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PRESIDENTS' MESSAGES

This issue marks the start of what we hope will be one of the finest years at Edinboro University. On September 15 we will officially begin the yearlong observance of our Sesquicentennial, our 150th birthday. On that day we will celebrate our Fall Convocation and Founder's Day with special guest speaker Kyle Maynard.

Kyle is an inspirational intercollegiate wrestler at the University of Georgia. We've asked him to join us for Sesquicentennial Convocation and Founder's Day because of his amazing drive and determination to overcome adversity. A congenital amputee, Kyle was born with no arms or legs. As we celebrate the modern era of the University, during which we created our Office for Students with Disabilities, it is very fitting that we honor the accomplishments of Kyle Maynard. Edinboro University is ranked among the top ten universities in the nation for services for students with disabilities.

Why do we celebrate our Sesquicentennial? Sometimes, as we plan for the future, it is helpful to look back and see where we have been as an institution. As we study our history, we can see with the clarity of hindsight how our predecessors faced their challenges and followed their dreams to create the University we know today. We can also marvel how the University changed so quickly in such a short period of time.

For example, when our University was founded in 1857, slavery was very much a reality. In 1864, less than ten years after its founding, the enrollment at Northwestern State Normal School at Edinboro was at 585. Ninety years later, in 1954, the enrollment had barely edged up to a mere 636. It is incredible to imagine that after the Emancipation Proclamation, two world wars, the Great Depression, the invention of the light bulb, the airplane,

television, motion pictures, and many other achievements, Edinboro State Teachers College had barely changed in nearly a century. Then, starting around 1960, the school began to explode. Enrollment grew from 1,147 in 1959-60 to 7,340 in 1972-73. The campus more than doubled in size. From the construction of Centennial Hall in 1960, through the construction of Baron-Forness Library in 1976, the University built 27 new structures in 17 years. And now our dynamic University has a diverse student enrollment of nearly 8,000 students and 59 buildings on more than 600 acres in three locations – all reflective of our student-centered environment.

We celebrate the Sesquicentennial to recognize and honor the contributions of those thousands of people who came before us and transformed a modest, one-building campus into the largest,

comprehensive university in northwestern Pennsylvania. Fifty years from now, in 2056, our descendants will look back upon this year as a benchmark in the University's history. They will use our Sesquicentennial as a reference point to mark the institution's progress over the next 50 years. That's why we want to make the 2006-07 academic year the brightest moment in our 150-year history. We are a University on the move.

GRADUATION PATH PAVED WITH OBSTACLES

Tina Hammer is not your traditional college graduate. At 32, she is older than most of her classmates. She finished her schooling in three years, not four. And cheering her from home when she walked during commencement on May 13 at Edinboro University was the single mom's three disabled children.

College graduation is just another step forward for Hammer on what has been a long road. "It's a stepping stone," Hammer said. "It's just one more in other goals."

In a larger sense, Hammer represents one member in the Class of 2006. Like some area students, her path to that degree was a rocky one.

The bends in that road to graduation included putting herself through high school after the grandparents who raised her died when she was in 10th grade; a divorce a few years back; and the premature birth of quadruplets nine years ago. One of them died after just a few days.

Hammer learned to work around circumstances while she was an undergraduate. Financial worry kept her from school for a while and she wasn't even sure she would be able to finish once she started.

"If you want to do something, do it," Hammer said. "Fear is nothing but a barrier."

Then, after she started school, she felt guilty when she spent too much time in the attic doing homework while a home health aide looked after her daughters. So she established a second workstation in a living-room chair with her books spread out in front of her while "Barney" music played in the background.

Hammer also learned to set boundaries. She told her boyfriend that he had to understand that her attention first went to her children, then education, then him.

That discipline, along with the support of friends and family, is why she's now graduating with a 3.93 grade point average.

She learned that bends in a road are no reason to stop walking along it.

"If you want to do something, do it," Hammer said. "Fear is nothing but a barrier."

Hammer expects to become a clinical psychologist, specializing in deaf clients. She has already enrolled in Edinboro's psychology master's program. She expects to go for her doctorate as soon as she can.





K.C. Kantz has always been a talker

When Kantz was in fifth grade, he began deejaying for friends' parties. At 12 he conducted an interview with pre-recorded voices from the confines of his bedroom. His parents overheard and thought it sounded like a real radio talk show. Their discovery of their son's talent for talking and technical know-how led them to buy Kantz some heavy-duty sound equipment. He started emceeing more parties, weddings, bar mitzvahs, and dances, all as a seventh-grader.

Kantz continued doing DJ jobs throughout his high school career, and as a freshman at Edinboro University in 2003. he talked his way onto Edinboro's news network, E-TV. He also began working at the campus radio station, WFSE 88.9, announcing play-by-play for Edinboro basketball games. He even worked for the Erie Otters as a public address announcer.

Kantz, now a junior broadcastjournalism major, recently took the next step in his career as a professional communicator and talked his way to local stardom. Approximately one month ago, he was hired as weekend sports anchor for WSEE-TV35 (the Erie CBS affiliate).

"Everything really fell into place . . . I got lucky," Kantz said of his accomplishment. "Just picture working at a big-time local station already . . . still in college. It's amazing."

Kantz is taking on a lot of new responsibilities. He will be WSEE's go-to sports guy every Saturday and Sunday evening, both on the 6 and 11 p.m. newscasts. He is in charge of writing and editing the sports scripts, editing video highlight footage, and putting it all together for one five-minute spot, twice each night.

Kantz was scheduled to head to Miami next spring for an internship with FOX Sports, but since this new opportunity with Channel 35, he will be staying local and getting his valuable field experience close to home in Edinboro. Kantz said that WSEE has been so flexible and accommodating to his schedule and needs that it was too hard to pass up this break.

WSEE's sports director Gary Drapcho, who had heard and was impressed with Kantz's work on WFSE and at Otter's games, said he is happy to have him on board. Drapcho added that he had quite a few candidates apply for the job, and what stood out most to him about Kantz was the striking way that he presented himself and the quality of his voice.

"I think he has a lot of potential and will do very well," Drapcho said. "I hope he continues to do well and improve."

Kantz said his work at E-TV, WFSE, and within the Speech Communications Department at Edinboro has prepared him well for this test and the fast-paced environment of television journalism.

Dr. Frank Rybicki, a professor in Edinboro's Speech Communications Department and the advisor of WFSE 88.9, said he was more than pleased to hear about Kantz's being hired at WSEE, and very proud.

"K.C. is blazing the trail and will obviously be an example to all that follow in an 'on-air' broadcast capacity," Rybicki said. "His focus has always been on the 'performing' aspects of production work, and rightly so."

Kantz's family is extremely proud

K.C.'s father, Kevin ('73), said that being hired at WSEE is right up the alley of what his son wants to do, and K.C. is really good at it. Kevin and his wife, Barb ('94), taped K.C.'s first broadcast and have watched it about 20 times.

Kantz said his favorite part about his new job is just being able to bring information to the community and meeting all sorts of new people.

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania and WMGW-AM disc jockey Mike Pazdyk ('76) is the track announcer for the Daytona 500, where racing's greats gather once each year.

The small-town race fan is making his own mark at big-time NASCAR tracks. He regularly interviews the likes of Jeff Gordon – favored to win this year's Daytona 500 – and the Indy Racing League's Danica Patrick.

"I started as a small-town race fan, and that's how I think as an announcer – what would someone in the stands want to know?" he said.

This year's Daytona 500 was February 19, and Mike Paz, as he's been known since his local radio days, headed south to get the feel of this year's field.

His 40-year radio career has taken some exciting turns of its own, most recently from Watkins Glen track announcer to Daytona.

But it all started at Meadville High School where Paz announced Bulldog and Allegheny College sports as a teenager. He worked 14-hour days at Edinboro University's station and went on to a job as DJ at a Meadville disco club and on air at WMGW where he learned "all the fundamentals I still use today" from Dave Hanahan, now a Titusville radio personality.

Off the air, Paz has followed racing since a baby-sitting neighbor introduced him to cars at age three.

"That neighbor taught me different models of cars, and my interest in racing followed naturally from that. He created a little monster," Paz said.

"I remember watching Daytona when I was six, and at Meadville High School.

When other kids were taking about football and baseball, my heroes were A.J. Foyt and Mario Andretti."

"He had cars all over the place," said his mom, Genevieve Pazdyk, 75, of Meadville.


A teenage Paz accompanied a friend to Watkins Glen for his first live race. Watkins Glen is the upstate New York road course that hosts NASCAR Nextel Cup, Busch Craftsman Truck and SCCA races.

"I have been back every year since, except for 1982 and '83 when they were closed," he said.

He began volunteering at the track after moving to a Rochester, New York, radio station. When disco died and clubs closed, Paz tuned in to racing full time.

"I started pursuing auto racing with a vengeance," he said.

He worked at Spencer Speedway in Rochester from 1988 to 1992 and at

Lancaster Speedway near Buffalo from 1993 to 1999. While at Lancaster, he got his first big break, announcing at Watkins Glen.

Track managers liked his work, and suggested him to Daytona International Speedway during a winter meeting in Florida.

"I got a call to audition to announce the Pepsi 400 in July 1999, on the weekend of my birthday, the fourth of July," Paz said. "I thought, this is it. This is the shot I've been waiting for."

This year, Paz made his seventh annual trip from Rochester to Daytona International Speedway.

On the road from his home in Spencerport, New York, about 28 weeks a year, Paz admits he's made some sacrifices for his dream, never marrying among them.

"I've come close a few times, but I never caught one," Paz said of finding a wife. "And I don't have any little ones running around."

The sacrifices have been worth it. He's met and interviewed his favorite driver, Tony Stewart, a number of times, and has been on hand for some of racing's most memorable moments – good and bad.

"I was in Daytona when Dale Earnhardt died. I was standing in victory lane. Michael Waltrip had won. Someone came and told (Waltrip), and his face just drained."

There are more memories.

"I get to see the best young drivers come up," Paz said. "The best new young driver I've seen is Carl Edwards. I think he's the next big thing in NASCAR."


He also likes Reed Sorenson, who ran in the Nextel Cup for the first time in 2005.

Despite his success, Paz has one more dream to fulfill.

"I'd like to go to Meadville High School and tell the kids, 'You can do it,'" Paz said. "It doesn't matter where you're from, just how much you want to go after it."

Perseverance has been key to his long climb to the front of the race announcing pack.

"Never give up," Paz said. "I'm 52, and I left Meadville when I was 23."





The "Grove Approach"



As the surgeons, doctors and nurses surrounded her hospital bed, Karen Grove ('76) looked up and wondered what all the fuss was about; this operation seemed easy compared to her daily struggle with fibromyalgia. As it turned out, everyone was curious how Karen had recovered so quickly from having open-heart surgery.

The answer, as she states in a matter-of-fact way, is the "Grove approach." To understand what Karen is so adamant about, it is essential to go back to the beginning of the story. Born and raised in Edinboro, Karen had worked her way up to a sales manager position in a local cabinet company, Suddenly, in 1997, she became incredibly sick. "I was extremely tired, but couldn't sleep. I had flu-like aches, migraines, restless legs. Illness encompassed my entire body, and my entire immune system was compromised," she said. After two spinal taps and numerous other tests, the physicians finally came up with a diagnosis - fibromyalgia.

Karen immediately went to work researching the disease. She found out that fibromyalgia is a debilitating skeletal disease that strikes 1 in 27 people in America. The signs and symptoms can vary and depend on weather, stress, physical activity, and even the food that a person eats. Unfortunately, there is currently no cure.

The more Karen looked for information and alternative suggestions to help her cope with the diagnosis, the more she found there were very few answers. Most professionals simply recommended a full regimen of prescriptions to deal with the symptoms.

That didn't sit well with Karen. She decided to put her Edinboro education to work and made the study of fibromyalgia her primary focus. She eventually decided that Yoga was the best approach. After studying with a Yoga master, she developed a workout that emphasized making

a "mind-body connection" that was tailored to be a safe treatment for fibromyalgia patients. Her urge to teach came full circle as she earned her certificate to educate students to help them

alleviate some of the pain. She aptly named it "Fibroga."

But Karen didn't stop there. She found experts in the field of chiropractic and massage therapy. Then she made a phone call to her alma mater seeking a dietician who had experience with fibromyalgia. Kate Stiller, assistant professor in the nursing

department at Edinboro, earned her doctorate in fibromyalgia from Case Western University. The two joined forces in the battle against this disease.


Two years later, the results of their hard work are amazing. Where Karen once had frozen shoulders, she can now raise her arms high above her head. While she could only walk with a cane before, she is now very agile and even enjoys driving again. She is far changed from her picture in 1997 where she weighed a fragile 98 pounds.

Karen has now pooled her resources and teaches the Grove Approach at the Family First Sports Park in Erie several times a week. She spends half of the one-hour sessions leading her students in stretching exercises, while the other half is for special guests who concentrate on alternative strategies to promote good health.

Ultimately, Karen tries to offer a total package for sufferers to make their ordeal much less traumatic. She has written a selfhelp book called How to Lighten the Heavy Load of Fibromyalgia and a cookbook titled Get to the Core of Healthy Fibromyalgia Cooking. Her other book, Good-bye Bathrobe. Hello World, tells of her personal journey. Karen is now studying for her master's degree in human development.

While the rewards of her practices have changed her body dramatically, the success of her cutting-edge techniques has not changed her ultimate focus. "I really have a passion for this," she said. "I want people to narrow the gap on their bad days. I want them to be hopeful, joyful and peaceful."

KEEPING SAP FLOWING AND PANCAKES DRIPPING

Eric Randall's family has produced maple syrup for more than 150 years in the tree-covered hills between Buffalo and Rochester.

"And one of these years, we're going to get it right," Mr. Randall, dean of Science, Management and Technology at Edinboro University and fifth-generation maple producer, said on a cold, clear day as he checked the tubes and pans he uses to collect and boil the sap until it is transformed into the sweetest of breakfast toppings.

The maple syrup made here should not be confused with the mass-produced imitation available in grocery stores. Most name-brand cane- or corn-based syrups contain little if any maple and are legally forbidden to use the word "maple" in their name or description.

"There is no comparison," Randall said. New York is the nation's third-largest producer of maple syrup, trailing Vermont – which produces about one-third of the national output – and Maine. Production in 2005 fell almost 13 percent from the previous year, though New York's 1,485 "sugarbushes," as individual producers are called, still tapped 1.42 million maple trees to produce 222,000 gallons of syrup, according to the New York Agricultural Statistics Service.

Mr. Randall worries that the temperate winter could lead to a further drop this year. A warm snap in January tricked the trees' biological clocks, causing them to begin producing sap earlier than usual.

Then, cold temperatures kept the sap from flowing for several days during what should have been the height of the production season.

The erratic schedule forced Randall and his peers to come up with a contingency plan for "Maple Weekend," an annual event at which local producers invite the public to their sugar shacks to watch the syrup being made. Without sap, producers would have had to boil water with some syrup added to create the steam and smell involved in the painstaking process.

But a burst of ideal weather – sunny days with temperatures in the high 30s and nighttime lows near 20 degrees – squeezed out plenty of sap for most of the 400 producers who opened their shacks to the public. About 1,000 people visited his operation, Randall said.

Mr. Randall, 59, has witnessed, and taken part in the modernization of maple production. As a boy, he watched his grandfather and uncle drop rows of wooden buckets in a stream so they would swell, compressing cracks in the wood, before hanging them from trees.

Buckets are little more than decoration these days, replaced by tubing that draws the sap out with the aid of a vacuum pump. Randall uses a state-of-the-art stainless steel boiling system to evaporate the water and concentrate the sugar in the sap. It sits on top of an iron arch that dates to the 1940s and holds the fire that burns

about one-quarter of a ton of wood every 20 minutes.

Most of the sap, with a sugar content of about 2 percent, runs directly from the trees into a holding tank and then is forced through a reverse-osmosis machine that filters out excess water and impurities. The process raises the sugar concentration in the sap to 6 percent and reduces the amount of sap needed to make a gallon of syrup to 15 gallons from 43. The sap is then boiled, further increasing the sugar percentage.

One by-product of the filtering process is the nearly pharmaceutical-grade distilled water left behind, according to Randall. He uses the water to clean the pans and other equipment after each boiling. Such fastidiousness marks another modern touch in the process.

"My grandfather would use stream water to wash the evaporator at the beginning of the season and again at the end," said Randall whose son, Jesse, returned home from Michigan where he is working toward a doctorate in forestry at Michigan State University, to help prepare for Maple Weekend.

Randall said he usually produces about 250 gallons with the sap drawn from about 1,000 trees during a typical season, though this year's weather could cut that output by up to 40 percent.

Production usually runs from mid-February until the end of March. During that time, he makes a weekly commute from his job at Edinboro University to spend weekends in the sugar shack.




EDINBORO AREA HISTORICAL SOCIETY SEEKS ALUMNI SUPPORT

Last year, under Bruce Gallery director John Bavaro, assistant professor of art, the Gallery kicked off its season with a very popular show that set the stage for its current offering of the Distinguished Alumni Series.

The first installment of the series was a solo exhibition by Pittsburgh-based Edinboro alumna Patricia Bellan Gillen, a distinguished professor at Carnegie Mellon University. Originally we wanted to make this a commemorative 30-year celebration of Ms. Bellan Gillen's graduation from Edinboro. We had such a positive response to the work that we decided to institute something on a more permanent basis.

With the art department being the largest department on campus, we obviously have many "distinguished" alumni. I'm continually surprised when I meet people in academia or in professional fields, and I find out they have an Edinboro connection. Ideally, we would love to have two galleries going at the same time, one that maintains an open call to entries for national entries and another that shows alumni exhibitions. This, however, is logistically impossible.

The mission of the gallery is to provide students with exposure to the most current and nationally recognized artists that we can


attract. We've been really proud of our track record and the caliber of artists that we've brought in over the years.

For the 2006-07 season, the Board has decided to invite Venango-based artist Gary Spinosa (MFA, 1998) to have a retrospective for the Distinguished Alumni Series. Spinosa is well known locally. His iconic reliquaries, mummy forms and totems have often straddled the line between the work of an intuitive outsider artist and a highly trained sculptor. He has national gallery representation and pieces in many collections. We saw a great opportunity to use the Bruce Gallery as the platform for a retrospective of a large body of his work which rarely (if ever) has been assembled in one place.

We hope to cultivate a much closer relationship with our alumni and hope that the new Distinguished Alumni Series will set the ball rolling on this process.



WE HEAR FROM OUR GRADS . . .

The following e-mail was sent to President Pogue by Dolores Jimerson, class of 1990

I am compelled to write you this morning to introduce you to my brother, Alan Jimerson, Dear Dr. Pogue, whose last day of work for the University is tomorrow. My father, Alfred Jimerson, worked for the University when it was a college. He died in 1986 from cancer at age 48. My brother and I were in elementary school when my dad started working there. My brother began working in housekeeping/maintenance a month prior to my father's passing. Twenty years have gone by since Alan started working at Edinboro. During this time, I was

a student under my father's tuition waiver. I am very grateful for this gift. I graduated in 1990 with my bachelor's degree in social work. I would not have gone to school had it not been for my brother Alan. After our dad died, we were all so sad. I was going to get a job to help support our family. Alan contacted my father's former boss, Dolores Mortimer, and asked her how I could go to school. That was all it took to find out that, even though my dad had just died, I could still go to school with the waiver. I do not think I would be the person I am today if not for this one event. I have since gone on to get my MSW and am now making a difference in American Indian communities at a national level.


Alan is 42 years old and is dealing with a malignant brain tumor. Edinboro has been very supportive of his illness since he was first diagnosed in July 1996. Alan had to switch jobs to accommodate his abilities. He has been with OSD repairing wheelchairs. He told me how this was more than a job to him. Edinboro brought so much to our family. It always kept him connected to the father he lost too soon in life. It reminded him of his sister who used to ride to work with him at 5:00 a.m. It will always remind him of the friends he made and the many students he has known over the years.

I hope our family's ties to Edinboro do not come to a close with Alan's parting. I have a nine-year-old nephew, Alan's son, who I dream will someday obtain an education like his aunt did at Edinboro, and obtain the skills and confidence he will need to make changes in his world.


The scholarship will be awarded annually to a freshman pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Education, with preference given to students graduating from Pittsburgh city schools.

COACH FRED J. CARO SCHOLARSHIP IN MEMORY OF DENNIS BAKER

Dennis Baker was an enthusiastic and competitive wrestler for four years (1972-76). He was an "upper weight" young man who was willing to take on anyone, regardless of size, and is fondly remembered as being happy, respectful and cooperative, but scrappy and very competitive. Sadly, Dennis was killed in a 1979 automobile accident.

Fred J. Caro, Edinboro University wrestling coach for 21 years, first took the lead to memorialize Dennis with a wrestling scholarship for Edinboro University in 1979. The scholarship has not yet reached the endowment level, and Fred recently led an initiative to ask for support of the scholarship from friends, family and colleagues.

After hearing from Fred, Don Kaufman, Class of 1966, was more than happy to contribute. But Don also wanted to honor Fred and what he meant (and still means) to all the wrestlers whose lives he touched during his tenure at Edinboro. That's why he proposed a name change:

The Coach Fred J. Caro (1963-84) Scholarship in Memory of Dennis Baker.

Don wrestled his first three years in college and had the pleasure of spending two of those three years under the guidance of Coach Fred Caro. In the words of Don, "Fred was the consummate coach – a blend of teacher, mentor, psychologist, and no-nonsense boss. Long after I graduated, I still thought of him as 'Coach,' but I was privileged to also consider him a friend."

In order for the scholarship to reach the endowment level, \$8,000 in additional funding is required, and Don Kaufman has pledged \$4,000 as a challenge grant! Don is convinced this group can raise another \$4,000, thereby honoring both Dennis and Fred, as well as the era in Edinboro wrestling that laid the groundwork for the current highly-regarded Division I wrestling program.

Caro (1963-84) Scholarship in Memory of Dennis Baker will be awarded to an incoming freshman or upper-class student who is a member of the Edinboro University wrestling team and meets minimum NCAA requirements. On September 1, 1954, Thomas R. Miller was appointed president of Edinboro State College. According to a 1954 article in the student newspaper about the new president's wife: "Mrs. Miller enjoys traveling and ice skating. Although kept busy caring for a family and home, she spends a lot of her spare moments knitting and reading. Naturally those spare moments are few, for, as Dr. Miller's wife, her social obligations are numerous. A gracious hostess and lively guest, Mrs. Miller is nevertheless first of all a wife and mother, the heart of a close-knit family."

ASSOCIATION OF FACULTY AND STAFF OF COLOR SCHOLARSHIP



In support of retention efforts at Edinboro University, the Association of Faculty and Staff of Color has established a scholarship fund to assist underrepresented students. The Association of Faculty and Staff of Color is composed of administrators, faculty and staff who are committed to enhancing the quality of life for students and employees of color.

The award will be made

annually to a full-time student pursuing his or her first bachelor's degree, with preference given to a student of color. The recipient must have a sophomore status with a minimum grade point average of 3.0 or better and may be required to submit an application and essay responding to a topic selected by the Association of Faculty and Staff of Color.

He was a senior airman in the Air Force National Guard-171st Air Refueling Wing and was pursuing dual degrees as a full-time student at Edinboro, majoring in chemistry/forensic science and secondary education. His degree was awarded posthumously at the Spring 2006 Commencement Ceremony.

Tragically, Kevin and his fiancee, Lindsey Myers, were involved in a plane crash on August 26, 2005, along with their best friend, Jim Regal, the pilot of the private aircraft. They were returning home after circling Niagara Falls where Kevin had proposed to Lindsey. Edinboro University has planted two blossoming trees near Mallory Lake in memory of Kevin and Lindsey.


distinguished themselves by their exemplary service, dedication and commitment to Big Brothers Big Sisters.





NINE NEW MEMBERS INDUCTED INTO ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

The Edinboro University Athletic Hall of Fame celebrated its 25th year with the induction of nine new members on Saturday, April 29, bringing the total membership to 160 inductees. In addition to the eight student-athlete inductees, the Athletic Hall of Fame inducted Foster Diebold, former Edinboro University president, as the recipient of the Distinguished Service Award.

MIKE KEGARISE ('93) ranks as one of Edinboro's all-time greatest offensive linemen. The 6'6", 301 lb. four-year starter at offensive tackle helped Edinboro go 33-11-1 during his four seasons. A native of Milan, OH, he earned first team

Associated Press Little All-America honors in 1993 and was a third team Football Gazette All-American. The year before as a junior he was a third team Associated Press Little All-American selection, one of just four Fighting Scots to earn the honor more than once. He also earned Football Gazette honorable mention All-American honors in 1992. Kegarise was a first team All-PSAC West choice in 1992 and '93. In addition to competing in football, he wrestled for the Fighting Scots. Following the completion of his Edinboro career, Kegarise signed as a free agent with the Seattle Seahawks, but a knee injury ended his hopes of continuing his professional career. He received his bachelor's degree from Edinboro in elementary education in 1993.



GEORJ LEWIS ('93 AND '98) enjoyed an outstanding career for the Edinboro football team while playing in the secondary. A four-year starter, Lewis helped Edinboro to a 32-12-1 record and three NCAA Playoff berths during that time. He was a two-time

first team All-PSAC West selection and a two-time All-American. As a freshman in 1989, he helped the Fighting Scots finish 8-3 and win the PSAC West championship. He was named Edinboro's Freshman of the Year while totaling 45 tackles, five passes broken up and a pair of interceptions. He intercepted two passes, as well, in 1990, while recording a career-high 68 tackles and breaking up six passes. He was a first team All-PSAC West choice and a third team Football Gazette All-American in 1991. In 1992, Edinboro made it back to the NCAA Playoffs, finishing with an 8-2-1 record. Lewis finished with 66 tackles, three interceptions and three passes broken up. He was named a first team All-PSAC West honoree and was a Football Gazette honorable mention All-American. Lewis graduated from Edinboro in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in accounting, then earned his master's degree in counseling in 1998. He is currently working on his doctorate. After working at Edinboro for a period of time, Lewis moved on to Georgia Southern University, where he is the Dean of Students.



CARL LEONARD ('96) rates as one of the all-time great runners in Edinboro cross country and track & field history, quite an honor given the long list of standout runners. He was named the Sox Harrison Award winner in 1997, recognizing his

accomplishments in track & field the year before. He ran for head coach Doug Watts from 1992-96, leading Edinboro to four

straight PSAC Championships in cross country. He was a threetime cross country All-American (1992, '93, '94), one of only ten Edinboro runners (male or female) to earn the honor three-ormore times. He won the PSAC individual championship in 1992. '93, and '94, and was a four-time All-PSAC and All-East Region performer. In track & field, Leonard earned All-American honors four times. That included three times in the 5,000 meter run (1994, '95 and '96), and once in the 10,000 meter run (1996). In fact, in 1996 he finished as the national champion in the 5,000 and was the runner-up in the 10,000. He was a seventime PSAC champion in track. Leonard was a multiple PSAC Athlete of the Year in both cross country and track & field, and was also named the NCAA Division II East Regional Runner of the Year several times. He still holds the school record in the 1,500 meters. Leonard graduated from Edinboro in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in Health & Physical Education. He currently serves as a health and physical education teacher at Luis Munoz Marin Middle school in Cleveland, OH, where he is also the head track coach and head soccer coach. He has remained an active runner, sponsored by Saucony (1999-01) and Puma (2001-03), winning numerous road races around the country, including a sub 4-minute mile in Pittsburgh in 1997.



GENNARO "JIM" MANOCCHIO ('88) is

considered by long-time head coach and fellow Edinboro Hall of Fame member Doug Watts as one of the group of outstanding runners in the '80s who began the storied tradition of Edinboro cross country.

Manocchio became a vital part of a team that won NCAA Division II national championships during his junior and senior seasons after runner-up finishes his first two years. He concluded his career as a three-time All-American, one of only seven men's cross country runners to earn more than two All-American certificates. He earned All-PSAC honors his final three seasons, and was also a six-time All-PSAC honoree in track & field. Manocchio was a three-time qualifier for the NCAA Track & Field National Championships. He graduated from Edinboro with his bachelor's degree in Health & Physical Education in 1988, and earned his master's degree from the University at Buffalo in 2003. He currently serves as a health teacher at Jamestown (NY) High School and is also the school's athletic trainer. He has been the head A.T.C. for track & field at the Empire State Games since 1992.



MELANIE (SKOLNY) MOODRY ('95) starred as a member of the Edinboro volleyball team. Due to the lack of statistics at that time, many of her accomplishments from a record book standpoint are not available. However, her impact on the

volleyball program's success is clearly evident. She earned All-PSAC honors all four seasons. In 1994, not only was she was a first team All-PSAC West selection, but was also an AVCA All-Atlantic Region pick. She was named the PSAC Tournament MVP and was a member of the NCAA Division II Atlantic Region All-Tournament Team. She led the team in kills (424), hitting percentage (.327), adding 354 digs and 105 total blocks. Edinboro won the PSAC Championship in 1994. Moodry was named the Nancy Acker Award winner in 1995. As a freshman in 1990, she was chosen the PSAC Rookie of the Year and was a first team All-PSAC choice at outside hitter. She was also named to the AVCA All-Atlantic Region Team. Edinboro had a 33-4 record in 1990. The Fighting Scots finished 29-5 and were runners-up in the PSAC in 1991, with Moodry once again an All-PSAC and All-Atlantic Region honoree. She finished second in Division II in hitting percentage. In 1992, she was recognized as the PSAC West Player of the Year and made it All-PSAC and All-Atlantic Region for the third straight year. Moodry graduated from Edinboro in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in nursing. She is currently employed as a registered nurse at Lake East Hospital in Painesville, Ohio.



SCOTT RUPERT ('95) was a multiple sport standout for the Fighting Scots, excelling both in baseball and football. In baseball, Rupert played shortstop for the Fighting Scots. He holds numerous school records, including the career

record for batting average (.411), runs (152), RBIs (177), doubles (66), home runs (30), walks (88), and slugging percentage (.894). He was a two-time ABCA All-American, earning third-team honors as a junior and senior. He his over .400 both seasons, with a .425 average in 1995 as a senior. Rupert finished with 16 doubles, a school-record 16 home runs, and also set school records for runs (63), hits (74) and RBIs (71) that season. Edinboro finished with a 30-22 record. In 1994, the Fighting Scots enjoyed the best season in school history with a 35-18 ledger, winning the PSAC West Championship with a 17-3 regular season record, and ending the year ranked 16th nationally. Rupert was named the PSAC West Player of the Year after finishing with a .414 average, with a school-record 29 doubles and 10 home runs. He also set new school standards for walks (40) and slugging percentage (1.102). He led the nation in doubles as a junior. He was a first team All-Atlantic Region selection as a junior and senior. Rupert hit .398 as a freshman and .387 as a sophomore. In football, he served as the team's placekicker from 1991-94, making 18 of 33 field goals and 117 of 140 extra points for 171 points. He ranks ninth in career scoring and is sixth in career field goals made and attempted. He led the team in scoring in 1993 with 58 points, making 5 of 11 field goals and 43 of 45 extra points. In addition, Rupert handled the punting chores as a senior, averaging 38.8 yards on 21 punts. He graduated from Edinboro in 1995 with a bachelor of arts in specialized studies.



TOM SHIFFLET ('95) ranks as one of the all-time great Edinboro wrestlers, earning All-American honors three times and being named the Sox Harrison Award recipient in 1995. Following a seventh place finish at 142 lbs. in 1992, he

placed sixth in 1993 and third in 1995. He finished with a 31-5 record in 1994-95 and was named the EWL Wrestler of the Year.

In 1992, Shifflet was voted both the EWL and PSAC Freshman of the Year after finishing with a 32-13-1 record. In the process he became Edinboro's freshman All-American. The following year he went 31-8 and once again earned All-American honors. He won the PSAC championship at 150 lbs., then went on to place second at the EWL Tournament at 142 lbs. Shiflett missed the first half of the '93-94 campaign with a back injury that eventually led to surgery, before returning to go 15-5. He won the PSAC championship and once again placed second at EWL's. He won his third PSAC crown as a senior and was second at EWL's. He concluded his career with a 109-31-1 record, currently ranking 15th in career wins. He is 14th in career winning percentage at 77.7 percent. Shifflet served as the wrestling coach at North Carolina-Greensboro before accepting the head coaching position at Hofstra in mid-May. He was recently inducted into the EWL Hall of Fame. He graduated from Edinboro in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education.



HENRIETT "HENI" (TOTH) SAAND ('96) was a standout for the Edinboro swimming team in the mid '90s. The winner of the 1996 Nancy Acker Award as Edinboro's Senior Female Athlete of the Year, she was an eight-time All-American during her

career. That included earning All-American honors in the 100-yard butterfly (4th), the 200-yard butterfly (13th), the 100-yard breaststroke (10th) and the 200-yard IM (11th) in 1993-94. In 1994-95, she was an All-American in the 100-yard butterfly and 200-yard IM while helping Edinboro finish 22nd at Nationals. She finished as a three-time All-American in 1995-96, setting the school record in the 200-yard IM. She stills holds school records in the 100-yard butterfly (57.65) and 200-yard butterfly (2:10.55). Toth Saand turned in numerous impressive performances at the PSAC Championships, including a first place finish in the 100-yard butterfly and 200-yard IM in 1995. Toth Saand received her bachelor's degree in communications from Edinboro in 1996. then completed work on a master's degree in communications/ journalism from Shippensburg in 1998, and another master's degree in environmental studies from Shippensburg in 2000. She has been working at Shippensburg since 2000 as an IT specialist with the Department of Computer Sciences.



FOSTER F. DIEBOLD is the second recipient of the Athletic Hall of Fame Distinguished Service Award, presented to an individual who didn't necessarily compete in athletics, but still made a major impact.

Diebold served as president of Edinboro University for 17 years, from 1979 to 1996. That marked the second-longest tenure by a president in the institution's history, and along the way he had a profound impression on the athletics program. He oversaw the move of Fighting Scots athletics from NAIA to NCAA Division II status. That was followed by the elevation of the wrestling program to Division I status in 1986-87. His support was essential in the implementation of summer camps and subsequent scholarship program. During his tenure, Edinboro athletic teams won four national championships and 33 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference titles.

Unfortunately, both teams also went down to defeat in their respective East Regional quarter final contests, but not without strong showings.

The Edinboro women's team, seeded eighth in the East Region, faced top-seeded Charleston (WV), the host of the regional, on March 10. Charleston came into the ranked third in Division II, but had its hands full against the Fighting Scots before eventually claiming a 71-62 win.

The men's team also ended the year at 21-10 after dropping a 103-89 decision to West Virginia State in Wilson, NC.



LOU ROSSELLI JOINS OHIO STATE COACHING STAFF

Edinboro University assistant wrestling coach Lou Rosselli has accepted a position at The Ohio State University.

"It's a great opportunity at Ohio State," Rosselli

said. "It was tough to leave behind the athletes and the staff here. We worked very hard to accomplish what we did. It was time for me to take on some new challenges."

Rosselli had been associated with Edinboro wrestling since 1988 when he joined the Fighting Scots as a freshman out of Royalton-Hartland (NY) High School. He would go on to become a two-time All- American for the Fighting Scots, placing fourth at 118 lbs. as a junior in 1991, then earning a third place

finish at 118 lbs. in 1993. He was selected the Outstanding Wrestler at both the PSAC and EWL Championships as a senior after winning individual titles in both events. He was recognized as the EWL Freshman of the Year in 1989.

The Middleport, NY native graduated from Edinboro with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1993. That same year he was named Edinboro's Sox Harrison Award winner, presented as the top senior male athlete. He departed with a 136-25-4, and still ranks third in career wins. Rosselli was a three-time PSAC champion. Off the mats, he earned Academic All-American honors.

Rosselli then joined the Fighting Scots as an assistant coach, and this past season completed his 11th term. In addition to his coaching career, Rosselli established himself as one of the top lightweight freestyle wrestlers in the United States before retiring after the 2000 Olympic Trials. He won the U.S. National Championships in 1995, '96 and '99, earning a berth on the 1996 U.S. Olympic Team with a dramatic victory in the finals of the Olympic Trials.

Rosselli has remained active in international wrestling as a coach, Earlier this year he was named the coach of the 2006 U.S. Freestyle World Team, and last summer he served as one of the coaches for the United States team in the 2005 World University Games. Three of his six wrestlers earned gold medals.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM ENJOYS FIRST PLAYOFF RUN SINCE '98

From the beginning of the 1998 season to the start of the 2006 PSAC Playoffs, the Edinboro University women's basketball team had won 129 games. But the one thing missing was a postseason win.

That changed this year. After making the PSAC Playoffs for the sixth time in the last seven years, coach Stan Swank's team went on the road and upset Indiana (Pa.), 65-54.

The Fighting Scots enjoyed the experience so much that they went back out and handed Kutztown a 77-46 defeat in the semifinals of the PSAC Championships.

That left Edinboro to face nemesis California (Pa.) in the PSAC title game. The Vulcans have ruled the PSAC in recent years, and that was certainly the case against Edinboro, as the Fighting Scots had lost 12 straight games to Cal. That included a pair this year. To make matters worse, the Vulcans were hosting the tournament. Edinboro, meanwhile, was making its first appearance in the PSAC championship game since 1998.

Tied at 55-55 with 3:06 remaining, Agnes Michalow gave the Scots a two-point lead with a layup. Following a Cal miss, Kelly Calderone came down and made two free throws with 1:34 to play for a 59-55 lead. They would be Edinboro's final points as it turned out.

Edinboro never trailed in its semifinal win over Kutztown, jumping out to a quick 20-8 lead with 11:58 remaining in the first half. Edinboro scored the first two points of the second half, as well, making it an 18-0 run in all. Only one time in the second half would the lead dip below 20 points, and that was 19 at 47-28. The Scots responded with five straight tallies. The lead grew to as big as 36 points at 75-39 with 2:35 to play.

THREE RUNNERS EARN **ALL-AMERICAN HONORS AT TRACK** NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS





The Edinboro University outdoor track and field team finished with three All-Americans at the NCAA Division II Outdoor Track & Field National Championships in Emporia, Kansas. Julie Nemergut started off the competition with an All-American performance in the 10,000 meter run, and Kelly Richards and Rachael Lanzel followed with All-American performances on the final

Nemergut placed seventh in the 10,000 meter run with a time of 37:23.05. The senior previously earned All-Americans honors in the same event in 2004, finishing eighth that year.

Lanzel earned her All-American certificate with an eighth place finish in the 5,000

meter run. The sophomore, making her second appearance at Nationals, posted a time of 18:13.58.

Richards entered the national championships with the third-best time in Division II in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, and that's exactly where she finished in the finals. The senior posted a time of 11:03.00.

Michele Kelly was the fourth Fighting Scot to qualify for Nationals. Kelly finished sixth in heat number two in the 1,500 meter run (4:55.17) and failed to qualify for the finals. Edinboro finished 24th.

2005 FOOTBALL GAME PROGRAM RATED BEST IN THE NATION

The 2005 Edinboro University football game program was rated the best in Division B by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Division B includes NCAA Division II institutions.

This marks the second straight year the program has been rated the best in Division B. The program is edited and produced by Edinboro Sports Information Director Bob Shreve.

WHEELCHAIR BASKETBALL TEAM FINISHES FOURTH AT **COLLEGE NATIONALS**

The Edinboro wheelchair basketball team earned a fourth place finish at the College Nationals in Champaign, IL. Coach Jim Glatch's Fighting Scots ended the year with a 19-15 record after defeating Arizona, 76-37, in the quarterfinals, before suffering a tight, 59-53, loss to Texas-Arlington, the top seed, in the semifinals. In the third place game, Illinois defeated the Fighting Scots, 65-54.

A pair of Fighting Scots earned All-American honors. Jose Leep repeated as a first team All-American, while Mike Looney was recognized as a second team All-American. In addition, Looney was chosen an Academic All-American.

CARMICHAEL, IORFIDO NAMED TO ALL-PSAC WEST SOFTBALL TEAM

The Edinboro University softball team had a pair of representatives on the 2006 All-PSAC West softball team, Leanne Carmichael and Mandie Jorfido were accorded second team honors, as the duo helped the Fighting Scots finish with a 15-23 record.

Carmichael, a junior first baseman, started and played in all 38 games for the Fighting Scots. She hit .250 with 10 runs scored, along with three doubles and a triple. Carmichael finished fourth on the team with 12 RBIs and was fifth in base hits with 27.

lorfido, a sophomore, spent most of her time behind the plate but also saw time at shortstop and second base. She was selected as a utility player. Iorfido finished as the team's leading hitter for the second consecutive season with a .343 average, collecting 35 hits in 102 at bats. lorfido finished with eight doubles, ranking eighth in the season records.
