hen I assumed the presidency of Edinboro University 15 years ago, I was impressed by the concern shown then by the alumni. That concern was indeed justified: many people had given up on the school and thoughts were being voiced that it would be closed. Fortunately, many alumni did not share this extreme view. They had faith in their alma mater and provided me with patient support for the many painful decisions which had to be made. Without that support, we would not be where we are today - the third largest of the 14 State System of Higher Education universities and widely recognized as one of its best.



### Richard Bly Returns Holgate Toys to Prominence





It is entirely fitting that one of the world's best toy companies should reside in the heart of the Allegheny National Forest, where time is measured by the passing of the seasons and marked by the rings on a tree.

Likewise, the craftsmen of the Holgate Toy Company of Kane, Pennsylvania, unhurriedly shape their natural hardwood creations by hand, one toy at a time. By comparison, the frenzied efforts of giant toy conglomerates to produce a new toy fad year after year seem to pass like frost in the morning sun.

In an industry that has become so computerized, mechanized and plasticized, Holgate takes on a near fairy-tale quality of its own. "We take time-tested toys," said Holgate President Richard Bly, "and provide a good quality product to consumers."

The history of the Holgate Toy Company begins in 1789, the year the U.S. Constitution was signed, when the Holgate family started a woodworking shop outside of Philadelphia. They later moved the business to the hardwood forest region of northwestern Pennsylvania. When the first Holgate toy was

made in 1929, the chief toy designer was Jarvis Rockwell, brother of artist Norman Rockwell. His designs of such classic Holgate toys as the Bingo Bed, Rocky Color Cone, Lacing Shoe, and Lacing Beads are still among the Company's most popular toys today.

By the 1940s, Holgate had more than 600 employees. The last owners of the company, James and Helen Henretta, eventually closed the Kane facility in the early 1960s and sold the Holgate name.

Holgate Toys might have disappeared forever had it not been for Bly. Growing up in Kane, he learned about Holgate from the Henrettas, who were friends of the Bly family. After graduating from Kane High School, Bly came to Edinboro University where he met Joanne Van Maurik, a Pittsburgh area native. They graduated in 1977 and were wed the same year.

"Since the late 1970s Joanne and I had been buying toys for nephews, nieces, and later our own children," said Bly. "We always looked at wooden toys because we wanted to buy a good quality gift. The wood products we were looking at then were coming from

Europe, and every time I'd buy one the thought I had was that somebody ought to be making Holgate toys again. That happened often enough that I began to take the idea seriously."

He teamed up with his neighbor, Kent Wilson, who had experience in manufacturing, to develop a business plan. In 1988 they presented the plan to Zippo, the lighter manufacturer in nearby Bradford. Joining forces with Zippo would be a big boost for the toy company. Zippo had expertise in silk screening, a staff of 19 graphic artists, an established sales force and financial resources. Zippo accepted the plan, and by the end of the year production of Holgate toys was once again underway.

Today the company employs more than 30 people in two locations just outside of Kane. The offices and assembly area are housed in a converted dairy barn. Most of the cutting and shaping of the wood takes place at a small wood products company Holgate purchased a couple of years ago. Some pieces, such as the people figures used in the cars and trains, come from companies in New England.

Perhaps the most familiar of Holgate's toys is the bright red and yellow Neighborhood Trolley from television's "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood." In 1990, Bly sent Fred Rogers a Fairyland Train for his birthday. By coincidence, Rogers' Family Communications company had been looking for an American company to make a wooden version of its trolley. They contacted Holgate. Rogers visited the company, liked what he saw, and gave the job to Bly.


When Rogers went to Washington, D.C., to meet President Clinton during the inauguration, he took along a gift – one of the Neighborhood Trolleys. A picture of Rogers with the President holding the trolley hangs in the Holgate lobby.

The company has another connection to President Clinton. His inaugural committee wanted an American manufacturer to make a replica of the Clinton/Gore '92 bus. It contacted a distributor who had a copy of the Holgate catalog. The distributor contacted Holgate, plans were drawn up for the bus and Holgate received the order. The bus appeared









The Holgate Toy Company's pursuit of quality is also evident in its philosophy of environmental responsibility. "You have to be responsible," said Holgate President Richard Bly. "In this part of Pennsylvania we are especially aware of environmental issues because we depend on our forests."

Bly understands the relationship between a healthy economy and a healthy environment. He said the forests in that area have adopted a 100-year growth cycle that allows only one percent of the forest to be harvested each year.

All of the packaging for Holgate's products is made from recycled paper, and the inner packing is made from shredded paper instead of plastic peanuts. Even the scrap wood from the manufacturing facility is saved to help heat the building in winter.

Bly said his environmental views were nurtured in the geography department at Edinboro by professors such as Paul Knuth and Frank Stoughton. "We spent a lot of time on Lake Erie doing shoreline studies and studies of Presque Isle. It was very important to get out of the classroom and work on projects together. The field experience was great."

in a million catalogs of inaugural memorabilia. Several thousand of the \$25 bus have been produced to date.

If there is one word to describe Holgate products, it is quality. Every toy is hand crafted in hardwood and decorated with nontoxic paint. They are designed to stimulate a child's creativity while lasting a lifetime. "Our philosophy is simple," said Bly. "Build the best product possible and stand behind it 100 percent."

Every toy comes with a lifetime guarantee. If one should ever need repair due to normal use, the company will fix it at the Holgate Toy Hospital and return it within 24 hours. Because the toys are so well made, only a handful have ever been "hospitalized" and most of them were abused or neglected.

Holgate's dedication to quality is starting to pay dividends at a national level. One of its toys, the Hickory Dickory Dock Clock, was honored by *Parents* magazine, *Toy Tips*, and *Early Childhood News* as one of the best toys for young children.

"I think there will always be a niche for our products," said Bly. "People like wood. It's warm, its sturdy. Grandparents like to buy them for their grandkids. We don't compete against faddish toys. We're not in that part of the toy industry where Fisher Price, Mattel or

Hasbro roll the dice and hope the next product line is a big hit and makes a million dollars. We don't do that."

Through its connections with Zippo, Holgate also makes products for the specialty advertising market. Some of these items include hardwood key rings, letter openers, tape measures, luggage tags, and golf bag tags. Among the most popular items for business gifts are toy trucks that are silk screened or laser engraved with a company's name or logo.

Even as Holgate continues to grow, Bly gives little thought to moving the company to a larger market area. "Kane is the perfect location," said Bly. "It also is a good location to raise a family." The Blys have three children – Andrew (10), Caitlin (7), and Lauren (4). Joanne is the court administrator in Smethport for the McKean County court.

Richard Bly majored in geography at Edinboro and obtained a master's degree in geography from Western Illinois University, with a concentration in regional planning. He returned to northwestern Pennsylvania to take a position with the North Central Regional Planning Economic Development Commission in Ridgway. One year later he joined his brother's financial services company in the Washington. He later returned to Kane to manage a real estate investment project before resurrecting Holgate.

### **Dan Mantia Overcomes Adversity**

here may be few true renaissance men or women in the world – people with a wide variety of interests with expertise in many areas. But a young man in California who graduated from Edinboro University in 1977 may be as good a candidate as any.

Dan Mantia is manager of the Central Coast Plaza, a shopping center in San Luis Obispo, located between San Francisco and Los Angeles. He is also a stand-up comedian, a helicopter pilot in training, serves on the board of a rape crisis center, does aerobic exercise, and is getting married in October. And on the first Wednesday of the month he meets with a support group he founded for people like him – Mantia has multiple sclerosis.

He first suspected something was wrong 10 years ago while living in the Pittsburgh area when the vision in one eye would come and go. He underwent a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) test, but it was negative. When the symptoms reappeared, a second MRI test was also negative. Two years ago, while living in Los Angeles, the symptoms returned in the form of double vision and impaired movement of his legs. This time the MRI test came back positive. Mantia had MS.

Mantia is a native of Munhall, Pa., and was in the first graduating class of Steel Valley High School. After working for a while as a railroad brakeman, he decided that a college education held better prospects for him. He graduated from Edinboro with a degree in speech communication and attended graduate school at Southern Illinois University.

Meanwhile, a friend who was in the shopping mall business encouraged Mantia to apply for the marketing director position of the Richmond Mall outside of Cleveland. He was hired, and six months later was made general manager. That was the beginning of a career that has taken him to managerial positions for several different mall companies. He was regional manager for the Zamias Company of the Cranberry and Clearview malls in western Pennsylvania. He worked for the First City Corp. in Pittsburgh, and managed facilities in New Orleans before

taking a position with a California mall company in the Los Angeles area.

"Managing a mall is like running a small city," said Mantia. "You're the mayor. You have to deal with a lot of people – everyone from store owners to custodians to the public.

In October of last year, Mantia attended a meeting where an author was speaking about her book, *If I'm So Wonderful*, *Why Am I Still Single?* During intermission he began talking to another person attending the talk, Barbara Andrews. They had a date the next night and three months later they were engaged. They will be married in Pittsburgh this fall.

Mantia's involvement with the plight of abused women began at Edinboro. In his senior year he had a choice of doing an internship at an Erie television station or at the Rape Crisis Center. He chose the latter and has never regretted it.

His job was to promote public awareness of the Center. He quickly put together a media directory and designed a brochure which, in a modified form, is still being used today. Mantia even took the training to become a counselor and took part in counseling before the semester-long internship was over.

Mantia has taken the experience of working with victimized women with him to Pittsburgh, New Orleans and California. One of the things that has enabled him to cope with his challenges, as well as those of the women he helps, is his sense of humor. Ten years ago he watched a friend get up on the stage at a comedy club in Pittsburgh. Mantia decided he wanted to try it too, so he wrote a routine for himself based on his own life experiences. "It was such a great feeling to get up in front of 300 people and make them laugh."

His bout with MS has helped him put things in perspective. He finds time to do the things that make life worth living. He still works more than 40 hours a week overseeing a major expansion to his mall, doing an occasional stand-up comedy engagement, and planning his wedding. "The secret," he said, "is never to lose your sense of humor."

### **Rob Lowther Leads Growth of Edinboro Company**

An on-going explosion of sorts is taking place in a cluster of blue buildings just east of Edinboro on Route 6N. Rob Lowther, dressed in shorts and a casual shirt, sits at a desk overflowing with paperwork. In other rooms of newly-constructed office space, employees dressed just as casually as the boss take care of the day-to-day operations in this chaotic environment.

The explosion has a name: Great Lakes Case & Cabinet Co., Inc. Since Lowther and his wife Carrie started the business in their garage in the spring of 1985, the company has grown from a very modest \$26,000 in sales for their first year to \$5.6 million for 1992. Last year alone sales grew by 70 percent. By the end of 1993 Lowther expects to have more than \$7 million in sales.

A 1977 graduate of Edinboro, Lowther started his company to make steel cabinets – primarily for the communications industry. His career had been entirely in the telephone business. He worked in purchasing for GTE in Erie, sales and marketing for Southern Tel Supply in Atlanta and Lynch Communications in Reno, Nevada, and until December of 1991, was regional sales manager for Tellabs, Inc., of Chicago.

As early as 1983 he was working on a cabinet prototype. "I saw many of the needs for housing communications equipment," said Lowther. "I saw the problems companies

were having with quality and delivery times. I thought I could design a product that was competitive."

Key to much of Great Lakes' success has been service. The industry standard for turnaround times for filling orders is four to six weeks; Lowther's company does it in seven to ten days. "All west coast shipments are made within 72 hours," said Lowther.

Since that first prototype cabinet, the company has expanded its product line to 30 standard cases and cabinets. Shelving, wiring and fans are custom installed.

"When an order goes out of here it's ready to be installed," said Lowther. "A lot of companies make cabinets that are assembled by the customer. That saves on shipping costs but the cabinets aren't as sturdy and won't last as long as ours."

All electronic components are tested and run twice before the order leaves the building. As a result, the rate of return is less than one percent.

The tremendous growth in sales has been accompanied by increases in both building space and office staff. Lowther obtained a \$30,000 loan to build the original building in the fall of 1985. Six months later he borrowed \$40,000 for a second building. Since then the first building has been expanded twice, a third structure was completed last year for assembly and shipping, and ground is about to be broken for a 5,000 sq. ft. expansion for manufacturing and assembly.

More than \$600,000 has been spent on plant additions, including 4,600 sq. ft. in office space which was completed last fall. Lowther finally has an office worthy of a CEO of a multi-million dollar company. For a long time he worked off a table in what had been a conference room. He now has a facility in which he is proud to receive visitors and representatives of large international corporations.

The Lowther family has lived in Edinboro since 1978. Rob and Carrie have four children: Jennifer, who is eight; six-year-old Robbie; John, age five; and three-year-old Bryan.

Like Lowther, many of the company's 32 full- and part-time employees are Edinboro graduates. Karen Grove, who received her degree in elementary education in 1976, is manager of inside sales and is responsible for all accounts nationwide. The quality assurance and product manager, Ray McQuillen Jr., earned a speech communications degree in 1982, and has been with the company for six years. One of the earliest employees to join the business is Tim Ward, who graduated with a degree in economics in 1983 and started at Great Lakes in 1986. Ward is sales manager for the eastern United States.

Another person having a big impact on the company is Alan Kalla, who is working in inside sales. He started at the company through an internship as a speech communications major. John Bacik, who graduated from Edinboro in 1975, recently joined the company as its production manager.

Clearly, the enthusiasm and optimism which are evident at Great Lakes are due not only to its financial success but also to Lowther's management style. "I'm not a dictator," he said candidly. "I believe in hiring adults who do not need someone looking over their shoulders, and who are able to make decisions on their own."

Lowther believes in treating employees well financially. He instituted a profit-sharing program which last year distributed \$2,100 to each non-commission earning employee just before Christmas. He also put in place Blue Cross/Blue Shield medical coverage that is entirely paid by the company.

"I'm not a prude about money. Two years ago during the recession we increased our budget by 40 percent for advertising, travel and entertainment. If we need something, like a piece of equipment, I'll get it."

An example of Lowther's philosophy is the \$50,000 Great Lakes spent to construct a sewer line down Route 6N to hook in with the Edinboro system – at no cost to taxpayers. He also contributes to his alma mater's Annual Fund – making gifts to Edinboro's athletic, disabled student and speech communication studies programs.



Lowther takes great pride in employing Edinboro graduates in fulland part-time positions and offering interships to Edinboro students.

Lowther believes his generous fiscal practices and attitude toward expansion are well justified. He said the data side of the communications industry is growing by leaps and bounds. "We see very strong growth in this industry."

He also sees the need to be able to compete and survive against international competition. Beginning this fall, Lowther will begin an internal quality management program based on the International Organization for Standardization's ISO 9000 series of quality standards. Meeting ISO 9000 certification is vital for companies wanting to do business with European firms. Great Lakes will soon hire a person to administer the ISO 9000 program. Undoubtedly, that person will be a graduate of Edinboro University.

### Edinboro Grad Walks Among Nation's Education Elite

eed a story on Allen Schmieder, the editor-in-chief says. Aha, Dr. Allen Schmieder, I say. *That* Dr. Allen Schmieder, that man, that educator, executive, program innovator and administrator, poet, power broker, author, newspaper editor, philosopher, preacher, geographer, professor, teacher, speechmaker, acquaintance and friend to the famous, and former fullback, sprinter, long jumper, and basketball forward. That Edinboro graduate, class of 1955, who was named a distinguished Edinboro alumnus in 1992. *That* Dr. Allen Schmieder.

Where does one begin a story about Allen Schmieder? An in-office interview was a good start. The office, of course, is in Washington, D.C., in one of the U.S. Department of Education's many buildings owned, leased and spread across the nation's capital. This particular building, one in the federal government's usual FBI Building-lookalike, prison-modern architectural style and nestled on F Street near Union Station – conveniently shares space with the Washington Court Hotel.

The fifth floor office itself is small but obviously the work space of an important, busy man. A first-time visitor is immediately struck by the display of artwork and awards adorning the walls. The awards – mostly plaques, framed certificates, and diplomas – number 32. That's 32 . . . count 'em. There's the 1955 diploma from Edinboro State

Teachers College, of course, and the laserengraved walnut plaque naming him a 1992 distinguished alumnus of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. There's also a Methodist Church Exhorter's license issued in 1951 in Wesleyville, Pa., and a plaque from the University of Maryland recognizing him as an outstanding faculty member in 1963-64. I could go on.

The citation that accompanied his Edinboro University distinguished alumni award, which was crafted by this writer for the 1992 award ceremony and subsequent press release, summarizes his distinguished life and career within and beyond academe:

"Dr. Allen Schmieder is currently the director of the Eisenhower National Program in Mathematics and Science Education in Washington, D.C. The Eisenhower Program and several complementing programs are funded at more than \$25 million annually, making them the largest federal math-science programs in the nation's history. Graduated from Edinboro in 1955, he earned master's and doctoral degrees at the Ohio State University and served on the faculties of both Ohio State and the University of Maryland. During his more than 25 years at the Department of Education, he has served six U.S. presidents and helped implement national programs in teacher education and training, environmental and energy education, alternative schools, teacher centers, foreign languages, drug education, the social sciences, competency-based education, counseling and guidance, mathematics and science, and computer and technology education. He has delivered keynote addresses at annual conferences of 24 of the nation's major professional scientific organizations, as well as state-level presentations in 49 of the 50 states. A prolific writer and poet, his poetry has been featured at several national festivals, and he has written or edited more than 200 books, monographs and articles, including the base paper for the United Nations International Congress on Environmental Education. The major focus of his writing and speaking in recent years has been on trends and futures in society, education and the new technologies."



Schmieder has never lost the sense of sheer excitement he exudes over the education programs he has created, had funded, and wisely managed through his years at DOE, and talks at length about them, particularly some of the new initiatives. One is the \$41 million Fund for Innovation in Education, or FIE, one of the three major programs he deals with daily (the other two being the Eisenhower Program and the Fund for Improvement of Schools and Teaching).

"FIE represents the most flexible money ever to be administered by DOE," he said. "Its three major components – the littany, the framework, and assessment – will develop new performance and knowledge standards in all major subject areas, as well as an array of curriculum frameworks or models which will be developed by the states in cooperation with universities and associations. Plus, new assessment approaches will be determined and applied."

Another program sharing his attention is CLIN, for the Community Learning Information Network. Schmieder's vision for CLIN is to give educators the best possible technology and give it to them *now*. And in doing so, he intends to bring together

administrative and instructional technology to create the largest educational technology base and collection in the world.

He adds an objective of his own to the overall goals he foresees for CLIN: "Kids can become contributors to the knowledge bases, and we often tend to overlook that. We're always saying that we're preparing kids for life, but they're *already* living . . . already doing great things that are contributive to our total knowledge."

About the only other topic that gets Allen Schmieder more animated than education is talk about Edinboro and the many reminiscences of his college days.

"High school in Wesleyville didn't do anything for me; in fact, I disliked school then," he said. "Edinboro was a paradise for me. It built the foundation for everything I've done in life, and the people were tremendous." Among his fondest memories were the summer afternoon teas that Justina Baron, the legend-status Edinboro librarian, held for students at her home in nearby McKean.

"I did everything at Edinboro, from cleaning toilets, to washing dishes and silverware, to editing the *Spectator*, to being one of the only three-sport 'walk-ons' ever to play for Art McComb," he said. "My mother sent me three dollars a week to live on, so I had to do all sorts of things just for spending money."

Schmieder credits the late, legendary Art McComb, for whom Edinboro's principal athletic complex has since been dedicated, with giving him the chance to play football and basketball and to run track and field. He also recalls fondly his four-year roommate, Jim Wolf, now the superintendent of Ft. LeBoeuf Schools, with whom he still maintains a close, personal friendship.

Always the poet at heart, Schmieder, who once shared the podium at the famed Rocky Mountain Poetry Festival with Norman Mailer, recited several of his poems as we concluded the interview and walked to the Metro at Union Station. One poem, written for his daughter, is shown at right.

### 1993 Distinguished Alumni Awards





Honored as Distinguished Alumni were (l-r): Dr. David Montefiori, John Novello, Erie Mayor Joyce Savocchio, Dr. Gertrude A. Barber, Dan Higham, and Dr. John Mikrut.

The 1993 Distinguished Alumni Award recipients represent a wide range of careers, academic backgrounds, and ages. Each has achieved impressive success, and by doing so has honored Edinboro University.

Dr. Gertrude A. Barber '30, distinguished alumna in education, is the founder of the Dr. Gertrude A. Barber Center and, since the Barber Center began serving the greater Erie community 41 years ago, its only president and chief executive officer. Under her leadership the Barber Center has emerged as the largest and most inclusive agency of its kind in Pennsylvania, as well as one of the premier facilities in the nation devoted to the evaluation, treatment, education, housing and placement of individuals with developmental disabilities. A member of Edinboro's Board of Advisors, she was president of her graduating class (1930) at the Erie Branch of Edinboro State Teachers College and a past president of the Edinboro Alumni Association.

The Honorable **Joyce A. Savocchio** '75, mayor of the City of Erie, distinguished alumna in public service, received her secondary school administration certificate from Edinboro University in 1975. During a 24-year career as a teacher and administrator, she entered politics and was the first woman ever elected to Erie City Council. She served two terms as Council president. In 1989 she

was elected mayor of the City of Erie – the city's first woman mayor – in a landslide, two-to-one margin victory, and, in her recent bid for re-election to a second term, won the Democratic primary race.

Dan Higham '71 was one of two recipients of a distinguished alumni award in the field of business and industry. A 1971 Edinboro graduate, he is currently vice president, plant manager and co-owner of U.S. Bronze Foundry and Machine, Inc., in Meadville, Pa., which has emerged under his leadership and business acumen as the most diversified bronze foundry in North America. He is also the current national director for the American Foundrymen's Association.

Dr. John Mikrut '66, the second business and industry honoree, is a nationally known, highly respected labor arbitrator. The 1966 Edinboro graduate began arbitrating labor and industry disputes in the early 1970s while teaching and working toward a doctorate at the University of Missouri at Columbia. Twenty years and some 2,000 cases later have brought him national and international prominence as an arbitration practitioner. He currently serves on arbitration panels in several midwestern states, and has arbitrated cases for both the Federal Aviation Administration and the U.S. Postal Service.

Dr. David Montefiori '78, the 1993 distinguished alumni award recipient in the natural and social sciences, plays a critical role in the worldwide search to find a cure for AIDS. A member of the International AIDS Society and the International Society for Antiviral Research, he is an associate professor of experimental surgery at Duke University Medical Center, where his research studies of AIDS vaccine trials and immune responses to modified vaccines are being funded in part by grants from the National Institutes of Health.

John Novello, class of 1970, the acclaimed musician, composer, recording artist and author, was 1993's distinguished alumni in the arts and humanities. His professional career spans more than 20 years and he has worked with such musical luminaries as Chuck Corea, A Taste of Honey, Manhattan Transfer, Donna Summer, Ramsey Lewis, Ronnie Laws, the Commodores, Ritchie Cole, and Edgar Winter. He is the author of *The Contemporary Keyboardist*, the critically acclaimed, definitive manual on jazz piano that has sold worldwide.



### Phase II – Another Alumni Success Story

The 1992-93 Alumni Annual Fund has been referred to as Phase II all year, and for a good reason. This was the second year of a three-year plan to support the scholarship endowment at Edinboro. After the adoption of the plan by the Alumni Board of Directors, it was quickly activated for the 1991-92 Annual Fund, and you responded by giving more than \$170,000. The first \$25,000 endowment was created for the Dean's Scholarship, School of Education.

This year, Phase II's goal of a second \$25,000 endowment and 10 freshman grants of \$5,000 each gave you the opportunity to continue your support for the scholarship program.

As reported in the last issue of the *Alumni News*, the fall and spring phonathons brought 3,916 pledges equaling \$119,672. However, by June 30, only 3,023 pledge payments were received, for a total of \$94,259. Some alumni who pledged a specific amount sent more. Others who were considering a gift or even said "no" on the phone sent gifts as well. The overall participation rate for this year was 19.44%, and when compared to 18.79% for 1991-92, shows that more alumni are choosing to support their alma mater and its programs. The chart on this page illustrates the total alumni giving for 1992-93. It also compares last year's figures and shows increases.

As a result of some gifts being designated and because a portion of the Alumni Association budget also comes from unrestricted Annual Fund gifts, \$30,000 will be used to establish the Admissions Grants Fund to assist with freshman grants and other needs. That fund will grow on an annual basis to include a variety of scholarship needs. The \$25,000 to create the endowment for the Dean's Scholarship, School of Liberal Arts was presented to President Diebold during Alumni Reunion Weekend.

As you read this, the books will have already been closed for the 1992-93 fiscal year, and the 1993-94 "Final Phase" already begun. The goals are the most challenging yet and include the final \$25,000 Dean's Scholarship (for the School of Science, Management and Technologies), continuing the freshman

grants, and adding grants for upperclassmen. The challenge of maintaining a fund for the grants will then continue on an annual basis.

Thanks for your support and let's continue that 'Boro spirit for 1993-94!

The conference was sponsored by Edinboro's Institute for Ethics and Values, created by President Diebold as part of the Thrust Toward Excellence project within the University's School of Education. The project established a Center for Excellence in Teaching, which includes the Institute for Ethics and Values Education.

### Edinboro Awarded Newcombe Foundation Grant

The prestigious Charlotte W. Newcombe Foundation of Princeton, N.J., will award a \$15,000 scholarship grant to Edinboro University in the 1993-94 academic year for financial aid to students with physical disabilities. The grant is Edinboro's 13th in 13 years, bringing the total awarded to \$240,000.

Edinboro is one of only ten colleges and universities in the northeastern United States to share in Newcombe Foundation scholarships in 1993-94. Funds may be used for special expenses related to a students disability or for off-campus internships or partial tuition scholarships.

The grants recognize Edinboro's extensive commitment to providing supportive services to students with disabilities and the need for augmented aid to cover special educational costs.

### Seven Teams Finish in Top 20

Football, wrestling, men's track, men's and women's cross country, and both swimming teams finished the 1992-93 athletic year in the NCAA top 20 final rankings, while the women's basketball team earned its third berth in six years in the Division II championship field of 32 teams.

Under the direction of head coach Tom Hollman, the football team posted the highest mid-season ranking this year, earning a number three mark after week seven. The Scots concluded with their best regular season record in 21 years, 8-1-1, and advanced to the national championship. At year's end, the 'Boro settled in at #15. Eight players earned All-America status, bringing the total under Hollman to 32.

Three-time Olympic medalist Bruce Baumgartner's Division I wrestling squad turned in its top finish since 1987-88 when the Scots took 15th place at the national championships. The team's showing tied for the top spot among PSAC and Eastern Wrestling League schools. Senior Lewis Rosselli, named Edinboro's Male Athlete of the Year, earned All-America honors, while sophomore Tom Shifflet is destined to become Edinboro's first four-time Division I All-American.

Under the watchful eye of Coach Doug Watts, the men's track team placed 14th, while both cross country teams placed among the top ten in the nation.

Coach Paul Stamm's swimming teams had another strong showing at nationals as the men finished 11th and the Lady Scots earned a 17th-place finish. Seven swimmers made the trip to nationals and all came home All-Americans.

Overall, 26 athletes earned All-America status.

# Football Team Named in Pre-season Top 10

The Edinboro football team has already received praise in a pair of pre-season polls. *Football Digest* has tabbed the 'Boro number two, while Host Communications, publicists

for the NCAA, ranks the Scots at number nine.

Individually, five players were named to the pre-season All-American squad by Host Communications, including first-team selections Jason Perkins (Geneva, Ohio) and Mike Kegarise (Milan, Ohio). Perkins led the Scots in tackles (123) last year and was named third team All-American by *Football Gazette*. Kegarise, the Scots' 6-7, 300-lb. offensive tackle, was an Associated Press third-team choice in '92 and an honorable mention in *Football Gazette*.

Also receiving early recognition were running back Larry Jackson (Pittsburgh), the PSAC West's 1992 Player of the Year; punter Gary Lhotsky (Bridgeport, W.Va.), the league's top punter (40.1); and defensive tackle Russell Cray (Cleveland), a secondteam choice on the Conference's west squad last year.

Edinboro opens its 1993 campaign at home against Ferris State, the opponent that knocked the Scots out of the national championship race in the opening round of the Division II playoffs last year, 19-15.

# Cross Country Team Hopes to Stay on Course

Coming off an outstanding year, the 'Boro cross country teams, under veteran mentor Doug Watts, are gearing for another run at national prominence in 1993. This past season proved to be one of Edinboro's most successful, as the women achieved their highest national ranking ever (fifth), and the men were close behind at sixth.

Returning to lead the men's team will be All-Americans Martin Lyons and Carl Leonard.

The men's cross country team has captured six national championships under Watts. Look for them to make a serious bid for the seventh in 1993.

The women are coming off a year when they captured team titles on both the state and regional levels. With the graduation of All-Americans Donna Thibert-Matthews and Marty Marczak, the squad will be tested to retain its place in the rankings this fall.

### **Volleyball Team to Sport New Faces**

The success of volleyball coach Glen Conley has been unmatched in the PSAC during the past seven years, and 1993 should prove to be another successful campaign for the Lady Scots.

Posting an impressive 180-66 record at the 'Boro, Conley has led the team to the Conference finals the past four years, including consecutive PSAC championships in 1990 and 1991. The squad finished as state runners-up in 1992 with a 25-5 overall record.

Great expectations lie ahead in 1993, but the spark will have to come from a small group of returnees and a host of new faces. Conley will depend on five sophomores and six newcomers to carry his squad back to the Conference championship.

### Softball Players Honored

A pair of Lady Scot softball players were named to the PSAC Western Division firstteam all-star squad. In voting done by the Conference coaches, outfielder Heather Heist (York, Pa.) and designated player Terri Spaulding (Madison, Ohio) earned the recognition for Edinboro. Head coach Dan Gierlak's squad finished the season 13-20 overall and a respectable 5-5 (3rd place) in the Western Division.

Spaulding, who pitched and played infield, hit .471 (8 for 17) in Conference action and .347 (17 for 49) overall on the season. She drove in 12 runs with her 17 hits and earned an on-base percentage of .482. Her earned-run average was an outstanding 1.06.

Heist, the Lady Scots' left fielder, turned in an outstanding season, leading the team in average (.356), total bases (59), at-bats (101), runs scored (27), hits (36), runs batted in (19) and stolen bases (3). Her hit total was the eighth best in the PSAC, and her batting mark ranked 18th.

### Baseball Players Recognized by **PSAC** and Atlantic Region

Former General McLane standout Bill McHenry (Edinboro, Pa.) was one of only three outfielders chosen to the first-team PSAC-West squad. He was later named to the second-team All-Atlantic Region squad by the district coaches. He concluded an outstanding career with the Scots, batting .359 for the season with 46 hits in 128 plate appearances. His safety total led the team, while he also topped the Scots in runs scored (40), walks (32), base percentage (.494) and stolen bases (15). In addition, he owned an impressive fielding mark of .987, committing just one error in 45 games.

Jason Bradburn (Library, Pa.) was named the PSAC-West's top designated hitter and "Rookie of the Year." He was also named to the second-team All-Atlantic Region squad. He got his 'Boro career off to a fine start last year, leading the squad in at-bats (130), runs batted in (42), doubles (13), home runs (4), and slugging percentage (.531). His average of .331 (43 of 130) was outstanding for a firstyear player.

### 'Boro's Paul Stamm Resigns Post

After guiding 40 All-Americans in the pool and six academic All-Americans in the classroom, head men's and women's swimming coach Paul Stamm ('69) resigned effective August 1. He has accepted a teaching and coaching position with Oil City (Pa.) High School in Venango County.

Since the 1986-87 season, Stamm has brought national recognition to the Edinboro swim program, including consecutive NCAA II top 20 finishes for both his men's and women's programs the past two years. His Edinboro teams combined to break more than 350 school records during his tenure. At the 1992-93 championships in Canton, Ohio, the men finished 11th nationally, while the Lady Scots took 17th place. All seven swimmers who traveled to last season's championships came home All-Americans.

Stamm came to Edinboro from nearby Meadville High School where his Bulldog teams registered a combined 258-26-1 dual meet record from 1975 to 1986.
