

BLOOMSBURG UNIVERSITY

Bloomsburg University is a multi-purpose institution of higher education serving the citizens of Pennsylvania as one of the 14 Commonwealth-owned universities in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. With a commitment to provide a quality, affordable education for all qualified students, Bloomsburg combines the tradition of an institution founded in 1839 with modern learning, living, and recreational programs and facilities. Commonwealth funding provides 55 percent of Bloomsburg's annual operating budget.

Undergraduate students may enroll in degree programs in 64 areas of study in the arts and sciences, business, teacher education, nursing, and health sciences. A program in engineering with the Pennsylvania State University and preparation for post-baccalaureate study at professional schools are offered. Unique educational opportunities are available through advanced placement, study abroad, professional practicum, internships, independent study, and the Department of Developmental Instruction programs.

At the graduate level, the master's degree is offered in 23 areas of study, and there are 11 supervisory certification programs in the field of teacher education.

Extended program offerings provide continuing, life-long learning opportunities for people of all ages and educational interests through non-degree courses, non-credit mini-courses offered at off-campus locations, and by public service television and credit for work experience.

Enrollment for the 1988-89 academic year totalled 6,951 students. There were 5,447 full-time and 818 part-time undergraduates and 116 full-time and 570 part-time graduate students. Instruction is provided by a 367-member faculty.

The university's 173-acre campus overlooks the town of Bloomsburg and the scenic Susquehanna Valley. Carver Hall, built in 1867, provides a contrast with the modern facilities that include seven residence halls, a library, a 2,000-seat auditorium, student union, dining hall, gymnasium, administration building, six classroom buildings, and athletic and recreational areas on the lower campus.

An athletic and recreational complex occupy the school's 100-acre upper campus. In addition, a residence complex which provide housing for 384 junior and senior students.

Located 80 miles northeast of the state capital of Harrisburg, Bloomsburg is within two miles of two interchanges of Interstate 80. A pair of interstate bus lines serve the community, and commercial airports at Wilkes-Barre/Scranton and Williamsport are approximately an hour's drive from Bloomsburg.

Bloomsburg has an enviable placement record, and 80.8 percent of the 1986-87 graduates had meaningful employment or were in graduate school one year later.

Active files of over 28,000 living alumni are kept by the university. Graduates of Bloomsburg have distinguished themselves in the areas including law, medicine, science, architecture, education, industry, and research.

Bloomsburg University is fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the Pennsylvania Board of Education.

Bloomsburg University is committed to Affirmative Action and Equal Opportunity. Minorities, women, and other protected class members are urged to pursue educational and employment opportunities at the university.

HARRY AUSPRICH PRESIDENT



Dr. Harry Ausprich began his tenure July 15, 1985 as the 16th president of Bloomsburg University. His appointment follows that of former president James H. McCormick, who is currently serving as Chancellor for the State System of Higher Education in Pennsylvania.

Prior to assuming his duties at Bloomsburg, Ausprich served at Kent State University as dean of the College of Fine and Professional Arts from 1978 to 1985. While there, he was instrumental in implementing a program in fashion design and merchandising that has gained a national reputation. In addition, he served as dean of the Blossom Festival School Program in cooperation with the Cleveland Orchestra.

In previous years, he served as dean of the Faculty of Arts and later as dean of the Faculty of Arts and Humanities, both at SUNY Buffalo. While at Buffalo, he developed a proposal for a program in dance and for a series of interdisciplinary seminars in the arts. In the early 1970s, he worked at the University of Northern Iowa as dean of the College of Humanities and Fine Arts. Classroom teaching experiences and departmental chairperson responsibilities comprised his major assignments at Indiana State University and Memphis State University.

His academic background includes a bachelor of science degree from New York University, College at Buffalo, a master of science degree from the University of Wisconsin in theater and broadcasting, and a doctorate from Michigan State University in communications and theater.

MARY GARDNER ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Mary Gardner took over the reins as Bloomsburg's athletic director in July of 1988 after serving in the capacity on an interim basis for six months. Prior to becoming the head of the Department of Athletics, she was the university's associate athletic director for one and one-half years.

Her duties include overseeing the daily activities of the university's 18 varsity teams, budget control, and fundraising to aid the general scholarship fund. In addition, Gardner directs activities in the university's three major athletic facilities as well as the many athletic practice and playing fields.

Before assuming her athletic administration duties three years ago, she was head coach of the women's swimming and diving program for 12 seasons and directed the men's swimming and diving unit for one season. Her women's squads posted an overall record of 88-28 in dual-meet action and finished as the Pennsylvania Conference runnerup six years in a row from 1981 to 1986. She coached 44 performers to multiple All-American honors as the Huskies' coach. In addition, she served as the university's first head field hockey coach and registered a four-year record of 20-12-9. She also served as the school's Director of Equal Opportunity in Sports (DEOS).

The Hatboro, Pa., native earned her bachelor's and master's degrees at East Stroudsburg where she was a four-year letterwinner in field hockey and swimming. She was a three-time national champion in the breaststroke.



BURT REESE ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Burt Reese has served as the university's assistant athletic director for the past six years in addition to being the Huskies' head tennis coach and assistant basketball coach. Reese is also a faculty member in the Department of Health and Physical Education.

His main responsibilities in athletic administration include the scheduling of events for most of the university's 18 varsity athletic teams and the coordination of scheduling for the university's four main athletic facilities and the many playing and practice areas on the campus.

Reese will be entering his 22nd year as a member of the Huskies' staff and has built one of the nation's top tennis programs. He served as the Huskies' freshman basketball coach for seven seasons and had a record of 83-27. In his 21 seasons in charge of the tennis team his clubs have accumulated a mark of 314-132. He has coached 61 singles and doubles champions in the Pennsylvania Conference and has been named the PC "Coach of the Year" on five occasions. He has handled six All-Americans and one national champion.

His teams have won eight of the last 11 conference titles, been highly ranked nationally over the past several seasons, and finished last season as Division II's fifth-rated club. In 1987, Reese was named the national Division II "Coach of the Year" and currently serves as chairman of the East Region on the NCAA's Division II Tennis Committee.

The native of Taylor, Pa., earned his bachelor of science and master of education degrees at East Stroudsburg, where he co-captained the Warriors' basketball and tennis teams.

JIM HOLLISTER SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR

Jim Hollister is in his 10th year as the university's sports information director in charge of maintaining and disseminating information regarding the 18 varsity athletic teams. His duties involve working with nearly 600 athletes and coaches involved in the program at Bloomsburg. He is responsible for arranging for coverage of all events and serving as host to the media at home contests.

In addition, Hollister is the editor for publications produced for the athletic department. He has been honored for his publications on 16 occasions including six "Best in the Nation" awards by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).



Hollister is a 1978 graduate of Bloomsburg and spent two years as a tennis teaching and playing professional before returning to his alma mater and his current position in August 1980. He was a four-year letterwinner as a member of the Huskies' tennis team and was a two-time Pennsylvania Conference (PC) singles champion. He remains on the school's all-time winning list as he compiled 95 victories in four seasons.

He is an active member of CoSIDA, has served on several committees, and is presently on the Special Awards Committee. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Eastern College Athletic Conference Sports Information Directors and is the president of the Pennsylvania Conference Sports Information Directors.

He served as the men's and women's basketball information director for the PC for eight years and was a member of the Bloomsburg University Alumni Association Board of Directors.

PETE ADRIAN HEAD COACH



Pete Adrian is entering his fourth season in charge of the Bloomsburg program and has continued to establish the Huskies as one of the teams to beat in the Pennsylvania Conference Eastern Division. In his initial three years, Adrian's clubs have posted marks of 7-2-1, 8-3 and 7-4 to give the coach an overall record of 22-9-1. Last season's 7-4 record gave the Huskies their fifth-straight winning season. The 1987 season's 8-3 finish marked only the fifth time a Bloomsburg squad has won as many games in a season. The other years were 1948 (9-0), 1949 (8-1), 1951 (8-0), and 1985 (12-1). The latter year, the Huskies won the conference championship and reached the national semifinals before suffering their only loss of the season. Adrian is the 15th head football coach since Bloomsburg became a four-year public institution in 1927.

Bloomsburg has appeared in the NCAA Division II national rankings in each of Adrian's three seasons and was ranked as high as 13th in the 1988 campaign. In addition, the Huskies have shown up among conference and national statistical leaders, both individually and as a team, on several occasions. During his short tenure, 23 players have earned All-Pennsylvania Conference Eastern Division honors, and four performers have earned spots on the All-East team. His teams have been among the passing and total offense leaders in the conference and finished sixth in total defense a year ago.

The head coaching position at Bloomsburg is a first for the 39-year old native of Brilliant, Ohio, as he came to the school after spending the previous 10 seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Rhode Island. Working under head coach Bob Griffin, he helped lead the Rams to consecutive 10-3 records in 1984 and 1985 and appearances in the NCAA Division I-AA national playoffs. Rhode Island also captured three Yankee Conference titles winning crowns in 1981, 1984, and 1985. During his 10 seasons at the New England school, the teams compiled an overall mark of 58-51-1 and was awarded the Lambert/Meadowlands Cup in both 1984 and 1985, symbolizing football supremacy among eastern Division I-AA clubs.

Prior to returning to Rhode Island, where he served as an assistant coach during the 1970 and 1971 seasons, Adrian was the defensive line coach under Griffin at Idaho State University in Pocatello, Idaho, from 1972 to 1975. He was also the school's head golf coach.

In addition to his football duties, Adrian has also been an instructor in the physical education departments at Idaho State and Rhode Island. He holds memberships in the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and the Masonic Lodge.

Before his first stint at Rhode Island, he was the freshman coach at West Virginia University following his graduation from that school in 1968. While at West Virginia, he played linebacker for the Mountaineers and served as the freshman team captain in his first year.

Adrian earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education at West Virginia in 1970 and his master's degree from Rhode Island in 1971.

In high school, he was a five-sport letterwinner at Brilliant High School in baseball, basketball, football, golf, and track and field.



THE HUSKIES' STAFF



Vin Sinagra - Defensive Line

Vin Sinagra, in his fourth season on the Huskies' staff, will be responsible for the defensive line. Prior to coming to BU, Sinagra was head coach at Milford Academy (CT) for four seasons. Before assuming his duties at Milford, he was defensive line coach at the University of Rhode Island. He played professional football for the Philadelphia Bell of the World Football League, after three seasons as a collegiate starter at Rhode Island.

Dave Fortunato - Offensive Line

Dave Fortunato is also in his fourth season and will serve as the Huskies' offensive line coach. He is a graduate of West Liberty (WV) State College where he played on the Hilltoppers' offensive line. He earned his master's degree at Ohio University where he was a member of the Bobcats' staff for two seasons. Fortunato is in his first season as one of the full-time members of the Bloomsburg coaching staff.



Frank Williams - Defensive Backs

Frank Williams boasts the most years (13) as a member of the Bloomsburg coaching staff. He returned to the Huskies' staff in 1982 after spending one season at nearby Bucknell. He attended Kutztown where he was an all-Pennsylvania Conference selection and is a member of that university's athletic Hall of Fame. Williams previously served on the staff from 1976-1980.

Lou Mingrone - Kickers

Lou Mingrone has been in charge of the Huskies' kickers since the 1983 season and has helped Bloomsburg's kicking game establish seven new school records during his tenure. He served as the Huskies' head soccer coach for eight years before joining the football coaching staff compiling a record of 65-42-4.



Bob Gutshall - Offensive Backs

Bob Gutshall rejoined the staff two years ago after two years as a member of the staff at Milton (Pa.) High School. This is his third stint at BU as he also coached from 1970 to 1974 and from 1982 to 1984. He will be in charge of the running backs and gained Little All-American honors in the backfield as an undergraduate at Lock Haven.



Tony Ianiero - Defensive Backs

Tony Ianiero adds a wealth of experience to the Huskies' coaching staff in his second season with the club. He spent 10 years as an assistant at Trenton State, the final seven as the Lions' defensive coordinator. That period proved to be Trenton's most successful ever as the Lions registered six-straight winning seasons and won two conference titles. Ianiero also serves as Bloomsburg's Director of Development.

Joe DeMelfi - Tight Ends

Joe DeMelfi returned to the coaching staff last season marking the third time he has been involved with the university's football program. He previously served during the 1970s and more recently under George Landis from 1982-85. He played college at Delta State and prior to that was the MVP in Pennsylvania's "Big 33" game in high school. DeMelfi is a member of the university's admissions staff.



Jay DeDea - Receivers

Jay DeDea will be in charge of the Huskies' receiving corps for the first season. He is a 1986 graduate of Bloomsburg and holds most of the school's passing records including passing yardage (7,026) and touchdowns (56). DeDea, a two-time all-conference choice, is a member of the faculty in the Bloomsburg School District and is the head boys basketball coach at Bloomsburg High School.

Brian Scriven - Defensive Ends

Brian Scriven is also on the Huskies' staff for the first time but is no stranger to the program. The all-conference performer played three different positions for the Huskies between 1983-86 both offensively and defensively. At defensive end and strong safety for three years he recorded 127 tackles, three interceptions and three sacks. In 1984, he was a runningback and gained 229 yards on 75 carries and scored twice. He also had 17 receptions for 138 yards and another touchdown.



Marshall Sills - Graduate Assistant

Marshall Sills is in his first season as the Huskies' graduate assistant coach. He will help the offensive unit, specifically the line. Sills was an all-Ohio Valley Conference selection at center during his playing days at Murray State. He also served as a captain for the Racers. His father, John Sills, is a 1963 graduate of Bloomsburg and was a member of the football team.

Wade Pickett - Student Assistant

Wade Pickett will serve as one of the Huskies' student assistant coaches following a four-year playing career at Bloomsburg. The former linebacker will work with this year's linebacking corps. As a player, Pickett served as one of the Huskies' captains in his senior year and finished both the 1987 and 1988 seasons as the club's leading tackler with 91 and 87, respectively.





Eric Speece - Student Assistant

Eric Speece is also a former member of the Huskies' program, who will remain this season as a member of the coaching staff. His main responsibilities will be to work with the offensive backfield. Speece played two seasons at Bloomsburg after transferring from Lock Haven. During his career at the two schools, the runningback rushed for 990 yards and was a three-year starter.

Ron Morgan - Equipment Manager

Ron Morgan has served as the Huskies' equipment manager for the past 15 years giving him the longest tenure of any member of the staff. He is located in the Nelson Fieldhouse and handles the needs of not only the Huskies' football program but most of the equipment for Bloomsburg's 17 other varsity sports teams as well.



Rolene Wagner - Trainer

Rolene Wagner is entering her fourth season as the Huskies' trainer. She is a former teacher and head trainer at Passiack Valley High School in New Jersey. She earned her master's degree in education from East Stroudsburg and her undergraduate degree at Lock Haven.

PREVIEW OF THE 1989 HUSKIES

If the Huskies expect to be successful in the upcoming campaign third-year head coach Pete Adrian thinks his club must "grow up in a hurry." Only nine starters return from last year's club, which finished with a 7-4 record, representing the school's fourth-consecutive winning season. Only two of those performers are on the defensive side of the ball. The club must also replace the entire offensive backfield as well as the defensive front line and linebacking corps.

Bloomsburg has built a 22-9-1 mark under Adrian in his three seasons in charge of the program and has appeared in the national rankings in each of those seasons, despite facing tough schedules and the loss of some key performers to graduation and injury. Last year the offense had to start fresh following the graduation of a pair of performers who had accounted for most of the team's offensive output in 1987. Then in game five the Huskies' top rusher and scorer, Leonard Bluitt, was lost for the season with a leg injury. Bluitt's absence was felt late in the campaign when the offense struggled during three straight losses but the squad still posted another fine season.

This season the schedule could present an even bigger obstacle as the Huskies open at James Madison, a 1987 NCAA Division I-AA national tournament participant, and also face four teams which appeared in the Division II ratings during the year. The club has finished third in the Pennsylvania Conference Eastern Division in each of the last three seasons and will again face the six PC East opponents throughout the season.

A veteran offensive line is going to be an integral part of Adrian's "growing up" theory in the early part of the season. The group, anchored by three-time all-conference center John Fulmer, will have to provide solid protection for the Huskies' new quarterback and open holes for a corps of inexperienced runners. Fulmer will be in the middle again in his final season and has some talented performers on either side. A pair of third-year starters will man the guard positions as Brian Crouthamel makes the move inside from one of the tackle spots to join another junior, Rob Grow, flanking Fulmer. Crouthamel's move will allow for another third-year starter, senior Dave Pysher, to slide from guard to tackle and he should be joined by freshman Bryan Mellinger at the other tackle slot. Mellinger, who is probably the fastest lineman, utilized his redshirt option last season, using the time to learn the Huskies' system and can fill in at center, if necessary.

One of the most interesting battles in the preseason drills could be for the vacant quarterback role. Sophomore Dave Robson saw very limited action last year, although he did start two games in the middle of the campaign which the Huskies eventually won. He rushed 26 times and threw 20 passes in predominantly a reserve role and gained more confidence in the club's offensive schemes during the spring drills. Newcomer Alan Eck, another sophomore, looked good in the spring workouts and turned in a fine performance in the Maroon and Gold game completing 11 of 15 passes for 182 yards and a touchdown. Eck sat out last season after transferring but will be given a good look by the staff for the starting job.

Four runningbacks who have very limited experience in the backfield should see a lot of time this season. Junior John Cannon and sophomore Jerry Marks appear to have the inside track to the starting jobs, however, junior Scott Walton and sophomore Mike Sohn could step in at any time and will see plenty of action. Cannon's speed and strength give the Huskies a double threat when he is in the game and he will most likely do the bulk of the ball carrying. He rushed just nine times a year ago and also returned five kickoffs. Marks was also on the kick return unit handling 11 kickoffs and carrying the ball seven times gaining limited backfield exposure. Walton was the team's leading kick returner last season returning 15 kicks for 266 yards, an average of 17.7 yards per return. He will remain in that capacity this season in addition to seeing a lot of time in the backfield. Sohn returns after sitting out last year and will also see considerable action. He led the team in kickoff returns in 1987 but has limited experience in the backfield carrying only eight times two years ago.

Several quality receivers will give the Huskies' quarterbacks many options in the passing attack. Tight end Paul Lonergan led the club in receiving last year with 40 catches for 508 yards and will return at that spot. In addition, wide receiver Jeff Sparks, who has 38 catches for 614 yards and nine touchdowns over the past two seasons, is back on the outside where he earned all-conference honors a year ago. Joining the senior duo will be junior Stef Kern who will be in the other wide receiver position. Kern had seven receptions for 187 yards and a touchdown last season to top the club in yards per catch at 28.1.

Defensively, a mainly veteran secondary will have to make its presence known early in the season to offset the inexperience that will prevail in front of it as five of seven performers up front will be starting for the first time. The return of two-time all-conference safety Derrick Hill, who missed last season, will bolster the backfield, giving the club three players with vast experience. Hill led the team in interceptions in 1986 and 1987 and was the squad's top punt returner in both seasons. He will be the Huskies' starting strong safety.

Junior Trent Dennis will man the free safety position where he has seen a lot of action in each of his first two seasons. He tied for the team lead in interceptions last season and, along with Hill, gives the Huskies one of the top safety combinations in the conference. He was also the team's top punt return man last season. Third-year starter Tom Heavey was one of the top defensive performers last season and will be back at one of the cornerback slots. He was very active and finished third on the team in total defensive points. The other corner position could be filled by junior Jerome Wilson, who earned the spot based on his performance during the spring. Another junior, Jeff Naugle, will see plenty of action as he can play any of the backfield spots and will definitely be on the field in passing situations. Naugle will also be the Huskies' punter.

A year ago John Hellgren made the move from linebacker to defensive end and enjoyed a fine season finishing second on the team in sacks of the opposing quarterbacks. The senior is one of only two performers returning at any one of the front line or linebacking positions and he will have to have a good year for the Huskies' defense to be successful. Sophomore Jacob Robinson looks like the starter on the other side following the spring drills, however, junior Jeff Haflett will see a lot of time after playing mostly on the special teams' unit during the last two years.

In the middle, senior Brian Angney was a part-time starter last season after missing the entire 1987 campaign with an injury. He played in all 11 games a year ago and will enter the season as the team's top linebacker. Two sophomores with limited experience should both see time beside Angney. E. J. Weston, who sat out last season, and Seth Kizel, who was a solid special teams' player and reserve defensive end, both have the skills and knowledge to turn in good seasons but must mature rapidly to give the club the stability it needs in the center of the defense.

Five players could all see ample time in the line for the defensive squad. Good size and quickness give the group the right tools to make an impact, however, as is the case with most of the defense, this unit must learn fast. Sophomore Mike Gonzales and senior Rob Joiner give the Huskies' a pair of good nose guards. Gonzales came out of the spring workouts as the starter but Joiner is the one player among the five with any experience and that should earn him a lot of playing time.

A junior and a pair of freshmen will fill the two tackle roles. Larry Beilis is in his third year with the Huskies and was a reserve performer last year after seeing some time with the special teams, while Chaine Casner and Cord Ferrari both possess good quickness and could cause problems for opposing quarterbacks.

Although an injury forced him to miss a few games, sophomore Mark Weiss handled most of the kicking duties a year ago. He was successful on nine of 11 extra-point attempts and made seven of 12 field goals.

A LOOK AT THE HUSKIES' 1989 VETERANS

Brian Angney, LB, 5-11, 218, senior

Comes out of the Huskies' spring drills as the number one linebacker. Returned to the club last season after an injury forced him the entire 1987 campaign. Enjoyed a fine season playing in all 11 games a year ago with 54 tackles including 19 unassisted hits. He also had a fumble recovery and caused another. In his two seasons of action he has recorded 67 tackles and recovered two opponent fumbles.



Larry Bellis, DT, 6-0, 238, junior

Played as a reserve tackle a year ago and steps into the starting role on the defensive line this season. Reads offensive blocking schemes well and is one of the top technicians on the defense. Also one of the strongest members of the team. Registered nine tackles in limited action last season and saw some time with the special teams as a freshman.



John Cannon, RB, 6-0, 203, junior

Will be in his first season as one of the Huskies' starting backfield performers. Has breakaway speed as well as strength for inside running. Expected to handle the ball between 25 and 30 times a game if the Huskies' offense is going to be successful. Limited time a year ago saw him carry just nine times for 33 yards, an average of 3.7 per rush. He also had one catch for eight yards and returned five kickoffs for 60 yards.



Chaine Casner, DT, 6-3, 252, freshman

Spent last season learning the Huskies' system and appears ready to step into an active role. Is the club's biggest defensive lineman who needs to gain experience and could do so right away as one of the starting tackles. Is very quick for his size and has the potential and other necessary tools to make things happen up front.



Brian Crouthamel, OG, 6-5, 310, junior

Third year as a starter on the offensive line and one of four returning starters up front. Making the move from tackle to guard but should have no problem adjusting if the spring workouts are any indication. Has improved both his quickness and technique which could make him one of the Pennsylvania Conference's top offensive linemen.





Trent Dennis, FS, 6-0, 189, junior

Has seen a lot of action in his first two seasons with the club. A good athlete who has potential to be one of the conference's top performers. Saw plenty of action last season and tied for the team lead in interceptions with five. Also had 20 tackles and a fumble recovery. Along with Derrick Hill, gives the Huskies one of the top safety combinations in the conference. Team's top punt returner last year with 20 for 86 yards.



Alan Eck, QB, 6-0, 175, sophomore

Turned in an excellent spring practice session topped by a fine effort in the Maroon and Gold game. In that contest he completed 11 of 15 passes for 182 yards and a touchdown. He will battle for the starting role after proving he can run the team. Possesses a good arm and continues to improve in all areas. A fine student who transferred from Grove City College.



Cord Ferrari, DT, 6-4, 218, freshman

In his first season with the club in an active role after using his redshirt option last season. Could make an immediate impact as one of the Huskies' top five defensive linemen. An excellent pass rusher who gives the defense good mobility up front. Will see plenty of action especially in passing situations.



John Fulmer, C, 6-3, 265, senior

Had a fine season a year ago as the leader of the offensive line. Was named to the all-conference second team unit for the third time in his career after returning from a knee injury which forced him to miss the entire 1987 season. Is playing as a post graduate and should use his vast experience to have his best season to date.



Mike Gonzales, NG, 6-0, 250, sophomore

Finished the spring as the Huskies' starting nose guard. Will be one of three newcomers on the defensive line making the area one of the squad's most inexperienced. Very tenacious and aggressive, both attributes which make him a good player for the position. Also uses good strength to his advantage.




Rob Grow, OG, 6-2, 262, junior

Rob Joiner, NG, 5-11, 225, senior

Will start opposite Jeff Sparks giving the Huskies a pair of quality receivers on the outside. Improved his routes since last season and has developed a better understanding of the game. Had seven catches a year ago for 187 yards and one touchdown. Led the team in yards per catch with an average of 28.1 per reception.




**Seth Kizel, LB, 6-2, 192, sophomore**

**Paul Lonergan, TE, 6-5, 211, senior**

Expected to have the same type of season he had a year ago when he topped the club in receiving. Gained weight in the off-season which should aid in his blocking assignments. One person the Huskies will look to for yardage on key downs. Good hands and height make him a good target for the passers. Caught 40 passes for 508 yards last year.

**Jerry Marks, RB, 5-9, 200, sophomore**

Finished the spring as one of the Huskies' starting backfield performers. Has a lot of potential to make an impact right away and is a good compliment to John Cannon in the running attack. Saw considerable action last season mainly as a kickoff returner. Had seven carries for 13 yards in limited backfield exposure but returned 11 kickoffs for 185 yards, an average of 16.8 per return.

**Bryan Mellinger, OT, 6-1, 219, freshman**

Spent last season as a redshirt learning the team's system. Excellent spring practice sessions vaulted him to a spot among the top five offensive linemen. Has played center but will move to the outside in one of the tackle spots for this season. Very quick and is probably the fastest of the Huskies' line performers.

**Jeff Naugle, DB, 5-11, 162, junior**

A very versatile performer who can play any of the defensive backfield positions. Good athlete who moves to the ball, and reads situations well. Will probably be the club's "nickel-back" as well as spending a lot more time on the field in relief. Will also be the team's punter after spending two seasons as the backup at that spot.

**Dave Pysher, OT, 6-2, 245, senior**

Another third-year starter who spent the last two years at guard but will move over to a tackle spot this fall. Technically has become very sound and is a fine pass blocker. Good size and strength should help him have a good year. Very solid and experienced which should help him adjust quickly to the new position.

One of four runningbacks who will see a lot of action for the squad. A strong inside runner who is also a fine blocker which makes him an asset in short yardage situations.



Jeff Sparks, WR, 6-1, 160, senior

Another veteran player who must handle the ball for the Huskies to be successful. Good speed and great hands make him a threat to score from anywhere on the field. Was the team scoring leader in 1987 and earned all-conference recognition last season. Has made 38 catches for 614 yards and nine touchdowns in the last two campaigns.



Scott Walton, RB, 5-7, 175, junior



REVIEW OF THE HUSKIES' 1988 SEASON

The Huskies started the 1988 campaign fast winning their first four games, and went on the post the school's fifth-consecutive winning season with a final record of 7-4. Victories over Norfolk State, Shippensburg, Lock Haven, and Kutztown got the team off on the right track before Pennsylvania Conference Eastern Division foe West Chester handed the club its first defeat. A three-game winning streak followed with triumphs coming over East Stroudsburg, Cheyney, and Mansfield to raise the Huskies' record to a fine 7-1 mark. The squad's outstanding record lifted it to the 13th position in the NCAA Division II national rankings and kept its national playoff hopes alive. However, three straight losses to close the season dashed any playoff aspirations and dropped the club out of the national polls. A Millersville win ended the Huskies' chances of a PC East crown and the club settled for third place for the third year in a row. Indiana (Pa.) and New Haven scored wins to end the year on a sour note.

GAME ONE - September 3: Bloomsburg 14 Norfolk State 7

A solid defensive effort would lift the Huskies over the homestanding Spartans in the season opener. The Huskies held their opponents to just 62 yards in total offense while registering three sacks and recovering two fumbles. Mike Medina put the visitors on top in the opening period capping a long drive when he went in from 16 yards out. Mark Weiss added the extra point. Medina's backfield mate, Leonard Bluitt, put the Huskies further ahead late in the third period when he scored on a three-yard run and Weiss' kick made it 14-0 entering the final quarter. However, the Spartans, who were stifled offensively all afternoon, depended on their special teams as an 89 yard punt return for a score early in the quarter kept the Spartans alive. The extra-point attempt failed and the Huskies' defense continued its fine play to seal the win.

GAME TWO - September 10: Bloomsburg 21 Shippensburg 7

On the road for the second-consecutive week, the Huskies again jumped ahead early and relied on good defense to post win number two. Tom Heavey recovered a fumble deep in Bloomsburg territory on the game's first possession and the Huskies marched 88 yards with Paul Venesky going in from three yards out. After the Red Raiders missed a field goal the Huskies took over again with the same result. Eric Speece went three yards for a score and Weiss kicked the second of his three conversions to give the visitors a 14-0 advantage. The defense, which had two interceptions and two fumble recoveries, faltered only once allowing a 59-yard touchdown pass late in the opening half. The Huskies wasted no time after the break as they scored on their first possession when Bluitt (129 yards) scored from five yards away.

GAME THREE - September 17: Bloomsburg 17 Lock Haven 6

A pair of scores late in the game helped the Huskies to win their home opener against the much-improved Bald Eagles. Bluitt's one-yard run was the only score of the first half by either team. Lock Haven drew close in the third quarter on an 86-yard touchdown pass but the conversion kick failed and that was as close as the visitors could get. A pair of Trent Dennis' interceptions led the defense and Bluitt gained more than 100 yards for the third straight week. Bluitt capped a long drive early in the fourth quarter with his second touchdown run of the day to give the Huskies some breathing room and Drew Lotsis' 27-yard field goal accounted for the final margin.

GAME FOUR - September 24: Bloomsburg 14 Kutztown 9

The Huskies trailed for the first time in the season as the visiting Bears kicked a field goal in the first period. A fumble recovery by Brian Angney set up Bloomsburg's first score, a three-yard run by Bluitt to give the Huskies a 7-3 halftime lead. Venesky, who passed for 152 yards in the game, connected with Mike Medina on a 30-yard scoring pass in the third quarter to up

the lead to 14-3. Kutztown went on an 80-yard drive late in the contest to score with just over two minutes left but the conversion pass and ensuing on-sides kick failed and the Huskies held on for their fourth win of the year and first in the PC Eastern Division.

GAME FIVE - September 30: West Chester 24 Bloomsburg 9

The Huskies held a 9-7 halftime lead under the lights at West Chester but the Rams scored on both of their third quarter possessions to hand Bloomsburg its first loss of the year. Trailing 7-0, the Huskies marched from their own eight-yard line with Bluitt going in from one yard out. The conversion kick was blocked but the visitors took the lead a short time later following Dan Shutt's interception. The Huskies started in great position at the West Chester 12-yard line but had to settle for a 23-yard field goal by Lotsis. After the intermission the Rams put together drives of 68 and 39 yards to take control of the contest. A field goal in the final quarter accounted for the final tally as the Rams' defense, which had nine sacks, toughened and held the Huskies to only 23 offensive yards in the second half.

GAME SIX - October 8: Bloomsburg 18 East Stroudsburg 7

Bruce Linton's 53-yard interception return for a score with just over a minute left in the contest topped a fine defensive effort and got the Huskies back on the winning track. Five interceptions and three fumble recoveries by the defense kept the Warriors out of the endzone while the Huskies' offense built a 12-0 lead on a pair of Weiss field goals of 26 and 36 yards, respectively, and a 25-yard Venesky-to-Jeff Sparksring pass. East Stroudsburg pulled close when the Warriors scored on an intercepted pass and returned for a score late in the fourth quarter. All of the Huskies' points came as a result of turnovers by the visitors. Bluitt surpassed the 100-yard mark for the fourth time in the season with 101 rushing yards in the game. In addition to Linton's fine defensive play, strong safety Shutt added a fumble recovery, which led to a score, and an interception in the Huskies' endzone which stopped a Warrior drive.

GAME SEVEN - October 15: Bloomsburg 3 Cheyney 0

The defensive unit continued to shine, limiting the sixth opponent in seven games to single-digit scoring as the Huskies picked up a tough road win at the expense of the Wolves. A Weiss field goal with 10:55 left in the contest were the only points either offense could put on the board. The Huskies' offense managed only 92 yards in the game against the nationally-ranked Cheyney defense but the Huskies' defense proved as tough by keeping the home team out of the endzone and forcing five turnovers. Again, the turnovers proved to be the difference as John Hellgren fell on a Cheyney fumble at the Wolves' 29-yard line to set up Weiss' game-winning kick. The Huskies' offensive effort was also stifled by what proved to be a season-ending injury to Bluitt, who was the team's leading rusher after the first six games.

GAME EIGHT - October 22: Bloomsburg 9 Mansfield 0

The foot of Weiss, the weather, and the Huskies' defense told the story in this victory which marked the fourth consecutive year that Bloomsburg posted at least seven wins. Three Weiss field goals provided all the points the Huskies would need in the cold, wet Homecoming contest. The freshman connected on kicks of 21, 29, and 31 yards, two of which were the result of Mountie turnovers, and missed on three other attempts. Mansfield was held to 175 yards in total offense and turned the ball over six times on four interceptions and two fumbles. In addition, the Mounties did not convert on a third-down play all afternoon. Tight end Paul Lonergan had a good day with seven catches for 81 yards and on the other side of the ball Shutt had two of the interceptions.

GAME NINE - October 29: Millersville 51 Bloomsburg 17

The Huskies led 10-7 after a quarter but then the roof fell in as the homestanding Marauders scored 23 points in the second quarter to turn an anticipated close game into a rout. In this game it was the Huskies who were guilty of turnovers as they gave away three interceptions and three fumbles. A Weiss 25-yard field goal and a Venesky-to-Sparks 27-yard pass accounted for the Huskies early lead. Venesky connected with his other wide receiver, Stef Kern, in the final period for the other Bloomsburg points. The Marauders, who would eventually win the PC Eastern Division and advance to the national playoffs, took full advantage of the Huskies' mistakes and rolled up 450 yards in total offense. Five of Millersville's eight scores came following Bloomsburg turnovers.

GAME TEN - November 5: Indiana (Pa.) 32 Bloomsburg 7

The Huskies took the lead in this game as well but the offense never got started and powerful Indiana ran away to an easy win. After a scoreless first quarter, tackle Chris Gross realized a lineman's dream midway through the second quarter when he picked off an Indiana pass and ran 48 yards for the first score of the game to put the Huskies on top. Weiss' kick made it 7-0. The visitors wasted little time getting back in the contest as they took the ensuing kickoff and marched 69 yards for a score. The conversion failed and the Huskies led 7-6 at halftime. The Indians took the second half kickoff and scored again and added another touchdown before the end of the third period to take control of the game. The Huskies managed only 127 yards in total offense.

GAME ELEVEN - November 12: New Haven 26 Bloomsburg 2

A disastrous fourth quarter was the cause of the Huskies' third-consecutive defeat as they trailed just 6-2 entering the final period but gave up 20 unanswered points to the Chargers and closed the season on a down note. Ron Sahm's blocked punt was one of the few bright spots for the visitors. He got to the Chargers' punter late in the first half and blocked the attempted kick at the 27-yard line and eventually the home team fell on the ball in the endzone giving the Huskies the safety and a 2-0 lead at halftime. After the Chargers scored in the third period to take the lead, the Huskies blocked their second kick of the afternoon when Jerome Wilson knocked down the extra-point attempt. However, three of the next four times the Chargers had the ball they put it in the endzone to pull away to the victory.

Some offensive revamping faces the Chargers' second-year head coach Mark Whipple but some talented veterans should make the transition period a little smoother. PENNSYLVANIA STATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (Pennsylvania Conference) is comprised of 14 schools in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. This new governing body took over from the Department of Education on July 1, 1983, and the change was also reflected in the granting of university status to all member institutions formerly known as "state colleges." Dr. James H. McCormick is the chancellor of the Pennsylvania SSHE.

The programs in the Pennsylvania Conference are under the leadership of a Board of Directors, which consists of the 14 university presidents. The organization of the conference, through its separate divisions of men's and women's athletics, is unique because it enables both programs to develop independently while sharing common goals. One of the largest conferences in the nation, the Pennsylvania Conference sponsors championship competition in 10 sports for men and 10 for women as follows: Fall Season - Men - cross country, football, soccer; Women - cross country, field hockey, tennis, and volleyball. Winter Season - Men - basketball, swimming and diving, wrestling; Women - basketball, gymnastics, and swimming and diving. Spring Season - Men - baseball, golf, tennis, track and field; Women - lacrosse, softball, and track and field.

All 14 schools are members of Division II of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). In individual sports, however, some schools have elected to compete in either NCAA Divisions I or III.


Athletes and teams have won numerous honors in national competition and have helped the Pennsylvania Conference become one of the most respected "small college" conferences in the nation.

ROBERT B. REDMAN STADIUM
"HOME OF THE HUSKIES"



Robert B. Redman Stadium is situated on the upper campus of Bloomsburg University as part of the university's 103-acre athletic complex. Completed in February 1974, the new facility took the place of Athletic Park in downtown Bloomsburg as "Home of the Huskies." The stadium, which overlooks the scenic Susquehanna Valley, has seating for 5,000 spectators, although attendance at several events has exceeded that total. The largest crowd to witness a football game in the facility totalled 7,483 at the 1985 Homecoming contest against Millersville.

The area is designed for expansion should such a project be needed and contains large storage capabilities as well as a concession stand and restrooms. The university's upper campus also contains the E.H. Nelson Fieldhouse, Danny Litwhiler Field (baseball), and a huge field area which serves as home for the Huskies' soccer and lacrosse teams along with multiple practice fields. Located inside the stadium confines is an all-weather track used by BU's men's and women's track and field teams. A pressbox with seating for more than 40 persons is situated on top of the west stands.

Originally, when planning began for the new stadium in 1963, the proposed site was the area now occupied by 18 tennis courts on the lower campus; however, a consultant's report recommended the upper campus development. The project finally got underway in 1972 at a total cost of \$725,000.

On Saturday, September 21, 1974, the first game was played in the stadium, and dedication ceremonies were held naming the facility in honor of Redman.

A native of Sayre, Pa., and a graduate of its public schools, Coach Redman graduated with honors in economics at Swarthmore College where he also participated in four years of varsity football activities, served as captain during his senior year, and was also a varsity performer with the baseball team. He earned his Master of Arts degree in economics at Pennsylvania State University during his tenure at Bloomsburg State College.

Redman had coached at Sayre High School and North High School in Binghamton, N.Y., prior to serving as an officer in the United States Navy during World War II. He left the service with the rank of lieutenant commander. He returned to his coaching duties at North High School and remained there until his appointment at Bloomsburg in 1947.

In addition to serving as head coach of two varsity teams, Redman also served as dean of men and taught a full schedule of courses in economics.

During his five years at Bloomsburg, his teams won 38 games while losing only four. His record included three Pennsylvania Conference championships and two undefeated teams. He left Bloomsburg in September 1952 to become head football coach at East Orange Senior High School, N.J. During the late 50s, he was appointed principal of the senior high school, and his untimely death occurred in 1960 shortly after he had been elected superintendent of schools in East Orange, N.J.
