## PRESIDENTS' MESSAGES



As we expected, the University's yearlong celebration of its Sesquicentennial has generated much attention and good will. Two recent developments have further exemplified the extraordinary nature of Edinboro University Alumni.

We were delighted to learn in early December that *Today's Facility Manager*, a national trade

magazine reporting on facility management at major corporations and institutions, named our Associate Vice President for Facilities, William Coleman ('95), as Facility Executive of the Year. There are few people as deserving of this kind of national recognition as Bill. He truly epitomizes the Edinboro Family's values of civility and collegiality. The magazine honored Bill in large part because of the teamwork he has fostered in the Facilities Office and in carrying out some 20 major projects under the University's Master Plan.

The second development came just before Winter Commencement when we learned that Edinboro University alumna Sharon Stone agreed to be our keynote speaker at the Eighth Annual Frank G. Pogue Honors Scholarship Luncheon. Year after year, this event has come to highlight our scholarship endowment efforts and has featured such notables as Ben Vereen, Janet Reno, James Earl Jones, and last year, Andrea Mitchell. Sharon Stone's appearance will mark her first official return to campus since she left for an award-winning career which began with the Eileen Ford modeling agency in New York. We are delighted to welcome her back and to reconnect in what we hope will be a long and mutually rewarding relationship with one of Hollywood's most acclaimed humanitarians.

So much has happened during our 150th anniversary celebration, and we are only half-way through the year! We opened our Sesquicentennial observance with an appearance at Fall

Convocation by one of the most inspiring personalities ever to have visited our campus. Kyle Maynard, a college student from Georgia, mesmerized the audience at Louis C. Cole Auditorium – Memorial Hall with his life story of overcoming severe physical disabilities to become a champion wrestler and nationally celebrated inspirational author and speaker. Other inspiring stories in our Diversity Speakers Series came from Sue Thomas who overcame childhood deafness to become a lip-reading FBI agent and serve as the model for the television series "Sue Thomas: F.B. Eye"; and from Matt Roloff, the star of The Learning Channel's "Little People, Big World."

We also enjoyed a concert by Ryan Star from the CBS series "Rock Star: Supernova," a stimulating discussion by two former Congressmen in the "Congress to Campus" program, and stunning performances by the Ahn Trio, the Erie Philharmonic Orchestra, Burning River Brass, and the Moscow Ballet. These programs were made possible in great part through the generous support of the Edinboro University Student Government Association.

The signature event of our Sesquicentennial celebration was the rededication of Academy Hall on January 18. Academy Hall is the original classroom building of the Edinboro Academy that became Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. It is the oldest Normal School building still in use for educational purposes in the United States and, as of November 21, 2006, Academy Hall is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

We hope you will take an opportunity during your alma mater's Sesquicentennial to return to the campus, or to reconnect or stay connected with Edinboro University in other ways.

As children we are always taught that we should leave things better than we found them. When I assumed the presidency of your Association it was already in fine shape; however, I would like to think that improvement is a continuous process, and that process was well served in the last four years.

I look forward to seeing many of my old and new friends during future homecomings and other campus events.



# The Sesquicentennial Celebrating 150 years of Academic Excellence

If you live, work or are retired in northwestern Pennsylvania, you already know the Edinboro Sesquicentennial has been even more successful than imagined. If you're among the many thousands who make up the Edinboro Family throughout other regions of our country, the following is just a sample of what you've been missing!

The spring semester's celebration got off fast with the actual highlight of the entire Sesquicentennial: the rededication of



150-year-old Academy Hall, the nation's oldest former Normal School building still being used for academic purposes.

Today, a century and a half later, Academy Hall's recent \$2.4 million renovation allows the striking "new"

old building to continue its service to the Edinboro Family, housing the Admissions Office and a new Welcome Center as the University embarks upon its second 150 years of excellence.

Perhaps the most exciting aspect of the rededication ceremony was the announcement by President Pogue that Academy Hall has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places, preserving its history not only for the Edinboro community and northwestern Pennsylvania, but for the entire country.

Two weeks after Academy Hall's rededication, Inez Baskin, the black journalist who helped chronicle the Montgomery bus boycott of the 1950s, appeared on campus as the featured speaker at the Sesquicentennial Martin Luther King, Jr. Awards Luncheon.

During the annual awards luncheon – created by President Pogue in 1997 to celebrate Dr. King's legacy and honor local citizens who embody King's spirit, philosophy and teachings the University honored three individuals for excellence in social equity advocacy: longtime civil rights activist Dr. Eron DeLeon Soto, Greater Erie Community Action Committee CEO Ronald Steele, and Bobby Harrison, founder and executive director of Erie's John F. Kennedy Center, who was honored posthumously. The event kicked off Black History Month observances and activities on campus.



The appearance of Capitol Steps, the outrageous American political satire group composed of former congressional staffers, was an event of pure fun. Sponsored by Edinboro in conjunction with WQLN Public Broadcasting, the satirical irreverence of Capitol Steps packed the house, bringing laughter and warmth to a cold Erie night.


And those events were just the beginning of the Sesquicentennial's second half activities!

One of the Sesquicentennial's premier events will be Edinboro University's Eighth Annual Frank G. Pogue Honors Scholarship Luncheon welcoming back alumna Sharon Stone - one of Hollywood's most sought-after leading ladies and an internationally acclaimed humanitarian.



Still to come is the appearance of Judge Marjorie Rendell, First Lady of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as she helps the University launch Women's History Month events. Also in March, Edinboro will proudly serve as host team for the 30th Annual National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament.

April and May Sesquicentennial events include the Spring Convocation and Employee Recognition Reception, Holocaust Remembrance Week, Arts Week, Disability Awareness Day, Spring Commencement, the Highland Games and Scottish Festival, and the Campaign of Excellence and Sesquicentennial Grand Finale.



Events during the first half of the Sesquicentennial Celebration were equally impressive, with Kyle Maynard, the first of three Diversity Speaker Series lecturers. Maynard, 20, was born with a rare disorder called congenital amputation, leaving him with only three joints. Despite what others would call physical challenges, Maynard became one

of Georgia's top high school wrestlers, currently wrestles for the University of Georgia, and authored the best-selling book, "No Excuses: The True Story of a Congenital Amputee Who Became a Champion in Wrestling and Life."

Next in the series came Sue Thomas, the reallife inspiration for the highly acclaimed TV series, "Sue Thomas: F.B.Eye." Deaf since the age of 18 months and now afflicted with multiple sclerosis, Thomas captivated the audience as living proof that one determined deaf woman can not only break the sound barrier in her own life, but within the FBI as well.





The final speaker in the series was Matt Roloff and star of TLC's "Little People, Big World" and author of "Against Tall Odds." With a video crew from The Learning Channel accompanying him to Edinboro, his campus experience is expected to become part of an episode of "Little People, Big World," to be aired this spring.

## OTHER FALL 2006 SESQUICENTENNIAL EVENTS INCLUDED:

- The Sept. 29 lecture by Jonathan Kozol, one of the nation's most highly regarded experts on education.
- Sesquicentennial Homecoming Weekend Oct. 6-7, with its delightful and creative parade floats themed "Edinboro University Through the Years 1857-2007."
- Presentations by Edinboro's Theatre for Young Audiences of "The Sleepy Hollow," Washington Irving's classic tale of the headless horseman.
- Congress-to-Campus, sponsored by the departments of Communication and Media Studies and Political Science and Criminal Justice, featuring two former members of Congress - Steven Kuykendall (R-Calif.) and Ken Hechler (D-W, Va.) – who held student forums, conducted classes and met informally with students and faculty.
- The Rising Star Concert Series, featuring Ryan Star, of CBS' Rock Star: Supernova fame. He is destined to take his place among the great entertainers who appeared at Edinboro early in their careers when they, too, were on their rise toward stardom.
- •The Moscow Ballet Repertory Show, part of the Sesquicentennial's Performing Arts Series.
- The Burning River Brass concert, preceded by the President's Club reception honoring scholarship donors and their recipients.
- The collaborative production by Erie Dance Conservatory Company and North Coast Dance of "How the Grinch Stole Christmas."

As you can see, whether it involved academic celebration, cultural events, diversity speakers, historical remembrance or just plain fun, the Sesquicentennial celebration is providing something for everyone, no matter the age or interest level.



# NATIONAL MAGAZINE NAMES BILL COLEMAN TOP FACILITY EXECUTIVE OF THE YEAR

The trip from tiny Ford City, Pa., to tiny Edinboro, Pa., takes less than two hours by way of Route 422 and Interstate 79. Yet that short journey 21 years ago was enough to launch William Coleman toward a lifetime of achievement at Edinboro University.

And now those accomplishments as the University's Associate Vice President for Facilities have been nationally recognized. Today's Facility Manager – a trade magazine considered the nation's leading facility management publication – has selected Coleman as its 2007 Facility Executive of the Year.

Coleman, a native of Ford City, veteran of the U.S. Navy and Edinboro graduate, was nominated by Edinboro President Frank G.

Pogue, who submitted to the magazine a lengthy and detailed entry outlining Coleman's many accomplishments. Dr. Pogue wrote, "Mr. Coleman's facilities expertise, combined with his untiring dedication to accomplishing the University's goals and objectives, has resulted in facilities management providing a safe, cost-effective, energy efficient, user-friendly, highly accessible environment and a campus that remains one of the most aesthetically pleasing in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania."

Today's Facility Manager has for the past five years recognized outstanding professionalism and performance in the field of facility management. Entries for the award were submitted from small and large organizations representing industries such as health care, education, retail, government, finance and manufacturing.

The coveted award was announced by the magazine in December after a panel of judges distinguished in the field of facilities management utilized a five-tiered scoring system to select Coleman for the award from three national finalists, according to Heidi Schwartz, editor-in-chief of *Today's Facility Manager*. Judges scored entries according to how well the candidates demonstrated innovation,

management, pro-business impact, human improvements, and sustainability through the course of major projects.

"This award recognizes facility managers' commitment to their profession," Schwartz said in the magazine's formal announcement. "All of this year's nominees deserve recognition for the hard work and ingenuity they devote to their jobs, but Coleman stood out. TFM is honored to present his accomplishments to other members of the facility management field."

She said Coleman is being recognized for 20 campus projects over the past 10 years — coinciding with Dr. Pogue's administration — in helping to create a cost-efficient, environmentally friendly and visually pleasing campus, while at the same time transforming

the 150-year-old campus through new construction, building renovations, accessibility enhancements and nationally-recognized signage plan.

The magazine particularly noted the recently-completed renovation of Academy Hall, the oldest former Normal School building in Pennsylvania and possibly the oldest building of its kind in the nation. With renovations maintaining the original architectural integrity of Academy Hall, the building was recently listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Coleman, who began his Edinboro career as a maintenance supervisor then worked his way up to the top job in the Facilities Department, said he was honored just to have been nominated for the award.

"I was surprised with the nomination," he said with typical modesty known so well to his co-workers. "But I can't believe I won! If there have been successes during this period, it was due largely to the work of our Facilities staff and the managers, all hard-working, dedicated people, and because of the support I've always received from President Pogue and Gordie Herbst (Vice President for Finance and Administration). Nothing can ever get accomplished without







support from the top, and I've always known and felt that support was there for us."

He and his wife Nancy have two children, Joseph, a civil engineering major at the University of Pittsburgh, and Elizabeth, an Edinboro University nursing student.

What has he enjoyed most about facilities management?

"The sense of accomplishment at getting things done. You can see it happen. You can see it make an impact on the campus and the community and the lives of the students you see every day."

What doesn't he like about the job?

"When you make a mistake, everyone knows!" he laughs.

# Edinboro Criminal Justice Grad **Joe Strupek** Leads State Farm Communications

Edinboro alumnus Joe Strupek used his experience to climb the ladder of success to become the Assistant Vice President of Corporate Communications at State Farm Insurance. Strupek, who graduated in 1984 with a degree in criminal justice, began his career at State Farm Insurance in the Erie claims office, where he covered accidents and reported their stories. Government affairs, reputation, and crisis management are just some of the daily tasks that Strupek now administers.

Networking and relationships also helped in Strupek's career with State Farm. It was through a past roommate who worked at an employment agency that he heard about a job opening at State Farm. Strupek worked in the Erie office for several years until he took on various leadership responsibilities in the northeastern branches of State Farm (Pennsylvania, New England and upstate New York). In 2001, he worked with the Northeast Zone Executive and in 2002, Strupek was repositioned as the Northeast Zone Learning and Development manager and oversaw training and development of employees. The Northeast Zone consists of Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey and the six New England states.

In 2004, Strupek moved to Bloomington, Illinois, State Farm Corporate Headquarters, to be a staff director in the executive department, and in 2006 he became the Assistant Vice President of Corporate Communication. His relationship with the media has been significant in telling the story of State Farm.

Two key influences Strupek cites are private criminal investigator Dan Barber and retired Edinboro University professor Jim Fisher of the Criminal Justice Department.



Through Barber, Strupek was able to intern at Dan Barber and Associates, whose work included private investigation and law enforcement. Strupek learned about the analytical and investigative fields that would aid in his career with State Farm, especially when investigating auto accidents.

"Joe was very impressive," said Barber. "He approached his internship with great enthusiasm and great integrity. He worked twice as many hours as

necessary, never shied away from hard work and was always available when I needed him. He was smart, ambitious, personable and had a great sense of humor."

Strupek worked with Jim Fisher on research for Fisher's books. Fisher was a mentor to Strupek, laying the foundation which Strupek built upon. After graduating and receiving the "Outstanding Graduate in Criminal Justice" award, Strupek spent a short time working at Hills Department store in Ohio in loss prevention.

Strupek's wife, Christina, is a criminal justice graduate from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He met his wife through State Farm when she was hired to replace him. Because of Strupek's promotions, he and his wife have moved several times to various locations. Their son, Jonathan, 15, was born in Philadelphia, while daughter, Samantha, 10, was born in Massachusetts.

In his spare time, Stupek is a writer for outdoor magazines, an op-ed writer for the Saratogian newspaper in Saratoga Springs, New York, and an amateur screen writer. He credits State Farm for providing opportunities to grow and learn and says, "Learning doesn't end with college." He also credits State Farm with giving him a fascinating career.

# EDINBORO FAMILY BRINGS UGANDAN STUDENT INTO THEIR HEARTS AND HOME

## It was just eleven years ago - although in many ways it was a lifetime ago - that Patrick Mwesige stole the hearts of Gary and Carla Means.

It was February of 1996. The African Children's Choir was touring the United States and Patrick, as he is called by everyone who knows him, was an elevenyear-old student from Uganda visiting the United States for the first time. When the Choir's tour stopped at the First Alliance Church in Erie, the Means family volunteered to host some of the 26 boys and girls, all of whom were traveling

away from their homes in Uganda for the first time.

Patrick and another boy named Richard and their tutor, Heather McAdam of Northern Ireland, were chosen to stay with Gary and Carla in their Edinboro home. To this day it is difficult for Dr. and Mrs. Means to express the feelings they experienced when they first met Patrick.

"Something happened that cannot be explained," said Gary, a retired dentist who is well-known in the Edinboro community. "It was a magical thing that occurred in our hearts. The Lord was a part of it."

That something was an instant bond with Patrick. Perhaps it was because of his constant smile, or maybe his ever-positive disposition.

Whatever it was, it was as close to a miracle as the Means family had ever experienced.

Gary and Carla knew they wanted to see young Patrick again. Two weeks later, when Carla asked Gary what he wanted for his birthday, Gary simply replied, "Let's go to see the choir again."

Perhaps by coincidence, the choir was scheduled to perform on March 1st, Gary's birthday, in a small church in Middleport, New York. So, off they went driving to Middleport to hear Patrick, Richard and the African Children's Choir sing again. It was during that weekend that the Means learned of the gutwrenching details surrounding Patrick's and Richard's home life in Uganda.

The Means continued to track the choir's schedule on the computer for the remainder of the spring. They stayed in phone contact with McAdam. To their dismay, they learned that the

choir would be returning to Africa in the summer following a month-long stay in Northern Ireland. With little hesitation, Gary and Carla booked a 15-day trip to Ireland where they visited Patrick and heard the choir sing one more time. This would be the last time they would see eleven-yearold-Patrick for more than ten years.

The villages of Uganda are a long way from Edinboro, Pennsylvania. Patrick's Ugandan home, which he shares with his mother and four younger

brothers and sisters, is a mud hut which has no electricity, running water or telephone. His family cooks outside on the ground using charcoal. They grow their own vegetables and keep a few chickens. Because the government high school he attended had electricity until 3:00 a.m., Patrick would leave his house in the evening after dinner and chores to study at the school until the electricity went off, then return to his home to sleep for three hours before rising at 6:00 a.m. to get ready for school.

During the ensuing years, and in spite of significant obstacles, the Means stayed in touch with Patrick through the choir's music director, who had returned to Uganda at the same time as Patrick. Conventional mail was unreliable and, of course, no phone service was available. It wasn't until the last few years that communication improved with the opening of an Internet café in Kampala, the capital of Uganda. Gary will tell you that were it not for the Internet and e-mail, Patrick's chances of coming to America to study would be somewhere between slim and none. "Early on, we did not have a grip on how his education was progressing," said Gary. "Later, however, we became aware that Patrick was doing very well in his studies."

As the duration of their separation from Patrick increased, an inspiration began to grow within Gary and Carla. Yes, Patrick should come again to America, live with them and attend Edinboro University! "It occurred to me that we should bring Patrick here," said Gary. "We were led by God. We were supposed to do this, regardless of the cost."

Once they received confirmation that Patrick had passed his rigorous final exams in Uganda, Gary contacted Edinboro

University's International Office and its director, Linda Kightlinger, to start the admissions process. Because of Patrick's excellent grades and test scores, admission to Edinboro University proved to be the easy part of the long and arduous process. As the Means found out, the process of sponsoring a student to come to America was a long and difficult one. Obtaining a student visa to come to

the U.S. proved to be daunting, and the Means had to demonstrate their willingness and ability to support Patrick while in the United States.

For a time it seemed that their dream of bringing Patrick to America was hopeless. Then one by one - as if by a series of small miracles things started falling into place.

The first near miracle occurred when Patrick went to the United States Embassy in Kampala, to undergo his student visa interview. On the Sunday before his Monday appointment for the interview, Patrick was very worried. His Ugandan pastor told him, "Don't worry. I believe it is in

God's plan for you to get the visa." The following Monday 35 students sat for their visa interview. Only two were granted -Patrick, of course, being one of them. The second near miracle had to do with Patrick's flight to America. While all this was taking place, Gary had tentatively booked a flight to America through a travel agent in Naples, Florida. As soon as Gary got the e-mail from Patrick declaring that he had been awarded his student visa, Gary e-mailed the travel agent who immediately booked Patrick on a British Airways flight from Entebbe Airport in Kampala, to London's Heathrow Airport, then on to JFK where he was to stay overnight, catching a Jet Blue flight to Buffalo the next morning. Two days later Patrick boarded that British Airways flight. His was the last plane out because immediately thereafter, British Airways went on

strike. While staying overnight at JFK, Patrick had to make his way from the international terminal to the domestic side - not an easy task for him. Fortunately, an African-American man who, sensing Patrick's dilemma, and after some conversation, escorted Patrick the entire distance from one terminal to the other.

> On the morning of August 11, 2005, Patrick disembarked his Jet Blue flight at the Buffalo airport carrying his worldly possessions in a knapsack – an extra pair of pants, a t-shirt, one set of underwear, a gift for the Means from the African Children's Choir music director, and his Bible.

Patrick has been living in Edinboro with people he calls "uncle" and "auntie" ever since. He is a sophomore at Edinboro University majoring in math and actuarial science with a remarkable 3.53 grade point average. He just completed his third straight semester on the Dean's List. While studying fervently, he holds down a part-time job on campus in the Maintenance Department. Patrick regularly sends

much of his wages home to his mother and siblings.

"It's been a blessing for us," said Gary. "He's added a dimension to our home which I can't explain. We work together around the property; and I enjoy teaching him how to do things like painting and driving the garden tractor."

"He brings so much joy," said Carla. "That little boy - that young man – stepped off that plane with that big, wonderful smile of his and said, 'Hi, auntie!' He's just too good to be true. I asked him the other day, 'Patrick, do you ever have a bad day?' 'Not yet!' he said through his famous smile."



Just like many of today's freshmen, when Tim Stambaugh arrived at Edinboro in 1979 he hadn't the foggiest notion of a career choice.

"I really had no idea what I wanted to be," said the York, Pennsylvania, native who now makes his professional home in "...I had one Manhattan. "My father was an attorney, my older eve toward brother became a banker and both had appeal. So law, the other during my freshman year,

I had one eye toward law, the other to banking."

But with no formal prelaw program offered at Edinboro at the time (pre-law has since become a recognized concentration), Stambaugh quickly centered on economics and business, which he found he loved. What he couldn't have known then was that his Edinboro University education would become a launching pad propelling him toward an executive position with JPMorgan in the world's financial capital.

Today at 45, following a career that began at Irving Trust Company, twisting and turning through an upward spiral of mergers and acquisitions, Stambaugh serves as an Executive Director within JPMorgan's Investment Bank. He's an integral part of the Financial Institutions Group, with responsibility for mergers and acquisitions, and corporate finance for the firm's insurance industry clients.

Although it's been more than a quarter century since Stambaugh called Lawrence Towers and even the historic Biggers House his home, he fully credits his days at Edinboro with firmly establishing his career course sights.

As he began his studies at Edinboro, two professors were highly influential in guiding him toward his banking career. "The influence of Dr. K.V. Jacob and Dr. James Dunn had an incredible impact on me and

> my decision to continue to pursue studies in economics."

He eyed his Edinboro experience philosophically: "I played hard, but worked harder. I look back at the experience as a real turning point in the

development of independent thought and critical thinking as opposed to peer group influence. I view my years at Edinboro as, 'You get out of it what you put into it." In other words, even then Stambaugh was self-motivated. But Edinboro became his guiding compass.

Between classes and cramming, he

worked part time at John's Wildwood Pizza while tutoring other students in economics. During summer breaks, he was a lifeguard on the beaches of Fenwick Island, Delaware, and Ocean City, Maryland.

By the time

Stambaugh graduated in 1983 with a BS in economics and a minor in German. he had already decided to pursue his MBA. In 1986, with the ink on his MBA diploma still wet, Tim Stambaugh headed to The Big Apple. Following an eight-month training program in corporate finance, he spent time in Germany (making excellent use of his Edinboro minor!)

where for six months he learned

international trade finance. Returning to the United States, he focused his career on corporate finance, joining JPMorgan in 2004.

Along the way, in 1988, he met Michele Williams, also of York, who graduated from Pepperdine University in Malibu, California. They were both home in York for the holidays and were introduced by a mutual friend. Married in 1990, they're now the parents of three daughters, Alexandra, Madeline and Katherine, and make their home in Yardley, Pa., located along the Delaware River in Bucks County.

Never forsaking his Edinboro roots or losing his enthusiastic support for his alma mater, Stambaugh last fall hosted the first ever New York area Edinboro alumni gathering at the famous Metropolitan Museum of Art. His wife, Michele, a volunteer at the world-renowned museum, was instrumental in arranging the

Edinboro reception there.

But Stambaugh's not done. He very much wants to spend time with Edinboro's business and economics students and hold discussions about career opportunities based on his wide-ranging banking experience. What's more, he's willing to meet with Edinboro

University students on campus or New York.

Tim Stambaugh's commitment and dedication to his alma mater once again underscores not only the loyalty, but the willingness of Edinboro University alumni to give back to the venerable institution of their educational and career roots.

# **BARBARA TRAVIS**

Edinboro University alumnus Barbara Travis has proved that she is a pioneer and innovator both in her life and career. Born in Ludlow, Pennsylvania, a town with a population of 467 (12 of which were her immediate family), Travis attended Ludlow High School. After the high school closed during Travis' sophomore year, the students were moved to Kane High School – transitioning from a class of 16 to one of 108. After graduating in 1950, Travis attended

Edinboro University to pursue an education degree. At that time Edinboro University was geared toward training future teachers and everyone was prepared for the same profession. Travis describes her experience at Edinboro University as "a sense of unity, commonality, and camaraderie that created one big family."

Travis explains that her most cherished recollection of her days at Edinboro University is

"the closeness of the students and the simplicity of our lives." Travis often practiced with the men's tennis team, since there was no women's team. As a result, she talked to Coach John Friese in hopes of trying out for the men's team. Friese's response was "Sure you can. We have a ladder. Come tomorrow." Travis did get to play, earned a Block Letter E in a male sport, and became a member of the EClub.

Travis began her teaching career in Jamestown, NY, teaching first grade for one year, then high school English for her second and third years. She decided to attend Teachers' College at Columbia University to receive an M.A. in reading. While there she met her future husband, Walter. They were married in 1959 and moved to California where Travis taught in the Berkley School System. Two years later they returned to New York so that Walter could complete his doctorate. While in New York, Travis taught at the


Agnes Russell Demonstration School, which is a part of Teachers' College.

After Walter accepted a job at Foothill College, the two moved back to California where Travis began teaching in the Sunnyvale School System as a classroom teacher, resource teacher and reading specialist. While there, Travis designed a Cross-age Tutoring program and taught fifth and sixth graders who had reading difficulties to tutor second and third graders having problems learning to read.

In 1975, Travis returned to DeAnza College to teach reading and developed the Academic Skills Center. Travis was the Director of Reading in the College Readiness Lab and was later named Executive Head of the Tutorial Services and Academic Skills Center until her retirement in June of 1985. She continued to work as an Adjunct Professor until 1988, when she fully retired.

Travis authored the books that were used in the Lab for the two levels of reading classes. The first, published in 1990, was "Reading Comprehension: Successful Conversation" with a second edition published in 1992. The second book titled "Reading Comprehension: Reasoned Understanding" was published in 1991. In 1989, Travis, along with two colleagues, was awarded The National Teaching Excellence Award from the University of Texas at Austin at The National Leadership Conference, recognizing the College Readiness Program as an exemplary center for students.

Barbara and Walter have been married for 47 years and have three children and two grandchildren. Eight years ago they moved from their home in Saratoga to an adult community in San Jose. They also own a condo in Palm Desert where they spend their winters. Travis states that her days at Edinboro University are "some of the most cherished memories of my life."





# ELEANOR LOGAN RETIRES... ANSWERS CALL OF THEATER

Eleanor Logan is retiring from a long career in the Human Resources department at Edinboro University. But, don't cry for Ellie Logan. She will continue her passion for theater at the Erie Playhouse taking part on and off stage as a performer, assistant director, and stage hand.

Logan grew up in New Castle with three brothers. After attending Youngstown State University, she took a position with Bell Telephone, where she worked for 18 years. She also spent five years in Albany, Georgia, but in 1992 found herself at Edinboro University as a secretary. Through all her moves and occupations, Logan maintained a sort of second life as a stage performer.

It was during her childhood that Logan found her passion for the stage. Her involvement with theater began in first grade when she took part in small plays at her country school. # BIO-RETENTION BASINS BUILT IN PARKING LOT

Bio-retention basins – also known as rain gardens – have been built in the new Reeder Hall parking lot on the campus of Edinboro University. Rather than using a traditional sheet drainage system which allows the storm water to flow from the parking lot directly into the storm drains and then into the streams, Edinboro University chose to construct bio-retention basins.

The Reeder Hall parking lot islands are constructed to allow storm water run-off to collect in them and slowly filter down to piping below. Storm water runoff is filtered through a special mix of soil before entering the underground storm water piping. The use of bio-retention basins helps to recharge the aquifers and prevent parking lot drainage from polluting the streams.

The basins are the first to be used in a university setting in the surrounding area. Carnegie Mellon University also uses this type of system. There has been a positive reaction to the basins and there has been no sign of adverse impacts from recent heavy rains.

# EDINBORO UNIVERSITY SIGNS ARTICULATION AGREEMENT WITH THE AUTONOMOUS UNIVERSITY OF YUCATAN

Edinboro University has signed a three-year articulation agreement with the Autonomous University of Yucatan, Mexico (UADY). The agreement between the two schools allows exchange students, faculty, and staff the opportunity to participate in all of the areas and fields of study at Edinboro and the UADY.

Each institution will provide academic advising and assistance to participating students and will grant them access to all facilities available to other students. For every two Edinboro University students received by UADY for up to one academic year, Edinboro agrees to provide oncampus housing and board for one UADY student. The number of students to be exchanged will be determined each year by mutual agreement.



## EDINBORO UNIVERSITY COUNSELING GRADS LEAD IN STATE EMPLOYMENT



# EDINBORO UNIVERSITY WELCOMES SHARON STONE TO THE FRANK G. POGUE SCHOLARSHIP LUNCHEON

An Edinboro University alumna and Meadville native, Sharon Stone is not only one of Hollywood's most sought-after leading ladies, but an internationally renowned champion for social justice.

Since her years at Edinboro in the mid-1970s when she majored in creative writing and fine arts, Stone's career skyrocketed on the national scene, first as a highly-successful commercial model with a driving interest in acting, then as an award-winning, critically acclaimed actress. Her off-screen role crusading for AIDS research and advocating for homeless and abused women and children through Planet Hope, earned her equal triumphs and recognition as a leading humanitarian of our time.


Her break-out role in *Basic Instinct*, the top grossing film of 1992, propelled her to stardom at the top of Hollywood's "A-List" and set the course for enormous professional, personal and philanthropic successes to come. Stone received an Academy Award nomination and won the Golden Globe Award for Best Actress in a Motion Picture Drama for her role in Martin Scorsese's *Casino*, in which she starred opposite Robert DeNiro and Joe Pesci. She also earned a Golden Globe nomination for her role opposite writer/director Albert Brooks in *The Muse*, and yet another Golden Globe nomination for her portrayal of the mother of a disabled child in *The Mighty*, a film that garnered rave reviews that she also executive produced.

Other film credits include *Simpatico* with Nick Nolte and Jeff Bridges, *Intersection* with Richard Gere, *Sliver* with William Baldwin and Tom Berenger, *The Quick and the Dead* opposite Gene Hackman, and *The Specialist* with Sylvester Stallone. Her role in the current hit, *Bobby*, a snapshot into the lives of employees at Los Angeles' Ambassador Hotel in June 1968 when presidential candidate Robert F. Kennedy was assassinated, demonstrates Stone's wide range of acting talent.

After winning a writing scholarship to Edinboro University, Stone's modeling and film career soared, and she became a champion for vital humanitarian causes. In 1992, on a studio lot at Paramount Pictures, Sharon and her sister, Kelly Stone, came together to create Planet Hope, inspired by an accident that left Kelly physically impaired for years.

Planet Hope has helped tens of thousands of families around the world, offering free medical and dental care, new clothes for children, counseling and image makeovers for homeless women and victims of domestic violence. Sharon Stone is perhaps best known for her leadership in the battle against AIDS. The recipient of The Global Conference Institute's Healthcare Humanitarian Award, Stone was proclaimed a leading healthcare advocate for her work as Chairman of the Campaign for AIDS Research of the American Foundation for AIDS Research. For her efforts in raising money and bringing awareness to AIDS research, she also received the Peter J. Gomes Humanitarian Award from the Harvard University Foundation. In 2005, at the John F. Kennedy Center, Stone received the People for the American Way Foundation's Spirit of Liberty Award for her advocacy in AIDS research.

The President's Club Reception is generously sponsored by the Edinboro University Alumni Association and Edinboro University Foundation.







# MEET THE DONOR Thomas Stanko

Thomas "T" Stanko joined the Edinboro University faculty (then Edinboro State College) in 1966 and retired in 2000. He came to Edinboro following 11 years as a teacher and basketball coach at Cecil and Canon-McMillan high schools in Washington County, Pennsylvania.

A graduate of Clarion State Teachers' College ('53) with a degree in English and history, he served two years with the U.S. military in Korea following graduation. He earned a master's degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 1960 and pursued doctoral studies there. As a Frick Scholar, Mr. Stanko became a diplomate of the University of Birmingham, England, for his work in Shakespearean studies. He also completed post-graduate work at the University of Chicago, Gannon University, the Walloon Writing Institute, Bard College, and Columbia University.

At Edinboro, Mr. Stanko was one of the first members of the graduate faculty in English, teaching at both the graduate and undergraduate levels and served as department chair from 1979-1990. He was the faculty advisor to the Edinboro student newspaper, The Spectator, from 1983-1995. His passion for basketball led Tom to be the "voice" of the Fighting Scots basketball teams for over 22 years.

Remarkably, Mr. Stanko has established five endowed scholarships. The Professor Thomas Stanko Basketball Scholarship for Women and Professor Thomas Stanko Basketball Scholarship for Men reward academically deserving student athletes. The On Special Assignment Scholarship is awarded to an incoming student newspaper editor who must be a member of The Spectator staff. These three scholarships have provided over \$20,000 in awards to Edinboro students.

He has created two new scholarships that will be endowed in 2007 and will be named in honor of his children: daughter Rebecca Lynn Mastrangelo, a 1987 graduate of Edinboro University, who practices law in Las Vegas and son Thomas Kevin, also a 1987 graduate of Edinboro with a degree in criminal justice.

T has expressed a great love for Edinboro and noted that the years passed by rather rapidly. Providing financial assistance to students is a way to "give back to the Boro". Tom also gives regularly to the Annual Fund in support of the Professor Robert J. Pfingstler English Scholarship, a scholarship created in memory of his good friend and colleague. 
# MEET THE STUDENT Adam Campbell







# BEN STROUP & KYLE WITUCKI EARN ALL-AMERICAN HONORS



Edinboro University had a pair of football players earn All-American honors. Linebacker Ben Stroup was

named to the 2006 Associated Press Little All-America Team. The team is composed of players from NCAA Division II and III and NAIA teams. Stroup was named to the first team, becoming the first Fighting Scot since Joe Valvoda in 2003 to be named to the AP Little All-America first team. Sean McNicholas earned first team honors in 2002. Greg Bzorek was a second team choice a year ago and a third-teamer in 2004.

In addition, Stroup and tight end Kyle Witucki were named to the 2006 Daktronics Division II All-America Football. The team is selected by Division II Sports Information Directors. Both were named to the second team.


Stroup, a 6'1", 213 lb. senior, was previously named the PSAC West Defensive Player of the Year, and he was the leading vote-getter at linebacker on the Daktronics All-Northeast Region team. He spearheaded an Edinboro defense which ranked first in the PSAC in rushing defense and total defense, and third in scoring defense, along with ranking sixth in Division II in rushing defense, 24th in scoring defense and 26th in total defense. He led the Fighting Scots with 105 tackles, the most since 1996. He also paced the team in tackles for losses (17.5), sacks (5.5), and passes broken up (7), while intercepting two passes and forcing a pair of fumbles.


Witucki landed on the team in his first year as a starter, and also earned first team All-PSAC West accolades. After catching 22 passes for 6 TDs in his first two seasons, the 6'3", 237 lb. junior hauled in 31 passes for 455 yards with 5 TDs. He is already tied for eighth in career touchdown receptions with 11. Witucki caught at least one pass in all but one game, with two touchdown receptions vs. Shippensburg. He had a career-best 5 catches for 80 yards and a touchdown against St. Anselm.

Both Stroup and Witucki were earlier accorded first team Daktronics All-Northeast Region honors. They were joined by senior **Damion Malott**, who earned a spot at safety on the second team.

Edinboro finished its first season under head coach Scott Browning with a 6-5 record.

Edinboro was well-represented when the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference announced its 2006 All-PSAC Football Teams. ## WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY TEAM SURPRISES WITH 10th-PLACE FINISH AT NATIONALS

In September, long-time Edinboro University cross country coach **Doug Watts** figured his November would be unlike those



in many years. With three key performers forced to redshirt due to injuries on both his men's and women's cross country teams, it appeared Edinboro's reign as one of the top cross country programs in Division II would take a brief break.

But in a testament to Watts' coaching skills,

his 2006 Fighting Scots peaked at just the right time, with both teams qualifying for Nationals thanks to second place finishes at the East Regional.

On November 18, the Edinboro women's cross country team capped an unlikely campaign with a tenth-place finish at the NCAA Division II National Championships in Pensacola, Florida. The men's cross country team finished 19th out of 24 competing teams. The cross country championships were part of the NCAA Division II Fall Festival, with a total of six championships decided over a four-day period.

Watts even had a chance to take part in his favorite pastime other than coaching his team – fishing. He hauled in a redfish that weighed 20 lbs. and measured 37  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches.

But Watts was even more pleased that two of his runners reeled in All-American honors. Rachael Lanzel, following her game plan of running with the lead pack, turned in one of the top performances ever by a female Boro runner, finishing fourth with a time of 20:28.5.

On the men's side, **Dave Niemira** completed a strong campaign with a 30th place finish, good enough for All-American honors. The junior covered the 10K course in a time of 30:32.8.

NOTE: In addition to the strong showing at Nationals, both the men's and women's cross country teams were presented the awards for Highest Team GPA at the 2006 NCAA Division II National Championship Festival. "The two NCAA academic honors awards served to highlight a week that lived up to the ideal of college athletics," said head coach Doug Watts "excellent athletic performance, superior academic accomplishment, and having a whole lot of fun while doing it!"

## RACHAEL LANZEL NAMED PSAC CROSS COUNTRY ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Edinboro University's **Rachael Lanzel** was named the 2006 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Women's Cross Country Athlete of the Year.

Lanzel is a junior who led all PSAC runners with a fourth place finish at the recent NCAA Division II National Championships. It marked the highest finish by a Fighting Scot in years. She finished with a time of 20:28.5 to earn All-American honors for the second time. In the process, she became just the seventh runner in Boro history to earn multiple All-American certificates.

Lanzel earlier won the PSAC Championship after finishing second in 2005. She added a second place finish at the East Regional for the second year in a row.

# PAIR OF FIGHTING SCOT VOLLEYBALL PLAYERS HONORED BY PSAC

OLIVIA WILLIAMS Named Rookie of the Year, JENNA NEWMAN Named to First Team



The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference recognized two Edinboro volleyball players when it announced its annual awards. Olivia Williams was honored as the PSAC West Rookie of the Year, while Jenna Newman was named to the All-PSAC West first team. Edinboro finished the season with a 19-17 record.



Williams is a 5'8" freshman who saw time both at outside hitter and middle hitter. She finished second for the Fighting Scots in kills with 345, along with a .230 hitting percentage. She was also second on the team in blocks with a total of 83, with a

team-leading 18 block solos and 65 block assists.

A 5'10" middle hitter, Newman led the Fighting Scots with 470 kills, the fifth-highest total in school history. She also paced the team with a .353 hitting percentage, a figure which ranks tenth all-time. Newman added a team-leading 85 blocks, with 16 block solos and 69 block assists.

Newman concludes her junior season ranked second in career kills with 1,283. She stands fourth in career blocks with 333, and is sixth in career block solos (56) and fourth in career block assists (277). She was also named to the 2006 Daktronics Division II All-Atlantic Region Volleyball second team.

# THREE FIGHTING SCOTS EARN ALL-PSAC WEST WOMEN'S SOCCER HONORS

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference announced the 2006 All-PSAC Women's Soccer Teams, and a trio of Edinboro players was recognized. **Angle de Almeida** and **Ashley Jones** were named to the first team, and **Mary Grebenc** landed a spot on the second team.



de Almeida was Edinboro's main offensive weapon, finishing as the team's leading scorer with 10 goals and 2 assists for 22 points, despite missing three games due to injury and playing the second half of the season at less than 100 percent. The junior forward was also named an All-PSAC West choice as

a sophomore. The 10 goals is tied for sixth in the season records, with the 22 points ranking 11th. de Almeida has moved into fifth place in career points (52) and is fourth in career goals (22).

Jones and Grebenc anchored an Edinboro defense that posted six shutouts and held opponents to 26 goals. Jones, a sophomore defender, was previously named the Rookie of the Year in 2005 in addition to landing a spot on the first team. In addition to her usual outstanding job at sweeper, she saw time in the midfield. Jones finished third on the team in scoring with 5 goals and 2 assists for 12 points. She also was named to the NSCAA All-Northeast Region second team.

Grebenc is a junior defender who started all 17 matches. She contributed 2 goals and an assist in addition to strong defensive play.

Edinboro finished with a 10-7-0 record, ending the season on a five-game winning streak. The ten wins were the most since 2002.

# PICKED SECOND IN PRESEASON POLL

## CURTIS INGRAM, DAREN TIELSCH NAMED TO PRESEASON ALL-PSAC WEST SQUAD

The Edinboro University men's basketball team was picked second in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Preseason Coaches Poll. The Fighting Scots have won the last two PSAC Championships, the first team to do so since Cheyney won back-to-back crowns in 1992 and '83. They are attempting to become the first team to win three straight PSAC crowns since Cheyney won five in a row from 1976-80.





Shippensburg, 24-7 a year ago and the Western Division regular season champion, is the preseason favorite. Edinboro upset the Red Raiders, 52-51, in last season's PSAC title game. The Fighting Scots ended the year with a 21-10 record.

In addition to the team's rankings, the PSAC coaches selected a Preseason All-PSAC West team. The six-man group included a pair of Fighting Scots – seniors **Daren Tielsch** and **Curtis Ingram**.

Tielsch received a sixth year of eligibility from the NCAA this summer. The 6'8", 230 lb. forward led the Fighting Scots in both scoring (18.7 ppg.) and (9.5 rpg.), ranking seventh in the PSAC in scoring while leading the league in rebounding. He shot 55.4 percent from the floor and attempted a school-record 210 free throws, although he shot just 57.1 percent from the line.

Tielsch added 81 assists and 42 blocked shots, both second on the team, while leading the Fighting Scots with 37 steals. He was accorded first team All-PSAC West honors and was the Most Outstanding Player at the PSAC Championships. In two seasons at Edinboro, Tielsch has scored 914 points. He previously played one season at Penn State and one game at Robert Morris.

Ingram joined Edinboro a year ago after playing two seasons at Division I Wofford. The 6'3" guard battled a knee injury early in the year, missing three games. He played a key role in Edinboro's playoff run down the stretch.

Ingram averaged 13.1 ppg., third on the team, while making 41 of 108 three-pointers. But the most notable aspect of Ingram's game is his defense. He regularly shut down some of the best scorers in the PSAC. He hit a free throw with no time left on the clock to give Edinboro a 52-51 win over Shippensburg in the PSAC championship game.

# PICKED THIRD IN PRESEASON POLL

## KELLY CALDERONE NAMED TO PRESEASON ALL-PSAC WEST SQUAD

The Edinboro University women's basketball team was picked third in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Preseason Coaches Poll. The Fighting Scots reached the PSAC championship game for the first time since 1998, and were also selected for the NCAA Playoffs for the first time since that season. They finished with a 21-10 record.



In addition to the team rankings, the PSAC coaches selected a Preseason All-PSAC West team. The six-man group includes **Kelly Calderone**, a two-time All-PSAC honoree, earning first team All-PSAC West honors a year ago after being selected to the second team as a sophomore. After transferring to Edinboro from the University at Buffalo at the conclusion of her freshman year, Calderone led Edinboro in scoring the last two seasons.

Calderone enters her senior year ranked 22nd in career scoring with 947 points, and including her one season at Buffalo, has 1,079 career points. She has a career-best 86.5 percent free throw percentage, along with ranking fifth in career three-pointers made (117) and seventh in career three-pointers attempted (323).


