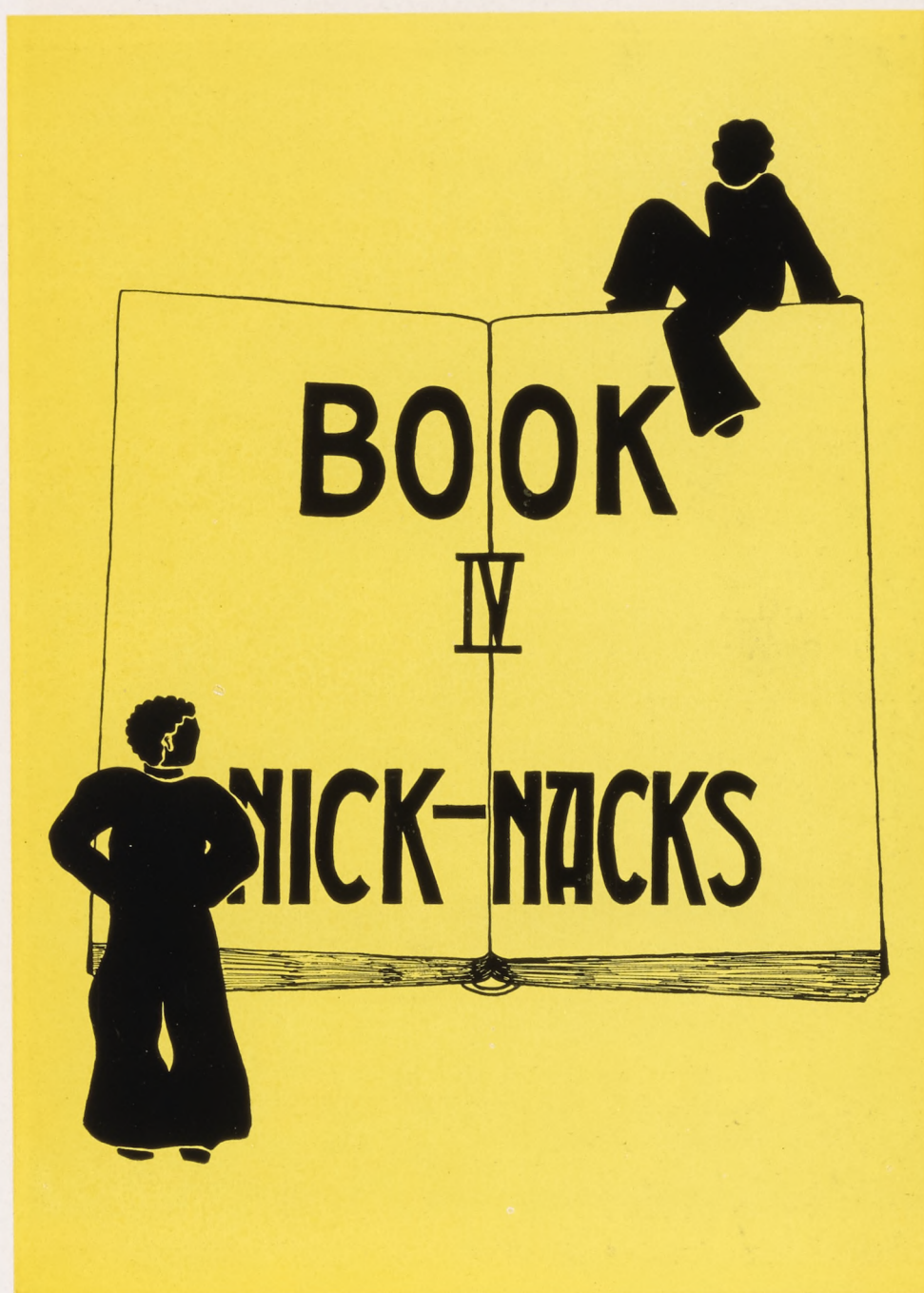
