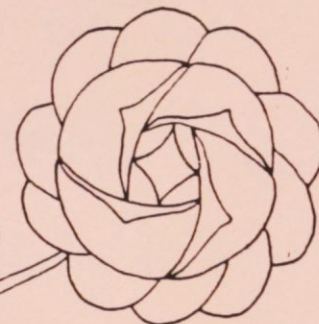

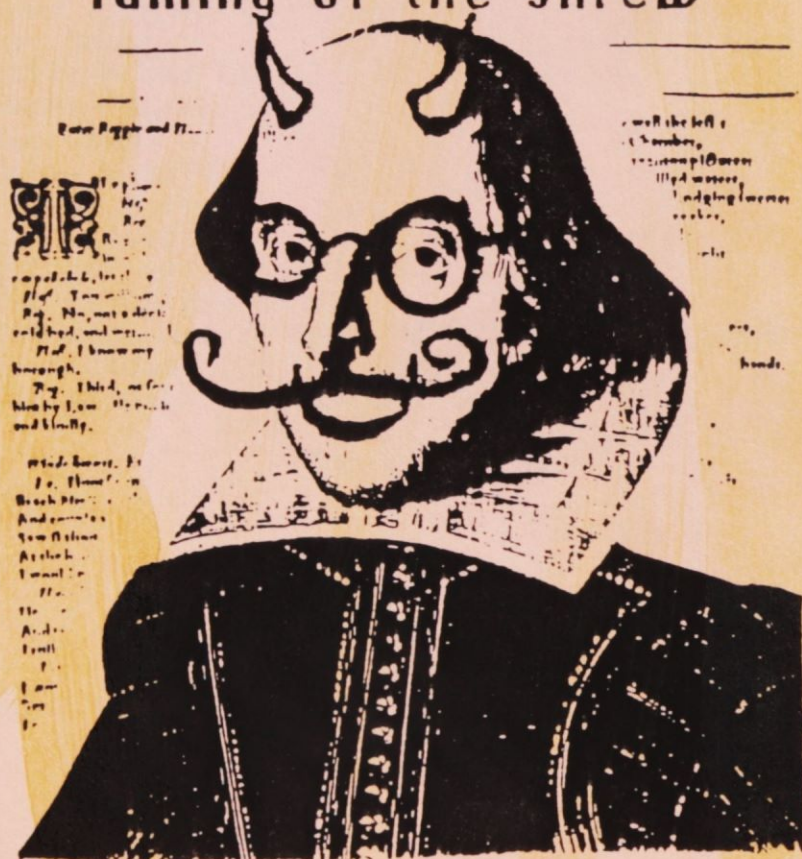

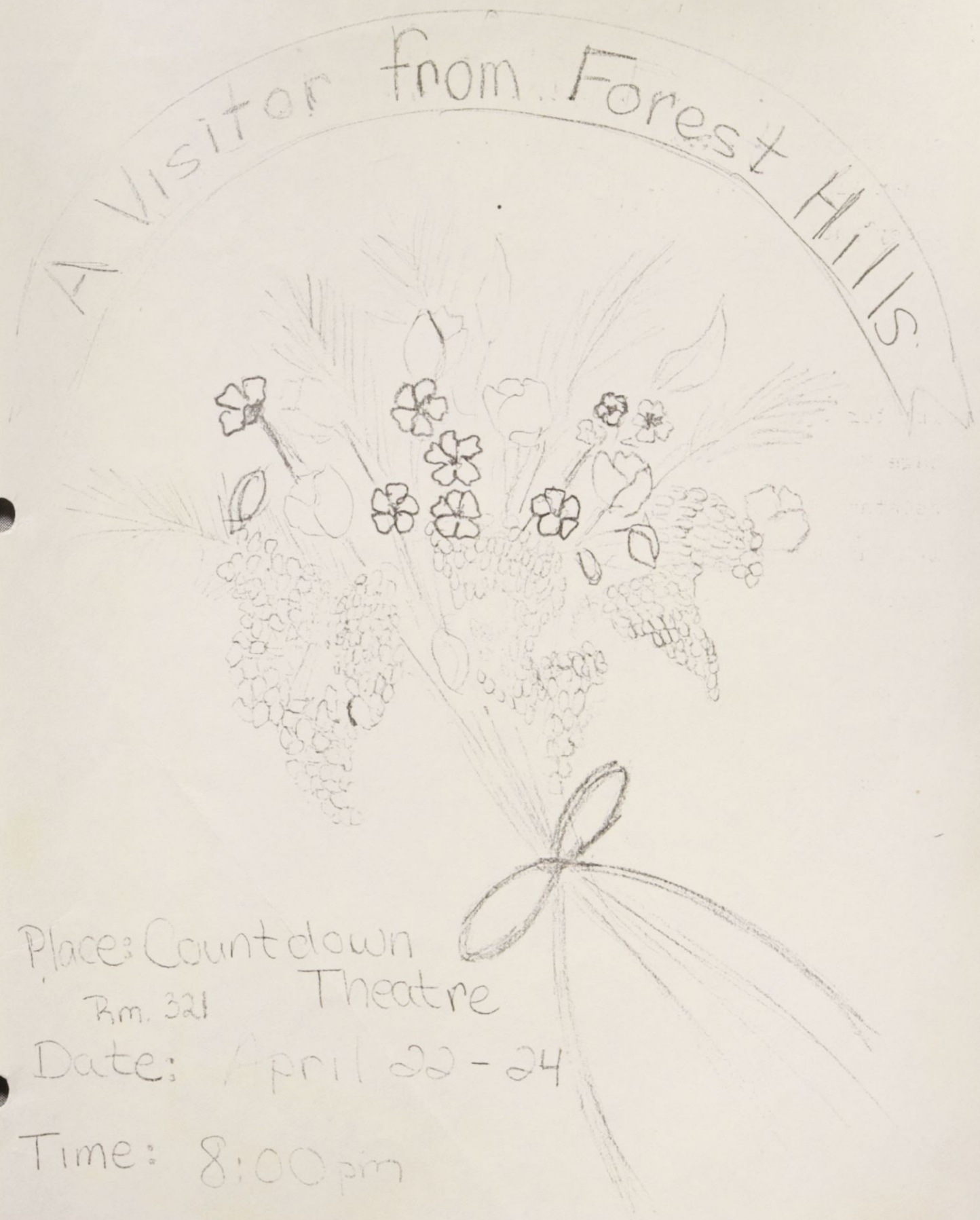

Campbell said that in developing her character for the "Scraps" monologue she found it very "interesting to talk to someone else and get their feedback on the character. It's challenging to portray the character realistically. On the surface she
