## 'Smilin' Thru' Effectively Given By College Players

Further evidence that Lock Haven is coming into its own once more in the field of worthwhile and entertaining local dramatic productions was evidenced last evening at the Teachers College auditorium where the college dramatics club, Chi Kappa Sigma, presented the ever-popular "Smilin' Thru" in a beautifully enacted and beautifully staged lighted the audience which filled delighted the audience which filled the auditorium for the occasion.

The college players, directed by Miss C. Cordelia Brong, whose thorough-going handiwork was evidenced in many important details of the presentation, are showing an increasing maturity in dramatic performances, and aided by the excellent stage facilities of the new auditorium, are increasingly able to offer entertainment of high calibre.

"Smilin' Thru" capably lived up to the reputation of the club's earlier production this year in the new auditorium, "Death Takes A Holiday," and the audience went away highly pleased with the play, many of them expressing this

pleasure informally in some after-the-play discussions in the lobby.

### "Old Men" Score

With a highly capable quartet in the romantic leads, composed of Miss Charlotte Figgles of this city as the fated "Moonyeen Clare," Miss Jane Shull of Pittsburgh as the vivacious "Kathleen Dungan-non," William Masterson of this city as "John Carteret," and J. Russell Gabel of Philadelphia as "Kenneth Wayne"—still the show, for many of the audience, was "stolen" by the two "old men" of the cast, "John Cartaret" in his older years as played by Mr. Masterson, and "Dr. Owen Harding" as enacted by William R. Bittner.

Mr. Masterson, seen in many local productions in recent years, is developing well. His role this year was similar in certain respects, particularly on the score of aging, with the one he played last year with Miss Shull in "Mrs. Moonlight," and he played his "John Carteret" with a skill and ease which showed growth over his fine performance last year.

Mr. Bittner's interpretation of "Dr. Owen" was a perfect foil for Mr. Masterson's "Carteret," and

## 'Smilin' Thru' Presented At T. C. Tomorrow, Friday

"Smilin' Thru," a phantasy-comedy, will be presented Thursday and Friday nights by the Dramatics Club of the Teachers College in the new college auditorium. Following seven weeks rehearsal under the direction of Miss C. Cordelia Brong, this play promises more than any work yet done by this organization.

The curtain will rise at 8.15 to reveal a stage setting more elaborate and beautiful than the one for "Death Takes a Holiday" which was performed last Fall, a quaint English cottage in a colorful flower garden.

In the leading role of "Kathleen Duncannon," is Miss Jane Shull of Pittsburgh. Supporting her in the part of "Kenneth Wayne," is James Russell Gabel of Philadelphia.

"John Carteret," "Kathleen's" irate uncle who for deep set reasons of his own will not permit the son of "Jeremiah Wayne" (played by I. B. Nolan of Flemington) to so much as set foot on his premises, will be interpreted by William Masterson of Lock Haven. His best
