
Some carping comes from those who thought the players handed off their lines too rapidly last night, and by poor timing robbed the audience of laughs. The play has punch lines all the way through three acts.

2 Sophs, Senior Take Leads In 'Sabrina Fair' Next Week

"Sabrina Fair," the first major production of the College Players will be presented in Price Auditorium Nov. 8-9.

Dr. Jack Handley will direct this work of Samuel Taylor. The play has been highly successful as both a movie and on stage.

Leading characters in the production will be Carol Hockenberry as Sabrina; Ken Bumgarner as Linus, son of Sabrina's father's employer; and Fred Hammer as David, Linus' brother.

Miss Hockenberry is a sophomore in elementary education from Camp Hill. An active dramatist, she has played leading roles in "Fair Exchange," "The Egg and I," "Twelve Pound Look" and "Hello Out There." Her present activities include historian of Alpha Sigma Tau, member of the Association for Childhood Education, reporter for The Eagle Eye and member of the College Players.

The lead role in this delightful comedy is a challenge to any

aspiring actress. Miss Hockenberry said: "Sabrina Fair is a wonderful play. It is almost a dream come true having the part of Sabrina. It is an experience I'll never forget!"

Ken Bumgarner, a senior in physical education is also enthused about his part as "Linus Larabee, Jr." Ken is a native of Beech Creek and has been on the gym team and football squad for four years. He is also a member of Kappa Delta Rho and the Varsity Club. He hopes to do graduate work in his field when he completes his studies at LHSC. When asked about his extracurricular interests he replied, "All sports . . . and anything that is fun!"

Fred Hammer, a sophomore in Social Science will portray David Larabee. His interest in dramatics stems from backstage work in high school plays. His hobbies include writing poetry and those who have sampled it are looking forward to reading more in the upcoming issue of the "Crucible."

Players to Present Greek 'Antigone'

"Antigone," a dramatization of the Greek myth concerned with the daughter of Oedipus, will be presented by the College Players at 8:15 p.m. today and tomorrow in Price Auditorium.

The play is adapted by Lewis Galantieri from the play by Anouilh. The "plot" is simple. Creon, successor to the Theban throne upon the death of Oedipus, has ordained that the corpse of Oedipus' son, Polynices, a revolutionary, is to be left to be mangled by the vultures and the dogs. Anyone who attempts to give him burial is himself to be put to death. Antigone, revolted by this godless and inhuman edict, tried to bury her brother.

Art Emery, remembered for his performance in "The Boor" and "The Apollo of Bellac," is cast as Creon, perhaps one of the most persuasive dictators ever portrayed on the stage.

Matching wits, in the electrifying role of Antigone, is Joan Burroughs. Joan was the sensuous grandmother in last semester's production of "White Dresses."

The Greek Chorus, though originally consisting of many voices, has now been reduced to one. Monte Shepler of "The Sand Box" fame takes this part.

Others in the cast include Karen Richardson as the Nurse; Chick Hamlin as the First

Guard; John Crowley as Haemon, Creon's son; Nancy Smith as Ismene, sister to Antigone; Alan Dessenberger as the Second Guard; Harry Sisak as the Third Guard; Dick Ballentine as the Page; Joan Kochik as the Messenger; and Karen McMichael as Eurydice, Creon's wife.

Dr. Jack Handley, associate professor of speech and drama, is directing. Mrs. Hazel Rae Ferguson, assistant professor of speech made the costumes, and Chuck Gummo, junior in biology, is in charge of lighting.

The play was originally chosen as part of a Greek year celebration on campus in conjunction with the library.

'Antigone' Cast Selections Made


A tentative cast has been selected by Director Jack Handley for the College Players' winter production, "Antigone," to be presented Feb. 21-22 in Price Auditorium.
