



wo interesting and important articles, among others, are in this issue:

One, the abstract of our recentlypublished Economic Impact Study highlights the importance of the role Edinboro University plays as an economic engine for the well-being of Erie County, northwestern Pennsylvania and the entire Commonwealth. Although in the past there have been several isolated, anecdotal reports attempting to quantify data such as the economic effects of faculty and staff salaries or student spending locally, this report, for the first time, has been specific about Edinboro University's place in Pennsylvania and the surrounding communities we serve. We know about the value of an Edinboro education. That is apparent as we note the success of countless Edinboro alumni. What we are now certain of, however, is the measure of the value of an Edinboro education in terms of how the presence of the University itself impacts the economic life of the community and how the resources of taxpayers, students, parents, families and friends that are invested in Edinboro University are returned to the community in the forms of economic growth, enhanced financial security and the betterment of life for all.

Two, on a somewhat lighter note, I wanted to share with our alumni and friends the excitement we experienced last year with the success of our teams of student-athletes. Please take note of my use of the term, student-athletes. Edinboro undergraduates are students first and athletes second. And what a group of student-athletes they are! Our Fighting Scots teams had seasons that should make the alumni very proud. In particular, the success of the wrestling squad beginning with the widely acclaimed schedule poster shown on the back cover – and the basketball team drew the attention of all of Pennsylvania (including Governor Tom Ridge who sent a "good luck" telegram to the basketball team in North Dakota), the nation and the world.

I know that all of you share my pride.

Pogue, President Edinboro University of Pennsylvania n May 11, 1997, during spring Commencement ceremonies, I had the opportunity to welcome Edinboro's most recent graduating class into the Alumni Association. This group of graduates joins over 35,000 other alumni from the first class of 1862 through last year's 1996 class.

At President Pogue's suggestion, my comments at Commencement addressed the Alumni Association's role of support to the University. Reflecting on my own remarks after the ceremony, I concluded that this supportive role is needed from members of all graduating classes, whether from 1917, 1957 or 1997. Our university needs our support, now as well as in the future.

It is not a well-kept secret that state funding for members of the State System of Higher Education is at an all-time low. In fact, the old premise that only "private" institutions require strong alumni support ("don't worry about the public universities, the government will take care of them") is no longer true. The quality of these Edinboro graduates, and our incoming freshman class, demonstrates potential for a great future – but they need our help.

Individually, we can provide our support through service to University organizations, by acting as ambassadors of good will for Edinboro, by maintaining contact with the Edinboro Family, in recruitment of new students and through financial support for scholarships. This last area is vital and one of the most important aspects of alumni support, both singly and collectively through your Alumni Association. Every scholarship dollar donated goes directly to a deserving student who will someday do likewise for another generation of Fighting Scots.

As I have mentioned before in this column, we are students at Edinboro for such a short time. We hail our alma mater for life. Keep the connection strong and strive toward life-long dedication to Edinboro University. Our memories of days at Edinboro are a treasure we will never lose. The future of Edinboro University is a treasure that has been entrusted to us, and it is now our turn to be its loyal alumni.

# What an Impact!



"This is the first time we have been specific about Edinboro University's place in the economy of Erie County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania," said Edinboro University President Dr. Frank G. Pogue, commenting on the economic impact report. "In addition to the value of an Edinboro undergraduate or graduate education to local and county residents, we have now measured to a large extent how the presence of a major public university enhances the economic well-being of Erie County, northwestern Pennsylvania and the Commonwealth as a whole."

L'dinboro University's estimated economic impact for fiscal year 1996 across
Pennsylvania was \$140,542,873 and in Erie
County, \$96,643,156, according to a report released recently by the University.

"Through the expenditures of its students, parents, alumni, visitors, faculty and staff, and retired faculty and staff, Edinboro University has a pronounced impact on both Erie County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania," said Dr. Michael Mogavero, whose office of University planning, institutional research and continuous improvement, prepared the report that describes the ways in which Edinboro affects the communities it serves in terms of employment, revenue, expenditures and volunteer service.

Edinboro University is directly responsible for the employment of approximately 2,000 people. When student employees are included, Edinboro is the fourth largest employer in Erie County, according to the report. Even if student employees are not counted, Edinboro ranks 12th among Erie County's major employers.

Edinboro's annual operating budget for fiscal year 1995 (July 1, 1995-June 30, 1996) totaled \$67,602,088. Of this figure, \$28,831,312, or some 43 percent, came from Pennsylvania taxpayers through the annual state appropriation. The remaining \$38,770,776 came from tuition and fees, faculty grants and contracts, income from residence halls and dining facilities, and private funds donated by alumni and friends.

"Put another way, for every dollar of Commonwealth money appropriated to Edinboro through the State System of Higher Education, the campus generated \$1.34 from other sources," Mogavero said.

Calculating these figures comes through use of what is called a "multiplier effect," which results from money that comes directly into the local economy subsequently being spent over and over again for additional local goods and services. It describes not only the direct impact of University spending, but also indirect and induced impact. According to the report, each Edinboro student spends on estimated average of \$1,500 annually on personal expenses, \$500 for books and

supplies, \$2,340 for rental housing (excluding those living in residence halls) and \$600 for food (excluding University meal plans). In fiscal year 1996, total expenditures in Erie County by Edinboro students totaled \$28,651,864. As this money worked its way through the economy, it generated another \$71,629,660.

University faculty and staff also spent \$19,339,060 on goods and services in the county, not including property taxes, and the University spent \$4,250,030 with Erie County businesses to purchase the whole range of goods and services required to run the campus.

"The report takes into account only the easily quantifiable economic activity," said Mogavero. "Other aspects of economic impact, such as families visiting the area and hundreds of retired faculty and staff who live here, are not included in the report.

"In addition, we have not put a number on the value of Edinboro's 37,834 alumni, 23,797 of whom live and work in Pennsylvania," he said.

It was a season to remember. Edinboro University athletic teams reaching national finals and receiving national, even international, publicity.

Head coach Bruce Baumgartner's wrestling squad had its first undefeated dualmeet season – 14 wins, no losses – in the University's history, and then placed sixth at the NCAA Division I championships.

All six of the Fighting Scot wrestlers who qualified for the national tournament held at the University of Northern Iowa won matches – another first – and three came home with All-America honors. They included senior Tony Robie, a graduate of Erie's Strong Vincent High School who was the national runner-up (yes, that's second in the nation) at 158 pounds; junior Jim Straight, who placed seventh at 177 pounds; and junior Jason Robison, who placed sixth at 190 pounds. Robison also became the first Fighting Scot to earn number one seed status in the national tournament.

Robie and Robison became only the sixth and seventh Edinboro wrestlers to earn multiple NCAA Division I All-America honors. Both have done it twice.

The sixth-place finish was the highest in the school's 11-year Division I wrestling history, and the 14-0 dual-meet record included nine wins over teams that were nationally ranked.

But that's not all. The now-famous Fighting Scot 1996-97 wrestling season schedule poster (shown on the outside back cover of this issue) was featured on the front sports page of the January 29, 1997 USA Today, in both the national and international editions. Over the caption "Dressed to Kilt," the poster photo depicts the ten Fighting Scot starters, all shirtless and wearing kilts. Singularly featured over a "Pretty in Plaid" caption was Edinboro's 190-pound junior All-American, Jason Robison.

If any of our readers were locked in the trunk of a car in Bayonne or Hoboken and by chance missed that edition of *USA Today*, here is a sampling of the article headlined "Team's Dress Big Success" and by-lined by *USA Today* writer Harry Blauvelt:

"Jason Robison belongs on wrestling's best-dressed list. Like Mel Gibson in *Braveheart*, Robison is a sartorial sensation wearing a kilt, his body bare from the waist up. Robison and his Edinboro (Pa.) teammates

posed in tartan [skirts] for publicity photos that adorn the Fighting Scots wrestling media guide and a popular poster."

The bare-chested, kiltie look was the idea of Tim Flynn, Baumgartner's assistant coach.

"We were looking for a catchy poster to sell as a fund raiser, and we came up with the idea," Flynn said. "They shot the guys barechested and in sweatshirts, and we liked the bare-chested look best."

Of the first 1,000 posters printed for distribution at Edinboro's first home wrestling match in mid-December 1996, fewer than 100 were left by mid-February after the picture and article appeared in *USA Today*. Orders for copies of the poster came from fans in Chicago and Los Angeles. One call came from as far away as Germany, and, strangely enough, a note of congratulations came from the University of Edinburgh in Scotland. (See sidebar.)

Not to be outdone by mere mortal male wrestlers, Edinboro University's women's basketball team enjoyed one of its best years ever. Finishing the regular season at 19-7, the Fighting Scots advanced to the Pa. State Athletic Conference championship game. While they lost that contest to Shippensburg, they earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Division II national tournament as the East Region's sixth seed.

With no seniors on the squad, they posted three impressive victories over higher-seeded teams to capture the East Region championships and advance – for the first time – to the "Elite Eight," the national quarterfinals.

While the Scots later lost to the University of North Dakota, the eventual national champion which had earlier unseated four-time defending national champion North Dakota State, their Cinderella season was one of the finest in Edinboro history.

Also of note, the volleyball team won the Atlantic Region championship to earn a second berth in three years in the Elite Eight. The softball team finished fourth in the PSAC, producing three All-Conference players. Men's tennis finished fifth in the PSAC, while the golf team placed sixth. The men's track and field team finished first runner-up at the PSAC outdoor championships, and the women's squad placed eighth.

What a year! The Edinboro Family can be very proud of their student-athletes, coaches and athletic department staff.


The Public Relations and Publications Office received this letter last February:

# Edinboro Prof Takes Music Beyond the Classroom





You'll have to excuse David Herendeen if he seems preoccupied. The music professor at Edinboro University is just a little busy these days. In addition to teaching class voice and voice lessons to some 20 or so individual students, Herendeen was guest director for Mercyhurst College's production of *The Marriage of Figaro*, directed Edinboro's music theatre production of *A Little Night Music*, recently served on the board of Meadville's Academy Theatre, will return this summer to stage direct at Brevard Music Center in North Carolina, and is in charge of Edinboro University's Concert and Lecture Series.

Perhaps his greatest achievement over the past 18 months, however, has been forging an affiliation with the Bel Canto Italia School of Opera in Florence, Italy. Herendeen met the director of the school, Carlos Della Mora, through the Internet.

"We quickly realized we had like ideas," said Herendeen. "He told me about his school and I started helping immediately. We developed a very good friendship."

The Bel Canto School educates its students in the style of opera singing and opera theater that existed during what Herendeen calls "the golden years of opera." What especially appealed to him was one of the school's faculty – tenor Franco Corelli: "One of the greatest tenors – my favorite tenor – of the past 30 years," he said.

What Herendeen is doing is twofold. The first is to translate the school's style of training into the traditional American university voice training, so that credits can easily transfer between the two schools. Second, and more ambitious, is creating a formal affiliation agreement that will allow Edinboro students to attend the Italian school, apply those credits to Edinboro courses, obtain guaranteed student loans, and most importantly, get a big break in their singing careers.

Already, two Edinboro students, Tracy Wolstoncroft of Oakdale and Christopher Smith of Williamsport, have received partial scholarships and will be attending the Bel Canto School. "I can say that two of my students are going to have master classes with one of my idols," said Herendeen proudly.

"My hope is that we will entwine all of the universities in the State System of Higher Education with this affiliation. This is our state's and University's goal, to allow every student access to a high-quality, diverse education regardless of their financial status. If we can get this system-wide affiliation we will have something unique.

"West Chester University, for example, has a master's program in opera and performance that would be perfect for the affiliation and will draw people from around the country into the State System."

At the heart of Herendeen's professional philosophy is a profound belief in collaboration and cooperation. "I don't do this alone," he explained. "Nothing worthwhile is done alone. In the music business you have friends and colleagues and you really try to help each other. I've performed with Bruce Morton at Gannon for its opera productions. Jonason is the director of voice and opera at Mercyhurst College. Herendeen offers guest direction at Mercyhurst as a good example of how the arts and education act as a bridge between groups. She produced *The Marriage of Figaro*, and he directed. "I got a

chance to work with and, in a sense, teach as I direct her lovely students. Her students and my students often join together. We shared in a master class for the National Association of Teachers of Singing."

He sees himself as a pebble in a musical pond forming ripples which reach out from Edinboro to Erie, Meadville, North Carolina and now, Italy.

"I think this is part of our mission, as part of my purpose as an employee of a state institution. It's an alignment of what I've dreamed of – being a performer, director and teacher. It's nice to be in a place that really nurtures it."


Herendeen's energy, enthusiasm, and genuine concern for his students is helping to pay dividends for Edinboro University. Enrollment in the music department has doubled in the past three years. Average SAT scores are up and the level of musical preparedness is also higher. When he came to the University there were eight students taking private voice lessons; now there are 40. The department now has 30-35 voice majors, and this is without a formal performance degree.

The department has recently attracted other talented faculty as well – Dr. Daniel Burdick, Dr. Allen Howell, Dr. Nancy Schecter and Herendeen's wife, Lucie, a soprano who also teaches voice. Department chair Dr. Peter van den Honert, Dr. Gary Grant and Dr. Tim Cordell have revitalized the University's performing groups.

Herendeen attended the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music where he obtained his bachelor of music and master of music theatre degrees. He earned his doctorate in vocal performance and pedagogy with a minor in stage direction from the University of Arizona.


He has performed with many regional opera companies and orchestras including the Arizona Opera, the Michigan Opera, the Rochester Philharmonic and the Tucson Symphony. His study in Europe was highlighted by his residency at the Deutsche Oper Berlin.

Herendeen created the role of Roderick Usher in the world premiere of the reconstruction of Debussy's *The Fall of the*

House of Usher for both stage and television in affiliation with Hartt Opera Theatre and Connecticut Public Television. In association with the Guggenheim Foundation, he was assistant to director Ian Stasfogel in the presentation of Kandinsky's color opera *The Yellow Sound*. This summer Dr. Herendeen will return to The Brevard Music Center as stage director for its production of *West Side Story*.

The Herendeens live in Edinboro with their dogs, Posie and Tonka, and their cats, Nook, Butch and Burnkitty.



While employed with Warner Brothers Classics, Bill worked on many projects, including the animation of the Warner Brothers logo, which reflected the Bugs Bunny character, and Carrotblanca (key animator). As key animator on a project, Bill serves one step below a sequence director and two steps below the director of the film. He also supervises numerous assistant and inbetween animators. As a student at Edinboro Bill helped to found the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity, and he designed two Homecoming floats - Alice in Wonderland, and ironically, The Wonderful World of Disney, which won first prize for his fraternity. A native of Williamsport, Pa., Bill currently resides in California, but returns to campus often to lecture and offer special viewings of films for Edinboro audiences. His most recent visit was this past April, sponsored by the Alumni Association.

#### **ART EDUCATION**

#### Patricia (Knezevich) Sennett, class of 1956

Retiring in June 1996 after 35 years of teaching art at all levels from elementary through college, Patricia quickly found herself teaching again at the State University of New York, Potsdam. Additionally, she is committed to teaching at the local museum this summer, and is pursuing the possibility of offering Elderhostel courses. Patricia brought the full spectrum of visual arts to her classes, to include historical and cultural aspects and chaperoning them during international travel. Very early in her career

she was instrumental in vitalizing the Northern Zone Art Teachers Association, where she was in a position to assist younger colleagues. She is held in high regard by former colleagues and student teachers. Throughout her teaching career she has been a parent and homemaker and also continued to produce a strong and vital body of her own work, exhibiting extensively in local, regional and national forums. She and her husband, Art (class of 1956 and recipient of the 1995 DAA in Art), have seen two of their children go on to earn doctorates, and another become an attorney.

#### Richard Siegel, class of 1957

For the past 40 years Richard has considered his role as one of an advocate for art education, and he continues his work today. After getting what he termed "a wonderful foundation of preparation at Edinboro," Richard earned a master's degree from Penn State, and both a master's and doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College. During his distinguished career, Richard has filled the varied roles of artist, teacher, administrator, supervisor, and leader. He continues to serve in all these roles today. Serving as the president of the Art Administrators of New Jersey from 1977-1980, and again from 1994-96, Richard has been instrumental in promoting and reinforcing the purpose of the group. In everything Richard has done there has been a common thread – to promote and advance art education. He's not planning to slow down anytime soon, and there's no doubt that his former Edinboro professors would applaud his efforts. Richard credits several of them (Frederic Hand, Aimé Doucette and Waldo Bates) with encouraging students to become affiliated with the college chapter of the NAEA, and Richard again presented at this organization's national conference, celebrating its 50th anniversary, his 40th with the group. Over the years he has shared two phrases with former students and prospective teachers: "Learning Never Ends," and "To Teach, One Must Never Cease To Learn."

Richard and his wife, Iona, have four children.

#### **BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY**

David Mikolajczyk, class of 1964

David began his career as a teacher in the Wattsburg School District. Less than three years later he was working for Westinghouse as an industrial engineer. During the next 25 years he earned an MBA from Northwestern University and worked his way up the corporate ladder in various roles for wellknown companies such as Welch Foods, Stouffer Hotels and Resorts, and Nestle Enterprises. In October 1987, he was chairman of the Nestle North American Purchasing Council and went on to form and serve as president and CEO of Hadd Holdings, Inc., which later purchased Ohio Pure Foods, a juice/juice drink company with sales of \$15 million. Sales grew profitably and he sold the company in three years. It then merged with another company and became Country Pure Foods, Inc. David served as vice chairman and CEO for nearly two years, later concentrating on strategic planning and acquisitions. Since January of this year, David has served as vice chairman, chairman of the acquisitions and planning committee, a board member and shareholder. Active in the community, one of his major projects has been as a volunteer board member for Parmadale, a residential treatment center for children in Cleveland. David continues to set his goals high, planning on further consolidation of the juice/juice drink industry and growing Country Pure Foods into a national juice drink company.

#### **EDUCATION**

Charles Agnew, class of 1977

Chuck Agnew has been involved in higher education nearly his entire career. He served his alma mater as director of development and was campaign director for the Reeder Hall/Old College Union restoration project. He also secured major support for the nationally-recognized

program for students with disabilities. From there he moved to Gannon University as vice president for external affairs. Later he accepted an appointment at Quinnipiac College, where he directed a successful \$4.5 million capital campaign and a \$7 million campaign. Chuck then served as executive director of the Foundation for Indiana University of Pa., and interim vice president for institutional advancement. He is currently the vice chancellor for development of the State System of Higher Education and president of the Fund for the Advancement of the State System of Higher Education, Inc. He is the chief policy and oversight officer for development within the State System. Chuck is an active member of the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education, the National Society of Fundraising Executives, the Newcomen Society of the United States, and the Center for the Study of the Presidency. He has chaired CASE's national conference "Alumni and Development: A Team Approach." Chuck holds the degree of Highest Distinction in Pi Kappa Delta and was included in the 1982 edition of Outstanding Young Men in America and the 24th edition of Who's Who in the East. Chuck resides in Mechanicsburg, Pa., with his wife, Anne, and their two children.

#### NATURAL or SOCIAL SCIENCES

Judge Richard Payne, class of 1966

After graduation from Edinboro, Richard obtained his juris doctor degree from Florida State University in 1971 and was admitted to the practice of law in Florida. He was in private practice for nine years, served as a criminal court prosecutor and as an assistant county attorney. Judge Payne has been a trial judge since 1980, serving as a Monroe County judge for nine years, and in 1988 was elected to a six-year term as circuit court judge, garnering over 73 percent of the public vote. He was elected to a second term without opposition. In 1995 his fellow judges elected him to the position of chief circuit judge, which carries the duties of overseeing the administration of all court matters in the

Sixteenth Judicial Circuit. Included in this circuit are all county and circuit courts located in the Florida Keys, which includes four circuit judges, four county court judges and 65 court employees, housed in three different courthouses. In addition to his duties as chief judge, Judge Payne also conducts court in Key West and in Marathon Key, where he presides over civil trials and juvenile court proceedings. Additionally, Richard has served on local boards, chaired professional committees, and been involved in local community groups. A native of Girard, Pa., Richard and his wife, Patricia (Brashley), a 1966 Edinboro graduate, have lived in Key West since 1971 and have four children.

#### **PUBLIC SERVICE**

State Representative Karl Boyes, class of 1959

As a native of Erie, serving the community came naturally for Karl. After receiving his bachelor's degree in social studies, he taught at McDowell High School for six years and became a Millcreek Township supervisor. He was soon recognized as "Young Man of the Year" by the Erie Jaycees and received an outstanding citizenship award from the Boy Scouts. After serving for four years as supervisor, Karl moved on to Harrisburg as a deputy director of the Governor's Justice Commission. Soon Karl became an Erie County commissioner, and was recognized in Who's Who in the East in Government. Because of his dedicated work as a commissioner, his commitment to the residents of Erie County, and his experience and work ethic, he won a seat to the State House of Representatives in 1981 serving the Third Legislative District. Since that time Karl has been the prime sponsor of numerous legislative proposals, and he continues to credit the people of his district with bringing these legislative ideas to his attention. Karl has also served on many committees: conservation, federal-state relations, professional licensure, appropriations, the firefighters' legislative

caucus, and policy, among others. He currently serves as the majority chairman of the house finance committee, the group that sets fiscal policy for the entire state. Karl and his wife, Sue, have two sons.

#### SPECIAL RECOGNITION AWARD

Ambassador Umaru Wurie, class of 1976

Umaru Wurie attended Edinboro as an international student from Sierra Leone. After graduating with a degree in geology, Umaru earned a diploma in mining exploitation at the International Institute for Aerial Survey and Earth Sciences, located in Deleft, Netherlands. He obtained further training in various related disciplines while studying in Nairobi, Kenya; Sioux Falls, SD; Madison, WI; and University of Bradford and University of Manchester, both in the United Kingdom. He worked for 16 years as a government geologist, Ministry of Mines, for his native country. His performance was so successful that he was appointed to diplomatic service as ambassador and accredited to one of the most important postings on Sierra Leone's foreign policy agenda, High Commissioner to Nigeria and Ghana. While in that post he was also accredited as ambassador to Cameroon, Equatorial Guinea, The Republic of Benin, Togo and Zaire. After five years in that capacity, he was recognized by the succeeding government and was appointed ambassador to Saudi Arabia. He was accredited in that posting to Turkey, Kuwait, Egypt, Qatar, Oman, Bahrain, Lebanon, Syria and the UAE. He also served in that posting as high commissioner to India and Pakistan. His strong and constant contact with authorities in these many nations enabled a vital renewal of support for his country. In recognition of that success he has now been appointed the new ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany, as well as to Austria, Italy and Switzerland, and as permanent representative to the United Nations agencies to those countries. Residing in Germany, Umaru and his wife have five children.

## Edinboro Places 22nd in Sears Cup

For the second consecutive year, the Edinboro University Fighting Scots intercollegiate athletic program completed its sports seasons ranked in the top 25 of the Sears Directors' Cup final standings as announced at a special ceremony at the 32nd annual convention of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Edinboro ranked 22nd nationally in the 1996-97 final Sears Directors' Cup standings (among the 289 schools competing in NCAA Division II athletics) after placing 23rd last season.

Edinboro's high national ranking, which is based on success in NCAA Division II post-season action, was sparked by a pair of NCAA Division II Regional Championships and Elite Eight appearances in women's volleyball and women's basketball. The Scots also scored points in both men's and women's cross country and outdoor track and field.

## 1997 Spring Recap

The Edinboro track and field teams led another strong spring season of athletic competition, highlighted by the men's runner-up finish at the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference outdoor championships under head coach Doug Watts. Two Fighting Scots men brought home All-American honors from the NCAA Division II national championships as senior Travis Kuhl placed fifth in the steeplechase, and senior Bryan Lambert was seventh in the shot put with a school-record toss of more than 55 feet. The women's track and field squad placed eighth at the league championships, and several individuals also qualified for the NCAA national meet.

Edinboro's young softball team, which featured 10 freshmen and six sophomores under the guidance of head coach Dan Gierlak, placed fourth in the PSAC West and finished the season with a 20-22 overall mark. Three Fighting Scots earned All-Conference accolades as freshman Stormy Alexander was a first-team utility player and sophomore Keri Criscione was a first-team designated player. In addition, sophomore Leah McMahon was a

second-team pick at catcher. Criscione and McMahon also were all-region picks.

The Fighting Scots baseball team also enjoyed its share of success this season. Edinboro posted a 6-9 record during the team's annual spring trip to Florida, and finished with a 17-33 overall mark. Highlights of the season included a doubleheader split with NCAA Division II power Mansfield, who went on to compete in the NCAA tournament. Junior outfielder Sean Rusko was a second-team All-Conference pick.

The Edinboro men's tennis squad enjoyed another winning season, posting a 10-8 overall mark. The Scots placed fifth at the PSAC Championships, just two points away from a fourth-place showing. Dave Salvatore and Poorna Amarasinghe were PSAC runners-up in doubles play, while Paul Skrok was one of the top singles players in the league.

The Edinboro golf team placed sixth at the PSAC Championships this spring. Senior Matt Corey placed in the top ten at the Conference championship to earn All-PSAC honors.

# Student-Athletes Honored as Part of Celebration of Excellence

Eighty Edinboro University studentathletes and athletic support staff students were honored at the athletic department's annual Student-Athlete Awards Luncheon on April 13 prior to the University's Celebration of Excellence ceremony.

Edinboro Provost Dr. Robert Weber was the keynote speaker at the event. Dr. Weber recited a poem he had written several years ago on the life of former Pittsburgh Pirate Hall of Famer Roberto Clemente, reflecting back on the positive role athletics played in his life, while encouraging the student-athletes in attendance to keep up the stellar academic work and commitment to community service.

President Frank Pogue also paid tribute to the honorees, speaking on the importance of balancing academic commitments and athletics and the unique challenges studentathletes face.

All student-athletes with a 3.2 cumulative

grade point average were invited to attend the event, and were encouraged to bring a faculty or staff member who has played a significant role in their success. Ten four-year scholar-athletes received special recognition.

# Fighting Scots to Play at Disney World

Some sports teams go to Disney World after they've won a championship. However, the Edinboro men's basketball team is going to take a little different approach, hoping the "magic" of the Magic Kingdom elevates the Fighting Scots to the championship level during the upcoming 1997-98 season.

Edinboro is indeed going to Disney World to open the 1997-98 men's basketball season. The Fighting Scots have accepted an invitation to play in the Disney Division II Tip-off Classic, November 14-16. The eight-team tournament will be played at Disney's Wide World of Sports Fieldhouse in Orlando.

"We're very honored to have been invited to Disney World," said Edinboro head coach Greg Walcavich. "It's my understanding the selection committee wanted to bring in some of the top programs from each region in the country to start the '97-98 season. So, we're thrilled to accept the invitation. It will be a real challenge for our team to go down there and play three games against some quality opposition.

"It should also be a lot of fun for our players and for the fans who go with us," Walcavich continued. "What a great way to begin the season."

The Edinboro athletic department has put together a travel package for Fighting Scots fans to make the trip along with the team. (See page 25 for details.)

"Disney has put together a great hotel and entertainment deal for the universities that are competing and their fans. We hope our fans, alumni, or anybody who would like to go to Florida the second week of November, takes advantage of this opportunity to go with the team," said Walcavich.

Edinboro will play three games at Disney, starting with Southern Connecticut State University in the first round of the tournament. The Owls won the Northeast Region last season to qualify for the NCAA

Division II Elite Eight for the first time. SCSU returns three starters from a team that posted a 28-4 record. Other participants include: Wheeling Jesuit College and Columbus (GA) College in the other half of Edinboro's bracket. Wheeling Jesuit was 20-7 last year and ranked as high as No. 2 in the national poll. Other schools include: Northern State (SD) University, 22-6 and a regional qualifier a year ago; Clark Atlanta University; Lone Star Conference champions University of Central Oklahoma, 24-5; and University of Southern Indiana, 23-5 last year and the NCAA Division II national champions in 1995.

# Fighting Scots Complete Spring Football, Prepare for Fall

The Edinboro University of Pennsylvania football team completed three weeks of spring football in mid-April under the direction of head coach Tom Hollman, who begins his 10th season at Edinboro. Hollman also announced the 1997 Fighting Scot schedule (see inside back cover) and several changes to his coaching staff.

#### **STAFF CHANGES**

Veteran assistant coach Scott Browning's position will remain the same this year as he begins his third season as the Fighting Scots offensive coordinator and 12th year overall coaching at the Boro. Browning also will continue to coach the offensive linemen.

Nick Cronk, who begins his fourth season in the Edinboro program, has been promoted to the defensive coordinator position, replacing Tony Elliott, who accepted a similar position at Grand Valley State University in March. In addition to serving as defensive coordinator, Cronk will coach linebackers this year after being in charge of the defensive line the past three seasons.

Mike McCoy has been promoted from part-time assistant to full-time. McCoy, who begins his second year at Edinboro, will coach the Fighting Scots quarterbacks and running backs.

Three newcomers have joined the coaching staff. Mario Houston, who played defensive back at Edinboro from 1990-94, will coach wide receivers. Houston was a two-time All-PSAC pick and was a three-year Scholar-Athlete. Dusty Calhoun, a native of

## Seven Inducted into Athletic Hall of Fame

Four former athletes, a coach, an administrator and an outstanding contributor were inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in April.

Guy Conti was recognized for his accomplishments as a faculty member and three-sport coach in the 1970s and '80s. As men's basketball coach, he compiled 140 wins with a .590 winning mark, third best in Edinboro history.

Coleen Snyder Conboy, a 1986 graduate, was a three-time All-American (the first female at Edinboro) in cross country and

Anthony Cutri, a 1940 graduate, was recognized for his achievements in basketball and football at Edinboro State Teachers College from 1936 to 1940.

Harry "Sparky" Gorton, a behind the scenes supporter of the athletic department, was honored for more than a decade of service to the University. He spearheaded the formation of the Scotsman Wrestling Club in the mid 1980s.

Al Hall was recognized for his years of dedicated service as Edinboro's athletic director from 1969 to 1980. Under his direction, the Scots went from a six-sport program to 16 men's and women's sports.

Ellen Mulligan, one of the Lady Scots' best all-time basketball players, was honored for her hardcourt accomplishments in the early 1980s. She played in 91 games at Edinboro and finished her career with 1,169 points and more than 500 rebounds.

Jolene Nagel, a 1983 graduate, was recognized for her volleyball court achievements from 1979 to 1982. A two-time co-captain, her teams recorded an outstanding 116 wins against just 43 losses.

Also honored at this year's event were Carl Leonard, male athlete of the year, and Stephanie Radecki, female athlete of the year.


