History of Four Year Class of 1930

On September 13, 1926, about seventy young men and women bashfully registered as Freshmen in the new Four Year Junior High School Course. After the first few weeks of homesickness and losing ourselves in the dormitories, we gradually became accustomed to classes and were integrated into the life of the school. Four of our men played on the Varsity football team. Literary societies and other extra-circular activities found dearth of 1930 Freshmen engaged in them. The class organization resulted in the election of Raymond Schwinger, president; Raymond Cable, vice-president; Margaret Hege, secretary; and George Brindle, treasurer. Throughout the four years of our college career, these officers have held the same positions with the exception of the vice-president.


The Sophomore year opened with eleven numbered among the missing. This was the fated year to start specialization in subjects. History and Science claimed the larger numbers although English, Mathematics, Latin, and French were designated as "majors" by many. The most prominent social event and perhaps the one which will bring back the tenderest memories of our college days took form in a class outing at Mr. Henry's bungalow on a certain moonlit night in May.

Our Junior year arrived with the class roll dwindled to forty-eight. We entered into upperclassmanship which the Freshmen soon understood in the more rigid enforcement of customs. The climax of social affairs culminated in the Junior Prom.

Replenished by a few students desiring a B. S. in Education degree, the Senior class roll numbered fifty-two. After practice teaching and one semester of classroom work, Commencement, and the realization of our Class motto, "He attains whatever he pursues."

We like to term them the life of the school. However, these clubs were not always the mainstaff of our educational institution. Like every movement of consequence, an inorganic evolution is connected with their growth. In this particular case, as in more general cases, the beginning was simple and unpretentious. One organization at a time taking its place among the existing clubs seems to have been the process. First of all were the literary societies, then the dramatic clubs, and debating clubs. As evidence of the fast increase in these organizations, we need only point to the fact that within the past year two more have been added to the already extended list. Besides this increase of number, we can make no mistake in mentioning the increase in membership of each of the various clubs.

The truth of the matter is that they do furnish a necessary part of college life. Everyone does not have the same interests; everyone does not have the same talents. Here is where individuality and initiative are made apparent and allowed to develop. Even the State has recognized that "extra-curricular activities" are desirable, for it requires a stipulated amount of time to be spent in work of this type and therefore, demands that each one has credits in these lines of endeavor. In modern life we must be ourselves. The clubs, through varied activities, help us to attain that end. Regardless of this individual development, the fellowship alone amply rewards those who "gang" together in any movement or institution.

The one objection often raised is that these organizations are ruining the regular courses of study in our colleges. As the saying goes "The side shows are becoming the main circus". Of course they can never take the place of organized curricula, but they can be and are a most vital supplement to any educational program. We do not believe that these organizations are over emphasized in the life of Shippensburg State Teachers College, and we, therefore, present them to you as a component part of the school life.

The schedule was as follows:



The Girls' Athletic Association stands for mass athletics. To have every girl a participant in at least one sport is the goal toward which the G. A. A. is striving.




This organization also gives several chapel programs each year, and sometimes plays for the presentation of other programs.


If the wearers of the Red and Blue progress in the future years under his supervision as they have in the past one, Shippensburg will meet any other college on the equality basis in sports.


The 1929 track season proved the most successful ever attempted at Shippensburg. Prior to this season track had been an alternating spring sport, depending on time and material for development.
