en years ago, in the fall of 1992, Dr. Tim Thompson approached his public relations classes with an idea: produce a Scottish festival for Edinboro students. After nine months of preparation, the first festival was held April 24, 1993. About 500 people showed up on campus that Saturday. Those who attended will never forget as soft morning rain turned into a freezing downpour by noon. The wind pushed a parade float of Scotland's Nessie across the playing fields as volunteers desperately struggled to keep tents from taking flight. But all survived, and Edinboro's Scottish Festival was born.

This year we celebrated the 10th Annual Highland Games and Scottish Festival. Now held in May in the hopes of better weather, the Festival is a signature event for our campus and the Edinboro Family.

From its inauspicious beginning, the Festival has grown to include pipe band competitions, highland dance competitions, professional and amateur heavy athletic competitions, Celtic vendors, Scottish clan family gatherings, an art show and auction, animal exhibitions, outstanding musicians, and a Scottish village with blacksmith, woodcarvers, and reenactment groups.

With the support of area citizens and visitors from throughout the world, the Edinboro Festival has gained the honor and stature of being among the most revered community events held in northwestern Pennsylvania.

The Edinboro Highland Games and Scottish Festival is a premier example of an activity that demonstrates our 2001-02 University-wide theme, "Building Partnerships for Excellence and Civility." It is also one of many ways that the University celebrates and recognizes diversity in the Edinboro Family. We also honor diversity through Black History Month, Women's History Month, Asian Heritage Month, Latino Heritage Month, the Soul Food Dinner, International Marketplace, the Martin Luther King Jr. Awards Luncheon, World Cultures Week, and through our many student organizations.

10th Annual Highland Games

hat started ten years ago as a class project has now grown to an event that draws thousands of people annually to the campus at Edinboro. The Edinboro Highland Games and Scottish Festival brings visitors the very best of Scottish tradition. The Festival combines great competition with Scottish hospitality.

Dr. Tim Thompson, speech and communication studies, is the driving force behind the University's Highland Games and Scottish Festival. The first Festival was held on April 24, 1993, after nine months of preparation by Thompson's graduate and

undergraduate public relations classes. Approximately 500 people attended the event that featured games, food, one Scottish Clan, a few Scottish vendors and two local pipe bands.

The excitement quickly caught on and the event began to grow. In 1994, mini-band and highland dance competitions were added; and one year later, world-class entertainers, such as Seven Nations, Bonnie Rideout and Al Petteway, ignited the Festival stages. The preparation time to transform the campus into a Scottish village now requires 12 months of planning with the help and support of several businesses and community members.



"Feast in the Streets," kicked off this year's annual event on Friday, May 17, in downtown Edinboro with a Celtic music jam, the kilted mile run, calling of the clans, and a bonfire welcome ceremony.

The Highland Games came alive on the campus on Saturday as participants experienced Scotland while Celtic music and the aroma of delicious Scottish foods filled the air. The centerpiece of the Games was competition in Highland dancing, piping and drumming, and traditional Scottish athletics. Participants witnessed first hand the fine array of talented pipers and drummers who competed before

judges. The grace and elegance of the Scottish dancers regaled the viewers with the Highland and National dances of Scotland; while pro and amateur heavy athletes, donned in kilted attire, amazed their audiences as they hoisted the 120-pound, 18-foot-high caber end-over-end.

The crowd was treated to performances by Chelsea House Orchestra, a group of more than 30 students from Michigan; and the 2000 U.S. Scottish Fiddle Champion, Jeremy Kittel, Other musicians who filled the air with traditional Scottish music included Heirloom, Brokenstraw, Anam Cara, and Empty Hats.

A Celtic marketplace offered an Old World atmosphere as 20 vendors and artisans displayed items such as books, music, crafts, clothing, Celtic jewelry, collectibles and many more authentic Scottish and Irish wares. Food booths offering shepherd's pies, meat pies and shortbread added to the enjoyment of the Festival attractions and activities.

Eighteen Scottish clans gathered on site in tents decorated with family tartans. Staffed with friendly people who enjoyed sharing their history and experiences, the Clan booths provided a rare opportunity to research family history.

Other events included kids' crafts and athletics, Highland cattle and Clydesdale horse exhibitions, sheep-to-shawl weaving, a storyteller, a rugby tournament, a blacksmith and woodcarvers.

The day ended with the traditional Ceilidh (pronounced kay-lee), a dinner party with live music, haggis ceremony, and Scottish country dancing at Nick's Place in Edinboro.

Finally Able to Realize His Full Potential in Work and Life

n this ever-changing environment of skilled workers, it is no surprise that it is a challenge for companies to find and keep loyal employees. But, there are loyal employees out there. Many of them are skilled information technology professionals with disabilities.

James "Jamie" Protho ('92) is just such an employee with an extraordinary story of courage and determination to realize his personal and professional dreams while living with cerebral palsy. His disability is severe enough to require him to need assistance with eating, dressing and virtually all aspects of his daily life

including communication. He uses an augmentative communication device with a mouth-held stylus that speaks for him.

Protho is an associate systems consultant for Bender Consulting Services, Inc. (BCS), a Pittsburgh-based consulting firm that hires technology professionals with disabilities. Hired in October 2001, he is a successful computer programmer working on assignment at Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield in Pittsburgh, Pa.

"Competitive employment means earning a competitive salary that allows me to live on my own. Now I have the potential to earn levels of compensation that are bounded only by my efforts," said Protho.

During the April 2002, United Cerebral Palsy Association (UCPA) Annual Conference in Minneapolis, Minn., Protho received the Prentke Romich Communication Technology Employment Award, a national award sponsored by UCPA that recognizes individuals who have achieved success in employment by using augmentative communication devices. "It is an honor to be chosen out of so many people who use augmentative communication," said Protho.

Protho has accomplished a great deal of success both professionally and personally. He received a bachelor's degree in computer science at Edinboro University, and a master's degree in rehabilitation science and technology at the

University of Pittsburgh.



"At Edinboro I felt like any other student because of the services that were provided to people with disabilities," said Protho. "I was able to do just about everything that people without disabilities do, because the staff took care of my personal needs."

Jamie is enjoying success in the workplace as well. "Working with Jamie has been very fulfilling for Highmark," said Loretta McLendon, manager at Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield. "I am glad to have Jamie as a part of my team. He has already been an asset and I look forward to more successes as he continues to be a contributing team member."

Joyce A. Bender, president and CEO of Bender Consulting Services, Inc., has a passion to help people with disabilities obtain competitive employment, as she herself has epilepsy and a hearing loss. She knows first-hand the challenges associated with people with disabilities gaining competitive employment. While the employment landscape for people with disabilities has improved, there is much work that needs to be done.

"Many people who use augmentative communication are either unemployed or underemployed. Jamie's exemplary performance proves why the attitudinal barriers must come down – Jamie is an outstanding employee and an assest to BCS.I commend our partner, Highmark, Inc., for focusing on ability and setting the 'high mark' for other companies," said Bender.

"What both Bender Consulting Services, Inc. and Highmark are doing for me and others like me is wonderful," said Protho. "I finally have the job I've always wanted. It is an honor to be working for BCS on assignment at one of Pittsburgh's most prestigious companies, Highmark. It is apparent that the commitment comes from the top and is something BCS and Highmark truly believe in," said Protho.

Hiring a person with a disability is beneficial to both the employer and the employee. Jamie exemplifies the true meaning of loyalty, commitment and determination. He and other employees like him deserve a chance to shine in the workforce.

Edinboro University is actively involved in providing services for students with severe physical disabilities, hearing impairments, visual impairments, and learning disabilities. Since September 1974, the University's program has broadened to include persons with varying degrees of disability as well as various types of disabilities.

Edinboro's campus is almost completely architecturally accessible, and all educational programs are accessible. The Office for Students with Disabilities provides the services essential for students with disabilities to enroll at Edinboro University. uses beans, blocks to explain math, selence concepts in South African schools

hen Edinboro University of Pennsylvania biology professor Dale Hunter got a \$100,000 grant in 1999, she hoped to train 10 people in South Africa to go out into their communities and spread the Family Math and Family Science programs.

So far, more than 150 people have been trained to educate parents, students and teachers about the value of math and science. And Hunter hopes to train even more, including a group of college students she would like to take to South Africa this summer.

"It's so successful," Hunter said about the project she co-directs.

She estimated that several thousand parents and children in the white town of Bloemfontein, the black township of Mangaung and the colored township of Heidedal have benefited from the program.

"There are too many math and science illiterate people in South Africa," Hunter said in explaining the need for such a project. She said it aims to reduce inequities and help parents understand the importance of math and science in their children's lives.

The Family Math and Family Science educational programs use everyday materials, such as beans and blocks, to teach math and science concepts, Hunter said.

"We give parents the activities to take home," she said.

The trained facilitators go into the community and give parents and teachers Family Math and Family Science lessons at workshops. The educational programs also have been established at four South African schools, Hunter said.

Family Math and Family Science materials have been translated into four of the 11 official languages of South Africa: Afrikaans, isiXhosa, Sesotho and Setswana. Hunter said students are educated in their mother tongue until grade three and many South African parents who are illiterate in English can read the languages.

She said she got the idea for the project after an official from the University of the Free State in South Africa visited Edinboro and talked about the need for more community-based programs. She



said she told him about Family Math and Family Science and began to look for money to pay for a partnership between the two universities.

Hunter applied for an Institutional Partnership in Higher Education for International Development from the United States Agency for International Development. The grant is administered for USAID by the Association Liaison Office.

Hunter spent the fall 1999 semester in South Africa, training facilitators from the community. The

project also established a Regional Center for Mathematics and Science Education at the University of the Free State.

She would like to return there this year.

"If we can get the funding, I want to take between four and six students with me to South Africa," she said.

The students, who don't have to be math or science majors, would be trained in Family Math and Family Science before going. They would spend seven to eight weeks working with parents in South African communities, Hunter said.

Blind Students Touch the Stars

Blind students from southern California touched the stars and toured the solar system for the first time thanks to a team from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), Jet Propulsion Laboratories (JPL) and Edinboro University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. David Hurd, Edinboro planetarium director, joined Stephen Edberg of JPL and Dr. Cass Runyon of NASA in Pasadena, California, to present a program designed to bring the universe within reach for visually impaired and blind students. "Accessible Outdoors," a Pasadena organization headed by Shari Fleischman which is dedicated to helping the disabled experience the outdoors, coordinated the


event with NASA, JPL and Edinboro University. Students who have never had the pleasure of experiencing the beauty of the night sky were able to visualize the solar system and stars in our galaxy with the use of tactile maps designed and developed at Edinboro University by Hurd and John Matelock.

Matelock, who manages the tactile lab of the University's Office for Students with Disabilities, has been called a "genius" by Hurd because of his creativeness in using materials such as sawdust for the moon's surface and doll hair for the flames of the sun. The two collaborated in 1992 when Hurd learned that he would have a blind student in his atmosphere and space science class. This became a challenge for him. "How do you reproduce something that is 100 percent visual, the night sky?" asked Hurd.

He soon realized the need for a star tactile map to teach the constellations. Hurd turned to Matelock who had created tactiles for just about everything. "What Matelock created was unique; I had never seen this done before," said Hurd. Star fields have been created before, but by using raised braille. "John is a master at using

creative materials like beads, string and other items to turn a visual image into a tactile image – one that is 'seen' with your fingers." Students are able to discern the difference in sizes – the larger the bead, the brighter the star.

Another challenge Hurd encountered was narrating the materials that were being produced. "When I wrote the descriptions, I had to remove myself from just seeing it. I had to feel it," said Hurd. "I had to




remember that the people who are reading this book are actually touching and feeling it."

The tactile charts created by Hurd and Matelock are not only popular here in the states, they have been sent to schools in Spain, Mexico, Canada, and England. The three that are in most demand include the moon chart, circumpolar constellation chart, and the full sky chart.


Hurd and Matelock took their creations one step further and produced an astronomy book. "The book, which was completed this past March, was born out of our passion to make tactile representations of the beautiful images

that come from the Hubble Space Telescope for students who are visually impaired or blind," said Hurd. It brings the universe within their reach.

NASA and JPL have recognized the quality of the astronomy book and of Hurd's experience in working with exceptional needs audiences. As a result, he has been asked to consult with the Space Telescope Science Institute in Baltimore on an audible description track for ViewSpace to make it



useful to visually-impaired museum visitors. In addition, he has been asked to present at the NASA Space Camp this summer. This conference is specifically designed to showcase exceptional materials that have been developed for special needs audiences.



Hurd and Matelock hope to collaborate with NASA and JPL to produce the astronomy tactile book for a wider audience. In the meantime, Edinboro University students who are visually impaired or blind are currently enjoying one of nature's wonders – the night sky.

Edinboro Nursing Program



Receives Premier Accreditation

dinboro University's baccalaureate degree in nursing is the first in the region to be awarded accreditation from the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE). Based on the University's continuous improvements to its nursing program, CCNE determined Edinboro met all four accreditation standards and awarded a five-year certificate for accreditation through December 31, 2006.


Developed by the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN), CCNE has become the premier accreditation for collegiate nursing officially recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education as a national accreditation agency. It assesses and identifies programs

that engage in effective educational practices, and ensures that the quality and integrity of baccalaureate and graduate education programs are preparing effective nurses.

"We are thrilled that the CCNE has recognized the excellence that is demonstrated by our nursing department," said Edinboro President Dr. Frank G. Pogue. "Our students are very well prepared for careers in nursing as a result of the progressive curriculum and the highly credentialed faculty who deliver it."

"CCNE is the impetus to move forward with a professional model and really recognize a baccalaureate degree program in nursing," said Debra Kubinski, professor of nursing at Edinboro. "We were prepared, we wanted to have everything in order to get the accreditation without any limitations or interim reports required," said Kubinski. The collaborative efforts of the 14 faculty members in the nursing department resulted in the University becoming only the second school in the State System of Higher Education to have done this.

The need for nurses with baccalaureate and graduate degrees is expanding. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that employment for registered nurses will grow faster than the average for all occupations through 2008. Although 60 percent of all employed RNs work in hospitals, many are employed in a wide range of other settings, such as private



practices, public health agencies, primary care clinics, home health care, outpatient surgicenters, insurance and managed care companies, nursing homes, schools, mental health agencies, and hospices.

Employers are seeking nurses prepared at the bachelor's and graduate degree levels who can deliver the higher complexity of care. The baccalaureate in nursing curriculum includes a broad spectrum of scientific, critical-thinking, humanistic, communication, and leadership skills, including specific courses on community health nursing not typically included in diploma or associate degree tracks. These abilities are essential for today's professional nurse.

Edinboro University offers four options in the nursing field. The baccalaureate degree program in nursing (BS) is a four-year program that combines professional nursing courses and clinical learning experiences with general education requirements. Graduates of the program are prepared to function as professional nurses in a variety of health care settings.



The bachelor of science in nursing degree (BSN), is an innovative nursing program for individuals who already have a baccalaureate degree in another field. This program can be completed in three academic semesters of full-time study.

Edinboro also offers baccalaureate nursing degrees for licensed practical nurses (LPN) and for registered nurses (RN). Registered nurses who have a non-nursing baccalaureate degree can apply for the innovative nursing program for a second degree.

Keeping Up with the Tilmes

ince becoming president of Edinboro University in 1996, Dr. Frank G. Pogue has established himself as a leader in building community both locally and across the region. At the same time, the University has been transforming itself as a leader in technology. In the past six years, the campus has undergone an evolution in technology, bringing state-of-the-art communication and computer systems to the campus.



The **Integrated Information System** (Banner) was implemented campuswide, providing administrative applications such as registration, grades, finance, and development. The Student-Centered On-Line Transaction System (S.C.O.T.S.) enables students to register, add and drop classes, view their academic history and financial aid, and conduct other University business **at any time from anywhere** using computers that have access to the Internet. In addition, Touchnet credit card payment software has been added, allowing students to pay account balances via a secure web connection using Visa, MasterCard or Discover.



The Campus-Wide Information Network (CWIN), a multiphased plan for installing a structured cabling system for voice, video and data, is in its final stages. The installation of **fiber optic cable** to all University buildings is complete and increases network speed by as much as 100 times. The entire campus has been wired with a **new voice communication system** that offers faculty, staff and students a variety of advanced features including voice mail, caller ID, call waiting, call forwarding, speed dialing and three-way conferencing.



The newly constructed Arts and Sciences Center includes **cutting-edge teaching and learning facilities** with four auditorium-style classrooms, three technology-enhanced classrooms and a distance education classroom. All of the classrooms include a "smart podium," a specially equipped desk that enables faculty members to operate computer and audio-visual equipment from one location. The **distance education classroom** can link to learning sites world-wide, as well as the State System central office in Harrisburg and other State System universities for multipurpose videoconferencing.



A new **computer classsroom** was added in Doucette Hall to handle the volume from the existing art computer lab. A new **video projector** in the lab enables faculty to demonstrate design on Macintosh computers. Computers have been integrated into the students' methodology at almost all levels and phases of instruction. **Program upgrades and memory increases** were installed, making the lab more efficient and compatible with the new Macintosh classroom.





Technology in Cooper Hall was improved with the addition of a "smart station" in room 102 and an upgraded sound system.



The residence halls have received a **multimillion-dollar upgrade** giving students a state-of-the-art communications network. Each room is wired for digital cable television services, two high-speed data connections, and a new voice communications system featuring advanced telephone options and voice mail services.



Students can access **automated teller machines** throughout campus and within the town of Edinboro in conjunction with a PNC Bank account by using a Smart Card System. The smart card also provides access to a variety of services such as dining facilities, library resources and the fitness center. Students are provided **e-mail accounts** and **network storage** space for their academic files. Their e-mail can be accessed via a web browser at any time and from anywhere in the world. Their network storage can be accessed from any Windows-based computer connected to the campus network. Students can also create web pages in their account areas.



Academically talented high school students also benefit from the University's technology enhancements. Project ECHO allows **high school students** to take credit-bearing Edinboro University courses right at their high school through interactive videoconferencing technology or via the web. Now in its fourth year, this successful program exemplifies the University's commitment to educate students by introducing high school students to the college experience while allowing them to remain in the familiar surroundings and supportive environment of their high school. This program also allows them to make an easier transition from high school to college.

Certified teachers can earn an additional certification and/or a master's degree in special education from Edinboro University through its new and--carefully designed **web-based program**. The online M.Ed. degree can be completed in two to three years of part-time coursework and includes a three-week summer residency with students with disabilities at Edinboro University's Miller Research Learning Center.



A course management system, BlackBoard, has been adopted by many University faculty as a means of supplementing their courses. It allows teachers to post their syllabi, handouts, lecture notes, grades, and tests, and hold discussions – all in a **secure, online environment** that is easy to use. In addition, many



are being offered.

Several portable "Smart Classroom" units consisting of a computer, VCR, document camera, smart board and/or a projector or large screen display have been placed in academic buildings. This allows **high-tech presentations** in rooms that do not have smart classroom technology installed and can be used in the existing classrooms if the permanent equipment fails.

The University has developed a mobile classroom in Doucette consisting of 30 laptop computers, connected by a **wireless network**. The laptops are stored on a cart along with extra batteries and charging bays. When taken into a classroom, the laptops are distributed to students and the cart is plugged into a hardware port in the classroom, which acts as the access point to the campus network. One **mobile classroom** is in operation and the University is pursuing funding for additional mobile classrooms.

A new **high-speed DS1 link** between the main campus and Edinboro University in Erie – The Porreco Center has been installed and provides a point-to-point private line service operating at 1.544 megabits per second. The link is being used for carrying data traffic between the main campus and the Erie location. The link will




also be used for **high quality video conferencing** between locations, as well as linking the Erie staff and lab users with services and Internet capabilities provided from the main campus.

As technology continues to change at a rapid pace, the Technology and Communications staff continues to provide high quality service. As a result, a help desk, service guides, and a Faculty Learning Technology Center have been established.

Edinboro University has taken these and many more steps to ensure that its students have the best up-to-date facilities and services that can possibly be provided. It is no surprise to find Edinboro University listed among the top 200 most wired colleges and universities in the U.S. by Yahoo! Internet Life.




CLASSES CELEBRATE REUNION WEEKEND





Academy Hall was built for \$3,200 in 1857 by master carpenter Nathaniel C. Austin. It is the original schoolhouse for what is now Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. This treasured building has served the



University well, housing a variety of classes and offices over the years. The last tenants were the employees of the Alumni Office until the operation moved into the new Alumni House in February of 1996.

It is an Italianate style building measuring 40'x 50', two stories high. Each story is 14' high. There are two wings 10' x 24' used for entrances and stairways to the second floor. It sits on a stone foundation and is of weatherboard construction. The front and rear on each floor has double-hung bracketed cornice and rows of dentil under the eaves. Atop the roof there is a square cupola with bracketed cornice and crenulated molding. The building stands with a high degree of integrity, reflecting the school's commitment to its educational heritage. Except for key scroll arched windows in the cupola (which were boarded over sometime after 1965), chimneys removed circa 1885, and canopies added to the doors

sometime before 1939, the building has the same outward appearance it had in 1857. Overall, Academy Hall retains the essential characteristics that define the Italianate style.

The building reproduction is ceramic with an electric light. Talented artisans created the likeness of the building by viewing photographs. It will be a collector's item for anyone who loves Edinboro, but especially for those who spent time in Academy Hall (also known at different times through the years as Austin Hall, Literary Hall, Commercial Hall and Music Hall). Additional buildings will be offered in the future, creating a true collector's series.

2002 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD RECIPIENTS



Tony Buba, Class of 1971

After graduating with a B.S. in psychology, Tony earned his M.F.A. in film from Ohio University. It has been written that "Tony Buba is one of the most unique voices working in American independent filmmaking today." He produces and directs films,



and he has taught filmmaking at Edinboro University, Ohio University, the University of Southern Illinois-Carbondale, and Pittsburgh Filmmakers, Inc. In 2001 he was a visiting artist at the University of Wisconsin, Madison.

Tony has completed more than 20 films and currently has others in various stages of progress and development. His films have brought him more than 55 awards and citations at many documentary film festivals in the United States and abroad. Two films that stand out on his resume are Lightning Over Braddock: A Rustbowl Fantasy and Struggles in Steel-A Story of African-American Steelworkers. Both films were screened at the Sundance Film Festival and have appeared on television on the Sundance Channel, PBS and BRAVO. Other films have aired regionally on PBS, A&E and other cable outlets. Tony has received more than 30 grants from arts councils and foundations, including a Guggenheim Fellowship and a Rockefeller Fellowship. In 1998 he was recognized as the Pittsburgh Center for the Arts' Artist of the Year, the first filmmaker so honored. In 1999 he received the Alfred I. DuPont-Columbia University Award for Excellence in Broadcast Journalism.

Tony still finds time to serve as a juror at film festivals and teaching institutions; he has served on many panels and provides numerous presentations and interviews. He has received several community awards, has served on several boards, including the Braddock City Council (1996-2000), and maintains professional membership in the University Film and Video Association, the Association of Independent Video and Filmmakers, and Pittsburgh Filmmakers, Inc.



Mindy Ellis, Class of 1979

Mindy graduated from Edinboro summa cum laude with a bachelor of fine arts degree. She majored in wood furniture design and construction, and minored in painting. She then headed Colorado with her college sweetheart (the man who would later

be her husband) and worked for a furniture making company. They soon created their own wholesale business manufacturing furniture and accessories. In 1985 they returned to Pittsburgh with their young daughter and continued to operate Ellis' Country Charm. Mindy has also ventured into kitchen and casework design and custom framing, and served as the art director for summer recreation at Foster Elementary School during the summer of 1989. She was employed with Giffin Interiors and Fixtures and continued to design custom furniture and also did woodcarving.

Mindy is currently self-employed and since 1994 has created clay sculpture relief works for Matthews Bronze International of Pittsburgh. She has produced more than 100 projects a year, sculpting items like eagles, police badges, architectural and memorial plaques, angels and religious figures, including a 12-foot risen Christ. Probably Mindy's most publicly recognizable work is plagues for the inductions to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York, for 1995, 1998, 2000 and 2001.



Louis Cole Class of 1965

Louis Cole earned a B.S. in Education, with a concentration in mathematics. For a brief period he worked as a substitute teacher, but then accepted a position with Erie Technological Products. A short time later he was hired by Litton Industries



and served as the information services manager to develop the network to control production. From there he was recruited to Fairchild Industries in California. This company was a leader in the semi-conductor industry, and accepting this job was probably a move of fate for Louis. Later he took a position at Itel selling IBM compatible computers. National Semiconductor bought out Itel and placed Louis in charge of inventory management and control, and information services. This gave him experience as a general manager and a technology manager. In 1983 he was hired to serve

as president of CXI, and, under his direction, the company grew to \$20 million in revenue before being sold to Novell in 1996. Louis served as Novell's executive vice president for all operating divisions, but retired one year later, in his mid-40s.

Although his objective was to never work again, Louis found that he wasn't good at retirement. He began to work as a "free" consultant, so he had no obligations. He provided friends and former colleagues with an evaluation of companies they were interested in as potential investments. Four young software developers approached Cole with some ideas, and after discussion he decided to become the president of Legato Systems, Inc. Legato is now a worldwide leader in enterprise storage management software. From July 1989 to October 2000 Louis served as President, Chief Executive Officer and Chairman of the Board. The growth of the company was staggering. In just five years its revenue grew tenfold. Under his tutelage the company experienced its first public offering, and revenue grew to \$251.1 million.

Louis is currently serving as the Chairman of the Board at Legato and as Chairman of Netreon, Inc. Netreon is a privately held company that provides management software to make networked storage easier and more convenient to deploy and use. Louis also serves on the Board of Directors for Peerless Systems Corporation, Tricord Systems, Rogue Wave Software, and Storage ASP, Inc.

James T. Harris, Class of 1983

James Harris received a master's degree in educational administration. Prior to attending Edinboro, he earned a B.S. in Education from the University of Toledo, and later received a doctorate from Penn State University. James has also conducted post-



doctoral studies at Harvard University's Institute from Educational Management. Following a two-year stint in the high school classroom, as well as coaching football and wrestling, James came to Edinboro's graduate program. Serving as a graduate assistant with the football team, he developed the first campus-wide academic advising program for all student athletes. James' rise through higher education included positions at Penn State as a financial aid coordinator, and as the associate director for corporate and foundation relations at the beginning of a \$300 million capital campaign. He was recruited to the College of Mount Saint Joseph in Cincinnati, and from 1988-1991 James served as college vice president, chief advancement officer and as an adjunct professor.



From there James moved on to Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio, as the chief advancement officer charged with building an advancement program and serving as the president of the WSU foundation.

In 1994 he began his tenure as the 16th president of Defiance College in Defiance, Ohio. In 1999 he was named by the Templeton Foundation as one of the 50 top college presidents in the United States committed to character development in college students. James has been directly involved with many projects, leading student groups on service missions throughout the United States, Kenya, China and Jamaica. In the spring of 2000 he was invited to be one of the first college presidents in the country to publish his own personal reflections online on the "President's Public Diaries," a national issues forum concerning character education in higher education. In 1998 James was appointed as one of 14 people to the National Service Leader Schools Program; an initiative launched by President Clinton to encourage and foster high quality service-learning opportunities for America's students.

This summer Jim accepted a new challange as president of Widener University in Philadelphia.

Connie Kerr Vogt, Class of 1972

Connie graduated from Edinboro State College with a B.S. in special education and secondary English. She taught in the public schools for two years, but then left to open a full-day preschool and childcare center in nearby Erie. Since being



founded in 1975, the South Hills Child Development Center has served nearly 2000 families. In 1993 Connie was approached by McDowell High School about a program to provide training for child development classes. The Department of Education had recommended South Hills to McDowell, and to date more than 500 students have completed the program. The cooperative with McDowell is the only program recognized and approved by the state that is not associated with a vo-tech program.

South Hills is licensed as a private school through the Department of Education and Pennsylvania Department of Welfare. The school has been awarded national accreditation through the National Association for the Education of Young Children. South Hills has assisted more than 60 graduates of Edinboro University in starting their careers as teachers. Connie continually seeks candidates from her alma mater because she is so impressed with the knowledge that the early childhood and elementary education graduates have. Additionally, she works closely with the faculty to provide field experience to Edinboro students. Connie feels a strong loyalty to Edinboro University and says that her experience at Edinboro led her to the founding of South Hills.

Areta Kalogeras, Class of 1975

Areta earned a B.S. in music education. She went on to earn a master's equivalency in music education from Duquesne University, post-graduate credits at Duquesne and Penn State, and in-service credits through the Allegheny Intermediate



Unit. Areta took a position with the North Hills School District in August of 1975, teaching instrumental music classes. At the same time she accepted duties as the assistant marching band director. Currently, she teaches instrumental music, junior high band and orchestra, and senior high orchestra. Additionally, Areta has been the director of the marching band since June 1989.

North Hills High School is considered to have one of the premier music programs in the country. The marching band and orchestra make frequent appearances at the Music Educators National Conference meetings. They are continually in high demand, appearing at many local events, at Steelers and Pirate games and at Walt Disney World Resort. In 1993 the marching band was selected to represent Pennsylvania in the "Bicentennial Musical Salute to America", which celebrated the 200th anniversary of the founding of Washington D.C. as the nation's capital. They were also selected to march in the 54th Inaugural Parade Performance for President George W. Bush on January 20, 2001.

Areta is affiliated with many professional associations, including the Music Educator's National Conference, the Pennsylvania Music Educator's Association (District 1 Curriculum and Instruction Representative), the American Strings Teachers Association, the National School Orchestra Association, and the Women Band Directors National Association, just to name a few. Areta was nominated for a Teacher's Excellence Award (1994) and Disney's American Teacher's Award (2000). Areta finds time to remain an active musician, playing with the North Pittsburgh Philharmonic Orchestra, the Butler Symphony Orchestra and the Allegheny Bow and Strings Ensemble, among others. She is also a volunteer in her community.



Natural Sciences

Kathryn Bowles, Class of 1978

After graduating from Edinboro magna cum laude with a B.S. in Nursing, Kathryn later received her M.S. in nursing from Villanova University in 1990, and her Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1996. Kathryn spent the first several years as a clinical and



critical care nurse. From 1982-1986 she served as an assistant instructor at St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing, teaching critical care and adult health. She served as an independent critical care nurse contractor for four years, and after receiving her master's degree joined the critical care nursing staff at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital in Philadelphia. At the same time she served as the staff development coordinator and clinical instructor (joint appointment) at Thomas Jefferson Hospital and the College of Allied Health Services, and during 92-93 she was an instructor in adult health in the department of nursing. During the 93-94 school year she had a Writing Fellow with the University of Pennsylvania's School of Nursing. From 1994-97 she served as a teaching assistant and a research associate, eventually becoming a research assistant professor in 1997. Since 2001 Kathryn has been an assistant professor in the Foundational Science Division, Center for Gerontologic Nursing Science, Hartford Center for Gerontologic Nursing Excellence in the University of Pennsylvania's School of Nursing.

Kathryn has contributed to 12 databased publications, seven clinical publications, and a book chapter. She has been awarded nearly \$2 million for various research projects and, since 1996, has given more than 30 speeches and workshops. Her honors and awards include the Leadership in Nursing Research Medallion from the Villanova University School of Nursing Alumni Society (2001); the Lillian Sholtis Brunner Award for Innovative Practice in Nursing, awarded by the University of Pennsylvania Society of the Alumni (2001); and the Professional Practice Award from Thomas Jefferson University Hospital (1990). Current professional service activities include manuscript review for nursing research and serving as a Telehome Care Consultant for the Philadelphia Corporation for Aging.

Public Service

Yuri Graves, Class of 1990

Yuri graduated from Edinboro with a B.S. in geology. In 1993 he earned his M.S. in geology from Ohio University. Later that same year he entered the United States Coast Guard Officer Candidate School in Yorktown, Virginia. Following completion, Ensign



(0-1) Yuri Graves was assigned as the Special Projects Officer, Environmental Response Division at USCG Headquarters in Washington, D.C. During his two years there Yuri served as the USCG representative to the International Organization for Standardization and the American Society for Testing and Materials. He was a supervisor and program manager for the integration/use of a hand-held infrared camera for environmental response/search and rescue. He also authored a report to Congress regarding tanker safety and liability, and a 787-page statistical analysis and graphic presentation covering 25 years of oil, chemical and sewage spills. During this time Yuri received a USCG Achievement Medal and two Meritorious Team Commendation Ribbons.

From there he was stationed at the USCG Marine Safety Office in New Orleans, as a Lieutenant Junior Grade (0-2). As Team Leader, Commercial Vessel Inspector/Marine Casualty Investigator, he conducted investigations after marine accidents and inspected structural integrity, machinery, navigational equipment, firefighting and lifesaving appliances on offshore drilling rigs/platforms, tank ships/barges, freight ships/barges, cruise ships, offshore supply vessels and crew boats. In January 1998 Lieutenant (0-3) Graves was named Section Chief, Waterways Management Section, Port Operations Department in New Orleans. He supervised Marine Traffic Light Controllers, the 24-hour Emergency Response Operations Center and was the Senior Command Duty Officer and supervised a waterways management staff. He received the USCG Achievement Medal and Meritorious Unit Commendation Ribbon.

Since June 1999 Lieutenant Graves has been assigned to the USCG Marine Safety Office in Los Angeles-Long Beach. He is the supervisor of the USCG Marine Safety Detachment, Santa Barbara. In early 2000 Yuri led his unit in response to the Alaska Airlines Flight 261 crash off of Anacapa Island, and provided port security efforts in response to the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. Yuri has been selected to attend a fully funded USCG program to obtain a master's in environmental management at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas this coming fall.



The Edinboro University Hall of Fame inducted five new members into its Athletic Hall of Fame this spring at the 21st Annual Hall of Fame Awards Banquet. With the five new members, the Edinboro Hall of Fame membership grew to 140 inductees.

This year's honorees are former swimming standouts Stewart Dawson and Kara (Hopkins) Dawson, the first husband-wife inductees; former wrestling star Terry Kennedy; and a pair of former standouts in cross country and track and field, Audra Naujokas-Knapp and Michael Renninger.

Stewart Dawson ('89) ranks as one of Edinboro's finest male swimmers. He earned NCAA Division II All-American honors once in 1987-88, then was a two-time All-American in 1988-89. His first All-American honor came in the 50-yard freestyle in 1987-88, with a time of 20.79. He repeated the honor in that event the next year, lowering his time to a school-record 20.40, and, with a time of 45:82, earned All-American recognition in the 100-yard freestyle, as well. He still holds the school record in the 50-yard freestyle, and graduated as the record-holder in the 100-yard freestyle. His career accomplishments also include PSAC championships in both events. At the conclusion of his career, Dawson was named the co-winner of the Sox Harrison Award in 1989, presented to the top senior male athlete at Edinboro. A 1989 graduate with a bachelor's degree in

business administration, Stewart and his wife, Kara, currently reside in Gainesville, Florida, where he is employed as a resident adjuster with the GEICO Insurance Co. The couple has a son, Daniel, born last year.

Kara (Hopkins) Dawson ('91) enjoyed an outstanding career in swimming and volleyball, rating as one of the top Fighting Scot swimmers ever. She is a 15-time All-American. After earning All-American status three times as a sophomore – in the 200-yard freestyle relay (1:38.89), the 400-yard freestyle relay (3:36.92), and the 200-yard IM (1:54.21) – she went on to capture All-American six times in her junior and senior years. As a junior, she earned All-American honors in three individual events and three relays, with times of 24:34 in the 50-yard freestyle, 52:17 in the 100-yard freestyle, and 1:54.11 in the 200-yard freestyle, along with swimming legs of the 200-yard freestyle relay (1:36.43), 400-yard freestyle relay (3:33.13), and 200-yard IM (1:50.68). She earned All-American honors in the 50-, 100- and 200-yard freestyle events as a senior, along with the 200-, 400- and 800-yard relay teams. Dawson was also named an Academic All-American her junior and senior years. She holds school records in seven events, including the 50-, 100-, and 200-yard freestyle events. As a member of the Fighting Scot volleyball team, she earned first team All-PSAC honors in 1991.

She capped her career by being named the 1991 Nancy Acker Award winner, presented to the outstanding senior female athlete. Dawson earned her bachelor's degree in elementary education from Edinboro in 1991, completed work on her master's degree in 1992, then earned her Ph.D. in instructional technology from the University of Virginia in 1997. Residing with her husband and fellow inductee Stewart, along with son Daniel, in Gainesville, Florida, she serves as an assistant professor at the University of Florida.

Terry Kennedy ('89) ranks among the greatest wrestlers to compete at Edinboro. He was one of the pioneers of Division I wrestling at Edinboro, finishing as a two-time All-American. With 139 career wins, he ranks second all-time to Jason Robison, while his winning percentage of 79.8 places him in tenth place. He finished with a career record of 139-34-3, and his 25 career falls ranks sixth. Kennedy opened his career with a 27-11 record and 5 falls in 1984-85 while competing at 134 lbs., capturing the Eastern Regional championship. After red-shirting in 1985-86 as Edinboro made the move to Division I, he repeated as the Eastern Regional champion in 1986-87 with a 35-10-1 record and 6 falls while competing at 150 lbs. He remained at 150 lbs. in 1987-88, earning All-American honors with a fifth place finish. He concluded the season with a 43-6-1 record, the second-highest win total in school history, along with 10 falls. He was named the Outstanding Wrestler at the 1988 PSAC Championships. In his final season, Kennedy moved to 142 lbs., placing seventh at Nationals to repeat as an All-American. He finished with a 34-7-1 ledger with 4 falls. A 1989 graduate with a bachelor's degree in education and secondary social studies, he later completed work on his master's degree in school counseling at Cleveland State in 2000. He and his wife, Denise, have twins -Joseph and Kate – and reside in North Olmsted, Ohio. He currently serves as a guidance counselor at Westlake High School and remains active in coaching wrestling since his graduation from Edinboro.

Audra Naujokas-Knapp ('91) is another of the many standouts turned out by head coach Doug Watts in cross country and track/field. Her cross country career included an All-American performance in 1990, along with All-PSAC honors all four years and All-East Region accolades twice. She helped the Fighting Scots finish eighth nationally in each of her last three years. Her career accomplishments might have been even greater if not for a late season illness and injury as a senior. She earned All-PSAC and All-East Region honors as a freshman in 1988, then was an All-PSAC runner in 1989 as Edinboro won the PSAC championship and finished eighth in Division II. She gained All-American honors in 1990, helping the Fighting Scots again finish eighth. She earned All-PSAC and All-Region recognition. Edinboro won the East Region crown in 1991, and finished eighth nationally, while earning All-PSAC honors. Her track career is equally impressive, beginning with All-PSAC honors in the 1500 meters in 1988. She captured All-PSAC recognition in both the 1500 and 3000 meters in 1989, then made it a three-peat in the 1500 meters as a junior. She capped her career with a brilliant senior season, earning All-American honors in the

3000 meters at the Division II Indoor National Championships, then capturing All-American accolades in the 5000 meters at the Division Outdoor National Championships. In addition, Knapp was the PSAC champion in the 3000 meters and the runner-up in the 5000 meters. She earned her bachelor's degree in psychology from Edinboro in 1991, then completed work on her master's degree in psychology from Rochester Institute of Technology in 1995. She is married to Scott Knapp, who is also a former Edinboro cross country and track All-American. The couple and their son, Andrew, reside in Rochester, New York. She currently works as a school psychologist in the Brockport Central School system.

Michael Renninger ('88) is another of the standout runners led by head coach Doug Watts. He helped the Fighting Scots to three NCAA Division II national championships - in 1986, 1987 and 1988 – and is a two-time All-American in both cross country and track and field. He was recognized as the 1989 PSAC "Most Valuable Trackman" and was a four-time All-PSAC honoree in track. In cross country, he captured All-American honors in 1988 and again in 1989. Renninger is one of only 25 runners all-time at Edinboro to capture multiple All-American honors. In addition, he was a fourtime All-East and All-PSAC performer as a harrier. Renninger capped his career by being named the 1990 Sox Harrison award winner. A December 1988 graduate with a bachelor's degree in speech and hearing disorders, he went on to earn a master's degree in audiology from the University of Tennessee in 1993, and is currently enrolled in the doctoral program at Central Michigan University. He and his wife, Elizabeth, reside in Chattanooga, Tennessee, with their three children: Christopher, Morgan and Abigail. Renninger is employed by Starkey Labs Inc.

JOHN WILLIAMS SELECTED BY BRITISH COLUMBIA IN CFL DRAFT Running Back Taken in Fourth Round

Edinboro University senior John Williams was recently chosen by the British Columbia Lions in the fourth round of the 2002 Canadian Football League College Draft. The 6'0", 195 lb. tailback was the 31st player selected in the draft and joins former Edinboro University performers Jeremy O'Day and Jeff Traversy in the CFL. O'Day is on Saskatchewan's roster, while Traversy plays for Calgary.

Williams will follow his father John's footsteps into the CFL. After playing one season for the NFL's Chicago Bears, the elder Williams toiled for ten years as a member of the Hamilton Tigercats, Toronto Argonauts and Calgary Stampeders. He is a native of Millgrove, Ontario.

After playing two seasons at the University of Rhode Island, Williams transferred to Edinboro in 2000. He finished as the second-leading rusher with 483 yards on 140 carries with 3 TDs. He added 8 receptions for 39 yards. This past year, Williams rushed for a team-high 723 yards on 175 carries, with 4 TDs. He tied for

second in receiving with 14 receptions for 116 yards and one score. In addition, he averaged 30 yards on seven kickoff returns.

Williams topped the 100-yard mark on two occasions in 2001 and concluded his career with 1,206 yards rushing, ranking 16th in the all-time record books.

SWANK ANNOUNCES 2002-03 RECRUITING CLASS

Edinboro University women's basketball coach Stan Swank has announced the names of five recruits for the 2002-03 season. Local standouts and rivals, Jessi Montie, from McDowell High School and Maria DiVecchio, from Villa Maria Academy, will join Callie Iorfido of Ambridge High School and Tenesha Aden of Lakeview High School in the freshman class. Shaton Williams will also join the group after serving in the Army and spending two years at Contra Costa Junior College (1996-98).

Montie and lorfido will bolster the backcourt, while DiVecchio, Aiden, and Williams will add much-needed height to the frontcourt. "We're extremely excited about this recruiting class. There's a lot of great potential for the future and they have excellent character that will fit into our team concept," Swank said.

Montie, a 5'9" guard, was named the Metro League Player of the Year in 2002. She finished third all-time in scoring at McDowell with 1,122 points, ninth in steals with 214, 12th for career assists with 166, and 13th for rebounds, grabbing 355. She was named the team's Most Valuable Player as a junior and senior. "We're excited to recruit and have the Player of the Year in the Metro League attending Edinboro University," said Swank.

DiVecchio left Villa Maria as the all-time leading scorer, accumulating 1,382 points. The 5'11" forward was named the Metro League Player of the Year as a junior and finished as the second-highest scorer in the Metro League in both 1999 and 2000. DiVecchio led Villa Maria in scoring all four years, recording 380 points as a sophomore and 268 points as a freshman. She also led in rebounding both years, grabbing 152 boards as a freshman and 171 in her sophomore year. "We're thrilled to get another inside player in Maria DiVecchio. She'll definitely have impact on our inside game," said Swank.

lorfido will follow in the footsteps of her father as a Fighting Scot student-athlete. Her father, Rich, set tackling records as a linebacker for the Fighting Scot football team in the early 1970s, and her mother, Char, is also an Edinboro graduate. She will join former Ambridge High School teammate, Jodi Calderone, who just completed her freshman year as a Scot. The 5'5" guard was a threetime first team Class AAAA All-Section 3 selection, also earning second team honors as a freshman. The point guard finished her career as the all-time assist and steal leader at Ambridge, in addition to scoring 1,273 points.

She was named to the Pittsburgh Post Gazette West Fab Five and the Pittsburgh Tribune Review Terrific Twenty in her senior year after averaging 15.8 ppg., 6.5 assists per game, and 3 steals per game. Iorfido also stood out on the soccer field as a four-year starter and three-time first team All-Section member as a midfielder.

Aden will join Edinboro after a successful career at Lakeview High School. The 6'1" forward will add much-needed height for the Scots. In her senior season, Aden averaged 20.8 ppg., and she concluded her career as the second all-time leading scorer with 1,328 points. She also pulled down 13.0 rpg., finishing with a school record 1,010 career rebounds. Aden was named the Meadville Tribune Player of the Year. She earned first team honors in the French Creek Valley Conference, moving up from the second team in her junior year.

Williams will have some adjustments to make to the Edinboro climate, after being stationed in Hawaii and attending Contra Costa College in California. In the 1997-98 season, the 5'11 forward led Contra Costa with 440 points (14.7 ppg.), 11.2 rpg., and 100 steals. She also made 19 three's on the year and earned her way to the free throw line 197 times, making 119 of those attempts (60.4 percent), and finished with 13 blocked shots.

WRESTLING TEAM ANNOUNCES THREE MORE RECRUITS

Class of 2002 Includes Two State Champions

Edinboro wrestling coach Tim Flynn and his coaching staff has been hard at work this year on the recruiting trail, putting together possibly the best recruiting class since he took over the program in 1998.

"I'm excited. We had a good early signing," said Flynn. "Each recruit brings good accomplishments and a good work ethic. We did well with this class." Edinboro finished 14th at the NCAA Division I National Championships, making this the fifth straight year it finished in the top 20.

Flynn opened up the recruiting class this fall with three signings - Alex Clemsen of Moberly, Missouri, Nate Mumbulo of Bainbridge, New York, and Shane Mihalko of Freedom, Pa. A number of additional wrestlers signed this spring, including three of the top wrestlers in the country in their respective weight classes - Jeremy Hartrum from Easton, Pa, Jim Gibson from Hermitage, Pa, and Deonte Penn from Solon, Ohio.






Tate, Wu Also Receive Special Awards

The Edinboro Athletic Department handed out its three major awards at this year's Annual Hall of Fame banquet. All three honors are determined by the Edinboro coaching staff and athletic administration.

Doug Watts was recognized as the Coach of the Year for the sixth time, while Lisa Petsche was named the Nancy Acker Award winner, given to the top senior female student-athlete, and Josh Koscheck was honored as the Sox Harrison Award winner. given to the top senior male student-athlete. The Sox Harrison Award was first presented in 1956, while the Nancy Acker Award has been in existence since 1984.

In addition to the three yearly awards, the Edinboro University athletic department handed out three special awards. Men's basketball player Kenny Tate had his uniform number retired, while Koscheck and cross country runner YiMin Wu were presented with national championship rings. Koscheck captured the 2001 174 lbs. championship at the NCAA Division I Wrestling National Championships, while Wu was the 1998 cross-country NCAA Division II national champion.





HONORS POUR IN FOR BASKETBALL STANDOUT KENNY TATE

During the past three years the honors have poured in for men's basketball standout Kenny Tate. But one honor has eluded the senior, and that was NABC All-American honors. That is, until now.

After recently being named a first team Daktronics All-American for the second straight year, Tate can now add NABC All-American honors to his resume. He was voted to a



spot on the 2002 NABC/Pontiac All-America teams, garnering a spot on the first team. Voting is conducted among members of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

He joins Tyrone Mason, Edinboro's all-time leading scorer, as the only Fighting Scots to earn NABC All-American accolades. Mason was a first-team choice in 1995-96

The 6'3", 210 lb. senior completed his three-year Edinboro career with another brilliant season. He led the Fighting Scots both in scoring (18.6 ppg.) and rebounding (10.5 rpg.) for the third straight year. Thanks largely to his efforts, Edinboro finished with an 18-9 record and advanced to the PSAC Tournament. The forward shot 49.3 percent from the floor (199 of 404) and was 101 of 131 from the free throw line (77.1 percent). He led the Scots in steals with 42, finished second in blocked shots with 17, and was third in assists with 51. All three figures were the highest of his career.

The forward finished the season with 14 double-doubles and 14 games of 20-or-more points. In 81 career games, he accumulated 46 double-doubles and scored 20-or-more points in 40 games. While playing in just three campaigns, Tate departs as the fourth all-time leading scorer with 1,552 points, just one shy of Tim Smiley's third-place figure, and third in career rebounds with 843. In addition, he stands fourth in career field goals made (623), fifth in career field goals attempted (1,244), tied for fifth in free throws made (297), and third in free throws attempted (415). He holds the 9th, 11th and 13th-highest scoring totals for a season, and his season rebounding figures ranked 7th, 9th and 12th. Most importantly, Edinboro posted a 52-29 record in his three campaigns, finishing in first place in the PSAC West each of the last two seasons. Tate also became the first player in Edinboro history to score 500-or-more points in three different seasons.

This is the culmination of a great career," said head coach Greg Walcavich. "Just to be mentioned in the same breath with Tyrone Mason is high praise, but Kenny definitely deserves it. He improved every year he was here. I couldn't be happier that the rest of the coaches around the country agree with my assessment that Kenny is one of the best players on the Division II level."



KOSCHECK, ACE EARN ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

AT WRESTLING NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2002 NCAA Division I Wrestling National Championships proved two things. Iowa State's Cael Sanderson defined the word "perfection". The senior completed a spotless career, winning his fourth straight national championship and completing his career with an unblemished 159-0 record.

The second item hit much closer to home, but may have been just as noteworthy, if not on a national basis. Edinboro's Josh Koscheck epitomized "heart". The senior battled through a bulging disk in his neck all year, and in coach Tim Flynn's estimation, was about fifty percent going into Nationals. Koscheck battled through the pain to capture third



place. It made Koscheck Edinboro's first four-time All-American, and he joins a small list of wrestlers to accomplish the feat nationwide.

Koscheck concluded his career with a 128-17 career record, good for fourth in career victories. Edinboro recorded its sixth straight finish in the top 20, finishing 14th. Seven Fighting Scots qualified for Nationals, with two – Koscheck and Cory Ace – earning All-American status. It marked the fourth straight year with multiple All-Americans.

Ace, a junior, hardly looked like he would be around long after third-seeded Witt Durden of Oklahoma posted a 18-3 technical fall in his opening match. But he turned it around to win his next four matches. He concluded his quest for All-American status with a 10-8 triumph over Jeff Ratliff of Ohio State, the seventh seed. Unfortunately, Ace suffered an injury in that match, and was unable to compete in Saturday's seventh place match.

HAHESY INDUCTED INTO NCAA DIVISION II WRESTLING HALL OF FAME

Former Edinboro wrestler **Mike Hahesy** was inducted into the NCAA Division II Wrestling Hall of Fame. Hahesy was one of four individuals inducted on March 6 in Kenosha, Wisconsin, the site of the NCAA Division II National Championships.

Hahesy began his collegiate career at the University of lowa under legendary Dan Gable. He spent three years as a Hawkeye, going



20-10 as a reserve while sitting behind two national champions.

When Iowa assistant Mike DeAnna took over the Edinboro program, Hahesy followed. The native of Ely, Iowa, wrestled from 1984-86 for the Fighting Scots, compiling a 69-14-3 record. He captured the NCAA Division II national championship at 158 lbs. during the '84-85 campaign, finishing with a 36-6-1 record. In the '85-86 season, he placed second at Nationals with a 33-8-2 record. He also helped the Scots from a last place finish at the 1984 NCAA Division II Nationals to a fifth place finish in '85 and a second place finish in '86.

Hahesy was an Eastern Regional Champion both years at Edinboro, and was named the 1986 Sox Harrison Award winner, presented to the top senior male athlete. He graduated from Edinboro in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He was inducted into the Edinboro Hall of Fame in 1998.

D.J. SAMMEL REPEATS AS ALL-PSAC WEST BASEBALL SELECTION

Edinboro University junior **D.J. Sammel** has been named to the 2002 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Baseball First Team for the second straight year. Sammel earned a spot on the elite squad at third base after being named to the first team at second base a year ago.



Sammel, a 6'3", 215 lb. junior, finished the season with a team-leading .400 average, becoming the first Fighting Scot to hit that mark since 1998. He also led the Scots in hits (52) was tied for the team lead in doubles (8) while

Scots in hits (52), was tied for the team lead in doubles (8), while finishing second in RBIs (24) and stolen bases (7). He ranked fourth in the PSAC in batting. It also marked the third straight year Sammel has hit better than .300, as he boosted his career batting average to .355. He hit .325 as a sophomore and .333 as a freshman.

In all, Sammel had 17 multiple hit games, including five three-hit games. He owned an eight-game hitting streak, a seven-game streak, and a six-game streak.


