PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Edinboro Family,



On behalf of my wife Dorothy and myself, I want to take this opportunity in my last President's Message for the Edinboro News to express my deepest thanks to every member of the Edinboro Family.

The past 11 years have gone by far too quickly, yet we have made some extraordinary accomplishments. As detailed elsewhere in this issue, we have made great strides in building this institution we all love. These achievements include the \$15 million Campaign for Excellence, 20 major construction and renovation projects valued at more than \$200 million, new and continued accreditations including NCATE, the restoration and rededication of Academy Hall, growth in our enrollment including doubling our graduate enrollment, and the creation of three dozen new academic programs. The Legacy of Dr. Frank G. Pogue

Edinboro University's 15th President, 1996-2007

Dr. Frank G. Pogue made history when he began his first day as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on July 1, 1996. At that moment he became the first African-American president of any college or university in Pennsylvania that was not a historically

But just as the eyes of a nation were on Jackie Robinson in major league baseball and on the first black students to enter the University of Alabama, President Pogue knew the eyes of Pennsylvania's higher education community were upon him. Would he be able to step up to the challenge as the


black institution.

Commonwealth's first African-American university president and set the standard by which all who followed in his footsteps would be measured, or if he did not succeed, would that make it more difficult for other black administrators to become senior college executives?

President Pogue has not only surpassed every expectation as Edinboro University's 15th president, he has created a legacy of achievement and leadership that will stand for generations of Edinboro students. Future scholars will look back on the administration of Frank G. Pogue as one of the most important and most prolific in its 150-year history.

The entire list of his accomplishments is simply too long to include here. When Dr. Pogue retires on June 30, 2007, it will not only mark the end of a remarkable career and the University's

Sesquicentennial celebration, it will mark the conclusion of Edinboro's most successful



One of his lasting legacies will be the Frank and Dorothy Pogue Honors Scholarship Fund. Seven years ago, the University held its first Honors Scholarship Luncheon as a way to raise funds for scholarships for honors students. With guest speakers such as James Earl Jones, Ben Vereen, Ted Kennedy, Jr., and most recently, Sharon Stone, the luncheon has raised more than \$900,000 that will be an enduring testimony to the vision of President Pogue.

There are many titles that could be used to describe President Pogue – statesman, humanitarian, advisor... peacemaker. At Edinboro University one of those titles

will be "builder." During his tenure the University has embarked on 20 major renovation and construction projects with a financial impact of more than \$200 million, including the \$4.8 million R. Benjamin Wiley Center, named for the late member of the University's Council of Trustees and the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education's Board of Governors.

Among those who know him best is Fred Rush, assistant to the Mayor of Erie. Rush, who like Dr. Pogue, is a brother in Alpha Phi Alpha, said Dr. Pogue epitomizes everything the fraternity stands for – scholarship, manly deeds and love for all mankind. "He has meant so much to the community," said Rush. "He has driven all over northwestern Pennsylvania and has transformed the University through his vision."

Dr. Pogue is undoubtedly the University's most visible President. From his first day in office, he has continually reached out to the entire region, making connections and forging relationships with every community and leader. He

created the "Edinboro Family" concept, uniting northwestern Pennsylvania through its largest









public University. He developed the Edinboro Family pin and has personally pinned hundreds of people from young children to former Pennsylvania governor Tom Ridge.

Hand in hand with the Edinboro Family concept,

President Pogue has been the region's leading proponent of civility. He initiated the Century of Civility Campaign within Erie's Millennium Commission and a campus-based Commission on Civility. He has been an untiring champion of respect, dignity, integrity, fairness and social justice.

Rush said Dr. Pogue often speaks of his life as a youngster growing up in a segregated Alabama in the 1950s and 1960s. "He recalled what Governor George Wallace said, 'Segregation now, segregation tomorrow, and segregation forever,' as Dr. Pogue spoke at a luncheon in the home of Gov. Ed Rendell where he was invited to receive a commendation," said Rush. "He is living proof that things change, even if it is slowly."

The University's growth in diversity accelerated under President Pogue's leadership. As minority enrollment grew by more than 60 percent, Dr. Pogue initiated such programs as the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Awards Luncheon, the Fredrick Douglass Scholars Program, the Frederick Douglass Living-Learning Floor, the Ben Wiley Partnership Program, and the Association of Faculty and Staff of Color.

Academics have flourished under President Pogue as enrollment grew from 7.178 to more than 8,000 in seven years. Three dozen new academic programs were created and the number of graduate students doubled. National accreditations were earned or renewed in education, business, social work, nursing, counseling, music, and speech-language and hearing. The crowning touch of the University's growth came with the opening of Edinboro University in Meadville in the Bessemer Building, matching its sister facility to the north, Edinboro University in Erie - the Porreco Center.

What will be the lasting legacy of President Pogue? His true greatness can be found - as expressed in the words of Dr. Martin Luther King – in the content of his character. He has personally touched the lives of thousands of students, faculty and staff. He has made hundreds of phone calls and visits to friends, families and associates in times of misfortune and tragedy. He has opened the doors of the University for the public funerals of teacher John Gillette, State Trooper Matthew Bond, and Trustee R. Benjamin Wiley.

Above all of the professional accomplishments of his 11 years at Edinboro University, Dr. Frank G. Pogue will best be remembered for the way he treated other people – with dignity, respect, kindness, and, most importantly, civility.

Dr. Pogue's leadership has been complemented and enabled by the administrative, faculty, staff, student and community team he built to guide the University's success.

Growth during the Pogue vears can be best characterized as a unique transformation that has enabled Edinboro University to be recognized as northwestern Pennsylvania's largest and most comprehensive institution of higher education. Following are selected highlights of this unprecedented growth.



- Implementation of nine-point priority plan: Increase enrollment to 8,000 students; enhance academic excellence; enhance technology campus-wide; create a just community that is student centered; enhance the advancement arm of the institution; create a collaborative administrative team on and off campus; create an inclusive planning process that ties budgeting to planning; increase diversity; enhance graduate studies.
- Ranked among top 15 animation programs nationwide by Animation magazine and among top 10 universities nationwide for students with disabilities accessibility.
- \$6.2 million campus-wide information network installation of fiber optic connectivity between 27 main campus administrative and classroom buildings and eight buildings at Edinboro University in Erie - The Porreco Center.
- Academy Hall, oldest campus building (1857) rededicated and listed on National Register of Historic Places following \$2.4 million renovation.
- Promoting core values of family and togetherness, President Pogue established the Edinboro Family.
- From academics to cultural activities, President Pogue personally greeted nearly every group that arrived on campus.
- Pa. Governor Ed Rendell and First Lady Marjorie Rendell honored Dr. Pogue at luncheon at governor's residence for his contributions to the Commonwealth.
- The State System of Higher Education's Board of Governors passed a special resolution honoring President Pogue for his "exemplary service to Edinboro University, the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and beyond."



After 11 years, I am very proud to be leaving a University that is well on its way to greatness, well on its way to the excellence the Edinboro Family has worked so diligently to achieve. I want to thank and congratulate faculty, staff, administrators, students, trustees, alumni and supporters of Edinboro University for these achievements."

When I wrote an article featuring some of our recent media graduates in the last issue of the *Edinboro News*, one of my hopes was that the article would prompt a response from other alumni across the country.

I was not disappointed.

I have heard from successful graduates who today are working in radio, television, newspapers, public relations and other fields. They are an impressive bunch, and their names and job titles will be published as part of this short follow-up article.

I was surprised that a couple of alumni felt that radio had been given the short shrift in my article. Part of that was because my submission had to be edited for space reasons.

Matthew Cummings, one of our top radio students of at least the last decade, was featured in the article, but he now works in public relations. What didn't appear in the last issue was a section that highlighted Matt's success in radio. His work with WFSE helped Matt to garner two prestigious and nationally

competitive awards, the John Bayliss Broadcast Foundation Scholarship and a fellowship with the International Radio and Television Society (IRTS). The latter led to an internship with CBS Radio/ Westwood One in New York City and the highest honor the IRTS bestows, the Dick Clark Fellow/Mercury Award.

Matt also worked with two commercial radio stations in Erie before making the switch to public relations. In addition, he credits his educational and commercial radio experience with helping to prepare him for a successful career in public relations. By the way, Matt also teaches as an adjunct faculty member in West Virginia University's Integrated Marketing Communications Graduate Program.

Katie Collett, co-anchor of the Channel 6 News Sunrise program at WJAC-TV in Johnstown, not only interned with Cox Broadcasting in Washington, DC, but had such a successful internship experience that she was immediately hired by Cox as a full-time producer. In this role, she covered a number of major national stories including the beginning of the war in Iraq and the release of the 9-11 report. Still, her bosses at Cox knew that Katie's desire was to be on air, so when a reporting position opened up at the Cox-owned WJAC, they supported her in the move.

Matthew Cummings and Katie Collett are but two examples of the many recent graduates who enjoy considerable professional success. 
JACK SPEER ~ A Public Voice.

A 1981 Edinboro graduate, Jack Speer's arrival at National Public Radio (NPR) launched a significant effort to expand the depth and breadth of business coverage offered by NPR. He joined "Morning Edition" in 1998, reporting live for the show on a daily basis, updating the news as developments warranted. His work proved to be a successful and popular addition to the program.

In 1999, he moved to NPR's National Desk, through which his reporting can now be heard on NPR news programs including "All Things Considered," "Morning Edition," and "Weekend Edition." Since moving to the national desk, Speer has produced and reported hundreds of stories, including an award-winning series on securities regulation and the need for greater transparency in the financial markets. His human-interest stories include a piece on the history of America's oldest brewery and a feature on a day spent with one of the last members of the full-time Fuller Brush sales force.

Over his two decades of reporting, Jack won numerous awards, including American University's 14th Annual Journalism Award for "Excellence in Personal Finance Reporting," Best News Feature in the AIR Awards, Best Editorial Commentary from the Washington Journalism Society, and a Best Newscaster award from the New Jersey Associated Press. In 2004, he was awarded a National Press Foundation fellowship.

Jack resides in Maryland with his wife, Colleen Allen, and two children. When he is not trying to keep up with the antics of his energetic young son and daughter, Jack enjoys tennis, swimming, reading, listening to music, and playing his guitar.

EDINBORO GRAD DEDICATES EFFORTS TOWARD A BETTER LIFE FOR **WOUNDED WARRIORS**

In the last issue of the *Edinboro News* we reported on Matthew Baum ('85) and his work with Wounded Warriors and other organizations dedicated to supporting those serving in the military who have been wounded, or killed while engaged in combat operations in the Middle East. In response to those Edinboro alumni who have asked how they can become involved in supporting our wounded veterans, we are sharing this updated information on these organizations.

Baum, who was recently appointed a security advisor to the Chief Information Officer at the Veterans Health Administration in the Veteran Affairs Department in Washington, D.C., became involved with these volunteer organizations through others in the VA and Walter Reed Army Hospital in

Washington. He, along with many other volunteers, helps provide support to these soldiers and their families to lessen their stress and suffering and help mitigate the major life changes they face as a result of their wounds.

The focus of Wounded Warriors is to provide families of servicemen and women wounded or killed in action with free lodging at special resort condominiums in Orlando, Florida, and

Galveston, Texas. The intent is to give these families a place of peace and solace to heal from the physical and psychological trauma of war. Wounded Warriors is a non-profit organization and can be contacted through its website www.woundedwarriors.org.

Baum is also an involved member with the Eastern Amputee Golf Association (www.eaga.org.) and its program called "First Swing." From April through October, the group sponsors golf seminars and clinics for persons with disabilities at country clubs and golf courses from Virginia to Vermont. Baum attended the first event in April at the Woodmont Country Club in Rockville, Maryland. The event was also cosponsored by the Wounded Warriors Project and Disabled Sports USA.

Another organization dedicated to supporting combat wounded veterans is the Aleethia Foundation, www.aleethia.org. Its mission is to provide newly wounded soldiers with short-term therapeutic recreation. It sponsors Friday night dinners, movies and sightseeing trips for patients recuperating at Walter Reed and Bethesda Naval Hospitals in Washington D.C., and accepts donations via their website.

Baum points out the easiest way for Edinboro alumni to get involved in supporting wounded veterans is through donations to the organizations mentioned, or volunteering at their local V.A. hospital. Karen O'Neal is the voluntary service officer at the V.A. Medical Center in Erie, which serves northwestern Pennsylvania and parts of

Ohio. She says more volunteers are always needed and local alumni can get involved by calling (814) 860-2453. For those alumni across the country, Baum encourages them to visit the VA's web site (http://www.va.gov), and click on "Find a Facility" to locate the VA medical center or clinic nearest to them. It is the least we can do for those veterans and their families who gave up their tomorrows for our freedom today.

The adventure started in 2003, when I left my life in Erie, Pennsylvania, to study abroad at a university in Northampton, England. I felt that it was time I ventured out of my safe community into the big wide world. I had planned on studying in England for one semester, but after only two weeks there, I knew I had to extend my stay to one academic year.

I knew little of England except that I could definitely communicate without having to be fluent in a foreign language, there is a well-known royal family who resides in the country, and I would be able to visit the ever-so-popular tourist attraction known as Big Ben during my visit.

Little did I know, for one, American English and British English are quite different. I quickly learned what seemed like a whole new vocabulary and way of life. Acclimating myself to the everyday norms such as taking various forms of public transportation, arriving at a store before the normal closing time of about 5 p.m., and having to pack my own groceries at the check-out counter, were just several aspects of life in England that I learned quickly.

While many international students on campus clung to others from their home countries, I quickly settled in with a flat of seven English girls. Right away we became close friends, and they taught me more about English culture than I ever could have learned by merely visiting England for a short stay as a tourist.

But life while studying abroad didn't always run so smoothly. The university in England forgot to pick me up at the airport upon my arrival, my credit card was stolen and used one month later, and when I arrived back in the U.S., my home university didn't want to accept all of the transfer credits that they originally said they would.* It is important for everyone considering study abroad to be prepared for the ups and downs that come with traveling and living far from home. But I feel that these are the experiences that make us strong, independent, well-rounded individuals.

After my year of studying in England, I returned to Pennsylvania with my husband, where we completed our master's degrees. This gave him a chance to experience education in a foreign country and allowed us to

continue our relationship while living in the same country. Upon graduation, we decided to return to the country that brought us together and continue to travel and learn more about the world we live in.

While some people see traveling as an extravagant leisure activity, I have learned that it is the best educational experience one can have. I have traveled to the Colosseum in Rome, the Pyramids in Egypt, and to the Eiffel Tower in Paris. I have climbed the Great Wall of China, and sailed through the canals in Venice. These are sites that most only read about in books or see on TV. I was able to fully use my five senses to take in and appreciate the amazing sites this world has to offer. These trips were all made possible by the first step I took in deciding to leave the comfort and familiarity of the U.S., and gain the knowledge and experience of traveling while studying abroad.

EDINBORO ALUMNI FIND SHARED SUCCESS IN THE ART WORLD

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania graduates Shane Christensen, Stephen Heywood, Brian Jensen, and Michael Schmidt have directed their energy toward a creative business endeavor to form The Firm, an art collective inspired by the graduate environment they experienced at Edinboro. The artists created the group to foster several ambitions: The Firm maintains the professional

relationship between the four, it establishes groundwork for networking, and it provides numerous other benefits associated with the business end of art. But the impetus of this group is a lasting friendship that holds these four together, allowing each individual's talents to be encouraged by the others, and cultivating the growth of collaborative efforts in the ceramic world.

Christensen, Heywood, Jensen, and Schmidt earned their M.F.A. degrees in ceramics at Edinboro University; each was then a studio technician in the program. Now, they all hold teaching positions scattered throughout the country in Florida, Georgia, and Utah. But distance hasn't kept these friends apart. With phone calls and the Internet, the four have been able to

stay in touch. They meet yearly at the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts (NCECA) conference; they host each other as visiting artists at each other's institutions; and they often meet at lectures and openings for their exhibitions.


The annual luncheon expands the endowment of the Frank and Dorothy Pogue Honors Scholarship established by Pogue. Over the past seven years, the event has raised more than \$900,000 to directly benefit University honors students. "The real reward in serving as university president," Pogue said, "comes in the personal moments of joy, and of sorrow, that will stand out (in memory) through the passage of time."

TRUSTEES RENAME UNIVERSITY CENTER TO HONOR PRESIDENT POGUE



Edinboro University's Council of Trustees unanimously voted to rename the University Center the "Frank G. Pogue Student Center" in honor of President Pogue.

Chairman Thomas further announced the University will bestow emeritus status on Dr. and Mrs. Pogue.

Dr. Pogue thanked the trustees for their actions, saying, "I am gratified and honored to be among those significant Edinboro figures for whom other campus buildings were named, and to become linked to the long history of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania."


WALDO F. BATES HONORED WITH MEMORIAL PLAQUE

Edinboro University honored former art professor Waldo F. Bates Jr., with the unveiling of a memorial in Loveland Hall.

Bates, a beloved art teacher, professor and chair of the Art Department, taught at Edinboro from 1920 to 1954. Through Bates' efforts the Normal School program of teaching art education was expanded to include professional visual arts training in new areas of concentration at Edinboro State Teachers College. Bates was a pivotal player in efforts to increase enrollment and by 1929 had succeeded in establishing Edinboro as the recognized art program in the western half of Pennsylvania's state colleges.

Using archival photographs, professor Michelle Vitali designed a memorial plaque that places Bates in front of a blackboard filled with his chalked instructions.

The memorial was initiated by the Waldo Committee and funded by the University's Student Art League, Student Government Association, and Development Office.



He first attended the Art Institute of Pittsburgh while in grade school, and excelled in art in high school where his painting entitled "Gentleman's Wharf" (for which he won an award) is on permanent display in the office of the high school. In the Spring of 2006, Michael won the Eclectic Etceteras Coffee House Arts and Crafts Scholarship award at Edinboro University for metals/jewelry design. Michael's creativity was exhibited with many media, however in his

junior year in college his interest in metals and jewelry design became his true focus, influenced by Professor Cappy Counard. Michael did wonderful work with his hands and often spoke through his creations. He had a great passion for eclectic art, trends and edgy fashion and this was exhibited in his own personal style. His exterior showed a young man of artistic spirit and style and on the inside there was a heart of purest gold. His genuine personality and unique charm made him loved by many.

Michael passed away on July 25, 2006, at the age of 22. He graduated from Gateway High School in 2002 and attended Bethany College for his freshman year. Michael transferred to Edinboro University of Pennsylvania where he would have graduated in the Spring of 2007 earning a degree in fine arts with an emphasis in jewelry design/metalsmithing.

Michael's father, Rich, along with his mother Jan and brother Devin, created this scholarship with help from family and friends, as a memorial to Michael to honor and cherish his

Michael wore a tattoo on the left side of his body that was the first part of the Victor Hugo quote, "The supreme happiness in life is the conviction we are loved." This quote can also be found on a metal plate on one of his tool boxes, a tracing lamp, note books, as well as embedded in his artwork. The Gmitter family designed three large pavers with this quote, installed in the Fighting Scot Statue complex, in loving memory of Michael. It had a special meaning to him and it has taken on a special meaning to his family and friends, and Edinboro University.

She's known for competing in grueling challenges on two of MTV's biggest-hit reality series. But for Diem Brown, the road of life's real challenges have been fought and won off-screen.

Just after being chosen to compete on "Road Rules: Fresh Meat" in 2005, Brown – who said she was just getting her bearings straight after the unexpected loss of her mother – was diagnosed with stage two ovarian cancer.

What followed, she told a crowd of hundreds of Edinboro University students, was "awful pain – intense, immense, awful pain," and a doctor's declaration that she could hope, at best, to live for about five more years.

"That's not gonna work for me," she said was her reply.



So, determined as many with terminal sentences are to live life to its fullest, Brown continued on to participate in that show's season, and more recently to appear on MTV's

"Real World/Road Rules Challenge: The Duel."

And in the meantime, she's become cancer-free and established Live for the Challenge, a Web-based charity organization (at www.liveforthechallenge.com) that helps medical patients establish registries to help with materials and expenses. Similar in design to maternity and wedding registries, the concept, put into action last fall, is the first of its kind to get off the ground.

"I think every single person has their 'cancer.' Everyone has a roadblock in their life," she said. "For me, the best thing was... finding somewhere to go toward," to give back.

Speaking on the importance of giving back was what brought Brown and one of her co-stars from "The Duel," Brad Fiorenza, to Edinboro. Both were guests at the University's second annual Philanthropy Day, an event to highlight and promote goodwill and service in the campus community and beyond. All proceeds from the event will benefit the newly-established university Student Legacy Scholarship fund, which provides an annual award to a senior with demonstrated financial need.

"Whenever I get a chance to stop and do charity work, I always do," Fiorenza told the Tribune at a meet-and-greet with top scholarship fund-raising groups and volunteers prior to the presentation. "You've got to stop and give back whenever you can. ... I wish I had more time (to give back). As soon as I do, I will."

At the meet-and-greet, university student Katie Hain was admittedly star-struck by the presences of both Brown and Fiorenza. "It's really awesome. It's a privilege that I got to meet these people. I talked to both of them," she said. "They're both really nice. ... (But) I didn't really know what to say."

Marilyn Goellner, director of the university Annual Fund and Stewardship program, said inviting easily-identifiable celebrities like Brown and Fiorenza to the campus is one effective tool to get students excited about getting involved with the university's civic works. "We have a captive audience," she said with a laugh.

The events were organized by university graduate student Seth Travis and sponsored by the university Marketing and Development Office, Student Government Association, Planning Board and the SOLID volunteer group.

DR. DONALD KAUFMAN CLASS OF 1966



Donald G. Kaufman, professor emeritus of zoology at Miami University, is the Director of the Hefner Zoology

Museum and the Center for Environmental Education, Natural History, and Conservation.

A native of Pittsburgh, Don earned a bachelor's degree from Edinboro in 1966 and a master's degree in 1968. He received his Ed.D. from Ball State University in 1973. Don joined the Miami University faculty in 1973, teaching first on the Hamilton campus and later on the Oxford campus. During his time at Miami, he earned several of the University's most prestigious honors, including the Outstanding Teacher of the

Year (1992), the E. Phillips Knox Teaching Award (1996) and the Distinguished Educator, College of Arts and Science (1996-97). Don also has received regional, national, and international recognition for his teaching and scholarship.

Don's most important scholarly contribution to the field of environmental studies is *Biosphere 2000: Protecting Our Global Environment*, which he coauthored with Cecilia Franz. The introductory-level college text has received a number of awards and honors.

Since 1986, Don has conducted workshops and seminars designed to help K-8 teachers become more effective science teachers using environmental themes to teach science concepts. Over the past 20 years, he has received grants totaling well over \$2 million to support workshops for teachers. Funding sources include the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Department of Energy, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Procter & Gamble Company, and Cinergy Corporation.

In 2000, Don's abiding interest in environmental education launched him on a new journey, when he was named the Director of the Hefner Zoology Museum with a mandate to expand and transform the facility into a center for environmental education and natural history. Just two years later, the museum staff unveiled an entirely renovated main gallery featuring seven new exhibits as well as new displays of favorite museum collections. Don and his staff have since renovated two additional spaces, one for children ages 3-9 (the Imaginarium) and the other for general audiences (the Paul Daniel Classroom). The Hefner Zoology Museum offers numerous programs to serve diverse audiences, from preschool children through university students, faculty to K-12 teachers, and the general public.



Kathy and Terry Perich ('70) were recently named 2007 Penn Township Citizens of the Year by the Penn-Trafford Star. The Periches are retired Penn-Trafford teachers, having taught for a combined 66 years. They remain active in the community, assisting neighbors, groups and anyone who asks for help. The couple has published three books on the history of Jeannette, Pa., Penn Township, and other Pennsylvania communities.

Donald Nuss, Ph.D. ('69) is professor of Pathobiology in the University of Maryland Biotechnology Institute (UMBI). Located on the recently expanded Shady Grove campus, Dr. Nuss was instrumental in securing funding and overseeing design and construction details of a new \$60 million research facility for UMBI's Center for Advanced Research in Biotechnology and Center for Biosystems Research during his tenure as CBR Director.

Researchers in this state-of-the-art facility study complex biological systems for increasing crop yields, enhancing human and animal health and modifying microorganisms for production of biologicals or environmental improvement. He researches pathogenic interactions between viruses, fungi and plants with an emphasis on the use of viruses to understand and control plant diseases caused by fungal pathogens.

Fueled by major advances in recombinant DNA technology, cell and developmental biology and genome sciences, the research performed by Dr. Nuss and colleagues is of increasing importance, as society faces a future of dwindling resources driven by a projected doubling in world population by the year 2030. Biotechnology holds promise for meeting increased demand for food, fiber and manufactured goods without destroying the environment in the process.



GILLESPIE BECOMES EDINBORO'S THIRD DIVISION I NATIONAL WRESTLING CHAMPION



Enduring
a journey that
included a
rematch with one of
the two wrestlers who had
defeated him during the regular
season, followed by a bout with the
defending national champion, and
concluding with a matchup against a
hometown favorite, Edinboro's Gregor
Gillespie became the third Fighting Scot to
win a Division I national championship.

Gillespie's performance sparked the Fighting Scots to their second straight top ten finish at the NCAA Division I Wrestling National Championship at The Palace of Auburn Hills in Auburn Hills, Michigan.

The way the tournament started, it's hard to believe Edinboro enjoyed such success. For starters, freshman Daryl Cocozzo failed to make weight at 141 lbs. Then Edinboro saw Phil Moricone and Jim Gibson lose their pigtail matches. Finally, Gillespie went down with what first appeared to be a serious injury less than a minute into his opening match.

As it would turn out, Gillespie was just fine, and so were the Fighting Scots. When it was all

said and done, three Fighting Scots earned trips to the stand as All-Americans, making it two years in a row Edinboro had three All-Americans.

In addition to Gillespie, Alex Clemsen made his fourth trip to Nationals well worth it, as he brought home fourth place at 184 lbs. Deonte Penn, meanwhile, concluded his career by joining Gillespie as a two-time All-American. Penn finished seventh at 165 lbs. And the Fighting Scots finished ninth, marking the second straight year in the

top ten.

But the tournament belonged to Gillespie. He came in as the number five seed at 149 lbs., and shook off the leg injury to post a 9-5 decision over Sam Alvarenga of VMI in his opening match.

Next came a

10-2 major decision over 12th-seeded Dan Vallimont of Penn State.

In the quarterfinals, the sophomore gained a bit of revenge for an earlier 9-4 loss in overtime to Cornell's Jordan Leen. This time around Gillespie disposed of Leen, the fourth seed, via a 6-2 decision, leaving him with a bout against top-seeded Dustin Schlatter of Minnesota in the semifinals.

A year ago both Schlatter and Gillespie were freshmen at Nationals. While Gillespie would go on to earn All-American honors with a seventh place finish, Schlatter blitzed the field to win the national championship. The 3-2 upset by Gillespie had the crowd of 14,745 yelling its approval.

In the finals, Gillespie was matched against Michigan's Josh Churella, and was able to stave off Churella's takedown attempt, then gained control and spun around Churella for the winning takedown late in overtime.

The victory set off a wild celebration for Gillespie, who jumped into head coach Tim Flynn's arms, and a small but boisterous group of Edinboro supporters were heard throughout the match.

Gillespie finished his sophomore campaign with a 34-2 record, boosting his career mark to an incredible 74-6.

GREGOR GILLESPIE NAMED EWL AND PSAC WRESTLER OF THE YEAR; TIM FLYNN SELECTED PSAC COACH OF THE YEAR

The Edinboro wrestling team captured several major post-season awards. Gregor Gillespie was named both the EWL and PSAC Wrestler of the Year and Tim Flynn was voted the PSAC Coach of the Year. It marked the eighth straight year an Edinboro wrestler has captured the PSAC Wrestler of the Year award.

Gillespie capped his sophomore season by becoming just the third wrestler in Edinboro history to win the national championship at the NCAA Division I Wrestling National Championships.

Gillespie joins Sean O'Day (1989) and Josh Koscheck (2001) as Edinboro's lone Division I national champions. In addition, he is now a two-time All-American after finishing seventh a year ago. He is just the 12th Fighting Scot to earn All-American honors more than once. He will enter his junior year with an impressive 74-6 career record.

Flynn has now guided Edinboro to back-to-back top ten finishes at the NCAA Division I National Championships after the Fighting Scots finished ninth. It capped another brilliant season for the

team, as the Fighting Scots finished with a 17-1 record, a school record for wins, and was sixth in the final USA Today/InterMat/NWCA Division I rankings, the highest ranking in school history.

Under Flynn's direction, Edinboro won its second straight PSAC Championship and eighth in the Flynn's ten years as head coach. In addition, the Fighting Scots won their fifth straight EWL and ninth in ten years with Flynn at the helm.

This marks the sixth time Flynn has been recognized as the PSAC Coach of the Year. He previously won the award in 1998, 1999, 2000, 2003, and 2004.



EDINBORO PLACES TWO ON ALL-PSAC MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM

Daren Tielsch Named to First Team, Curtis Ingram on Second Unit

When the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference announced its 2006-07 All-PSAC Men's Basketball Teams, two Edinboro players were recognized – Daren Tielsch was a first team selection, while Curtis Ingram was accorded second team honors.

This marks the second straight year Tielsch has been named to the All-PSAC Western Division First Team. The 6'8", 230 lb. forward concluded a brilliant three-year career by leading the Fighting Scots both in scoring (16.5 ppg.) and rebounding (9.4 rpg.). He stood fifth in the PSAC in scoring and second in rebounding, after leading the conference in rebounding a year ago.

Tielsch shot a team-high 50.5 percent from the floor, ranking 15th in the PSAC, making 185 of 366 field goal attempts. He added 91 free throws in 184 attempts. The 184 attempts ranks fourth in the season record books. A year ago he set the standard with 210 attempts. In addition, Tielsch stood second on the

team in assists (54) and blocked shots (28) and was third in steals (33).


The transfer from Penn State led the Fighting Scots in scoring 14 times and was the top rebounder on 20 occasions. He had 12 double-doubles and scored in double figures in 25 of 29 games.

Like Tielsch, Ingram began his career on the Division I level before coming to Edinboro. A 6'3", 196 lb. guard, he played two seasons at Wofford before joining the Fighting Scots in 2005-06. Like Tielsch, he was a main reason Edinboro finished with 20 wins and won its second straight PSAC title, averaging 13.1 ppg. and 5.3 rpg.

Ingram enjoyed very similar numbers this year, averaging 13.1 ppg. and 4.8 rpg., but there's no question he enjoyed an even better season as a senior. While finishing as the second-leading scorer, he made 140 of 329 field goal attempts (42.6 percent), including 37 of 111 three-pointers,

and shot a team-high 76.8 percent from the line (63 of 82).

Ingram concluded his career with a string of 12 straight

FIGHTING SCOTS DROP 81-58 DECISION AT IUP IN PSAC QUARTERFINALS

For a half it looked as if the Edinboro University women's basketball team had a chance to upset Indiana, the top seed in the PSAC West. But the Crimson Hawks exploded for 59 points in the second half to defeat the visiting Fighting Scots in the PSAC Quarterfinal game, 81-58. The loss ended Edinboro's season at 14-14.

Kelly Calderone led the Boro with 17 points, as the senior guard concluded her career with 1,460 points. That's good for fourth all-time, in just three seasons. Calderone also went 5-for-6 from the line, giving her a school-record 153 free throws made on the season. That breaks the old mark of 152 set by Lachelle Crawl in 2002-03.

Rachel Johnson was the only other Fighting Scot in double figures, making 7 of 9 field goals to finish with 14 points. Conklin got into foul trouble in the second half and ended the night with 9 points and 10 rebounds.

ALEX CLEMSEN JOINS ELITE OF PSAC WRESTLERS

When the Edinboro University wrestling team won its second straight PSAC Championship and eighth in ten years, five wrestlers came away with individual titles. One victor particularly stood out. Alex Clemsen, who won the 184 lb. championship, became just the 14th wrestler in PSAC history to win four PSAC championships. Clemsen had previously won the crown at 184 lbs. in 2003, 2004 and 2006. The senior won by major decision over Tom Kocher of Lock Haven, 14-4, to ioin Josh Koscheck as the only Fighting Scots to win four crowns.

SOX HARRISON STADIUM TO UNDERGO RENOVATIONS

Edinboro President Dr. Frank Pogue announced in January that the University has approved plans for major renovations at Sox Harrison Stadium. The plan, which calls for artificial turf, a lighting system, and a new scoreboard, was approved by Edinboro's Student Government Association prior to that.

"I firmly believe this is another project that is in line with our housing renovations, the expansion of the University Center, and the renovation of Academy Hall to maintain Edinboro University's place as a major regional resource," commented Dr. Pogue. "Most importantly, this reaffirms our commitment to enhancing diversity and community outreach, making another campus facility available for more individuals."

Pogue said that improvements to Sox Harrison Stadium have been in the works for quite some time. "It is gratifying to see different entities at the University work together to make this possible," he commented. "That includes the Finance and Administration Office, the student government leadership, along with the Athletic Department staff. This had been in the talking stages for several years, but over the past few months they explored this issue thoroughly and have now made it a reality."

"The ability to expand our programmatic offerings for the student body is what made this project so attractive to us,"



stated SGA President Josh Novak. "This benefits the entire campus community, and I think is why it was so widely supported by the Student Government Association. This is an idea whose time had come. This continues to improve the quality of life for Edinboro students, and will be another recruiting tool for the University."

Director of Athletics Bruce Baumgartner noted that the University is still talking with

several artificial turf firms, and that the field will be similar to those installed in recent years at other area universities and high schools.

He emphasized that the installation of lights was a major part of the package. "This project isn't just about a field for athletics," Baumgartner stressed. "The driving force behind this entire project is for Sox Harrison Stadium to become a multi-use facility."

Baumgartner noted that when the project is complete, Sox Harrison Stadium will be used for a variety of campus and community events. That includes classes, recreational sports, homecoming events, and club sports. The University would also look to attract possible PIAA playoff contests.

If all goes according to plan, bids will be awarded soon and work will begin this summer, with the renovations to Sox Harrison Stadium completed in time for the football season opener against West Chester on Saturday, September 1.

Station, Ohio.


EDINBORO HONORS SCHOLAR ATHLETES AT 18th ANNUAL BANQUET

Edinboro's Chris Rhodes was recently named the 2006-07 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Women's Swimming Coach of the Year.

Rhodes, a native of Oil City, Pa., is a former All-American

at Edinboro who returned to his alma mater in 2002 as the head coach. Since that time he has worked to return the Fighting Scot swimming program to the excellence it enjoyed in the 1990s. He has improved the number of Edinboro all-conference performers each year and also produced Edinboro's first All-American since 1995 in Brooke Heath.

The women's team finished with a deceiving 4-7 record, then went on to turn in its best showing at the

PSAC Championships since he took over, finishing sixth out of 13 teams. Heath led the way. The junior captured All-PSAC honors in the 100 and 200-yard breaststroke, the 200-yard IM, and

Heath would go on to earn AII-American honors three times at the NCAA Division II National Championships as Edinboro finished 20th. In all, a total of five individuals earned AII-PSAC honors, with Desirée Thomas, Amy Corbran, and Samantha Sustrich joining Heath on the 400-yard medley relay team.

KELLY CALDERONE EARNS ALL-PSAC WEST HONORS FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference announced its All-PSAC Women's Basketball Teams, with Edinboro senior Kelly Calderone recognized for her third year in a row.

Calderone earned a spot on the All-PSAC West First Team for the second straight year, after being a second team selection as a sophomore.

Calderone transferred to Edinboro after playing for one season at the University at Buffalo. She enjoyed an outstanding three-year career, finishing fourth in career scoring with 1,460 career points. In addition, her career average of 16.8 ppg. ranks third.

In 28 games, the 5'7" guard led Edinboro in scoring at 18.3 ppg., a figure which ranks fourth in the PSAC. Her 513 points ranked 12th in the season records. She shot 39.7 percent from the floor (162 of 408). Including 36 of 112 on three-pointers, and made 153 of 182 free throws. She led the Fighting Scots in scoring in 20 contests, while scoring in double figures in 26 of 28 games.

While playing just three seasons as a Fighting Scot, Calderone compiled some impressive numbers. In addition to her 1,460 career points, she set the career record for free throws made with 415, is fourth in career free throws attempted (485), set the school record for career free throw percentage at 85.9 percent, a figure which is also first all-time in the PSAC. She finished fourth in career three-pointers made (153) and fifth in career three-pointers attempted (446). She is 13th in career assists (263) and 11th in career steals (195).

Edinboro finished the season with a 14-14 record, suffering an 81-58 loss to Indiana (Pa.) in the PSAC quarterfinals.

MILLERSVILLE HANDS EDINBORO 65-55 DEFEAT IN PSAC SEMIFINALS

Fighting Scots
End the Year
with 19-10 Record

Edinboro's quest for a third straight Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference championship came to an end in March as the Fighting Scots suffered a 65-55 loss to Millersville in the PSAC semifinals.

The contest matched the PSAC's top defensive team, Edinboro, against a Millersville team which led the PSAC in scoring. The Fighting Scots did a solid job defensively, holding the Marauders well under their season scoring average of 82.9 ppg., and also limited them to 32.8 percent shooting from the floor. Millersville came in ranked second in the PSAC in field goal percentage at 47.7 percent, while Edinboro was first in field goal percentage defense and third nationally at 38.0 percent.

However, one area Edinboro appeared to have an advantage was on the boards. The Fighting Scots ranked third in rebounding margin while the Marauders were 12th. But on this evening Millersville controlled the glass, 49-37. That was enough to overcome 19 turnovers by a Millersville team that came in leading the PSAC in turnover margin.

Edinboro ended up tying the school record for wins in a three-year period with 64. The Scots also fell one win short of reaching 20 wins for the third straight year, something which had never been done before.

EDINBORO ANNOUNCES ALL-TIME MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM

JAKIM DONALDSON: From a raw walk-on as a freshman, the 6'8" forward departed as a first team NABC All-American in 2004-05. Donaldson is the only player in Edinboro history with 1,000 career points (1,335) and 1,000 career rebounds (1,100), ranking eighth in career wins and first in rebounds.

TYRONE MASON: Edinboro's all-time leading scorer with 1,954 points and a career scoring average of 23.6 ppg. A 6'1" guard who was a first team NABC All-American in 1995-96, Mason holds the top two single-season scoring campaigns.

DAN PETCHEL: One of three players from the 1960s, Petchel is the first All-American on record at Edinboro. The 6'4" forward was accorded second team NAIA honors in 1964-65. He ranks ninth in career scoring (1,344 points).

FRED RILEY: One of four Boro players to earn All-American honors more than once, the 5'10" guard was a third team NAIA All-American in 1971-72 after earning honorable mention honors the previous year. He ranks tenth in career scoring with 1,279 points, and also holds the career record for steals (246) while playing three seasons.

TIM SMILEY: A 6'1" guard, Smiley was an honorable mention NAIA All-American in 1974-75 and again in 1975-76, leading Edinboro to the NAIA National Tournament both years. He is the third all-time leading scorer with 1,553 points.

FRANK SMITH: Another of the players from the 60s, Smith scored 1,225 career points, good for 12th all-time. That includes a school-record average of 30.1 ppg. in 1966-67. The 6'2" forward holds the top two single game scoring figures with 54 and 52 points.

ROY STAUFFER: While ranking 18th in career scoring at 1,149 points, Stauffer earned NAIA All-American honors in two of his three seasons. He was honorable mention choice in 1972-73 and 1973-74.

KENNY TATE: A second team NABC All-American in 2001-02, he accumulated 1,552 points and 843 rebounds in three seasons as a Fighting Scot. The 6'4" forward ranks fourth in both categories.

The remaining four members of the team aren't too shabby, either. For starters, there's **Walt Askins**. A 6'5" forward, he is the player with the most tenure, having played from 1956-60. Askins ranks second in career scoring at 1,739 points, including 26.1 ppg. in 1956-57.

Then there's Adam Kaufman, who wasn't known for his scoring but rather his playmaking. The 5'11" guard holds the Edinboro career record for assists (936), and also has four of the top five season assists marks. That includes a school-record 273 in 1997-98, his freshman campaign. Kaufman scored 1,148 career points.

Billy Wade and Price Williams round out the All-Time Team. Wade played from 1986-90. The 6'7" forward ranks sixth in both career scoring (1,446 points) and career rebounds (792). Williams played two seasons at Edinboro, and earned All-PSAC honors both in 1991-92 and 1993-94. He scored 912 career points.

EDINBORO ALL-TIME WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM ANNOUNCED

We now present the All-Time Women's Basketball Team. A total of twelve former players were selected. The group is highlighted by the six former players who have earned All-American honors. That includes:

JESSICA ROWE, Edinboro's all-time leading scorer with 1,846 points, and a first team Kodak All-American in 1999-2000

TAMMY WALKER-STRODE, Edinboro's lone two-time All-American, earning a spot on the Kodak All-American first team in 1991-92 after landing a spot on the honorable mention team in 1990-91. Walker-Strode played two seasons at Edinboro and ranks ninth in career scoring (1,273 points) and fourth in career rebounds (777).

JEANNINE JEAN-PIERRE, a two-year performer for the Fighting Scots who was a first team Kodak All-American in 1992-93 when she averaged 21.4 ppg. and 11.7 rpg.


HEATHER GATES, who was an honorable mention Kodak All-American choice in 1996-97 after leading Division II in rebounding (14.3 rpg.). She is one of only two players to reach 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in her career, finishing with 1,320 points and 1,301 rebounds.

MARIN HIGHTOWER, a 1999-2000 honorable mention All-American who set a school-record with 23.6 ppg. that season.

CALLIE IORFIDO, an honorable mention All-American a year ago when she set the school record for career assists with 682. That figure ranks second all-time in the PSAC.

The rest of the team is still a "who's who" of Edinboro women's basketball, and represents several eras. From the 1980s there is Tina Skidmore, who played from 1977-81 and ranks eighth in career scoring with 1,337 career points. Sarah Bishop leads a contingent of three players from the late '80s, all who were integral parts of the 1989-90 team which finished 27-3. Bishop played from 1986-90 and ranks third in career scoring with 1,652 points. She is joined by Montigue Wade, the second all-time leading scorer and the only other player with 1,000 points and rebounds (1,113 rebounds, also second), and Andrea Martre, who was the point guard on the '89-90 squad.

The 1990s includes players like Meghan Miller, who ranks fourth in career scoring (1,426 points), and Pam Artman, who ranks second in career assists (500) and first in career steals (304).

The Fighting Scots nearly captured their first national title, upsetting Illinois to reach the championship game. In the semifinals, Edinboro faced an Illinois team which has always given them a great deal of trouble in the past. After falling behind early, the Fighting Scots roared back for a 58-41 win. Looney again led the way with 19 points, and Jose Leep finished with 11.

Edinboro, 24-9, was led by Jose Leep in the title game. The three-time first team All-American concluded a brilliant career with 18 points. Bryce Doody added 13 points and Jason Mathews 11.



After Penn's pin put the team title out of reach, Alex Clemsen took the mat at 184 lbs. and brought home his first EWL title, thanks to a 4-1 decision over Bloomsburg's Nate Shirk. Clemsen had previously finished second as a sophomore and junior, along with a third place finish as a freshman.

Jim Gibson's run at a championship finally came to an end as he suffered a 4-2 loss to West Virginia's Jared Villers in the finals at 197 lbs.

In addition to the finalists, the Fighting Scots had two wrestlers finish third and three more fourth, as all five of Edinboro's wrestlers in the consolation bracket reached the third place match. Daryl Cocozzo, a true freshman, placed third at 141 lbs., while Phil Moricone won by technical fall to take third place at 174 lbs. Eric Morrill (125 lbs.), Matt Hill (157 lbs.), and Joe Fendone (hwt.)

brought home fourth place finishes.

Edinboro's four finalists earned trips to Nationals. In addition, four more wrestlers were accorded wild card berths, giving Edinboro eight national qualifiers. Those four were Cocozzo at 141 lbs., Hill at 157 lbs., Moricone at 174 lbs., and Fendone at heavyweight. The top two in each weight class plus 12 wild card selections comprised the EWL's contingent of 32 national qualifiers.

DR. JEREMY D. BROWN SELECTED PRESIDENT

Dr. Jeremy D. Brown, provost and vice president for academic affairs at State University of New York, Canton, has been selected to serve as the next president of Edinboro University. Dr. Brown will begin his tenure at Edinboro on July 1.

"Dr. Brown will bring to Edinboro University of Pennsylvania a distinguished record as both an educator and administrator," said Board of Governors Chairman Kenneth M. Jarin. "He is an excellent choice to lead Edinboro into the future."

"Following the leadership of President Frank G. Pogue, Edinboro University is poised to write a new chapter under Dr. Brown, who will make an exceptional president," said Harry Thomas, chairman of Edinboro University's Council of Trustees. "Dr. Brown has the experience and the vision to position the University for great success in the 21st century."

Harold Shields, chairman of the University's Presidential Search Committee and secretary of the Council of Trustees, also said he is pleased with the Board of Governor's decision.

"We are confident and convinced Dr. Brown's background and experience in higher education now position him to immediately continue the process of furthering Edinboro's growth in terms of academic excellence and enrollment," Shields said. He was particularly appreciative of the many University constituencies – faculty, students and staff – that participated in the interview process during the presidential candidates' campus visits the past several months.

Dr. Brown said he is looking forward to assuming the Edinboro presidency.

"I am absolutely delighted and am looking forward to meeting the challenges that are facing all of higher education," he said. "I am looking forward to being part of the success story."

As provost at SUNY-Canton, Dr. Brown serves as the 2,600-student university's chief academic officer. He developed a strategic planning council, implemented a plan to introduce distance education to the campus and cultivated international collaborations in Eastern Europe, the former Soviet Union and Asia.

Dr. Brown earned both a Bachelor of Arts and a Ph.D. in physics from the University of Birmingham, England.

He served on the faculty at Princeton for seven years, where he taught both undergraduate and graduate level physics courses. From 1987 to 1992, he also served as a resident faculty fellow at Rockefeller College and was the faculty liaison for academic and social programs.

Dr. Brown was named associate dean of the Graduate School at Yale University in 1992, and also served as a lecturer in the University's Physics Department for three years. He administered more than \$30 million in financial aid and served as the chief budget officer for tuition and aid, overseeing an annual budget of more than \$60 million.

In 1995, Dr. Brown returned to Princeton as associate dean of the faculty, where he advised the dean of faculty and provost on long-range academic planning and budgeting. He was named rector of Florida State-Panama in 2000, serving as the chief executive officer of a small U.S. university operating in Latin America. While he was there, enrollment increased by 40 percent, revenues doubled and a number of new programs were introduced.
