

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

Ome years ago, during the height of our first-ever and now historic capital campaign, I was pleased to have the opportunity to introduce one of our major campaign donors at a special philanthropic awards banquet. When I was introduced, the emcee (a graduate, I learned later, of one of our sister State System universities) introduced me as being from that "little state university up in northwestern Pennsylvania." Far from being insulted, I was instead amused and have often repeated the vignette, particularly when I speak and write about Edinboro's remarkable growth in terms of enrollment and academic integrity.

Enrollment has increased – at record levels – to 8,202 in the fall of 1992. During this academic year, Edinboro attracted students from 65 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties, the District of Columbia, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and 44 foreign countries. The Edinboro campus is truly representative of the rich mix of backgrounds and cultures we have strived to bring to the Edinboro student of the 1990s and the 21st century. In addition, Edinboro is now the third largest institution of the 14 making up the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education.

Much of Edinboro University's growth has paralleled that of the State System, which celebrates its tenth anniversary in 1993. As I was an early advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, this decade of achievements has special meaning to me. Now in its tenth year of service to the citizens of the Commonwealth, the System's 14 universities enroll more than 98,000 students – 88 percent of whom are Pennsylvania residents – and employ more than 11,000 faculty, administrators and support staff, making it the 18th largest employer in the state.

Many of the events planned to recognize the System's tenth anniversary will be held across Pennsylvania in and near cities and towns where Edinboro alumni live and work. I encourage all of you to join me and others as we extend our congratulations to the State System of Higher Education on ten years of success.

Foster F. Diebold, President Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Homecoming 1992 is now behind us. From my point of view, this year's homecoming must rate near – if not at – the top of successful events for the University. With two golf outings, an "easy" run, and a full bag of activities in between, Homecoming showcased the University on a beautiful October weekend. At the close of that weekend, it made me wonder just how many really understand the roles an active alumnus or alumna of Edinboro University can continue to play after graduation.

Your journey toward your current alumni status began at the very onset of your involvement with Edinboro. The day you graduated, the official transition from student to graduate was made, but the connection to your alma mater doesn't have to end there. Many have returned to the University for additional degrees and certifications; for others the connection to Edinboro has been for cultural, social and athletic events. In each instance their ties with the University have grown stronger.

When we were attending Edinboro as students, we weren't yet a part of the real world. Returning to campus is like walking back into one of the best parts of our lives. But as students we learned how to deal with and become a part of the greater world, and we are all better for it.



eil Diamond rides them. School kids in Greenville and Reynolds ride them. The Denver Broncos ride them. The Edinboro University Ski Club rides them. The L.A. Raiders ride them, as do another 250,000 passengers every year. "Them" are the buses, motorcoaches and vans of Anderson Bus & Tour, One Anderson Plaza, Greenville, Pa., Doug Anderson, Edinboro '81, president and chief executive officer.


Welcome to the world of Anderson Bus & Tour. Enter that world and enter a sort of time warp where business is done the old-fashioned way. ("They earn it.") Amid the modern business trappings of computers and fax machines and high-speed copiers sits the company's president in a modest, no-nonsense office. Only a plexiglass room divider separates him from the workforce of 96 fulltime and 57 part-time employees. One of them, a full-timer, is his mom, Dorotha ("Dot"), the corporate treasurer. Daily she still handles the "books," everything from selling and pricing the trips, to planning the itineraries and charting the routes, to setting up the drivers and dispatching them properly. The corporate vice president is the president's brother, Lyle, who is also a full-time driver.

Three times during a 45-minute interview, Doug excuses himself and personally greets customers in the nearby reception area. It's face-to-face business, handshakes and backslaps all around. There are smiling,

happy faces on employees and customers alike. He says that the business was built on long-term employer-employee relationships. Of the customers – a quarter-million every year – some are famous . . . most are just real people. But they all ride and take tours just the same and they keep coming back. The recession does not seem to reign at One Anderson Plaza.

It is a business that has grown from its roots but has not outgrown them. The house where Doug was raised now holds offices and is connected to the 5,000 square foot office and terminal complex that was formally dedicated as One Anderson Plaza on June 1, 1991. The terminal and nearby lot hold many, but not all, of the 40 motorcoaches, 29 school buses, and five vans. Most are on the road serving and moving happy customers to and from places like Atlantic City, Disney World, the Poconos, Opryland in Tennessee, the Grand Canyon, Colonial Williamsburg, Washington's Cherry Blossom Festival, and to the new "Mall of America" in Bloomington, Minnesota. Since 1964 when tours to Alaska were added, Anderson tours have gone to all 49 continental states, Hawaii, all Canadian provinces, and in 1992, added professionallyguided tours in Europe, Australia and New Zealand. It's by no accident that the 76-page Anderson Bus & Tour brochure that lists hundreds of available trips and tours is titled the "Wish Book." The Andersons have made the travel and touring wishes of millions come true.

Graduating from high school in the mid-1930s, O. D. (Orville DeWayne) Anderson began working on the family farm in rural Mercer County. He bought a converted panel truck to deliver strawberries to markets in New Castle after he delivered his brother to school. Soon he began picking up other students from school, and as Mercer County's one-room schools began to consolidate, the school bus enterprise grew as well. In 1937 Dad Anderson founded the O. D. Anderson Bus Company, and located it south of the town of Mercer. He moved the fledgling business to its present location on Conneaut Lake Road, north of Greenville, in 1948, and that

same year bought the company's first motor-coach for \$13,000. (The newest of the three generations of motorcoaches now garaged at One Anderson Plaza, the four purchased in 1987, cost \$185,000 each.) The earliest Anderson sightseeing tours were school-sponsored trips to Pittsburgh for local school children to visit the H. J. Heinz plant, Buhl Planetarium, and the Carnegie Museum.

O. D. Anderson died in 1990, but according to Doug, he never left the business, driving a tour bus the day before he died, adding the last miles to the four million he'd logged over the years. His legacy is the sense of integrity he instilled in the business and in his sons (and widow) who now run it. O. D. understood the value of customer service long before Deming and his Japanese disciples began preaching it, and even longer before "total quality management" became the salve and newfound savvy of corporate America.

"I eat, drink and sleep this business, and I've been involved in it all my life," said Doug, pointing again during a walking tour of the grounds at the house where he grew up, which is now literally and figuratively a part of the sprawling, modern Greenville complex. "As a child, I played in the bus garage."

The last statement belies the fact that he is an eminently devoted family man. He and wife, Lori, who is also an Edinboro graduate, (two degrees: bachelor's in 1982 and master's in 1988, both in education,) live "three houses

down the street" from One Anderson Plaza. The real family pride, though, shows nowadays in new son Evan DeWayne, born on April 28, 1992. A teacher in the nearby Reynolds School District since 1984, Lori is now on maternity leave.

Though both Doug and Lori are Edinboro alumni, the Edinboro campus was not where they met. It seems that Lori was an O. D. Anderson Bus Company tour escort in the summers, and Doug, of course, was driving and fixing buses. As Lori somewhat elliptically tells it, Doug was underneath one of the school buses doing repairs when they first met. She was drawn to Edinboro by its repute for teacher education; Doug by the business curriculum. He still recalls Mr. Gary Barbour of the University's business and economics department as one of his favorite professors, as well as Dr. Merrick Owen, recently retired from Edinboro's science faculty, with whom Doug worked closely to establish ski club trips to several New England locations. Owen was the club's adviser, Doug its student president. It was obviously the beginning of a long-term business arrangement – the club still charters Anderson motorcoaches to ski lodges in New York and Vermont.

So how's business, what with all the down-in-the-mouth campaign rhetoric about the economy, Doug is asked. "Great," he says. "In fact, the bus and tour industry got super PR from the bus trips Bill Clinton and Al Gore took during and after the '92 presidential election." With Doug at the wheel of one of them, a dozen Anderson motorcoaches formed what he calls "buscades" that took onlookers from several locations in Ohio and Pennsylvania to Washington for President Clinton's inauguration.


Any regrets, he's asked. "None at all," Doug says, "except that I'd like to get back to more driving. With the driving comes the best part . . . nice times, nice places, nice people. That's my reward."

Human Performance Lab: In Tune with Fitness





Kinesiology and exercise physiology classes use the treadmills, stationary bikes, and other equipment as part of their learning process and as a service to the students and faculty who utilize the facility.

The best kept secret in the basement of Edinboro's McComb Fieldhouse is no longer head wrestling coach and Olympic champion Bruce Baumgartner. His accomplishments are well publicized.

There is a facility in McComb that most Edinboro residents and University faculty, staff and students aren't even aware of. What was once a health and physical education (HPE) classroom is now a Human Performance Lab, utilized mainly by exercise physiology classes that explore the physiological responses and phenomena elicited by exercise. But the facility's benefits go much further than its educational purpose.

"Beyond the use by our HPE majors, the lab benefits athletic department coaches and University faculty and staff as well," said Dr. Arnold White, physical education professor and "pioneer" of the Performance Lab. White is quick to share the credit for creation of the project, however. "Dr. Betty Hammond and a facilities committee, formerly chaired by professor George Vierkorn, had this concept long before I arrived at Edinboro," said White. "But with my background and experience in creating such a service, we were able to get it done in the spring of 1992." (White had implemented similar programs at Aims Community College and at the University of Northern Colorado at Greely.)

With its ideal location, the facility offers a multitude of services for University personnel and students.

First, it is a diverse learning environment for health and physical education majors that expands on standard textbook learning. White explains: "We are exposing the HPE students to the type of technology they will need when they graduate and enter this field. We are showing them teaching tools that go beyond just textbooks for use in organizing their own classrooms or as coaches in their chosen sport. If we show them the value of this type of program, it will surely enhance their creativity when they are running their own classrooms or conducting practices."

Kinesiology and exercise physiology classes use the treadmills, stationary bikes, and other equipment as part of their learning process and as a service to the students and faculty who utilize the facility. The HPE majors are required to implement fitness testing and exercise programs for those interested in using the lab. There is a computerized fitness analysis program to help the tester evaluate the participant. Following a treadmill test, recommendations on types of exercise and diet are given to the user. More than 200 students, faculty and staff at the University were tested during the fall 1992 semester.

Hammond has expanded plans for the facility and its benefits to the University and community. "It is a service that can be utilized by faculty members – retired and active – students, and by residents of Edinboro. We are a bit restricted right now because of the lack of workers to run the facility. White uses his off-time to make the facility available. As the department and the lab expand, we hope to increase the work force," said Hammond.

In addition, the use of the facility could benefit area businesses. "We can offer fitness testing to area businesses at virtually no cost and in turn reduce their insurance rates for employees. There is great potential for service. It is just another way the University can provide a service to the community," Hammond said.

Aside from the fitness aspect, the lab offers a unique teaching method to Edinboro University coaches and athletes. White has implemented a bio-mechanical computer analysis program similar to that used for his doctoral dissertation at Northern Colorado. Baseball and softball players, as well as the golf and swim teams, have already seen the benefits.

"By using the computer analysis, student athletes can participate in a complete training program," White said. "After viewing the athletes and comparing the task – whether it be a swing or stroke – with a model, both the coach and the athlete can literally see the difference. It can be a great tool for the overall teaching process of the sport," White said.

"It's a great way for the coaches to be able to teach their sport and evaluate their athletes," said Edinboro golf coach Bob Orr. "The computer calculates the proper angles of the swing and can even designate the center of gravity in the athlete's weight distribution. It has been a great tool."

Donna Matthews: A Champion's Courage





 ${f A}$ diamond in the rough.

Any coach can recruit the blue-chip athlete, but it takes someone special to see a champion inside an average athlete. Edinboro cross country coach Doug Watts did just that.

But credit must also be given to the athlete, whose level of courage and perseverance goes miles beyond one's wildest dreams.

The obstacles faced by Donna Thibert-Matthews during the past decade sound like the ailments of a professional football player or a Hollywood actor: deteriorating vertebrae, a spinal tumor, four back surgeries, possible paralysis, full-body casts, broken bones, and a near-fatal kidney infection. Add motherhood and earning a degree in education, and you have an extraordinary student-athlete.

"I knew there was something special about her the first time I saw her," said Watts, "and there still is. I saw her in a race more than eight years ago at the Ontario High School championships, and I knew she was a unique athlete. I knew nothing of her health problems." (She had already had two back surgeries.)

"But there was such determination and 'guts' to this girl, that I knew she reflected the special character that makes Edinboro runners so successful," said Watts.

"There was *something* about this skinny, round-shouldered little girl in the middle of

the pack. I had no idea why I noticed her, but I felt she was special," said Watts.

How right he was! But it would be an uphill battle for Donna.

The veteran coach was sure he had landed Matthews. Then something happened during her senior year that led her away from Watts and his premier NCAA Division II cross country program – she had simply improved too much. Recruiters from Oklahoma State, a Division I program, had watched Matthews win the 3000-meter race and finish second in the 1500 at the high school track and field championships. They lured the "skinny girl" away.

But as fate would have it, Oklahoma State was not the answer for Matthews. Despite running to all-conference honors in the Big Eight, Matthews was once again ailing. She had stress fractures in her legs caused by running too many miles too fast. In January 1988 Coach Watts met up with Matthews at a track meet in Ontario. She had left Oklahoma State and was considering transferring to Edinboro.

"I was thankful for the second chance," Matthews said, "although I was a bit embarrassed when I ran into Coach Watts. I felt like I had let him down the first time."

The runner's challenges were far from over. She broke her foot during the summer of 1988 and had to sit out the entire year. "Coach Watts never gave up on me. He was

always behind me, regardless of the situation," said Matthews.

In 1989, Matthews won the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference and East Regional individual championships and took All-America honors at nationals. In the national championships of 1990, she earned Division II runner-up honors in the 3,000- and 5,000-meter races.

All was well until the Canadian national team asked her to train with them the following summer. Too much speed work and distance resulted in another back injury.

"I was burned out – mentally and physically," said Matthews. "I was training hard, probably trying too hard to excel. I think my health problems were catching up with me."

In 1991, Matthews returned to Canada for more back surgery. This time, it was eight and a half hours of microsurgery to remove a growth and other "particles" around the spinal cord. She hadn't run competitively since the 1990 track and field championships, but her first priority was to live a normal life. She married Brian Matthews, a former Edinboro All-America cross country runner she met at Oklahoma State. They had their first baby in February of 1992.

Last summer Matthews started training again. She could only run a mile before becoming sore and exhausted, but she continued to run. She placed 11th at the University of Wisconsin's Midwest cross country meet and progressed at her own pace. Just when things were going well, Matthews was hospitalized with a systemic infection of both kidneys. She lost eight more pounds and was released from the hospital at 110 pounds.

She wanted to keep running.

Just two weeks later, Matthews, along with her Edinboro teammates, faced the conference championships at California. She not only won, she beat her closest competition by more than 20 seconds and captured the individual crown.

"I literally cried the last half mile at the PSAC's," said Watts. "I still get choked up when I think about it. She is so loyal and dedicated to Edinboro and the running program. No one I've ever coached has wanted to run more than Donna. Her accomplishments are mind-boggling."

"Coach Watts told me to just go out and do my best," said Donna after the conference race, "but there was no way I was going to step up to that starting line and think that I wasn't going to win – that's just not me. I was there to win!"

Her success last year didn't end there. Matthews captured the East Regional championship a week later. Her performance brought her to tears. "I never expected to feel so good physically," said Donna. "I really hadn't trained enough to win the regionals. I can't explain it – it was just an unbelievable feeling."

The NCAA Division II championships at Slippery Rock were the next hurdle. Matthews finished third among the Division II elite to cap off her collegiate career with another All-America performance.

What about the pain? "She said it herself," said Watts. "Running doesn't hurt that much when you've been through everything she's gone through. Her success in life, her profile, her self confidence . . . they've really been defined by her ability to run and to run well. It obviously means a great deal to her."

"Running is my identity," said Matthews.
"I don't do it to please anyone else; I do it for me. I am in my own little world when I'm running."

Athletic trainer George Roberts is amazed at her abilities. "I think she has taken on the attitude that 'pain is pain and as long as I am going to have it, I might as well run and live with it," said Roberts. "Sometimes people suffering from chronic pain find that physical activity is a psychological release to help them cope with the pain. That may well be the case with Donna.

"Regardless," Roberts said, "she is something special."

What's next? "I remember when I was young," said Matthews, "I had a goal to make the Olympic team. There were so many setbacks that it was more a dream than anything else.

"But in the back of my mind, it's still there. I would love to represent Canada at the Olympic games. It's a long shot, but it's not impossible!" Matthews said.

Double the Joy, Double the Love





icky and Drew Perkoski are 4-1/2-year-old fraternal twins who are called survivors by their parents. They survived premature birth, abandonment by their mother, and four years in a Russian orphanage.

Born three months premature, Nicky weighed less than two pounds and Drew just two pounds. At the age of three months they were abandoned by their birth mother who placed them in an orphanage and relinquished all parental rights.

Although the orphanage was reportedly clean, dry and warm and the twins had clothes, they had little else. They expressed the desire to have their own "mama and papa."

They got their wish December 22 when they left Russia with their new parents, Tom ('81) and Denise Perkoski of Meadville.

Tom and Denise gave them American names, but their full names include part of their Russian heritage. Katya (Nicky) became Nicole Grace Katya Perkoski, and Denis became Andrew (Drew) Philip Denis Perkoski.

They arrived at their new home in Meadville the evening of December 23 after a 14-hour flight. The trip was the final step in a three-month process which began when Tom and Denise read an article in *The Meadville Tribune* about a Titusville-area couple who adopted a Russian baby.

They had been thinking about adopting a baby and contacted Jodi Bruckner at Congressman Tom Ridge's office. (She is the sister

of the Titusville couple.) From there they were put in touch with the same Pittsburgh adoption agency, International Assistance Group.

After filing applications, they traveled to Pittsburgh where they saw videotapes of children who were awaiting adoption and who the agency thought might be good matches with the couple.

The first videotape was of the twins. Tom and Denise immediately fell in love with them and decided they were the children they would like to adopt.

Denise flew to Russia on December 2, spending time with the children before Tom arrived a week later. The couple's pictures had previously been sent to the orphanage so the children could recognize their new parents. When Tom arrived, they ran to him and immediately called him "Papa," he recalled with a smile.

While in Russia, the couple spent time with the children so they could get to know their parents.

After completing all the requirements at the orphanage, the couple took the children to Moscow for medical appointments and then to the U.S. Embassy. They left Moscow on December 22, and arrived in Pittsburgh December 23. They were met by a television news team which totally enthralled the children, the couple said.

They had more surprises in Meadville – neighbors and friends put up a Christmas tree at the couple's home and brought over cookies.

The Christmas tree was only one of many new things in the twins' lives. The children had never seen such things as crayons, bananas (which they love), eggs or ice cream. The children also learned about turkey, broccoli (which they also love), stuffing, chocolate pudding and Cheerios.

For Christmas, Nicky wanted a red ball and Drew a red car. Both got their wish.

The twins have done very well adjusting to the major changes in their lives and are eager to learn, their parents said. They are learning English rapidly and have started preschool.

Alumni Scholarship Support on the Upswing

While the Alumni Association has always regarded scholarship support for Edinboro students as one of its highest priorities, it recently intensified its efforts to increase scholarships. Thanks to the generous response of so many graduates to the Annual Fund Drive, the Association has been able to boost its support for Edinboro students.

Alumni Association scholarships fall into two basic categories. The first is named scholarships, which are established and funded by a person or group of people, sometimes to honor another person. The Mike and Ruth Zahorchak Fund is a good example of a named scholarship fund. Alumnus Mike Zahorchak established the fund with his own contributions, and a company with which he was formerly associated matches his gifts. This year, they will contribute two dollars for every dollar he puts into the fund. Such matching gifts can make a big difference on the impact of a graduate's gift. As the founder of the fund, Zahorchak was involved in defining the criteria by which recipients are chosen for his scholarship. In the case of the Zahorchak scholarship, the award is given to a Pennsylvania resident of above-average academic ability who is an athlete recommended by a coach. Preference is given to residents of Beaver and Allegheny counties.

Other examples of named Alumni Association scholarship funds are the Frank Hawthorne Endowed Scholarship, the Nelle G. Hudson Memorial Scholarship, the Helen Hornaman Parker Memorial Endowed Scholarship, the Frank LaBounty Memorial Endowed Scholarship, and the Kevin K. Maloney Memorial Endowed Scholarship.

The second category of scholarship is supported through the General Alumni Association Scholarship Fund, funded by contributions to the Annual Fund Drive. The criteria for these scholarships are established by the Board of Directors of the Alumni Association. Current General Alumni Scholarships include pre-law, pre-healing arts, education, nursing, business, minor sports, theater arts, and art, among others. Both named and general alumni scholarships support a wide variety of majors and students and are awarded for academic merit, athletic ability, and financial need, among other criteria.

At the end of the first year of its three-

year campaign to increase scholarships, the Alumni Association set aside \$25,000 to endow its first Dean's Scholarship, for the School of Education. This year, it plans to endow a Dean's Scholarship for the School of Liberal Arts, and to provide significant grant money for academically gifted students entering Edinboro in Fall 1993.

All of the success the Alumni Association has experienced in its efforts to expand scholarships at Edinboro could never have taken place without the enthusiastic support of so many alumni. While the Board of Directors acts as a steward of these funds, these scholarships represent the concern, commitment and contributions of every graduate who supports the Annual Fund and scholarships.

Twila Gleeten Reid – Unsung Hero for Equal Opportunity

Twila Gleeten was born on November 4, 1895, in Washington Township where she attended a one-room country school. After her graduation from Edinboro Normal School, she taught at Washington Valley School.

Twila married Paul Reid in 1917 and moved to Orange County, California. There she taught school and became interested in the Women's Suffrage Movement. She worked for the passage of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, giving women the right to vote.

She taught and later was the principal of an all-Hispanic school in Stanton, California, in the 1930s and 1940s. At that time schools in southern California were pretty well segregated. Twila felt very strongly that education was the ticket to advancement for her pupils. She worked with families, school, and government officials to see that the Hispanic students received a quality education. She also worked to transfer promising students to the Anglo school in the district.

Later Mrs. Reid became the superintendent of the Savanna District – the first woman superintendent in California. To honor Mrs. Reid, the School District named a new integrated school in her honor, and the city of Anaheim, where the new school is located, named a local park adjoining the school after her.

Better race and ethnic relations have a few unsung heroes, and Edinboro University spawned one of them – Twila Gleeten Reid.

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Fall Phonathon sets Annual Fund records

From October 18 through November 12, 1992, student callers spoke with 6,027 alumni across the nation; 3,278 Edinboro graduates pledged gifts to the 1992-93 Annual Fund. That is a record-setting participation rate of 54.39 percent! An average of \$32.69 was pledged for a total of \$107,142, which exceeded the \$105,500 goal by \$1,642. An additional 1,099 alumni are considering a gift to the Annual Fund by June 30, 1993.

This year's annual fund strategy represents Phase two of a three-year program. Last year a \$25,000 endowed scholarship was created for the School of Education. This year's goals are to create a \$25,000 endowment for the School of Liberal Arts and to establish ten \$5,000 freshman grants for merit. Next year's challenge is to establish a \$25,000 endowment for the School of Science, Management and Technologies, maintain the freshman grants and establish ten \$5,000 grants for upperclass students. Maintaining the grants for the freshman and upperclass grants will also be a challenge for the future.

The true success of any annual fund is measured by the level of pledge fulfillment. Jim Kirk '74, the 1992-93 Annual Fund chairman, would like to see a fulfillment level of at least 90 percent this year. He was surprised to learn that last year's fulfillment rate was just over 76 percent. More than \$20,600 in pledges

were not paid. An improved reminder system has been put in place to help increase the fulfillment rate this year.

The goals for the annual fund are more challenging each year, and alumni are responding positively. Last year 898 new donors came on board, and this year's spring New Donor Phonathon will attempt to increase the number of new donors to 1,000. Participation rates directly affect the Alumni Annual Fund and also affect Annual Fund giving from private corporations and foundations. Higher participation rates indicate that our graduates believe in and support their alma mater and that there is good reason to invest in its future.

1926 Graduate Creates Legacy

Marie (Rogers) Kline '26, achieved great things during her student days at Edinboro Normal School. Although she kept a busy social schedule, played in the orchestra and sang in the Glee Club, she maintained a high academic standing. In tribute to Marie, the 1926 Conneauteean was lavish in its praise: "Here's to Marie, the girl with the contagious giggle. Many an evening feed has been flavored by her laughter which when heard is a sure cure for the 'blues.' In classes Marie shows that she has stored a mine of knowledge."

Apparently Marie was not content to rest on her laurels. On August 25, 1992, Edinboro received notice of a \$20,000 bequest from the executor and trustee of her estate to establish the Marie Rogers Kline Scholarship. To be administered and awarded without restrictions, the scholarship will assure the name of Marie Rogers Kline shall be carried to perpetuity at her alma mater.

The Betty J. Murch Memorial Scholarship

Although he had no prior association with Edinboro University, Donald P. Murch of Erie recently selected Edinboro to receive \$50,000 in funds over a four-year period to create a scholarship in memory of his wife. The Betty J. Murch Memorial Scholarship, to be initially awarded in fall 1994, will benefit a non-traditional minority student entering either the field of nursing or education. The award will be renewable for a period of three years providing a minimum cumulative QPA of 3.0 is maintained by the student recipient. The award will be made on the basis of financial need and merit.

In selecting Edinboro, Murch stated, "A college education can open the doors of opportunity for a young person. I hope to enrich the lives of other minority young people the way my wife's life became enriched through her educational experiences. Edinboro has an excellent reputation in the region for serving students from all walks of life who have the ability to obtain a higher education."

Thanks to the many interested alumni who have contributed to the Nelle G. Hudson Memorial Scholarship, nearly \$8,000 has been raised since the project was kicked off in May 1992. We don't have far to go to reach the \$10,000 endowed level.

President Diebold Receives Pakistani Gold Medal

The vice chancellor of Pakistan's Shah Abdul Latif University presented his school's highest honor to Edinboro University President Foster F. Diebold. Vice Chancellor A. Hameed Memon awarded Diebold a gold medal for his role in developing international education and his commitment to promoting higher education in Pakistan for the past 12 years.

Professor Memon said the academic linkage between his institution and Edinboro has promoted the cause of higher education between the two schools and is a bridge of friendship that leads to mutually benefitting experiences.

"It is to the credit of President Diebold, a person of vision and dedication . . . for bringing our two institutions closer and closer to share from the same fountain of knowledge," said Memon. He praised Diebold's worldwide contribution to the cause of humanity, his commitment to the development of Asia's citizens, and his insistence on ethical standards in the administration of public education.

Reading from the citation that accompanied the award, Memon said: "We at Shah Abdul Latif University feel immensely satisfied and are proud of our educational linkage with Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. This linkage has not only been instrumental in promoting the cause of higher education between the two institutions, but also has

been a bridge of lasting friendship that leads to a way of enriching knowledge, knowing new frontiers of technological advancement and benefit from mutual experiences."

Memon said that the linkage between Edinboro and Shah Abdul Latif University had resulted in numerous exchanges between visiting scholars from both universities, as well as special consultation visits to his campus by library and computer science specialists and financial management and teaching methodology experts from Edinboro.

Memon also mentioned that faculty from Edinboro had created a special professorial chair in women's studies at Shah Abdul Latif.

In acknowledging the award, Diebold said that he accepted it on behalf of the entire Edinboro University community and its governing bodies.

"Each of us at Edinboro has labored long and hard to establish the relationship which we have produced," Diebold said. "Through this mutual exchange, great progress has been realized both educationally and culturally for both sides."

Shah Abdul Latif University is one of seven institutions in Pakistan with which Edinboro University has signed formal academic linkage agreements over the last decade. Several hundred Pakistani students and a score of visiting Pakistani scholars have come to Edinboro under the agreements.

Two years ago, Diebold received gold medals from the universities of Sindh and Balochistan, two of the other institutions in Pakistan that maintain linkages with Edinboro.

Diebold said that he views the awards and attendant ceremonies not as personal recognition, but as a means of facilitating and calling attention to Edinboro's commitment to its expansive program of international studies and services, a program, he describes, "that truly seeks to promote understanding among people of different national and cultural backgrounds."

Center for Excellence in Teaching

Challenging the University's School of Education a year ago to attain its full potential as an academic force for excellence both within the University and outward to its service region, President Foster Diebold launched the "Thrust Toward Excellence," an

initiative to bring Edinboro's traditionally distinguished program of teacher education into sharp analytical focus, prepare it for collaborative and futuristic action, and maximize its potential as the region's major educational resource for the 1990s and the 21st century.

Central to the interdisciplinary and crosscurricular initiative was the establishment of the Center for Excellence in Teaching, now operational in the Miller Research-Learning Center. Formation of the Center, which is codirected by professors Ruthanne Atkinson and Dr. Robert Connors, embodies the potential of the School of Education to reach more broadly across the total University curriculum and involve faculty and students from other disciplines, as well as collaborate on interdisciplinary concerns in its own curricular area.

"The outcome of the total 'Thrust . . .' enterprise, besides the end result of the Center and its four institutes, was a significant step forward in bringing the faculty from all academic disciplines together, interacting, and working toward collaborative program and service activities within not only the School of Education, but within the total University and with other institutions in the region," said Diebold.

"I expect the good work of the Thrust Toward Excellence task force and the Center for Excellence in Teaching to have long standing high impact on this University," Diebold said, "and I expect to see recommendations come forward for similar initiatives in the schools of Liberal Arts and Science, Management and Technologies."

The Center for Excellence in Teaching houses four institutes; the Ethics and Values in Education Institute; the Literacy Institute; the Early Childhood Institute; and the Curriculum, Instruction and Collaboration Institute.

Winter Commencement 1992

Edinboro University held its winter Commencement ceremony on Sunday, December 13, for only the second time since 1975. Edinboro President Foster F. Diebold, now in the 14th year of his presidency, conferred graduate, undergraduate, and associate degrees on more than 700 students. With a May graduating class of 690, Edinboro granted approximately 1,400 degrees during 1992.

Calling Commencement "the most significant event in the University's year-long calendar of events," Diebold welcomed more than 3,200 to the University's McComb Fieldhouse for the ceremony. Defining commencement as both a beginning and an end, Diebold charged the newest Edinboro University graduates to go forth with three thoughts: to always consider the needs of others, to continue to learn throughout life, and to react to others as you would have others react to you. "It's that simple," Diebold said.

The Commencement speaker was Dr. Robert C. Weber, Edinboro's dean of liberal arts. In an address titled "Knowledge Does a Something," Weber asked the graduates to focus on a context of values for what they had attained, for what lies ahead, and for the continuing development of an increased consciousness with which to deal with the future.

Clocktower Update

Circumstances beyond the University's control may delay the Normal Hall Clocktower construction project. The site preparation was begun last fall with excavation and fill. Hopefully, construction can be completed in 1993.

Edinboro Hosts Freedom Forum

Some of the nation's foremost authorities on the Constitution and the Bill of Rights met in Edinboro recently to take part in "A Forum on First Amendment Freedoms: The Vital Center," a conference sponsored by Edinboro University and the Pennsylvania Humanities Council, and funded in part by the Gannett Foundation's Freedom Forum. Arrangements for the conference were made by the University's Institute for Research and Community Services.

Dr. Robert Rhodes, a professor in the political science department and organizer of the conference, said that the forum was designed for "public information and education," and emphasized that the information presented focused on issues specific to northwestern Pennsylvania.

At a special pre-conference dinner, President Diebold welcomed the presenters with observations from his presidential perspective. "The freedom of students to learn, though it is inextricably linked to the freedom to teach, has often been subsumed by the latter freedom and the preoccupation of the professoriate with notions of academic freedom," Diebold said.

Speakers at the forum included the distinguished First Amendment scholar Dr. Henry J. Abraham, professor of government and foreign affairs at the University of Virginia; and

Dr. Dean Kelley, counselor on religious liberty for the National Council of Churches.

Chairing the day's three panels were Katy J. Harriger, a 1979 Edinboro University graduate and professor of politics at Wake Forest University; Dr. Charles Abel, chairman of Edinboro's political science department; and Alan Culbertson, Esq., a practicing attorney in Charlottesville, Va., and frequent lecturer at the University of Virginia School of Law. Culbertson, a 1971 Edinboro University graduate, is a nationally-recognized authority on environmental law.

SSHE Begins Celebration of 10th Anniversary

"Creative Forces," a collection of artwork by faculty from the 14 universities of the State System of Higher Education, went on exhibit at a special November 15 reception hosted by Governor and Mrs. Robert Casey at the Governor's Residence. The event officially marked the start of the 20-month program that will celebrate the tenth anniversary of the State System.

"Creative Forces inaugurates a milestone for the State System," said System Board of Governors Chairman F. Eugene Dixon, Jr. "Ten years ago the legislation which established the System – Act 188 of 1982 – was signed into law. Formal operations of the System began on July 1, 1983. The tenth anniversary provides the ideal opportunity to recognize our decade of service to the citizens of Pennsylvania and to join together to reflect upon the original 'creative forces' which brought forth the System."

Chancellor James H. McCormick said, "The 14 System universities serve their communities in many ways . . . and in serving their communities, they serve the entire Commonwealth. It is appropriate that a cross section of art from the universities appears in Pennsylvania's capital city. Creative Forces symbolizes the breadth and diversity of contributions the System universities make to Pennsylvania, and it is appropriate that with it we begin celebration of the System's tenth anniversary."

Thirty pieces of artwork were selected for Creative Forces from more than 200 university submissions. The works of three Edinboro art faculty – Suzanne Amendolara, Steven Emmett, and Kathe Kowalski – were among the pieces exhibited.

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'Boro Football Among Nation's Elite

Under the direction of fifth-year head coach Tom Hollman and his staff, Edinboro University football has earned national recognition as one of the best programs on the NCAA Division II level.

This past season, the Fighting Scots advanced to the national playoffs for the third time in four years and posted an impressive 8-2-1 overall record. Edinboro's 8-1-1 regular season mark was the school's best in 21 years. Ranked number three nationally entering week eight, the Scots ended the season at 15th, marking the fourth consecutive season Edinboro concluded the year among the "elite 20" in Division II competition.

"Having time to reflect, it was a great year, but we are certainly not satisfied," Hollman said. "Getting to the playoffs seemed to satisfy us in the past, but not now. We are establishing a very solid program, and I love the caliber of our student athletes and the direction of our program on and off the field. But there are still goals to achieve, and we are not going to stop until we reach them. Our ultimate goal is to win the Division II national championship."

In 1992, the Scots downed Buffalo (35-13), Northwood (37-13), Southern Connecticut (41-0), Clarion (26-17), Lock Haven (38-10), Shippensburg (47-3), California (33-13), and Millersville (36-12) for their eight victories. The one loss came at the hands of Slippery Rock, and the tie game against IUP.

Statistically, the Scot defense headed the team charts, ranking third in the country in scoring defense. Their 112 points (11.2 ppg) surrendered during the regular season was third in Division II and was the best among the 14 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) schools. Their total defense mark of yielding just 257.5 yards per game ranked in the top 15 nationally and led the charts in the state. The 'Boro's pass defense efficiency mark of 88.8 percent was the 13th best in Division II, while the rushing defense total of 95.0 ypg was also among the nation's top 15.

Offensively, the Scots averaged 32.1 points per game for the 14th best total across the country, and their 236.2 yards per game rushing mark was the Conference's best by more than 45 yards. With an average of 409

yards per game total offense, the Scots ranked third in the PSAC, second in the Western Division, and among the nation's top 30.

Women's Volleyball Runners-up in Pa. Conference

Over the past four years, the Lady Scots volleyball team finished no worse than second among the 14 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference schools. In 1992, under the direction of seventh-year head coach Glen Conley, Edinboro took conference runner-up honors for the second straight year and posted an impressive 25-5 record.

With an overall slate of 180-66 (.732), Conley has turned Edinboro into one of the best women's volleyball programs in the eastern United States. In 1989 and 1990, the Lady Scots captured the PSAC championships and finished second only to California University of Pa. the last two years.

In this year's finale, California edged the Lady Scots, 17-15, 16-14, 16-18 and 16-14, to capture the crown. "In all my years of competing and coaching it may have been the finest volleyball match I have ever been associated with," Conley said. "Our women can use this experience to build on down the road. We graduate just one senior, so we are looking forward to another run at the PSAC crown. Our team matured a great deal throughout the season and played a very tough schedule. It appears that eastern teams are gaining some national respect, and I would hope that Edinboro's success over the past five years has had something to do with it," Conley said.

Edinboro won championships in tournaments at George Mason University (Va.), Bentley (Mass.), and in their own Lady Scot Invitational. The only squads to defeat Edinboro were NCAA II Elite Eight qualifier Gannon University and PSAC titlist California.

Runners Excel: Women #5, Men #6

The tradition of Edinboro excellence in cross country continued this fall with the women achieving a fifth-place ranking while the men were close behind in sixth place in Eight members of the Edinboro University football team were selected to Don Hansen's Football Gazette All-America team.

Linebacker Jason Perkins, safety Michael Barnes and defensive end Anthony Ross were named to the publication's third-team defensive squad, while five Edinboro players were honorable mention selections. They were: offensive lineman Mike Kegarise, who was also selected to the Associated Press third team, guard Scott Nickel, running back Larry Jackson, defensive back Georj Lewis and punter Gary Lhotsky. Twenty-six Edinboro football players have attained All-America status since 1988. During that time, the Scots have compiled a 37-16-2 record and have participated in the NCAA Division II national playoffs three times under fifth-year head coach Tom Hollman.

NCAA Division II competition. The women's lofty mark was the highest team placing of any female squad, regardless of sport, in Edinboro's history.

Head coach Doug Watts, the architect of six men's national titles and the recipient of two national Coach of the Year honors, was pleased with another successful campaign. "Our goal was to finish in the top five with both programs," Watts said. "We came awfully close. A special salute should go to the women's team. Their progress has been steady at establishing themselves as one of the top teams in Division II."

Along the path to nationals, both squads captured titles at the Buffalo State Invitational and the Northwest Pennsylvania meet, and then claimed the PSAC and East Regional championships. The women defended their 1991 title at the state championships, while the men dethroned Slippery Rock to reclaim team supremacy in the PSAC. "For the first time in years, we really geared ourselves to win the state title. Both teams performed extremely well in preparation for the regional and national championship races," Watts said.

Individually, Donna Thibert-Matthews was the top gun for the women, while freshman Carl Leonard emerged to take the reins as the number one runner on the men's side. She captured the individual crown at the PSAC and Regional races, and both earned All-America honors at the Division II national championship race held at Slippery Rock. Matthews finished third at nationals, while Leonard was 22nd in the men's race. He finished two spots behind teammate Martin Lyons, the 1991 national champion, who also earned All-America status and 20th place. Deb Springer was also an All-American for the Lady Scots, taking 18th place among the Division II's elite.

Athletic Hall of Fame

Edinboro University's Athletic Hall of Fame committee announced seven new members to be inducted at the 12th annual banquet on April 24, 1993.

Begun in 1982 with 18 charter members, the Hall of Fame annually recognizes individuals who have distinguished themselves in their association with athletics at Edinboro either by virtue of their performance or their meritorious efforts on behalf of the athletic program.

The memory of Arthur McComb will live forever in the halls of McComb Fieldhouse. He is being recognized for his many years of coaching.

Dalvin Baehler, currently residing in Oklahoma, was the school's Sox Harrison award winner in 1979 for his success in track and cross country.

Susan Hirth-Colton, a former basketball player and assistant coach, went on to become one of northwestern Pennsylvania's most successful basketball, swimming and softball coaches.

Roger Doyle from Utica, Michigan, will be remembered as Edinboro's first All-America swimmer.

John Ferraro, now with the FBI in Washington, D.C., captained baseball and football teams at Edinboro and later played in the Continental Pro Football League.

Rich Ruskiewicz from the Pittsburgh area was a first-team Kodak All-American and continues to hold school records for most field goals in a season and career.

The ceremony will also recognize the 1992-93 Contributor of the Year and the school's male and female athletes of the year. The men's honor is recognized in the name of the late Sox Harrison, and the women's award honors the late Nancy Acker.

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
